Here on the Spartan Daily, we successfully undertook to publish a six-page paper three times each week to supplement the usual four-page editions. By so doing, we have been able to give Student Body affairs more adequate news coverage, and journalism students more adequate training in the newspaper field.

Yes, it has been a quarter of interest, a quarter of progress, a quarter that has helped to fortify San Jose State's place in the sun. May the Spring quarter prove as challenging.

The U. S. A. contributes 30% of the total income for World Student Service Fund roughly 375 grand—chicken feed to us. American students spent something like \$87 million on football alone last year. Chinese students, hardest hit of the war, contribute 15%

of the total income of WSSF. Bombed out Britain and tiny Switzerland contribute 12% each. Australia, Belgium, Canada, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, Holland, Ireland, New Zealand, Palestine, and Sweden make up the remainder of contributors. Fourteen contributing nations to International WSSF and eighteen nations receiving direct aid.

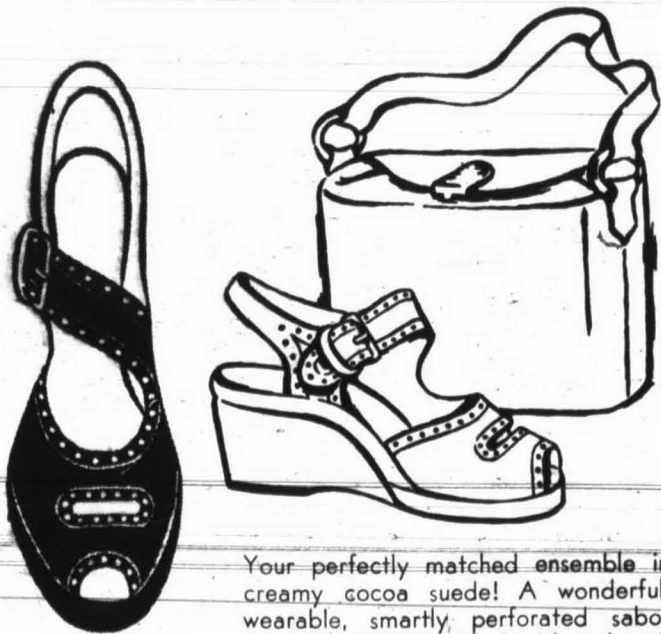

Writer Ends Colorful Wrestling History As Colleges Revive Sport

Ed. Note.—This is the fourth and concluding article in a series tracing wrestling from its inception up to the present day. The articles were written by Jack O'Neil of San Quentin and are printed through the courtesy of Mel Bruno, former Spartan wrestling star, and director of all state penal institutions.

Amateur wrestling in this country did not come into prominence until 1921 or '22 despite the fact that Americans won two titles in the Olympics of 1904. The first intercollegiate meet was held in 1900 between the University of Pennsylvania and Yale. Then in 1904 several Eastern schools got together and formed the Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Conference. This was the beginning of intercollegiate wrestling as we know it today.

First action of the conference was to establish a uniform set of rules to govern competition. Several points had to be agreed upon including weights and length of bouts. Prior to adoption of a uniform set of rules coaches often engaged in prolonged arguments over these points in an effort to secure an advantage for their team. Adoption of the rules eliminated the bickering and improved the caliber of the competition.

RULES COMMITTEE

Perhaps the greatest impetus given the development of amateur wrestling since 1904, was the formation of a Wrestling Rules Committee by the NCAA in 1927. Two of the most important changes made by this group, were (1) a new point system for scoring, in order to determine a winner when no fall is secured, and (2) dividing the matches into three periods of three minutes each. The new point system of scoring immeasurably increased spectator interest, for it considerably enlivened the bouts. As a result of this system skill and versatility are accentuated in amateur wrestling today.

OLYMPIC GAMES

Most important wrestling events of modern times are the Olympic Games competitions. These contests match the skills of many nations. The competition is divided into two classes, Greco-Roman and Catch-as-catch-can. The latter is much more popular in the United States, since it permits the use of tripping, leg holds, and dives. Greco-Roman style does not permit any holds below the waist.

The United States has completely dominated Olympic Wrestling competition over a span of years, winning 19 out of a possible 44 championships in various weights.

Weather permitting, the San Jose State track team will host the Olympic club of San Francisco in the opening duel meet of the season Saturday afternoon at the Spartan track.

The strong clubmen, coached by Dink Templeton, are slight favorites and will provide the local team with their first test of duel meet strength. The full entry list of the Winged "O" will not be known until meet time, however.

The Spartans should be especially strong in the sprints and hurdles. Hal Davis, who has tied the world record of 9.4 in the 100-yard dash is not in shape and won't compete.

The javelin, shot put, and discus shape up as the visitors strong events. Martin Biles, who has thrown 230' should edge NCAA champ, Bob Likens, while Jim Delaney has a mark of better than 54' in the shot. Max, Dodge, Walt Flood, and Bob Kerr and State's trio of Ray Overhouse, Woody Linn, and Grant Denmark have all thrown over 150' and should

stage one of the best battles of the meet.

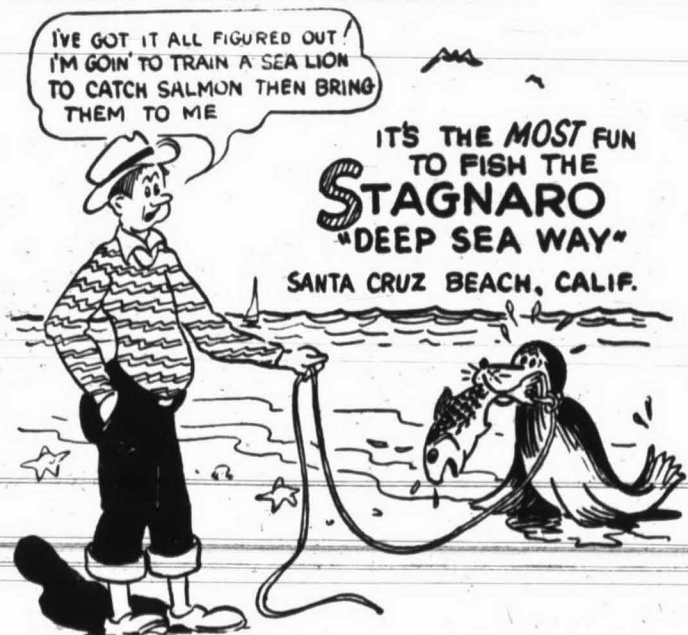

During the Winter quarter several students assisted in gathering

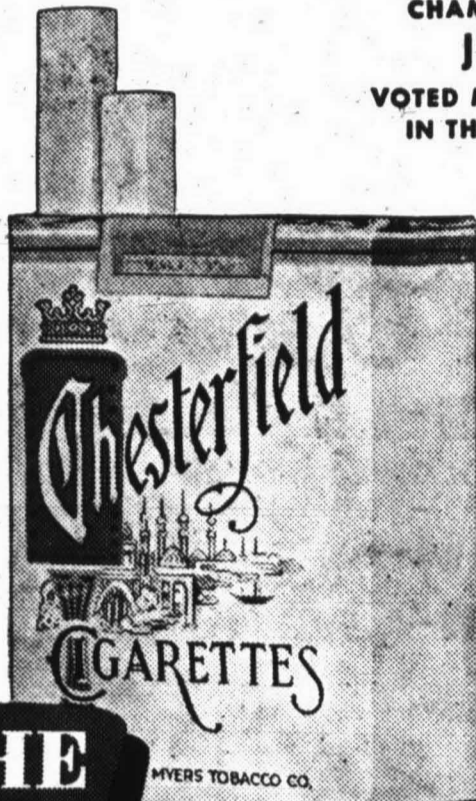
material for an annual municipal report that will be issued in a few weeks.
