Tokyo Brigade Nets \$235 On Third Day; Drive Ends Oct. 27

Contributions to the War Chest yesterday totaled \$235.00 for the Tokyo brigade, which brings the amount collected so far in the drive to \$811.35, leaving \$1688.65 yet to be donated by the students.

The progress between the two units is being recorded on poster indicators, representing a Jap and a German, placed near the library. Two booths are being manned by the brigades in their campaign to amass the \$2500 quota set for the students to raise by October 27. One booth is in the Quad and one by the library, where the organizations in each brigade receive contributions on alternate days.

The War Chest campaign will close on October 27 with a combined War Chest-Navy Day assembly which will feature Chaplain Richard E. Barnes of Moffett Field, who has addressed San Jose State college assemblies on several previous occasions.

USO

Barbara Bressani, chairman of the on-campus drive, states that as a result of the War Chest gifts, the USO operates more than 3,000 service units for our armed forces, and an estimated monthly attendance is over 30,000,000 persons at USO clubs and service units from Alaska to Brazil, and from Newfoundland to Hawaii.

War Prisoners' Aid provides as many as 7,000,000 men with recreational and educational materials, including more than 300 tons of supplies shipped to the "barbed wire legion."

AID

Aid is given nearly 25,000 Chinese war orphans, and care is provided in this country for 2,000 child evacuees from Europe. The services of National War Fund agencies extend over six continents into 91 countries and major geographical areas.

In addition to the many national and international services made possible by this fund, agencies serving on the home front are also recipients of these benefits. "So give for this triple cause!" Miss Bressani urges.

Two special trains will carry Spartan rooters to the game. The trains leaving from the San Jose depot tomorrow at 2:15 will be adequately equipped with a lounge car, including radios, phonograph, and all the luxuries of home. (Those were the days!)

The gridders will be after their seventh consecutive win, and with boys like Leroy Zimmerman, "Little All - American," Morris Manoogian, Aubrey Minter, Carlton Perego, Kenny Cook, Bob Titchenal, Johnny Allen, etc., it looks like the job may be handled in very good fashion. Pre-game odds slightly favor the Spartans. State's soccer team yesterday

San Jose State men in German camps included on the WSSF list are F/O John Joseph Needham, at Stalag Luft III; G. T. Smith, Stalag XVII-B, and Second Lieut. Charles Roque Esparza, Stalag Luft III, where he is an instructor.

Assistance to these men in pursuing college studies at their camps is given through the European Student Relief Fund, administering committee of the World Student Service Fund in Geneva, Switzerland.
