Pre-Meds Hear **Medical School** Talk By Elder

Dr. Elder Gives Statistics On Four Medical Schools In California

At a meeting of the Pre-Medical Club last Thursday, October 19, Dr. J. Elder poke on the medical schools of the United States.

Many interesting statistics were given concerning the medical schools. There are 22,466 medical students in the Uni-States, 1056 of these are women There were 4,896 graduates this year.

Of the 77 medical schools in the United States there are four in California ey are University of California, niord University, University of othern California and the school of Medical Evangelists in Loma Linda.

The tuition fees of the four schools are as follows; University of California, freshmen \$290, and sophomores, juniors and seniors \$225; Stanford University, freshmen \$387, sophomores \$369 suy, Iraniana and seniors \$360. University of Southern California \$460 for each year. Hubbard Party freshmen \$385, sophomores \$375, juniors \$480, and seniors \$440. These fees are ident students only. An additional non-resident fee is charged at each of four medical schools.

The school of Medical Evangelists requires only 2 years of pre-medical work, while the other three require three years
