In the opening section of "The God of Creation" the audience takes an imaginary trip to the stars to view complex gyrations of the solar system. Photography is taken through the giant 100nch telescope of Mt. Wilson observatory in southern California. Beauties of the natural sciences are demonstrated in another section of the film through the use f. lapse-time photography. The llusion of flower buds developing into full-bloom blossoms in a few seconds on the screen is the metamorphesis of a caterpillar through the various stages from worm to butterfly, and the pollination of lowers.
Believed by Dr. Moody to be the first of their kind are the natural color pictures of photo ynthesis, the food-manufacturing pocess resulting from the aetion of sunitght on green leaves.
