FOUR HUNDRED TWENTY-ONE **GRADUATES BID SJS FAREWEL** WITH PUBLIC CEREMONY IN AT FOUR O'CLOCK ON FRI By TOM MARSHALL

Climaxing four years of study and preparation, four hundred and twenty-one Spartans will receive diplomas in the time-honored graduation ceremony Friday afternoon. Second class to receive degrees since this country's entrance into the war, the class of 1943 will start the processional promptly at 4 p. m.

In the shadow of the ivy-covered tower, the graduates will receive their diplomas at the hand of college president Dr. T. W. MacQuarrie. The entire inner

quad will be converted into an open air auditorium for the day.

Following the Invocation, which will be given by Dean Paul M. Pitman, the class gift will be presented by the president of the graduating class, Charles McCumby. Accepting on behalf of the student body will be ASB President Jane Reed.

Guest speaker of the day is Dr. Ralph H. Luis, Dean of Graduate Study, Stanford. Dr. Lutz will speak on "The Post-War World and the Student of Today."

Singing for the last time the college hymn, "Hail, Spartans, Hail," the graduates will bid farewell to San Jose State. The processional, the recessional, and other music will be played by the college band.

Four hundred twenty-one seniors, comprising the classes of De-cember, March, June and August, receive their A.B. degrees from San Jose State college Friday, June 18, at 4 o'clock ceremonies






