## About Budget, **Ceilings Today**

A report to the faculty on the latest developments on enrollment ceiling, capital outlay budgets, and other matters pending in the state legislature will be made at a general faculty meeting today by Dr. John T. Wahlquist, college president.

Dr. Wahlquist currently is studying recommendations of the Faculty Council which propose that the number of recommending units for admission be raised, that subjects in which recommending units are earned be defined, and that regulations concerning disqualification and reinstatement of students be toughened.

The council also recommended at its last meeting that any ceiling imposed on the college by the state legislature be adhered to

Dr. Wahlquist had no comment to make on the council's resolu-

Copies of two publications will be distributed to those attending the faculty meeting. One is a brochure which graphically portrays the need for additional buildings by the state colleges. It was published by the Council of State College Presidents.

The second publication to be distributed is the February issue of the California Schools, which includes a feature on San Jose State and pictures the inner quad and tower on the cover. The drawing was done by John DeVincenzi of the art faculty.

## **JC Administrators To Visit Campus**

Administrators of 19 junior colleges will visit the campus tomorrow for the second annual conference sponsored by the college to discuss mutual problems concerning transfer of students from the junior colleges to San Jose State.

No formal program has been planned, according to Dean of Students Joe E. West. Informal dis-cussions will be held on problems reported by the visitors.

Executive Dean James DeVoss will lead the discussions.

The proposed formation of a new state college athletic league met with the disapproval today of Glen "Tiny" Hartranft, director of the Physical Education department.

"The idea would not be financially sound nor would the competition be on an equal basis," warned Hartranft in observing the ath-

•letic plan conceived by the Coun-cil of State College Presidents last

He stated that he didn't know how such a plan would work un-less they divided up the league into northern and southern divi-

According to the plan, which would go into effect in 1956 if ens today on campus, according to passed, the league would be composed of 10 state colleges. How-ever, if San Jose continued its major team schedule, it was noted in the plan that for the success of the loop the Spartans should be

> "We wouldn't be in favor of the idea unless we were forced into the league by action of the Presidents' Council or the State Department of Aducation," de clared Hartranft.

Not only would it affect the football slate, but if the basketball team were forced to travel up and down the coast meeting its conference foes it would miss nine and a half days of school. The college would lose approximately \$2,000, Hartranft said.

Under the present CBA setup the Spartans play their loop games in their "own back yard." Trips to Oregon, Arizona and Southern California only cost the Golden Raiders two days of school work and about \$1000.

San Jose State's cagers, eager to cinch second place in CBA standings, close out their 1954 casaba season when they meet USF tonight at Kezar pavilion. Game time is 8:20 o'clock.

The Spartans sport a 6-5 league mark while the Dons had a 5-4

record going into Friday night's clash with College of Pacific.
San Jose and USF split their first pair of games. For the benefit of those who came in late, the Dons whipped the locals, 57-50, up north and the home-towners won out locally, 66-49.

Carroll Williams, winner of the alumni trophy as the most valuable player of the year, will have his last chance to assault the Spartan record books this season. The lively junior guard, already the second highest scorer in Spartan history, had 418 points going into Friday night's tiff with Fresno. This is already more points than has ever been registered by a Spartan on a 27-game schedule.

Mighty Mouse, the 5 ft. 10 in. captain, has enjoyed good nights via the scoring column in both bouts against the Dons. In their first bout he collected 23 points and in the return go he tallied

Friday night as the fast-finishing San Jose State Spartans toyed with the Fresno State Bulldogs before dumping the visitors, 78-63.

The victory marked the eighth win in nine starts for Walt Mc-Pherson's cagers who now sport a 12-14 record. Fresno had to be content with their 16th set-back against 11 triumphs.

Carroll Williams led the hometown club to avenge an early season, 60-58, loss to the Bulldogs. The mighty one collected 22 points, hitting on nine field goals in 18 attempts for a 50 per cent feit.

The remainder of the San Jose scoring was distributed between Bob Steinbach with 14, Bob Bondanza 13, Tor Hansen 9, Bud Hjelm 7, Don Fausset 6, Bill Lam-son 3, and Merle Flattley and George King with 2.

Bondanza started off the fireworks with a 25 footer to get the Spartans out of the starting blocks and boost them to a 19-12 first period lead.

Some brilliant offensive play by Williams netted State a 42-30 halftime margin and from here McPherson substituted freely as the locals rolled to a 61-45 third stanza mark

In the field goal department San Jose netted 27 shots in 76 tries for a 35.5 percentage, Fresno State also finished second best here, hitting 20 of 61 attempts for 29.4 per cent.
