Contributions In Classrooms Will Aid Drive

As the climax of its 1951 drive, the Campus Chest will solicit contributions from students in all Washington Square classrooms tomorrow, Shirley Crandall, chairman, announced yesterday.

Student solicitors will circulate through 9:30, 10:30 and 11:30 a.m. classes in an effort to push the lagging drive over its goal. Student and organization contributions totaled only \$823.20 at the end of the second week of the drive. Faculty and school employees had given \$4946.50.

The goal set for the drive is \$7980. A total of \$2210 will have to be collected today and tomorrow in order to reach the mark.

Miss Crandall emphasized the fact that the present drive is the only fund raising drive scheduled for the school year. Money collected during the drive will be distributed as follows: 65 per cent to Community Chest, 25 per cent to World Student Service fund, 5 per cent to March of Dimes, and 5 per cent to Cancer fund.

McMullen Wins Annual Turkey Trot Gobbler; Delta Upsilon Sweeps Organizational Division

Bob McMullen, the guts runner of the SJS cross-country team,

came within a half second of smashing the all-time Turkey Trot record as he hustled over a rain-drenched three-mile "Thanksgiving dinner" course in 15:41 minutes yesterday afternoon.

For his iron-lunged efforts, McMullen received a turkey, a gold cup and a kiss from Homecoming Queen Barbara Kelly.

Finishing three strides behind the champ was Larry Purley, who will be having a goose dinner Thursday. Pre-race favorite Joe Tyler won the third place chicken. Tyler was hampered by a sore leg, according to Don Bryant, cross-country coach.

Delta Upsilon took home both organizational awards as their relay team, composed of Tom Sparling, Bill Booth, George Coakley, Bill Mendonsa, Darrell Dukes and Rod Kolze won the six-man event in 14:36 minutes, and 19 members of the fraternity finished the three-mile run to capture the John Shehtanian trophy for the team having the most men complete the race.

Lloyd Neutz, an independent entrant, was the first novice runner to cross the finish line. He placed ninth. Novice George Sweet, Theta Xi, romped in twelfth.

Coach Bryant was of the opinion that McMullen would have smashed the record of 15:40.5, set by Merle Knox in 1947, if he had not been hampered by the rainy weather.

Bud Winter and Don Bryant served as officials of the Alpha Phi Omega sponsored event. Glenn Hartranft was the master of ceremonies while Dean of Men Stanley Benz was the official starter.

ASB Card Purchases Provide Injury Fund

"I believe that if the students were to inform themselves fully regarding the benefits to be derived from Universal Associated Student Body membership, there would be a very strong vote in its favor at the polls."

This was the recent statement of Dean of Students Joe H. West concerning the coming student election Friday, Nov. 30, on the question of a Universal Associated Student Body Card fee.

One of these benefits is the Student Injury fund, provided by the Associated Student body. It has been in operation since 1947, according to Miss Margaret M. Twombly, director of the Student Health service.

This fund was set up to assist ASB in the expense of necessary, outside medical care of injuries which can't be taken care of by the college health staff.

A receipt, bearing an itemized account of medical services rendered, must be submitted to the Health office before a student's request for compensation can be considered.

Regulations for administering the injury fund have been set up by the Student Council as follows:

1. Only registered students car-

rying more than six units are eligible.

2. Students must be ASB card holders.

3. The injury should be reported to the Health office within 48 hours of its occurrence.

4. The necessity for outside care must be approved by a college physician, or by the Health department head or, in the case of off-campus trips, by the faculty member in charge.

5. Reimbursement must be approved by the Health Cottage board, which includes the Health department head, Miss Twombly; a faculty member, Dr. Dwight Bentel; the Graduate Manager, Bill Felse; ASB president, Lud Spolyar; and an ASB member, Richard "Doc" Weaver.

6. Approved cases will be reimbursed for the first \$50 and for one-half of any amount over \$50. The total reimbursement cannot exceed \$200.

Miss Twombly stated that all students, if possible, should come to the college clinic first for medical aid, rather than enlist outside care.

"No Student Body card is necessary for service at the college clinic," she said.

Today Is Last Day for Frosh Office Candidates to Apply

Today at 1 p.m. is the deadline for applications for freshman class officers, Kitty Gunner, senior justice of the Student Court, announced yesterday.

"Application blanks will be available at a meeting of the freshman class in the Morris Dailey auditorium at 11:30 o'clock this morning," Miss Gunner said. "Applications must be deposited in a box outside the ASB office by 1 o'clock this afternoon."

All candidates for class offices must meet certain requirements established by the Constitution of the Associated Student Body, she warned.

The Student Court will check each applicant for these requirements, which are: "The candidate must be a member of the ASB, a declared member of his class, on clear standing, not more than six units deficient for his class and must not hold any other Associated Student elective office."

Petitions will be issued to ap-

proved applicants tomorrow from the Graduate Manager's office, Miss Gunner said. All petitions, which require 50 signatures, will be due Monday, Nov. 26.

Fifty Have Filed For Draft Test

Approximately 50 applications have been filed for the Selective Service Qualification test to be given at San Jose State college Dec. 15, according to Dr. H. F. Heath, who will supervise the examination.

Dr. Heath said an earlier estimate had placed the expected number of applicants at 300. According to the Educational Testing Service of Princeton, N.J., which conducts the tests, it is expected that most qualified students will take the April 24 examination.

Two matches tentatively scheduled with Santa Clara high school for next week were cancelled.

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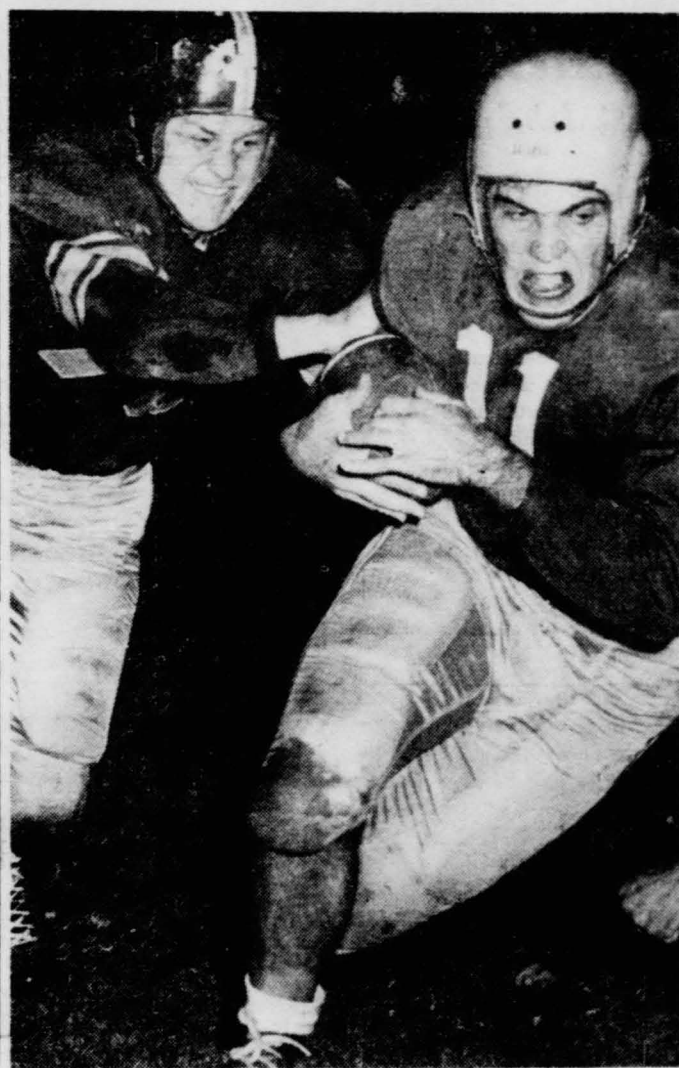

SJS Varsity Loses Ray Poznekoff

San Jose State's Spartans were thinking about "beating the Bengals" when their upset thoughts were interrupted yesterday by some bad news.

Valuable Ray Poznekoff is out for the rest of the season! The durable 201-pound senior end was bumped hard Saturday night against Santa Clara and suffered a severe knee injury. He will be operated on for badly torn knee ligaments today in San Jose's Community Service hospital.

Poznekoff, a key man on defense and several times a starter on offense, joins Fullback Bob Sykes on the seriously disabled list. Sykes is recovering from an operation for a shoulder separation.

Fullback Frank Morriss, the team's leading scorer, and Tackle Sal Cardinalli, 230-pound sophomore, are listed as doubtful for the homecoming clash with the thrice-beaten COP Tigers Friday night. Morriss has been on the blink since the Idaho game. Cardinalli hurt his wrist against San Diego Navy.

The Spartans "arrived" in the Santa Clara deadlock. Bronzan was quite content with the improved team play. He particularly liked the defensive work of Linebackers Dick Bondellie and Bruce Halladay. Both had been sidelined for weeks with

bad knee injuries. Also impressive were Center and Linebacker Tom Cuffe and the defensive line unit of Jerry Perich, Jon Petersen, Joe St. Denis, George Porter and Poznekoff.

Fullback Bob Amaral and Halfback Bobby Osborne delivered some clutch running. Although the passing game was secondary to the ground duel, QB Lynn Aplanalp maintained his 60 per cent passing mark with seven for 15. His total now is 45 completions for 75 attempts. Jerry Hamilton hit two for five, one big one to Osborne!

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SJS Orchestra to Play Music Of Ailing American Composer

"It's the old story of the musician struggling through years of disappointment and then, as he is about to die, suddenly being acclaimed," said Dr. Lyle Downey, head of the Music department.

He was discussing Charles Ives, whose "Symphony No. Two" will be played by the San Jose State college orchestra in its autumn quarter formal concert Tuesday night, Dec. 4, in the Morris Dailey auditorium.

Ives, a New Englander, is ill and may not live much longer, said Dr. Downey. Dr. Downey added that Ives is considered to be one of the foremost American composers of this time.

His symphony was difficult to obtain, said Dr. Downey, and after its performance here the orchestration will be sent immediately to the Dallas Symphony orchestra for a performance there.

For the concert, the orchestra also will perform the "Concerto, Op. 83," for piano and orchestra, by Johannes Brahms; and the "Romeo and Juliet" overture-fantasy, by Peter Tchaikowsky.

Dr. Downey will conduct and Thomas Ryan, associate professor of music, will perform the piano solo.

Sound-Deadening Tile Installed In Home Ec Building

The job of installing acoustic tile in the ceilings of the main floor hallways in the Home Economics building is completed, Byron Bollinger, college superintendent of buildings and grounds, announced yesterday.

Work on the project began early in October. Purpose of the installation is to reduce the sounds from the child training classes and the noise from the cafeteria so they will not disturb other students in the building, he added.

Mr. Bollinger previously had revealed that the cost of installing the acoustic tile would be approximately \$990.

Suez Shooting Toll Is Revised; 17 Dead

Cairo, Egypt (UP)—British and Egyptian authorities revised the toll of weekend rioting in the Suez canal zone city of Ismailia to 17 dead and 37 injured yesterday as new clashes broke out in the city's suburbs.

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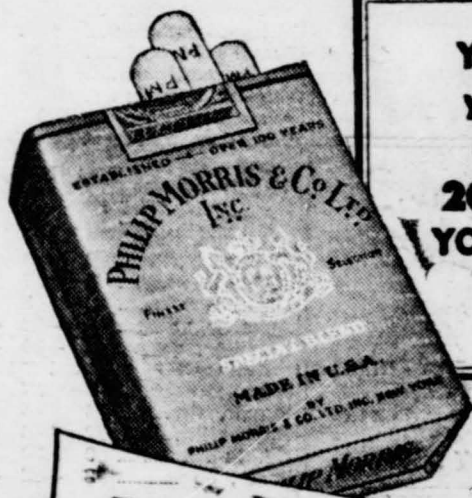
