CONTESTANTS TO DRAW LUCKY NUMBERS TONIGHT

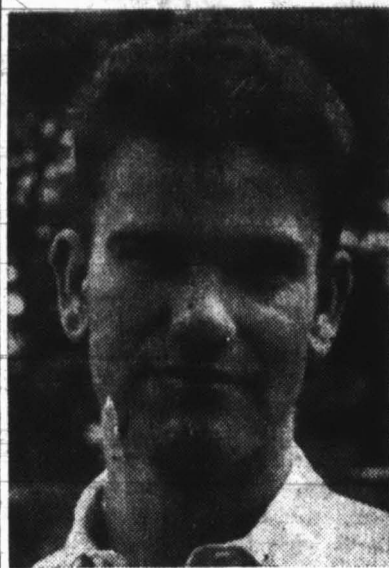
Emerson "Doc" Arends is the new San Jose State college student body president.

As the count reached a new record of 1682 ballots, Arends defeated his nearest rival, Hal Riddle, by thirty six votes in one of the closest races in ASB history. Arends polled 859 to 832 for Riddle.

Arends and the outgoing president Marty Taylor will leave Mills field in San Francisco this morning at 9:30 by United airlines for the Pacific Students Presidents' association convention at the University of British Columbia in Vancouver, B. C.

The three day meet will bring student body presidents from all western states, British Columbia, and Hawaii, Taylor states. Purpose of the conference is to discuss problems encountered by student prexy's, and to give the presidents-elect an opportunity to acquaint themselves with the duties of their office.

WOMEN ACCEPT CONSTITUTION

Women students yesterday adopted the new AWS constitution by an almost unanimous vote.

With the acceptance of this constitution, the Associated Women's Activities, is officially reorganized, so that only social and service functions are handled by the Associated Women Students, and all women's recreational activities are sponsored by the Women's Athletic Association.

One major change in the new constitution concerns the election of AWS officers. In the past, candidates for offices on the AWA cabinet have been nominated at the weekly meetings. Under the new system, women petition for certain offices instead of being nominated.

The constitution also provides that women run for a particular office instead of for the cabinet in general as had been done in the past. Executive officers who will be elected by women students are president, two vice-presidents, secretary, and treasurer.

ELECTION CHANGE EXPLAINED BY MARTY TAYLOR

In a meeting held in Dean Pitman's office late yesterday afternoon, Marty Taylor outlined the principle reason for the change in the voting procedure for the past election from Australian to preferential. The outgoing ASB president listed the trip to Vancouver as the principle factor governing the Council's change in voting style. "Due to the late primary, it was necessary to eliminate the possibility of another run-off," Taylor said.

"Doc" Arends, Hal Riddle, and Sal Millan were present at the meeting yesterday and all stated that they had no complaints at the set-up. Doug Morrison told the Spartan Daily that he was also satisfied with the manner in which the election was carried on.

The change to an Australian ballot was brought about in the spring quarter of 1946 on a referendum to the student body, but was never included in the constitution or the by-laws of the ASB.

Taylor and student body Treasurer Jim Gualtieri proposed that the status of the preferential ballot be submitted to the Student Court for clarification at the next meeting of the student council.

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STUDENTS TO MEET ATHLETES

MAY 23 IS VET SUPPLY DEADLINE

"Veterans will not be able to purchase supplies for this quarter under the GI Bill after Friday, May 16," announces Harry E. Brakebill, of the Business office. "Deadline for purchasing books and equipment is May 23."

It is advisable, according to Brakebill, to purchase these supplies as early as possible. The maximum expenditure for supplies for veterans enrolled in the college under the provisions of Public Law 346 and Public Law 16 is \$3.50.

"Only those supplies listed under Item 5 of the veterans' purchase request are to be charged this allowance," Brakebill said.

These are to be considered general supply items as distinguished from special classroom supplies. Deadline for purchasing the latter is May 23.

"If this maximum of \$3.50 will not cover the general supply items required in your particular case, see Mrs. Craig or myself in the Business office," Brakebill said.

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil, May 7 (UP)—The Brazilian Communist party was outlawed today by the Supreme Electoral Tribunal and President Eurico Gaspar Dutra decreed the suspension of the Brazilian Federation of Labor and 21 regional labor organizations because of alleged communistic influence.

Communist party headquarters and regional cells were immediately raided and occupied by police forces alerted everywhere in the country.

The Brazilian Communist party had 200,000 registered members, the largest of any north or south American country.

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 7 (UP)—Pistol-carrying state legislators from Holdenville toted a home town feud into the state senate chamber this afternoon and when the shooting was over one man was wounded and another was held by officers.

State Senator Tom Anglin, 64, oldest member of the upper house in point of service, was shot through the left hip and abdomen. Rep. Jimmie Scott, 34, was arrested in the state laboratory a few minutes after the exchange of shots.

Behind the snap shooting, according to James C. Nance, president pro tem of the senate, was the fact that Anglin's Holdenville law firm handled a property settlement for Scott's divorced wife.

The first, "They Live Forever" had a large showing in all parts of the country. Dr. Moon had a display at the 1939 San Francisco World's Fair on the natural sciences illustrated in his movie.

In the opening section of "The God of Creation" the audience takes an imaginary trip to the stars to view complex gyrations of the solar system. Photography is taken through the giant 100-inch telescope of Mt. Wilson observatory in southern California.

Beauties of the natural sciences are demonstrated in another section of the film through the use of lapse-time photography. The illusion of flower buds developing into full-bloom blossoms in a few seconds on the screen is the metamorphosis of a caterpillar through the various stages from worm to butterfly, and the pollination of flowers.

Believed by Dr. Moody to be the first of their kind are the natural color pictures of photosynthesis, the food-manufacturing process resulting from the action of sunlight on green leaves.

SPARTANS DEFEATED IN FIRST GAME WITH TIGERS

TRACK TEAM IN ROUGH WORKOUT FOR CCAA NIGHT MEET IN FRESNO

Coach Bud Winter sent his Spartan track men through another rough session of practice last night on Spartan field in preparation for the conference meet with Fresno Saturday.

However, lack of sunshine prevented any spectacular times or any times near the usual marks of the performers.

Coach Winter will enter a full team in the CCAA championships with four men slated to start in nearly all events. Time trials will take place at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon with the finals slated to get underway at 8 o'clock that night.

The Spartans are rated the favorites this year and should take over the title from the Fresno State tracksters, who took the title last year.

The Spartans are favored to capture the mile run, the 880 yard run, 220 yard dash, discus throw and javelin. San Jose could come through in the high jump, 100 yard dash, the 220 yard low hurdles and relay. If Thelno Knowles is started in the 440, the Spartans could pick up another first place here.

Don Smalley should come through in the 220 yard dash but may have trouble with Bob Heck, Tiger sprinter, in the 100. Heck won the century run in Stockton. If Billy Rhyme can keep his stride in the low hurdles he may upset Fresno's Merle Martin in the 220 yard low hurdles.

Anyone of the seven men could win the high jump with San Jose leading the field with three prospects. Fresno is next with two and San Diego and Santa Barbara follow with one each.

In the shot-put Woody Linn is expected to garner one or two points but rated ahead of him are Fresno's Jean Lamoure, College of Pacific's George Ker and Santa Barbara's Ed Graboast. All beat Linn in the dual meets this season but Linn could pull an upset.
