Faced with another drastic budget slash, San Jose State's activity for the next biennium is in danger of serious curtailment, according to Herman F. Minssen, vice president of the college.

Despite unusual economic meas-Vandegrift, State of California's effort to balance California's bud-

to Vandegrift, called for a general maintenance sum of \$789,030. Vandegrift desires to reduce this figure to \$675,670, a slash of \$113,360.

400 for permanent improvements and equipment. Vandegrift reand equipment. Vandegrift re-duced this sum to \$77,000, a re-duction of \$88,400. Of the \$77,-000, \$75,000 is to be used in equiping the new science wing, which fact dooms hope of completely equiping the building.

It is easy to critically sneer at college and wonder what one is getting out of it. Radicalism leaves one with a nice feeling of superiority-it rather sets one out from the mob and inflates the student ego. But when it comes down to the cold, hard fact that there may not be any college to return to next year, we suddenly feel very differently. The Legislature is considering a bill to abolish three teachers colleges. San Jose has escaped, but the tuition will be raised to \$75 per quarter under the terms of the new bill, which will undoubtedly make it impossible for many to return next year.

That such a bill should even be considered, destroys what faith we had in politicians. Surely they realize the danger of ruining the hopes and ambitions of the state's youth. If the bill should be passed, and those who pass it are the "people's choice", then California richly deserves her future fate.

This bill concerns all of us, concerns us so greatly that we should take stock of what college really amounts to. We don't mean the "rah-rah, support-the-team" idea, but the advantages, socially and intellectually, that put us on a level far superior to the high school graduate. There are few who would voluntarily discontinue higher education, however cynical we are about its inadequacy. The theory that "it is all so meaningless" seldom gets further than intellectual (?) bull sessions. It is not until we consider how very barren life would be if college were an impossibility, that we feel real appreciation. -F. A.



In order to decide this, the number of units registered for is divided by the normal individual load of credit (151/2) hours per quarter.

The figures are based on the ve enrollment of November, live 857 in Junior College; otaling ing a long way without a dollar. 2612, on the whole there is a drop between actual enrollment and equivalent enrollment. The Teachers College figures show an increase, while that of the Junior College shows a decrease.

Limited students, when considered, make the Teachers College enrollment become 1873 and leave the Junior College the same.


One hundred and fifty limited students were taking work equivalent to 31 students with normal loads.
