## Construction of New Student Union Is 'Strictly Conversation' Says Felse

### Grad Manager Admits Need For Building

The Student Union council convave yesterday touched gently on the subject of obtaining a new Student Union building for the college.

William Felse, graduate manager, informed that "at this date, all talk regarding a new Union is strictly conversation. A few unofficial meetings have been held," Mr. Felse stated, "but no decision has been reached as to how to start the ball rolling."

Mr. Felse stated that only two things concerning the problem were certain: The need for a new Union, and the very apparent and puzzling question of how to get it.

"For example, if the state appropriated \$750,000 for eating quarters," Mr. Felse said, "then the furnishing and adding to the building would have to be financed by ASB funds, the floating of long-term loans, and possibly endowments from SJS alumni."

Additions to the present Union are out of the question, according to Mr. Felse, for proposed new buildings will take up any unoccupied property now available.

### Place Damper On Dance Plan

The hopes of the Social Affairs committee to obtain a big-name band for their spring dance were dimmed yesterday.

The Student Council passed a motion advising the committee to stay within their budget in sponsoring the spring affair and further advising them not to charge admission to it.

The College Life committee, in an oral report, said that they felt that there would be too many big dances coming up during too short a period for the student body to support them all.

The Junior Prom and the Senior Ball are scheduled for spring and it was felt that the dance planned by the Social Affairs committee would hurt attendance at these.

It was the general opinion of the Student Council that no money should be allocated to the Social Affairs budget from ASB funds.

The junior class said that a big dance put on by the Social Affairs committee might cut attendance at their Junior Prom and cause them to run the risk of losing money on it. The Prom is scheduled for about two weeks after the spring dance.

Nevertheless, the Social Affairs committee has a dance scheduled for April 12. It will be free to all students. It will take place close to campus and there will be a band.

## Queen Elizabeth Will Preserve U.S.-England Ties--Poytress

The ascension of Queen Elizabeth to the throne of England may be the main factor in alleviating any disagreements which could arise between England and the United States if the English Labor government was again voted into power.

This was the opinion expressed yesterday by Dr. William Poytress, head of the Social Science department, in reference to the effect the new sovereign will have on English policy. Twenty-five-year-old Princess Elizabeth became Queen yesterday when her father, King George VI, died at the age of 56.

In explaining his view, Dr. Poytress said that he expects England will be forced to hold another general election in the not too distant future. However, this will not be a result of the ascension of the Queen, he stated.

"When the election does occur," he said, "the government will again be given to the Labor party, in which more and more influence will be exerted by Ernest Bevin." Dr. Poytress said that many of Bevin's views have been unfavorable toward the United States.

"It will be at this time," Dr. Poytress stated, "that the influence of the Queen will be present to smooth over any disagreements between Bevin and this country."

Dr. Poytress made reference to the fact that the influence of Queen Victoria during the United States Civil War, was a deciding factor in keeping England from entering into an alliance with the southern forces. Elizabeth is the first Queen since the Victorian reign.

### Draft Deferment Request Due Soon

Students seeking a deferment from selective service must request such a deferment before the end of the school year. These students also must write their own letter requesting deferment to their local draft board, Miss Bernice VanGundy, secretary to Dean Stanley Benz, said yesterday.

Even if a student has a deferment at present, he must request another for next year. His request should be submitted to his local board soon, "preferably sometime in May," Miss VanGundy stressed.

## U.S. Battle Casualties Total 105,271

(By UNITED PRESS)

Washington.—American battle casualties in Korea through last Friday totaled 105,271, an increase of 270 over last week's report, the defense department reported yesterday.

It was one of the smallest increases reported by the defense department for many months.

The report does not cover all casualties through last Friday, but only those whose next of kin have been notified. It requires from one to three weeks to notify

next of kin. The casualties included 18,245 deaths, 74,605 wounded, 10,856 missing, 175 captured, 1390 previously missing but returned to service.

### Peculiar Situation

Washington.—President Truman says America faces "a very peculiar situation" which many people do not understand "except they have to pay taxes."

Mr. Truman, speaking at a dinner of the Veterans of Foreign Wars last night, said the nation

is "going through a period, the conclusion of which, if we can bring it out successfully, will mean peace in the world from now on."

### Plane Carrier Demoted

San Francisco.—The Navy will take the Essex-class carrier USS Intrepid from the moth-ball fleet here Saturday, it was announced yesterday.

The Intrepid's planes and guns sank 70 Japanese ships and shot down 700 Japanese planes in World War II Pacific action.

## Council to Plan Student U. Review

At its meeting yesterday, the Student Council decided to postpone discussion on the possibilities for a new Student Union, pending a report by the Student Union committee, which is expected to meet within the next two weeks.

Lud Spolyar, ASB president, said

that with the committee's report, the council will strive this quarter to make plans for a feasible financial program for the building of the Student Union. Edward Clements, faculty adviser for the council, told the members that a new Student Union could become a reality within the next few years, if the initial planning were begun right now.

In other matters before the council, the freshman class constitution was referred back to the frosh committee for revisions, after certain items in the laws were questioned by the council.

On a motion by Tom Evans, the council voted to keep the Social Affairs committee within their budget in planning for their April 12 dance. The committee also was instructed not to charge admission for the affair.

Since no applications have been received for the position of 1952 Homecoming chairman, it was decided to accept applications until next week.

The Student Y request to have its forthcoming ski trip covered by the ASB injury fund was denied by the council, after it was explained that this service is extended only to student body organizations.

The council accepted Dean Helen Dimmick's request to be relieved of her duties of scheduling the functions for the Student Union, Henry Stoltenberg, custodian for the Student Union, was assigned the duties.

It was decided to wait until next quarter before a student public relations representative should be appointed. It is planned to give the position to a public relations major as part of his field work requirement.

## Lt. Col. Brown To Leave SJS

Lt. Col. Howard E. Brown, head of the Air Force ROTC department, revealed yesterday that he will be transferred to another post at the end of spring quarter. Name of Colonel Brown's replacement has not been released.

The colonel's new assignment is at the Air Command and Staff school, Maxwell Air Force base, Montgomery, Ala. The school offers graduate work in the latest Air Force tactics for career officers.

Stationed here in 1948, Colonel Brown has seen the enrollment in the Air Force ROTC program

quadrupled. "This is one of the most productive and pleasant posts at which I've been stationed," he commented.

Colonel Brown entered the Air Force in 1940, immediately after graduation from the University of California. During World War II, he commanded a reconnaissance squadron in the Pacific.

He is faculty adviser to Delta Upsilon and Arnold Air society, Air Force ROTC honor society.

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# Mittmen Point For Saturday Nevada Match

After dumping Minnesota, 6½-1½, to complete their twenty-third consecutive dual match without defeat, Coach Dee Portal's boxing squad began working yesterday for their Saturday night meeting with the Nevada Wolfpack.

Coach Jimmy Olivas will bring his Reno ringmen to Spartan gym in hopes of upsetting the high-riding Raiders who have won three matches and tied one this season. Minnesota was the second Big Ten team that the Spartans encountered in 10 days, SJS "upset" Michigan State Jan. 25 by earning a draw with them, 4½-4½.

The Gold and White team tamed the Cal Poly Mustangs in the opening match of the season, and defeated Alameda Naval Air station last Friday. Portal's men are only five bouts from breaking a national collegiate mark of 27 consecutive dual matches without defeat, established by Wisconsin over the 1946-49 seasons. The Badgers were the last team to defeat the Spartans, turning the trick in the final match of the 1949 campaign.

Should SJS ringmen finish the year with victories or draws with their opponents—Nevada, Idaho, Gonzaga, Washington State, and San Francisco State—they could bust the record. Gonzaga, who turned in a 6-3 victory over MSC last week, appears to be the biggest block to Spartan hopes, although Portal is not looking beyond the Nevada bout at the present time.

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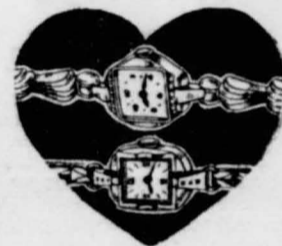


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# Revelries Preparations Madden Musical Chief

"I'm going nuts, nuts, nuts!" calmly stated Maurice Bodwell, musical director for this year's Spartan Revelries.

"First the music to write, now these tryouts next week, after that the show—fatigue, the strain, the constant pressure—I'm gonna go off my rocker," commented the bespectacled Bodwell as he sank into an overstuffed chair in the Spartan Daily office.

Bodwell, a 21-year-old business administration major from San Jose, shyly admitted that he has been playing the piano since the age of ten. In addition to composing and orchestrating for local dance bands while in high school, he also did a three-and-a-half year stint studying and composing parts.

His main interest, however, is composing show tunes, a field he hopes to go into professionally. "I'm willing to accept offers from music publishing firms, however," he pointed out.

Enthusiastic about "Kiss Me Hello," the title of the Spartan Revelries of '52, Bodwell said, "This year's show is unique in that we are using a theater orchestra instead of a dance band. In fact, the very nature of the plot lends itself to a variety of treatment. That is, since the scenes of the show take place all over the world, the music can, of course, be representative of many types of the world's music."

The quality of Bodwell's work on "Kiss Me Hello" was emphasized by Dave Woods, production director, who commented, "The music is terrific. Bodwell has done an amazing job."

Bodwell, who worked closely with Woods and Mary Hall while they were writing the script, feels that "The Devil's Right Hand Man" and "We Are College Rah-Rah Boys" are the best of the 16 songs he wrote for the show.

Tryouts will be held next Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday for "Kiss Me Hello," which is a modernized musical adaptation of the Faust legend. The three nights of auditions will be held in the Morris Dailey auditorium at 7 p.m.
