City To Install Traffic Lights Near College

Installation of traffic signals on 7th St. between San Carlos and San Fernando Sts. began yesterday.

These signals will operate in coordination with the SJS class periods. They will operate from 18 until 32 minutes after each hour during the day and will use only a blinking caution light during class periods, according to Arthur Philpott, San Jose traffic analyst.

Three walk and wait pedestrian signals will be built first. They will be located in front of the SJS Music, Home Economics and Engineering buildings. Construction is now under way on the walk-wait signal in front of the Music building.

Preparation was being made yesterday for laying the underground pipes necessary in the intricate electrical timing system of the signals.

Dean Dimmick Favors Dorms

Miss Helen Dimmick, dean of women, said yesterday she was highly in favor of Dean of Students Joe H. West's proposal for financing dormitories at SJS and other California colleges.

She said that residence halls charge rent only according to expenses; whereas, private boarding houses must receive both expenses and income from their rent rate.

Dean Dimmick stated residence hall living would help to instill a better college spirit into students.

Frosh Stage Spring Fling

A water ballet and other entertainment staged around the pool at Adobe Creek Lodge is planned for the Freshman class Spring Fling picnic-social Friday, according to Natalie Fancher, program chairman.

"Since we are known as the 'Centennial Class' because we will graduate in 1957, just 100 years after SJS's founding, we've chosen Through the Years as our program theme," Miss Fancher explained. Tickets are now on sale in the Inner Quad for 75 cents.

Players Plan Movie Today

The San Jose Players will present "Here Comes Mr. Jordan" twice daily, according to Joe Lo-Bue, member of San Jose Players. The comedy stars Robert Montgomery, Evelyn Keyes, Claude Rains and James Gleason and will be shown in Morris Dailey at 4 and 8 p.m. Admission is 35 cents.

The exhibits and demonstrations are being prepared by students and faculty of the department and will include quicksand, "the Magic Wand," "See Your Voice" and "Here's How It's Done" exhibits.

The quicksand exhibit will feature a visual demonstration that quicksand is not a material, but a condition that develops due to upward flow of water through sand. "The Magic Wand" will be an ordinary fluorescent tube, which lights brilliantly without wires when brought near a small high frequency radio transmitter. One can "squeeze" the light out with his hand.

Sound waves are converted into electrical vibrations by a microphone. The signals are amplified and sent to the deflecting plates of an oscilloscope. The electrical equivalent of a human voice appears as an irregular wave in the "See Your Voice" exhibit. Bubbles of a "trapezoid" pattern can be seen in the "Here's How It's Done" exhibition.

Group Agrees on Rules For Possible Association

The Athletic committee of the Council of State College Presidents has tentatively accepted a proposal by San Jose State College for the formation of a Western College Athletic Assn.

The proposal was drawn up by Glenn "Tiny" Hartranft, chairman of the Division of Physical Education, and presented to the committee by President John T. Wahlquist at the meeting at Chico State College Monday.

Big Red Apple Presentation Is Held Today

All students are invited to attend the presentation of the Big Red Apple by the Journalism department today at 12:30 in the Spartan Daily newsroom, according to Dr. Dwight Bentel, head of the department.

Sally Curtiss, journalism student, will make the award to Pierre Salinger of the San Francisco Chronicle in recognition of his outstanding contribution to the journalism profession.

Salinger spent six weeks in a California city-by-city investigation of the jails. He was arrested in several cities so that he could obtain material for the series. The series appeared in the Chronicle in February, 1953, under the alias "Peter Emile Flick."

Following the Salinger expose, four counties appropriated funds to tear down old jails and build new ones. Salinger also worked on the Jack Santo murder investigation for six weeks.

Student Group Attends Confab Of Presidents

Five SJS student leaders are in San Francisco today for the opening of the annual Pacific Student Presidents' Assn. convention.

Attending the four-day conference are John Aitken, ASB president; Bill Eckert, vice-president; Art Lühnd, ASB president-elect; Paul Sakamoto, vice president-elect; and John Denney, ASB treasurer-elect.

The convention is being held at the University of San Francisco and is sponsored by SJS, University of California, Stanford, San Francisco State and USF.

The college leaders will discuss phases of student government, and participate in panel discussions. Delegates also will hear Dr. Wallace E. Sterling, president of Stanford University, and Dr. Paul Leonard, president of San Francisco State college.

Teacher Group Leaves College

Seventeen members of the State Division of Instruction left SJS yesterday after a two-day conference much better informed about teacher education changes here, stated Dr. William Rogers, acting head of the SJS division of teacher training.

"The conference was extremely informative and beneficial to both ourselves and the state department," he said.

Visiting only two state colleges each year, the group isn't expected to return to SJS until 1958.

Oral Reading

An oral reading program will be presented today in the Music building, Room 158 at 3:30 p.m., according to a spokesman for the Speech and Drama department.

Dr. Wahlquist reported that the proposal, as agreed upon by the committee, is essentially the same as the one presented by this college. It provides for a merger of the Far Western Conference and the California Collegiate Athletic Assn. plus the addition of independent San Jose State and Long Beach State colleges.

The committee also agreed upon two tentative proposals which would go into effect with the new association in 1956 if it is officially approved. The proposals are:

(1) No "work aid" program will be offered to athletes as such. The only consideration which will be given to athletes in this respect will be as individual students in need of help. The president added, though, that the rule will not be retroactive and will not affect any commitments made before that time.

(2) The new association will abide by the rules of the National Collegiate Athletic Assn. which prohibits participation by freshmen on varsity teams. The committee agreed this rule would not be enforced in schools in which the male enrollment is lower than 750, or when waived by unanimous consent.

Under the proposed arrangement, San Jose State would compete in a football league composed of San Francisco State, Fresno State, Cal Aggies, Los Angeles State, U.C. at Santa Barbara and San Diego State. Each team would be obligated to schedule at least four games with other teams in the conference.

The balance of games scheduled could be with independent or teams in other conferences. This would allow for the possibility of SJS staying in "big-time" competition. Dr. Wahlquist stated, however, that most of the state colleges are growing and he felt they will be equal to us competitively in a few years.

In other sports, such as basketball, baseball and track, the state colleges would be divided into two divisions, north and south. Competing in the northern division, SJS would meet San Francisco State, Chico State, Humboldt State, Cal Aggies and Nevada. The league would be conducted on a round-robin basis with each team playing all others twice. A play-off of the two divisions would be held at the end of the season.

President Wahlquist added that this would not prohibit San Jose State from competing in another league such as the California Basketball Assn., of which it is presently a member, if the games could be scheduled.

The proposal for the formation of the association came from this college as a supplement to a proposal by President Julian McPhee of Cal Poly for a state college league.

Dr. Wahlquist said that there were two main objections to the proposed state college league. They were: (1) cost of travel, involved in the playing of nine other state colleges, and (2) all of the state colleges are not on an equal plane of competition.

He added that "we are interested in joining the association, but we are not committed to it." Before the actual formation of the new association can be realized, the proposal must clear three hurdles. It must be approved by the individual schools, the Council of State College Presidents and the Far Western Conference and CCAA, both of which it would, in effect, envelop.

Dr. Wahlquist said that an indication of the feeling of the other colleges on the matter will be obtained at the next meeting of the Council, July 26.

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Golden Raider Linemen Hold All-League Honors

Jack Crawford, a senior police major from Pasadena, also makes the sports page via Coach Yosh Uchida's judo team. Jack, a 6-2 219 pound tackle, has compiled a string of all-conference honors. In addition to all-league at John Muir High, where he holds the shot put record, big Jack was named All-Western States, All-Southern California, and All-Jr. College, as well as being the outstanding athlete at his jaycee in 1951.

Another All-Western States Conference star is Tackle Charlie Kaaihue of Honolulu via Compton J. C., where he was captain of 1952 team. A veteran of last fall's squad, Charlie stands 5-9 and weighs 210. Kaaihue was recently switched to tackle, his old high school position at which he won Honolulu All-Star honors two years.

One of the members of last fall's Frosh squad is Tackle Al Severino, a police major. Al, who prepped at Puente High School, made the All-Tri County team during his junior and senior years. Standing 6-2½ and weighing 230. Al also tossed the shot in high school.

Another Freshman tackle is Walt Ramsey, 6 ft., 198 pounds, who played for Glendale City College last fall where he was selected for the all-conference team. Walt attended Verdugo Hills High in Sunland, where he made the All-Valley team and threw the shot on the track squad. He is a cook during the summer.

Guard Stan Galas, 5-11, 208, is a veteran of last fall's team and a transfer from Modesto J.C. Stan, a sophomore industrial arts major, is a native of Oakdale and played on the Oakdale High team at guard for three years. He says he is self-employed during the summer.

Harry Greenberg, 5-11, 190, is a freshman guard. A native of San Francisco, Harry attended Lowell High and earned a berth on the second string all-city team during the 1952 season. He is majoring in marketing and is a lifeguard during the summer.

Bob Bashford is another transfer from Glendale City College, a sophomore guard, Bob played one year at jaycee and three years at Glendale High. He is an aeronautical maintenance major. He spent two years in the air force and was discharged as a sergeant first class after serving 15 months in Japan.

Seattle Club Cops AAU Judo Honors

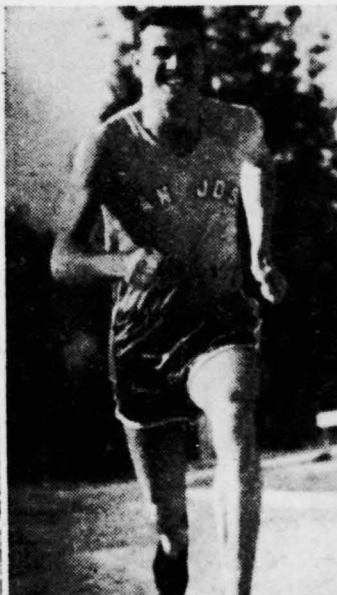

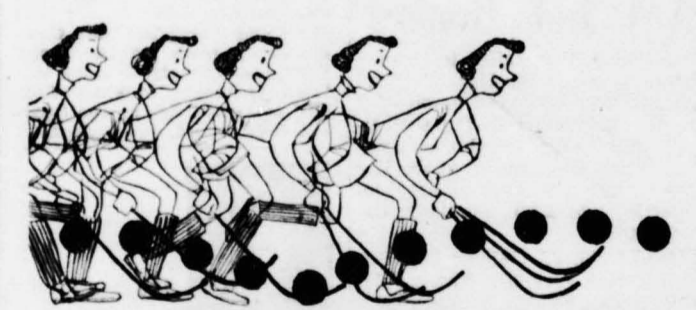
