Large Parade Hits Television For Big Game

A huge televised parade will kick off festivities for the College of Pacific game tomorrow at 4 p. m. in downtown Stockton, according to Shunji Ito, Rally Committee chairman.

SJS will be represented by the State Marching Band, "Spardi," Trish Meyers, last year's homecoming queen; the song girls, and yell leaders. San Jose mayor, George Starbird, will also ride in the parade.

The parade, which will be televised on KQVR (Channel 13), will organize at the corner of American Ave. and Market St. and travel two blocks North on American and eight blocks west to Webber St. to the City Court house.

1954 Queen To Get Crown At Ball Tonight

The 1954 Homecoming Queen will be crowned tonight before an expected crowd of more than 5,000 persons at the annual Coronation Ball in the Civic Auditorium. Crowning the new queen at 11 p. m. will be last year's honoree, Trish Meyers.

With the queen will be her four attendants, selected at the rally last night.

Playing for the Ball, which is slated to last from 9 p. m. to 1 a. m., will be Orrin Tucker and his twelve piece band. The orchestra is known as the one which made Wee Bonnie Baker famous in the pre-World War II days. Color theme of the ball will be purple and white.

A few bids still are available in the Graduate Manager's office, Jim Cottrell, chairman of the committee said yesterday, but students who do not pick up bids will be admitted by their student body cards.

Solon Says 6400 Ceiling Not Legislative Mandate

Another state college in this area was one of the prospects discussed yesterday by the California Senate Investigating committee on Education as a solution to San Jose State College's enrollment crisis.

Before an overflow crowd in Dunne Hall of the San Jose Civic Auditorium, the committee held a two-session public hearing to gather evidence which may lead to recommendations that will go before the legislature at its next session.

Sen. Nelson Dilworth, chairman of the committee, asked President John T. Wahlquist, "Can the present location of the college be expanded or should the legislature consider an entirely new state college in this area?"

He asked President Wahlquist to supply him with written information about expansion possibilities so he can determine whether to tell the legislature to consider building another college in this area.

President Wahlquist said SJS could handle the students but double sessions probably would be necessary.

After President Wahlquist pointed out the measures taken by SJS to hold the enrollment

down to the 6400 student ceiling supposedly set down by the legislature, Sam Yates, SJS student, asked the committee, "Do you believe the 6400 ceiling is a legislative mandate?"

Sen. Dilworth said that to his knowledge, "A 6400 ceiling never was placed on San Jose State College by the State Legislature."

President Wahlquist answered by declaring the 6400 full-time-equivalent student ceiling was in the Governor's budget.

Concerning a recent ruling by Attorney General Edmund G. Brown stating that it is illegal to restrict enrollments on the basis of entrance requirements which are higher than those at other state colleges, President Wahlquist explained that, with this ruling in mind, the estimated enrollment for fall quarter 1955 is more than 10,000 students or an FTE of about 8771 which makes necessary an additional 140 instructors.

Frank Brennan, SJS student, appealing to the committee, pointed out that additional funds is the only way to meet the present problem.

Sen. Dilworth answered him saying the Legislature does not have the power to meet the problem immediately. Brennan retorted, "you vote the money; you have the power."

Concluding the final session Sen. Dilworth said, "San Jose State College should get some positive legislation which would give the college officials a basis upon which to operate."

Sen. Robert Montgomery of King County was the only other member of the committee present during the hearing.

Hundreds Attend Conciliators Talks

Several hundred SJS students attended one or more of the three phases of the State Conciliators Conference held here yesterday.

Some economics, business and psychology classes were released for the conference.

The conference was opened in the morning by Dr. C. Grant Burton substituting for President John T. Wahlquist.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4 (UP)—Democrats clinched control of the 84th Congress today with a stirring photo-finish victory in Oregon which tipped the balance of power to the Democrats in the new Senate.

Assured control of the Senate, the Democrats already had captured the House by a 232 to 203 margin over the GOP.

Barring reversals by recounts in New Jersey and Oregon and elsewhere, the political lineup in the new Senate which convenes Jan. 5 will be: Democrats 48, Republicans 47, Independent 1.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4 (UP)—Senate Republican Leader William F. Knowland said today he expects President Eisenhower to run for re-election in 1956. However, he said he had not discussed the situation with Mr. Eisenhower.

45 MILLION VOTE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4 (UP)—Unofficial estimates indicated to-

day that about 45 million Americans voted in Tuesday's congressional election—a record number for non-presidential year balloting.

The previous record number of votes cast in an off-year election was 40,700,000 in 1950.

Held to a pair of contests under Pacific Coast Conference rules, the Spartababes were tied 12-12 by Fresno State in their opener here last Friday night.

The Tiger Cubs had their victory hopes scuttled by Treasure Island Navy, 27-14, in their initial encounter.

The COP offense is centered around Quarterback Chuck Chatfield, ex-Sacramento all-city prepster, who completed eight out of ten passes to End Gary Strong of Calgary in the Treasure Island mix.

Anchoring the line is Bill Elliot, 222 pound tackle from Hollywood. Spartan Coach Larry Matthews, ex-Raider halfback star, came up with a hard running backfield thrust against Fresno State in Halfbacks Rich Spierkerman, Lodi High School flash, and Bill Montero and Fullback Dick Frederickson.

Ron Dennis, high school All-American at Castlemont in Oakland, and Russ Camelleri, former Campbell prep, are Coach Matthews' outstanding flankers.

It'll be Don Hubbard versus Max Truex in the main event tomorrow morning in the big three-way cross country race involving University of Southern California, Stanford and San Jose State at Palo Alto.

Unbeaten Hubbard, SJS distance ace, and SC's once beaten Truex will square off in the four mile grind at 10 o'clock in what will be the local runner's toughest test to date.

Truex, SC's sensational freshman, who is holder of the national high school mile record of 4:21, paces an undefeated Trojan team termed as the school's "finest."

Truex smashed course records while winning every meet he raced in until he encountered ex-Spartan Joe Tyler, now of the U.S. Navy, last week in Southern California. Tyler beat Truex when the latter stumbled while running second and finished fifth.

Hubbard, who paced the Spartans to a 23-32 triumph over Stanford Tuesday, heads a crew that includes Jim Green, Don Barry, Duane Ludlow, Frank Wulf-tange and Weldon Stroud.

The team has only an opening loss to Cal to mar its otherwise clean slate, a 3-1 record.
