## DeVoss To Lead Inaugural March

Tomorrow morning the residents of San Jose and the citizens of Washington Square will take part in the most formal of all college ceremonies, the inauguration of a college president.

Some of them will stand on tiptoes, on curb stones, to get a peek at Dr. John T. Wahlquist, president of the state's oldest college. Others will march in the solemn procession behind Dr. James C. DeVoss, executive dean, who is marshal of the procession.

### Everyone Invited: Bids Unnecessary

For all college graduates and prospective graduates it will be a day to plan and work for. Governor Earl Warren will be present to greet and congratulate the new president.

The day will belong to Dr. Wahlquist and to students, the members of the San Jose State college family.

Ceremonies will begin at 9:30 a.m. tomorrow with the march of the academic line down San Carlos street to the Civic auditorium. Some of the most important figures in the educational world will follow members of the Student Council and the ROTC.

The impressive black of the procession will be broken only by the colored vestments of faculty members.

Students have been asked by Seymour Abrahams, member of the inaugural committee, to meet at Fourth street between San Carlos and San Fernando streets to form an informal student delegation to lead the line.

The audience will hear remarks by L. D. Bohnett, chairman of the college advisory board and Governor Warren. Selections will be performed by the A Cappella choir and greetings extended by the faculty and student representatives. Induction of Dr. Wahlquist will be made by Roy E. Simpson, state superintendent of schools.

The gap between the morning ceremonies and the Inaugural Ball that evening will be bridged with a symposium on "The Role of the California State College" at 2:30 p.m. in Morris Dailey auditorium.

All students, faculty members, employees, and alumni of the college are invited to attend the Inaugural Ball tomorrow evening at the Civic auditorium from 9 to 1 o'clock whether they have received invitations or not, stressed Seymour Abrahams, co-chairman of the ball, yesterday.

A mix-up in mailing resulted in many not receiving their invitations, according to Abrahams.

The only requirement for entrance is that men wear either a tuxedo or a dark suit and women a formal, he said.

Admission is free and a printed invitation is not necessary.

### Seniors Hear Meanings of Gowns, Colors

The colorful gowns to be worn in the inaugural procession will be modeled today at 11:30 a.m. in senior orientation class by members of the faculty, reports Dr. Vernon A. Ouellette, adviser to the Senior class.

Movies of past commencement exercises and color-slides will be shown the seniors to explain the meaning of the hoods and colors that will be worn in inauguration and commencement ceremonies.

### Library To Close

The Library and Reserve Book room will be closed during the inauguration on Friday, from 9:30 to 1:30 o'clock, according to Miss Joyce Backus, head librarian.

### Evans Urges Enthusiasm for Inauguration

Tom Evans, ASB president, yesterday stressed the importance of the inauguration to the Student Council and urged members to encourage individual students to attend the ceremonies.

Evans' appeal followed the appearance of Seymour Abrahams, student representative on the inauguration committee, who outlined the plans for a student procession to precede the academic procession to the Civic auditorium.

Members of the Alpha Phi Omega fraternity will be on hand on Fourth street, where the students are to congregate immediately after 9:30 o'clock, to organize the procession, Abrahams said.

The Student Council also passed an amendment to the by-laws raising the number of Revelries board members from four to eight, and expressed disapproval of a proposed entertainment debate on "Womenhaters" at the Election Rally, May 7.

### AWS Members Are Hostesses

AWS members will act as hostesses for the wives of visiting delegates this morning from 8:30 to 9:30 a.m., according to Carol Larsen, AWS president.

During the afternoon 20 AWS members will serve at the reception tea to be held for President John T. Wahlquist in the Women's gym from 4 to 5 p.m.

### Daily Out Early Friday Morning

A special 24-page inaugural issue of the Spartan Daily will be distributed on campus at 7 o'clock Friday morning, according to Daily editor Ted Faley.

Staff members will put papers in the boxes early that morning, so students may obtain an issue before going to the Civic auditorium for the inauguration ceremonies.

Pictures of AMS and ASB candidates who have not been photographed will be taken this afternoon in B95 at 1:30 o'clock, according to Clifford Harrington, photo editor of the Spartan Daily.

Ted Faley, editor of the Spartan Daily, asked that candidates who have not been interviewed stop at B-93, the Daily office, after 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

### Students Invited For Recording of College Quiz Show

San Jose State college students will be given an opportunity to participate in a quiz show this afternoon at 3:45 o'clock when KLOK's 29-30 program is tape-recorded in the Studio Theater, Room 53, Clyde Allen, senior radio-speech major, announced yesterday.

Allen disclosed that Dave Woods, master of ceremonies of the show, has written a three-act mystery of the "Who Done It?" type. Members of the audience will be asked to identify the culprit of the mystery, and prizes will be awarded to the winners. Allen refused to tell what the prizes will be.

John Aitken and Jerry Ball, candidates for the ASB presidency will be interviewed by Allen after the first act of the broadcast. Two vice presidential candidates will be interviewed after the second act, and two others at the conclusion of the show, according to Allen.

The tape-recorded show will be broadcast over Station KLOK Saturday evening at 8 p.m., Allen revealed.

### Faculty Backs Inauguration; Forms Parade

The faculty section of the Inaugural procession will form along the corridor from Room 24 west to the Library, according to the Public Relations office. The procession will form at 9:30 a.m.

About 35 members of the faculty will represent other colleges and universities and will march with the delegates. The Inauguration committee has been assured that nearly 100 per cent of the faculty will participate in the various events.

Members of the faculty who do not feel physically able to march in the procession may join the group as it enters the Civic auditorium. There will be no formal organization of the faculty group by departments, degrees or otherwise.

Instructors may obtain tickets for a reserved section of the auditorium at the Information office.

Other events to which the faculty and their wives are invited are the Symposium at 2:30 p.m. in the Morris Dailey auditorium, the tea which is to follow at 4 p.m. in the patio of the Women's gym and the Inaugural Ball in the Civic auditorium from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m.

### Inaugural Ball Crowd Grows, Says Bowles

"On the strength of the number of people contacted in the last few days, I am anticipating a much larger crowd at the Inaugural Ball than we originally had hoped for," said Del Bowles, chairman of the Social Affairs committee, yesterday.

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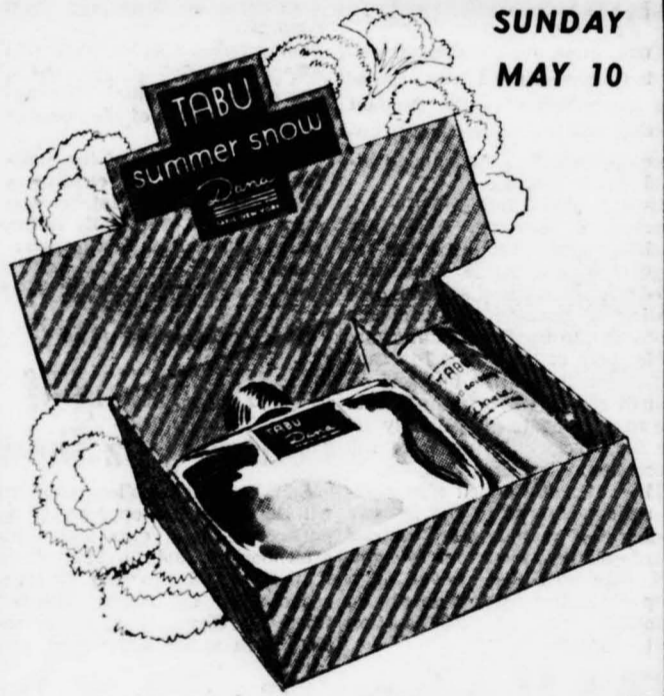

# Ex-Spartan Players Guide Present Football Fortunes

The mechanics who keep the Golden Raider grid machine in good running order all are former Spartan players.

Chief fixer-upper is 34-year-old Bob Bronzan.

A Tehachapi native, Coach Bronzan captained his high school team and then moved on Modesto J.C., where he was named all-conference center. The following year he transferred to San Jose State.

In 1939—Bronzan's final season as a player—San Jose entered the California Collegiate Athletic association. The Golden Raiders won the championship that year, and Bronzan was named tackle on the conference all-star team. (San Jose withdrew from the league in 1950).

After his graduation in 1940, Coach Bronzan did a year of graduate work at UCLA, and then was appointed head coach at Livingstone high school. While there, he compiled the best season in the school's record—six wins, two losses and one tie.

Following his single season at Livingstone high, Coach Bronzan entered the Army Air Force where he served as physical training di-

## Locals Meet Gators Here

After five days of hitting and fielding practice, the Spartan horsehiders resume game activity Saturday afternoon when they meet San Francisco State in a twin bill at Municipal stadium.

The doubleheader is scheduled for 12:30 p.m.

Coach Walt Williams has elected Ron Kauffman and Doug Bochner to hurl against the Gators, who hold two wins over the locals in earlier contests. Kauffman will be looking for his second win of the campaign against four losses and Bochner will be out to better his 3-6 record.

After 27 games, Catcher Bob Poole is leading the batting race with a .329 average. Reserve catcher Mel Leal is hitting an even .300 while Cookie Camara follows with a .282 average.

Other averages include Dick Priddy at .274, Ralph Cleland with .259, Jack Richards with .245, Bochner at .243, Ron Palma at .222 and Kauffman with a .206 average.

Johnny Oldham is the leading hurler with five wins and five losses. He will toe the rubber Tuesday against California.

rector at several air bases. He later became a member of a nine man committee which planned the physical education program for the entire Air Force.

Discharged in 1945, Bronzan was appointed head coach at Long Beach City college. His team won seven and lost two that year.

Bronzan returned to his Alma Mater in 1946 and began building tough, durable lines for Coach Bill Hubbard. Following the 1949 season, he became head coach when Hubbard was elevated to the position of Director of Athletics. This fall San Jose State college will field the fourth team under Bronzan's tutelage.

Famed for unique scouting techniques, Coach Bronzan has been employed in that capacity by the San Francisco 49'ers and Notre Dame. He has been invited to spring practice at South Bend, an invitation rarely extended by Notre Dame's Frank Leahy.

All-purpose Bill Perry, a 1947 graduate, was named line coach by Head Coach Bronzan when he took the job over from Bill Hubbard. In his undergraduate days, Perry played guard and quarterback for the Golden Raiders, as well as competing in basketball and baseball. Also, a member of the Army Air Force during the war, Perry played for a brief period at Oklahoma university.

Backfield coach Gene Menges

was known in his undergraduate days as "Menges, the Magician." He holds 17 of the 20 San Jose State college passing records. A 1950 San Jose State graduate, "The Magician" served a year's

apprenticeship at San Jose's James Lick high school before joining the Spartan coaching staff.

In 1944 Menges was named High School Baseball Player of the Year by the Helms Foundation. Another veteran, Menges has served 22 months in Uncle Sam's navy.

Freshman footballers are directed by Tom Cuffe, a fine linebacker of the 1951 team. He is assisted by ex-Spartan scatbacks Gibby Mendonsa, 1951; Dick Bondelle, guard, and Stan Wacholz, Russ Phillips and Bob Amaral, ends. Wacholz, Phillips and Amaral played for the Spartans last season.

## Football Leaders

Mervin Lopes, end, from Hawaii, leads the linemen with 262 points, followed by End Ralph Daehler with 210. Charley Kaaihue leads the guards with 208, Jon Petersen tops the tackles with 200 and Jim Hague leads the centers with 164. Al Brown is ahead in the backfield with 92 points while Bill Walker has 85.

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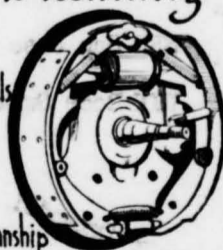

# Spartans Rely on Field Events in Gator Meet

High-jumper Gene Denny and Shot-putter Dick Stultz will attempt to lead the Spartans to a sweep in their two events when the local thinclads meet undefeated San Francisco State at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon on the Spartan track.

Denny, who has been consistent at 6ft. 4 in. lately, led Jon Braun and Jamie Fletcher to clean sweeps over the COP and Fresno jumpers, but this trio will have to beat out Al Desin, SFS leaper who has posted a 6 ft. 1 in. mark. Braun and Fletcher are consistently going over 6 ft.

Stultz, who recently tossed a 49 ft. 2 in. effort, will be backed by "Jarrin" John Slaughter and Joe Muldowney, both of whom have better records than the San Francisco shot-putters. Stultz has possibilities of exceeding the school record of 50 ft. 9 in., which now is held by Woody Linn.

Coach Bud Winter also hopes to pick up valuable points in the discus and javelin events. With Muldowney and Ed Bill throwing for the Spartans, eight points could come to the locals' scoring total. Muldowney surprised Winter by heaving the platter 143 ft. 2 in. against Fresno, and he may exceed this mark Saturday.

Paul Vuosalo, star Spartan javelin tosser who hit 188 ft. 4 1/4 in. against the Fresnoans, and Stan Dowell, who has thrown 165 ft., will oppose San Francisco's Art Longar, a 176-ft. flinger.

Candidates for kindergarten-primary, elementary, junior high, general secondary and special secondary credentials are included in the sign-up.

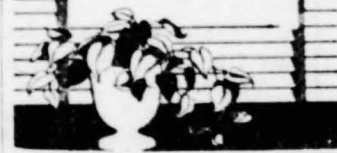
