Surprise Action In Assembly Hits Co-Op Store Bill

State Campus Co-Op Store Will Keep Same Status Here

The recent surprise action of the State Assembly in voting down Assembly Bill 1906, introduced by Meekers and Powers of Fresno, expressly permitting the operation of student Co-Operative stores on the campus, leaves the store situation in the same status as it was prior to its recent consideration.

The two bills prohibiting the operation of student stores on the campus having been killed in committee, there is no possibility that legislative action will be taken

which will forbid such stores.

The only bill still eligible for consideration is Senate Bill 757, authored by Herbert C. Jones of Santa Clara County. Its context is similar to that of the Meekers and Powers bill, just adversely decided upon. Should Jones' bill receive favorable consideration by the Senate, it will go to the embly for concurrence, which event the matter will be again opened for debate in the wer house.

Indications are that the Co-Operative store will continue its operation just as it has in the past.

Pre-Historic Indian Village Is Discovered on New Stadium Site

When San Jose opposes Pacific in the opening football game of next season, they will be playing over ash heaps of pre-historic ru-ins. This fact was disclosed last week when Charlie Curtis and Coach MacDonald unearthed a mortar and two pestles.

Dr. Count, of our Science faculty, examined the ash heaps from which the tools were taken and expressed the belief that they were used over a thousand years ago when the Indians were forced by flood waters or other circumtances to leave their sites. In addition to the tolos, bones of ani-mals, birds and fishes were found. As yet no gold or other valuable metal was found so the contrac-tors may proceed with their excavations without fear of being engulfed in a mad rush of some kind or another.

Incidentally, the stadium is pro-gressing rapidly, and it would be a good idea for the students and faculty to drop over and examine the proceedings.

Rushing Rules Governing Campus Sororities Activities for the Coming Semester Are

Dean of Women on Friday morning, one day before the preference dinner.

No bids shall be sent out by mail or special delivery.

No conversation shall be carried on with girls who have received bids until the bids have been answered.

Immediately after the bids have been filed with the Dean of Women, the Dean of Women shall send to the Co-opa letter summoning each girl who has received a bid.

In confidential and individual interviews the girls who have been sent for shall tell the Dean of. Women what their vrst choices are. If they receive bids from this find their vrst choices are. If they receive bids from this find choice, they shall be told, and shall not be told of any further bids received by them.

If not bidden by first choice the girl shall state second choice and so on through to the third choice if necessary.
