RED CROSS NEEDS MORE WORKERS

An appeal for more women to work in the Red Cross room was issued yesterday by Chairman Bernice Tompkins of the faculty, who at the same time announced what the campus unit accomplished during the winter quarter.

Three hundred eighty-one completed items were just turned over to the San Jose branch of the American Red Cross from the campus unit. Representing the work of last quarter, the items included 92 knitted articles (eight of these are afghans), 250 hospital bed bags finished as an AWA project, and 39 pairs of hospital slippers.

Miss Tompkins announced that seven girls have won 100-hour service pins for Red Cross work so far this year. They are Audrey Anderson, Audrey Backenstoe, Jane Baumgartner Helbush, Betty James, Roberta Ramsey, Margaret Regan and Marilyn Wilson.

Though the campus unit has been successful in recruiting enough captains to be on duty practically every hour of the day, many more sewing aides are needed, says Miss Tompkins.

THETA MU SIGMA ENTER FIRST TEAM

to 120. Most of the faculty members don't even see the inside of the Spartan shop for quarters and quarters on end.

Practically every student in school uses the store regularly.

Four members aren't enough.

It may sound like "we wanna be all hog or none at all," but in this particular organization there isn't any other choice.

A truly democratic spirit would be to have the board members consist of seven faculty members and seven students.

Notice we're not even asking for majority representation but an equal opportunity to be heard not only vocally, but by way of the ballot when policies are voted on.

In Section Four, Article VI of the tentative by-laws drawn up by this board (practically all by the faculty), a majority of the representatives shall constitute a quorum (six members). A simple majority of the quorum (4 members) shall be necessary for the transaction of business.

Section Three, Article VII provides that the by-laws may be amended, adopted, or repealed by a two-thirds vote at any meeting, providing a quorum (six members) is present.

We wouldn't like to accuse the faculty of doing any such high-handed shenanigans, but then the by-laws do not provide for the prevention of a four-members faculty board from doing away with the by-laws and running things to suit themselves.

As it now stands, it provides for such a possibility.

We suggest to the Spartan shop board that they amend their by-laws (1) to include three additional students on the board; (2) that a quorum consist of 10 members of which five shall be students; and (3) that a two-thirds vote of the entire board be needed to change, adopt, or repeal the by-laws of said organization.
