The spirit of the ASB election code intends
to give all students, regardless of social as-
filiation, an equal opportunity to seek office.
Any flier displaping the names of more
than one candidate violated this code because
it offers an advantage to those persons in
two ways: by increasing the circulation of
individuals names (the code limits the num-
ber of on-campus handouts to six) and af-
fording each an opportunity to be eleceted by
association rather than qualifications.
The sections of the code which pertain to
such lists were revised just this year by Stu-
dent Councili, in an effort to prevent campus
domination by political machines. With the
defeat of SPUR last year, student govern-
ment was opened to more "independent
domination."
But this year's election saw a revival of
the party system when the Community for

New Poitics (CNP) and Sparta Party be-
came active. While Ira Meltzer assumed the
leadership of CNP, Sparta Party leadership of CNP, Sparta Party, originally

| Student Council . . . legal or illegal? <br> This was the big question at yesterday's meeting. <br> Particular attention was drawn to the issue when Treasurer John Bruckman refused to discuss any of the seven budgets that council was to act upon. <br> "At this moment, there is no such body as Student Council in my mind," he said. "I think you are meeting illegally. Council was dissolved when the installation date was set for the new officers." <br> This date, however, was declared invalid by the judiciary. <br> "The only reason I'm here is because I was directed to pass out budgets by the assistant dean of men, Hal Smith," he said. "I'm doing this under protest." <br> "Do you still consider yourself treasurer?" asked grad rep Dick Miner. <br> PASSER-OUTER' <br> "No," replied Bruckman. <br> "What do you consider yourself then?" he asked. <br> "Official budget passer-outer," the treasurer said. <br> Bruckman left immediately after passing out the budgets. <br> The question of Student Council's legality in meeting had been | discussed previous to Bruckman's appearance. The body had decided that their meetings were legal until the new council had been installed. <br> NO CHANGEOVER <br> Jerry Newman, a member of the judiciary, concurred. "Speaking as a student, I feel that the judiciary's intent was that the present members should serve until the new ones are installed," he said. <br> At yesterday's meeting, the council acted to prevent faculty involvement in elections. Introduced by senior rep Bob Stahl, the resolution requests Academic Council to adopt a policy statement "prohibiting faculty participation in ASB elections." <br> In other business, council passed budgets for Summer Sessions, ASB public relations and the Orientation Committee. <br> The Summer Sessions account received $\$ 15,000$ by a $10-0-0$ vote.
