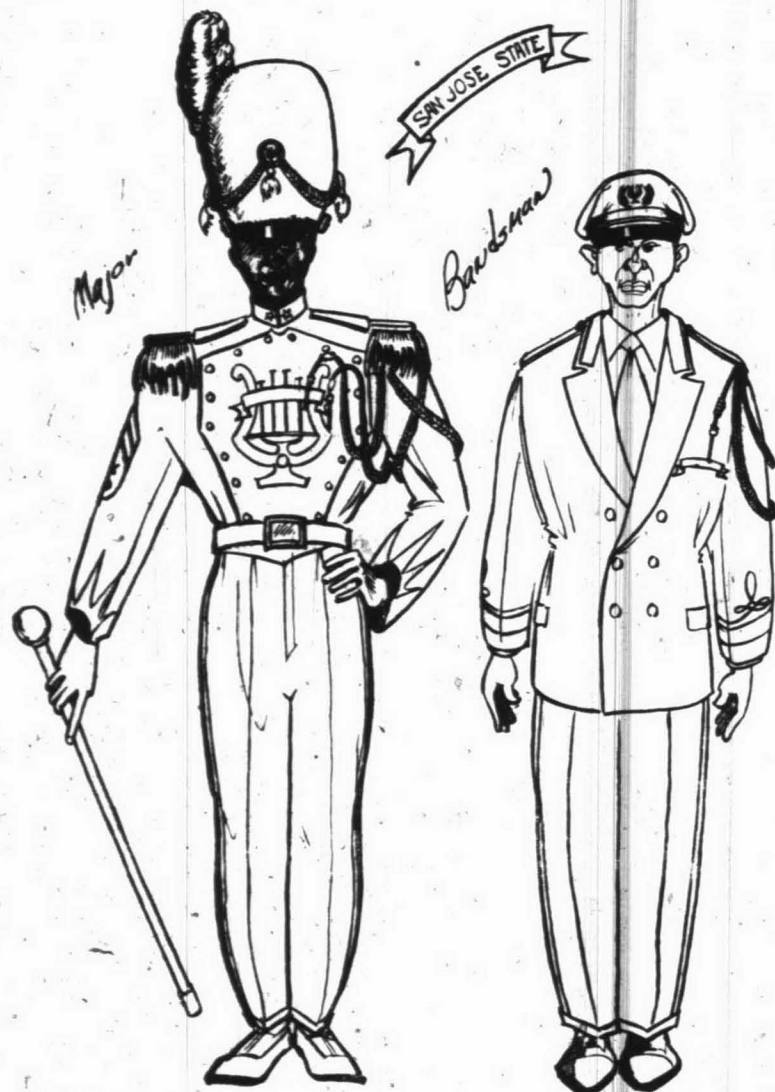


## New Band Uniforms

## Basketball Rating Exams Set For Women P.E. Teachers

Basketball rating examinations for women's P.E. teachers will be held in San Jose Feb. 3 and March 10, and also at Stanford on two dates yet to be decided, according to Miss Margaretta Fristoe, chairman of the Coastal Valley's Board of Women Officials.

Last Thursday's meeting of the board, which took place in the Women's gym, served as a basketball officiating clinic and discussion of 1949 rules changes. Women's physical education teachers in attendance represented Santa Clara, Fremont, Mountain View, Campbell and Salinas high schools, and Hartnell Junior college. San Jose State physical education majors were also present. Miss Fristoe was commentator.

Miss Eleanor Coombe, assisted by Barbara Patterson, Lillian Bradshaw and Shirley Plowright, is in charge of rules changes and demonstration. Mrs. Margaret Barr of Stanford, with Dickie Shainwald, will be in charge of the officiating demonstration.

The board, which was first organized in Feb. 1947 as an affiliate of the Bay Counties board, became independent last fall, under the Women's National Officials Rating committee. This committee formulates all the official rules for all women's sports. The local board has for the past two years conducted examinations and given officials' ratings in basketball. Fall quarter hockey ratings were given, and plans are to rate officials in volleyball, tennis, softball and other such sports as requests come.

Presenting membership of the board include: Miss Margaretta Fristoe, chairman; Mrs. Margaret Barr, vice-chairman; Barbara Patterson, secretary; Shirley Plowright, treasurer, and Miss Eleanor Coombe, chairman of the basketball rating committee.

National judges are Miss Coombe, basketball and volleyball; Mrs. Barr, basketball; Miss Luell Weed of Stanford, tennis. Board members now include officials who hold ratings in hockey, basketball, volleyball, softball and tennis.

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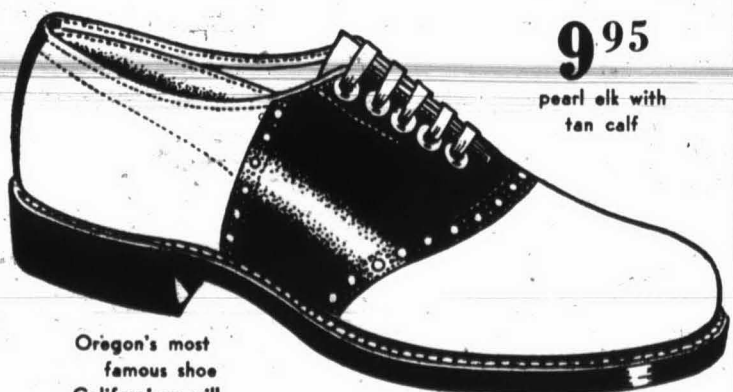

Center Stu Inman was a marvel on offense and defense for San Jose to shade the Gael star Frank Kudelka. Inman potted 18 to Kudelka's 16 points.

Led by Joe Flahaven, a diminutive forward, and Don Kramm, reserve guard, St. Mary's roared down the court to close a halftime deficit. The local unit led 32-26 at the rest period.

San Jose shot into a lead of 6 digits before the Gaels had scored a field goal. Until Kudelka, subject of the fans' jeering throughout the contest, found his eye from far out, San Jose appeared to have the cat skinned.

Spartan Guards Bob Wuesthoff, Ralph Romero, and Bob Enzensperger, took turns at defending against Kudelka's shots. When Wuesthoff left the fray with 15 minutes to play, San Jose State's lead slowly diminished.

Poor passing during the desperate Spartan comeback in the last five minutes enabled the Gaels to pull ahead three points. With the lead lessened to two markers and less than a minute left, Flahaven hooked a pass to Kudelka in the key for the last basket of the evening.

Don McCaslin, Junior Morgan, Bob Crowe, Bob Hagen, Chuck Crampton, and Ed Anderson played in the losing battle for the Spartans. Crowe erjss-crossed the Gael defenders to ace a pair of hook shots in the bucket.

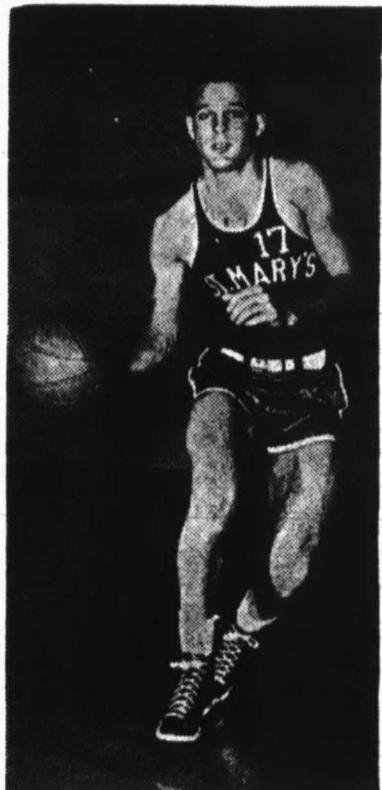
