Epidemic of Fumbles Set Up 4 Bear TD's

BERKELEY — A severe case of fumblyitis broke out in epidemic proportions here Saturday as California capitalized on San Jose State bobbles to crush the Spartans, 45-0, in Memorial Stadium before 32,000 fans.

The Golden Raider gridgers fumbled 13 times, losing the pigskin on nine of these occasions, setting up four of the Golden Bear touchdowns. Eight of the fumbles occurred in the first half.

The defeat was the worst licking Cal has handed SJS since 1899 when the Berkeley Boys trounced State, 44-0. San Jose has yet to beat Cal in four attempts.

Cal electrified the sweltering fans when Halfback John Wilson broke loose over right end and scampered nonstop 95 yards for the initial TD of the game. Paul Larson missed the conversion and the score stood, 6-0, with two minutes and thirty-six seconds elapsed.

Only seconds before Wilson's long jaunt, San Jose State showed signs of being as hot as the 96 degree temperature on the playing field when they had a first down on the Cal four on the third play of the game.

They had found themselves in this enviable position after Guard Tom Louderback recovered Sebastian Bordonaro's fumble on the Cal 34. On an impromptu play, Benny Pierce handed off to Al Brown, who fumbled, only to have Pierce scoop the ball out of mid-air and lateral it to Fullback Matt Vujevich, who rambled to the four-yard line.

Vujevich then preceded a long line of San Jose State fumbles by losing the ball on the four.

Ted Granger tallied three California teedee's on two plunges of three yards and one for four, all set up on Spartan fumbles.

Pierce's passing marked the unproductive Spartan attack as the Washington Square signal-caller completed 10 tosses in 16 attempts for 107 yards.

Ceremony Today

A ceremony possibly destined to become a tradition here will begin at 11 o'clock this morning when students and faculty gather in the Inner Quad for the President's Convocation. SJS President John T. Wahlquist officially will mark the beginning of the college year with a welcoming address. Classes will be excused from 10:55 to 11:30 o'clock this morning.

7648 Total Enrollment Swells State

San Jose State College's expected full-time equivalent of 6400 seemed to be bursting at the seams Friday as student enrollment climbed to 7648, according to Glen E. Guttormsen, accounting officer.

Tabulated returns from the Registrar's Office with a Friday 2 o'clock figure of 7626 registration showed 1361 new freshman students, 1125 college transfers, 34 adult special students, 4664 regular students and 442 former student returnees, Mrs. Barbara L. Wilcox of the office disclosed.

This figure includes all students carrying six or more units. Limited students, those carrying six or less units, numbered 158, as recorded by the Accounting Office.

"Since students were aware of the various restrictions on entrance this quarter, more than two-thirds of the registration, 5035 students, had registered during the first day. By noon Tuesday, the total had reached 7591," Guttormsen commented.

The state full-time enrollment figure of 6400 FTE students is based on the average for the entire year according to Lowell C. Pratt, director of public relations, who noted also that a 7000 FTE figure has been asked for the 1955-56 college budget.

1953-54 registration figures show 7113, fall; 6708, winter, and 6676 students for the last spring quarter.

File Applications Now for Offices

Hopefuls from all classes, except freshman, may file applications for petitions as candidates in the October 15 elections, according to Stan Croonquist, chief justice.

Croonquist says he has been "swamped" with inquiries by frosh asking the reason behind the freshman election delay.

Class Adviser Robert P. Johnson and the chief justice agreed that the delay gives class members an opportunity to decide which persons would make the best class leaders.

Applications are being accepted now for the appointive office of secretary on the Student Court. All SJS students are eligible.

State Ceilings Cause Concern At Colleges

The State Legislature recently imposed college enrollment ceilings have caused concern in five other colleges besides San Jose State as the fall enrollment became the "heaviest load of students in history" according to reports from state colleges.

The increases ranged from 4 per cent at San Jose State to 40 per cent at Sacramento State. Reports show enrollment overflows at Los Angeles State, San Diego State, San Francisco State, and Humboldt State.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Roy E. Simpson warned "there must be no further delay in providing the resources necessary to maintain a sound program in all of our schools and colleges." He stated that state college budget limitations are handicapping those students who need more education to meet the state's requirements for public school teachers.

Fall Rushing Commences at Ten Sororities

Fall rushing for the first time in eleven years starts tomorrow with informal lunches, afternoon affairs and dinners at the ten sorority houses on campus.

Girls who signed up at the Panhellenic registration booth will be notified by a mimeographed sheet that they are eligible to rush. During the period between tomorrow and October 8 no more than five rushees can be in the sorority house at any one time.

A desert party at the sorority houses on October 12 will be the only organized party during the rush period. Rushees will make out their preference October 13 and will pick up their bids to join the same day.

TWO FOR THE MONEY seems to be the theme here with a pair of Cal tacklers converging on an unidentified Spartan ball carrier as Guard Jim Davis, and teammate, come to the aid of the party. As it was there seemed to be too many Bears for the Spartans to handle as 32,000 fans watched the locals get shut out, 45-0, in Memorial Stadium, Berkeley, Saturday afternoon with the temperature skyrocketed to 96 degrees on the playing field. The Golden Raider gridgers fumbled 13 times, allowing Cal to grab nine of them and set up four touchdowns.



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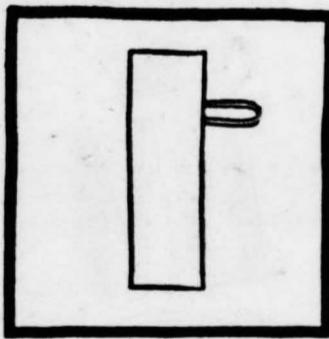
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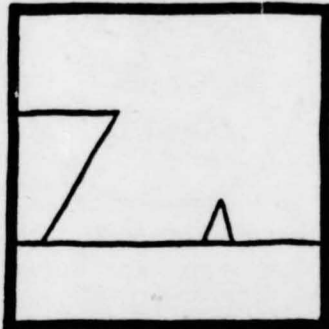
