De Groot Expresses Disappointment With Lettermen Turnout

Only Fourteen Lettermen Out of Twenty-nine Apply for Suits

Coach Dud De Groot, and his assistant, Bill Hubbard, have become pessimistic over the football outlook for next fall, for there are but fourteen lettermen from last year's championship squad reporting for practice. Twenty-nine lettermen were expected to return by De Groot. Peterson, Scott, Klem, Carmichael, Riley, Griffiths, and Horbek are not in school this quarter and some of them may not return. Francis, Shehtanian, Hubbard, Bennett, Arnold, and Arjo are reporting for track. The remainder are fiddling about school. Thus, De Groot, instead of losing but three through graduation, loses eighteen—although the six out for track can report after May 15, but will be too late to do the team, as a whole, any good.

Conference Teams Practice

Our biggest rivals, Pacific, Nevada, and Fresno, all have a FIVE DAY A WEEK turnout, and every man that is even remotely suspected of being football material, out. The coaches at these institutions have their ENTIRE '33 varsity out for Spring practice. Stanford has 100 men out, including all varsity candidates, with one or two exceptions.

Lack of Spirit

This all shows a lack of spirit among the players—a factor to which previous disastrous seasons must be attributed. There isn't much silver lining to this cloud, and De Groot and Hubbard are both disappointed in the showing made by the lettermen and say that things will look pretty dismal if the boys don't snap out of it. Their only ray of sunshine is the spirit shown by the frosh, transfers, and non-lettermen.

De Groot's Attitude

"Hubbard and I are not only discouraged, but disgusted with the support with which the lettermen are giving us at Spring practice. Our attitude, in self-defense is simply this: Every letterman from last year's squad, and especially those not out for Spring practice will have to win their spurs anew to receive any special consideration insofar as the 1933 varsity is concerned. As things now stand, it looks very much as though the Spartan team which takes the field against Stanford September 23, will be an inexperienced one, with many strange faces. It is doubtful whether such a team will offer the powerful, experienced front that the veteran team of '32 would present."

Conference Attitude

Every team in the Conference will be gunning for State next year because of last season's record. "Tiny" Thornhill makes his debut at Stanford on September 23, and will try to make his first season an impressive one, so State can expect no mercy. Stagg, at Pacific, will be pointing for us,

TRACKMEN DETERMINED TO TAKE FAR WESTERN CONFERENCE ON MAY 6

With six meets behind them and but four more weeks of competition ahead, Coach Erwin Blesh and his stalwart Spartan tracksters are settling down to a program of conditioning which has but one objective, the Far Western Conference meet in Sacramento on May 6th.

The locals are determined to take the Conference crown from Fresno and at the same time gain revenge for the 79-52 beating which they took at the hands of the Bulldogs last Saturday. The members of the team are confident that the two squads are evenly enough matched that the points of the other Conference schools will serve as a balancing factor which will give them their fighting chance.

Two dual meets remain before the all-important fracas. This Saturday the locals will tangle with Coach Fred Earle's Modesto Junior College Pirates, and the following week will find Coach Charlie Hunter's Olympic Club team making an invasion of San Jose.

Spartans Will Enter the Field Saturday as Slight Favorites Over Modesto

Saturday will find Coach Fred Earle and his Modesto Junior College Pirates in San Jose to do battle with Coach Erwin Blesh's Spartan cinder path artists at Spartan Field.

The Junior Collegians possess one of the strongest teams in their history, but they are not expected to muster enough power to overthrow the locals. Sacramento Junior College, whom the Spartans nosed out by one point, holds a 76-46 decision over the Pirate aggregation, which serves to install Coach Blesh's charges as favorites in the coming fracas.

The Pirates number among their team several high class performers who will give Captain Doug Taylor and company plenty of trouble before the afternoon is over. For instance, there is Bud Shoemaker in the sprints with marks of 9.8 and 21.8. Then there is Lyle Jamison in the quarter,

as will Nevada and Fresno. Last year State had the advantage—other teams were taking us in stride, but this year, because of this change in Conference attitude a new type of game is needed. Last year State got along with a strong defense and a relatively weak offense. This season the offense must be strengthened. This cannot be developed in the fall, for the foundation must be laid down during Spring practice, which is impossible this year because of the poor turnout of lettermen. "Even the two of the three all-conference men who are eligible are not out, and unless we receive better co-operation, we can't promise anything," says Coach De Groot, while Hubbard glommiyly nods his head in agreement.

Frosh Tracksters Will Meet Strong Commerce High School Outfit of San Francisco Here This Afternoon, 3 P. M.

Claud McWilliams, Versatile Star of Powerful City Team

Commerce High School, one of San Francisco's strongest, led by an "iron man" in the person of Claude McWilliams, will form the mid-week opposition for Coach Bill Hubbard's State Frosh track and field team this afternoon at Phelan Field. The first event will get under way at 3:00 o'clock.

In McWilliams, Coach Harold Brillhart has a man who runs the hundred in 9.9, the 220 in 21.0, broad jumps over 23 feet, and is good for 5 feet 10 inches in the high jump, a very handy man to have on any high school track team. To beat "Red" Provan, lanky yearling sprinter, McWilliams will have to run his fastest, as Provan is consistently good for 10 flat in the century, and can cover the 220 in 22 flat. Backing McWilliams up in the 220 is a lad named Lewen, who is also capable of running the 220 in 22 flat. In a meet in which McWilliams competed for the San Francisco All-Stars against the Stanford Frosh, he took first places in the 100, 220, and broad jump.

Bert Watson will be pressed for the first time this season in the broad jump. Watson has been going out about 21 feet, but with a little forcing by McWilliams he will no doubt extend his former record.

Commerce boasts of another famous personage in Johnny Ligouri, the 440 pride of San Francisco Prep circles. Ligouri has covered the one lap in 51.2, which is about 3 seconds faster than any of the locals can turn in. Lewen is just a little slower man his team-mate in this event.

San Jose will reign in the pole vaulting. Commerce has but one vaulter who can do 11 feet, while the Spartans boast of three men, Watson, Hickman, and Davis, who are good for 11 feet 6 inches, and better. Don McCauley, another frosh, can be depended on to reach 11 feet.

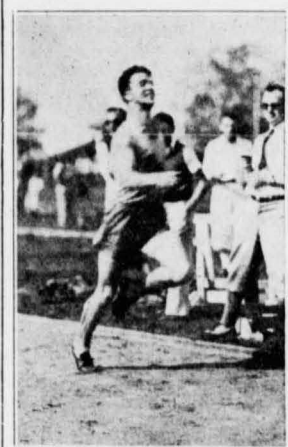

Spartan Spasms

The Fresno meet produced two performances worthy of note on the part of Spartan athletes which were overlooked in the general rush of events but deserve mention now.

The first was by Harry Murphy who cleared six feet in high jump for the first time this season. Harry has been jumping five ten and eleven consistently all year, but last Saturday represents his first adventure into that very exclusive field of gentlemen who soar 72 inches or more into the ozone. If Wallace Leslie can get back in form by the Conference meet, Sparty ought to pick up some very valuable points behind Fresno's great Marty.

The second was by "Red" Wool, who kept up his constant standard of improvement in the pole vault. Picking up where he left off last year at 12 feet 8 inches, "Red" has climbed steadily week by week until he soared over 12 feet 8 inches at Fresno. At this rate of improvement he may surpass his brother Jack's Far Western Conference record of 13 feet 2 1/2 inches.

"Tiny" Thornhill's suggestion that a spring football carnival be held annually between Stanford, San Jose, Santa Clara, and the combined forces of San Mateo and Menlo Junior Colleges appears to be a very good idea. We are waiting to see how it takes hold with the other coaches involved. It is possible that they may consider another arrival in addition to the Pacific affair, which, we understand, is to be held annually, a bit much of the good thing.

Those who are interested in journey out to Spartan Field this afternoon and witness some of the leading high school athletes of the state perform with Commerce High School do battle with Coach Bill Hubbard's Frosh.

Leading the Commerce team is Claude McWilliams, the colorful flash whose sensational abilities have made him the talk of San Francisco for the past three years. He has marks of 9.9 for the 100, 21.9 for the 220, 5 feet 10 inches for the high jump, and 23 feet 1 1/2 inches in the broad jump.

Other luminaries on the city team are Lewen, with a mark of 22.2 for the 220; Ligouri, with 51.2 quarter mile to his credit; Gordon, a 4:47 miler; and Leaf, who has cleared 6 feet in the high jump.

Anson Hayes, undefeated Frosh hurdler, will be one of the more promising additions to Coach Erwin Blesh's varsity next spring. His 15.8 second high hurdle performance against Palo Alto stamped him definitely as a prospect of marked ability.

Champion of Fresno looked good winning the two mile, uncorking a terrific 200 yard finishing sprint. He appears to be the logical favorite to win this event in the Conference at the present writing.
