SPARTANS TOSS AWAY FINAL GAME 9-7 IN MATCH AGAINST MENLO

Despite the nine errors chalked up by the opponents, Coach Glenn "Tiny" Hartranft's baseball squad threw away their last game of the season yesterday afternoon when they lost to Menlo Junior College by a score of 9 to 7.

Pitcher Phil Clark, who has been cheated out of almost every game he has pitched, allowed the Menlo diamondmen 12 hits, but

could have reduced the number with a little faster fielding on the part of the Spartans who backed him up.

SCORING

San Jose led the game for six innings, starting with a tally in the initial frame when Jack Maughmer singled to bring in Clark. In the second inning the Spartans picked up three runs, made another in the third and two more in the eighth.

Menlo tied the game at five all in the seventh inning after picking up scattered runs in other frames. They turned in four runs in the eighth to take a 9 to 5 lead. A triple to left field with the bases loaded brought in three runs and a long fly to the outfield with only one away accounted for the ninth run.

EIGHTH INNING

San Jose inaugurated a hitting streak in their half of the eighth, but tallied only two runs.

The Spartans threw away several chances to score when runners became over-zealous and tried unsuccessfully to steal bases. They also failed to take full ad-

vantage of the breaks accorded them on the visitors' errors.

Statistics for the game were: San Jose, five hits, seven runs, and four errors; Menlo Junior college, twelve hits, nine runs, and nine errors.



All students who are signed up for typhoid-paratyphoid immunizations are requested to report to the Health office today, for the second in a series of these shots.


