Applicants are assigned the highest class of membership for which they are qualified. Applications may be obtained from the Association Office. All memberships, except Sustaining, are personal and are not transferable.

SLA'S SPECIAL ACTIVITIES AND SERVICES

CONFERENCES

Annual Conferences are an important part of the SLA network. In addition to sessions of general professional interest, you will find programs of special subject interest, discussion of new technology and equipment, Division programs and business meetings, an exhibit area and tours to special libraries and information centers.

CONTINUING EDUCATION COURSES

SLA continuing education courses focus on a wide range of current issues and new technological development. The Association sponsors an education program at the Annual Conference and a regional education program throughout the Association year. SLA also cooperates in joint education programs with the Medical Library Association and the American Society for Information Science.

SLA designs courses for working librarians and information managers, as well as recent graduates. A five-year continuing education plan offers members at all stages of their careers special direction in their continuing education pursuits. Those who complete SLA courses receive SLA Continuing Education Course Certificates and continuing education units (CEUs).

CONSULTATION SERVICE

This very special program provides Chapter consultation officers to assist businesses and other organizations with their special information needs. SLA members consult confidentially on a one-day basis as a professional courtesy, working with management and information staff to define problems and find realistic solutions.

EMPLOYMENT CLEARINGHOUSE

The Employment Clearinghouse offers job information through publication of a monthly newsletter and by providing facilities for employers and job-seekers to meet at Annual Conferences. Both employers and SLA members can register with this information bank through the Association Office. SLA Chapters provide local job information and some operate telephone job lines.

PUBLICATIONS

Since its inception, SLA has been active in publishing indexes, bibliographies, monographs, and other material important to its members.

Current offerings are listed in SLA's publications catalog. They include bibliographies, directories and guides on various subjects as well as publications about the organization of special libraries, and career pamphlets.

Special Libraries, the Association's official journal, includes papers on the administration, organization and operation of special libraries and infor-

mation centers; scholarly reports of research in librarianship, documentation, education, information science and technology, bibliographies and bibliographic essays; and articles on such concerns as professional standards, salary information, education, recruitment, and public relations. News items of professional and Association interests are also published.

A subscription to *Special Libraries* and the *SpecialList* are integral parts of all SLA membership classes. In addition, all SLA Chapters and Divisions publish bulletins. Some Chapters and Divisions also publish serials, directories, and monographs of professional interest to their members.

INFORMATION SERVICES

Whether you need a few facts or a literature search, or if you want to know how other libraries have solved the same problems you face, SLA Information Services Department is ready to help.

A growing clearinghouse for information on special libraries, Information Services offers telephone reference assistance and referrals to other sources; a circulating collection of books on library and information science; recent periodicals in the field; and materials from SLA's Management Documents Collection, including job descriptions, corporate organization charts, user survey questionnaires, collection development policies, user guides, promotional pieces, floor plans, budgets, and staff manuals.

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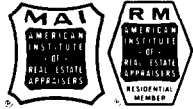
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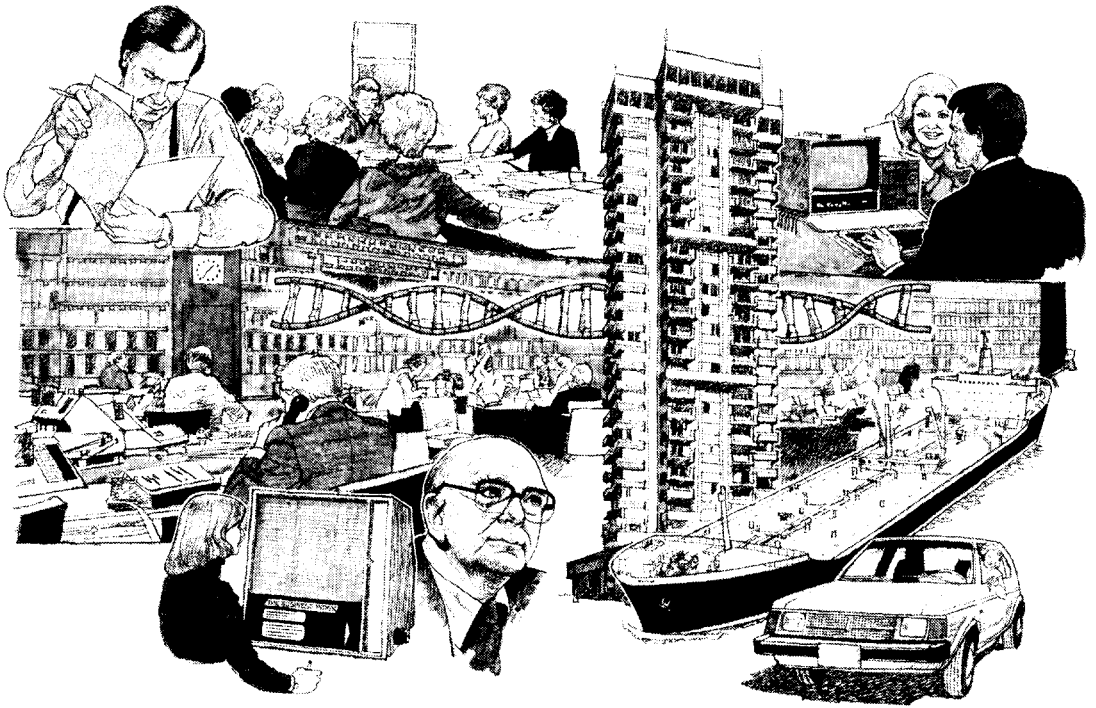
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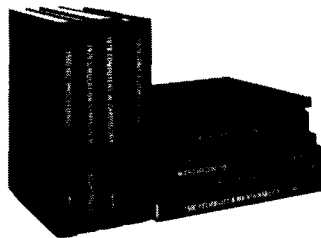
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Article I: Name and Objectives

SECTION 1. The name of this not-for-profit corporation, organized and existing under the laws of the State of New York, shall be The Special Libraries Association, Inc., hereinafter referred to as the "Association."

SECTION 2. The objectives of this Association shall be to provide an association of individuals and organizations having a professional, scientific or technical interest in library and information science, especially as these are applied in the recording, retrieval and dissemination of knowledge and information in areas such as the physical, biological, technical and social sciences and the humanities; and to promote and improve the communication, dissemination and use of such information and knowledge for the benefit of libraries or other educational organizations, and no part of the property, assets, profits or net income shall inure to the benefit of any director, officer or member or to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 as amended.

SECTION 3. As a not-for-profit corporation, which is exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, no part of the property, assets or net income of the Association shall inure to the benefit of any director, officer, member, or other private person except that the Association shall be authorized to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the objectives set forth in Article I, Section 2 of these Bylaws. No substantial part of the activities of the Association shall be devoted to propaganda or to attempt to influence legislation. The Association shall not participate or intervene in any political campaign for public office, nor shall it carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Code).

SECTION 4. Should dissolution of the Association become necessary, the Association shall

be dissolved pursuant to the relevant provisions of the New York Not-for-Profit Corporation Law. After paying or adequately providing for the payment of its liabilities the remaining assets of the Association shall be distributed to one or more domestic or foreign corporations or other organizations engaged in activities substantially similar to those of the Association pursuant to a plan of distribution adopted as provided in the relevant sections of the New York Not-for-Profit Corporation Law.

SECTION 5. The Association will not, without first obtaining appropriate approvals as required by New York law, engage in any of the activities referred to in the New York Not-for-Profit Corporation Law, Sections 404(b) through (o), or the New York Social Services Law, Section 35, or the corresponding provisions of any future revisions of these laws.

Article II: Membership

SECTION 1. Membership in the Association shall consist of: Members, Associate Members, Student Members, Retired Members, Sustaining Members and Honorary Members. Eligibility for and privileges of each class shall be as stated herein. The Association committee concerned with membership shall be the authority on the eligibility of membership applicants. Within the terms of this Article, a special library is defined as:

- (a) A library or information center maintained by an individual, corporation, association, government agency or any other group; or
- (b) A specialized or departmental collection within a library;

for the organization and dissemination of information, and primarily offering service to a specialized clientele through the use of varied media and methods.

SECTION 2. Member status shall be granted to an applicant who fulfills any one of the following requirements:

- (a) Has a graduate degree in library or information science; or

- (b) Has a bachelor's degree or higher degree and has three or more years of professional experience in a special library or information center; or
- (c) Has at least seven years experience in a special library or information center, determined by the Association committee concerned with membership to be professional experience. (One year of undergraduate college credit equals one year of professional experience); or
- (d) Has a teaching position in a university or college and is engaged in educating students in one or more disciplines related to special librarianship or information science; or
- (e) Has a bachelor's degree or higher degree and has had general administrative responsibility for one or more special divisions or subject areas in an academic or public library.

A Member shall have the right to vote, to hold any Association, Chapter or Division elective office or appointive position, to affiliate with one Chapter and one Division without payment of additional fee, and to receive the official journal free.

SECTION 3. Associate Member status shall be granted to an applicant who has a serious interest in the objectives of the Association. An Associate Member shall have the right to vote, to hold any appointive Association position, to hold any elective office or appointive position in a Chapter or a Division; but not to hold any elective Association office; to affiliate with one Chapter and one Division without payment of additional fee, and to receive the official journal free. Upon qualification an Associate Member shall be granted Member status.

SECTION 4. Student Member status shall be granted to an applicant enrolled in a curriculum of library or information science at least part time. This category of membership shall be available only to those joining the Association for the first time and may be held for no more than three years. A Student Member shall have the right to vote, to hold any Association, Chapter or Division appointive position; but not to hold any elective Association, Chapter or Division office; to affiliate with one Chapter

and one Division without payment of additional fee, and to receive the official journal free.

SECTION 5. Retired Member status shall be granted, upon request, to a Member who has reached age 60 and who has retired. In this connection "retirement" shall be defined by the Board with the advice of the Association committee concerned with membership. A Retired Member shall have the right to vote, to hold any appointive Association position, to hold any elective office or appointive position in a Chapter or a Division; but not to hold any elective Association office; to affiliate with one Chapter and one Division without payment of additional fee, and to receive the official journal free.

SECTION 6. Sustaining Member status shall be granted to a firm, organization or individual desiring to support the objectives and programs of the Association. The benefits of this class of membership shall be determined by the Board.

SECTION 7. An Honorary Member shall be an individual elected to this honor by the Association members. At the time of his election, a candidate shall not belong to the Special Libraries Association. Nominations shall be presented in writing to the Board and may be proposed by one or more Association members. Upon endorsement by a two-thirds vote of the Board, the nomination shall be submitted by the Board to the members for election at an Annual Business Meeting. The total number of Honorary Members shall not exceed 15 at any one time and not more than two may be elected in any one year. An Honorary Member shall have the right to affiliate with one Chapter and one Division, and to receive the official journal free.

Article III: Board of Directors

SECTION 1. There shall be a Board of Directors, herein referred to as the "Board," that shall have power and authority to manage the Association's property and to regulate and govern its affairs. The Board shall determine policies of the Association, and shall take such actions as it considers necessary to carry out the objectives of the Association.

SECTION 2. The Board shall consist of: the President and President-Elect of the Association, the Chairman and Chairman-Elect of the Chapter Cabinet, the Chairman and Chairman-Elect of the Division Cabinet, the Treasurer, the most recent Past President and six elected Directors. At the first regular meeting held after the Annual Business Meeting the Board shall elect one of its members to serve as Secretary.

SECTION 3. The Board shall hold four regular meetings per year on such dates and at such places as shall be fixed by the Board and may hold special meetings upon call of the President or upon written request of any three members of the Board. There shall be a regular meeting of the Board no later than one week after the Annual Business Meeting of the Association. Meetings of the Board, except Executive Sessions, shall be open to members of the Association and by invitation of the President to nonmembers. Eight members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 4. In the event that a vacancy occurs in the membership of the Board, a replacement shall be elected by a majority vote of the remaining members of the Board to serve until a new member is elected by the membership of the Association under the procedures in Article XI.

SECTION 5. All members of the Board shall serve until their successors are elected and assume their duties. The terms of office and the "Association Year" shall commence at the adjournment of the Annual Business Meeting or if there is no Annual Business Meeting on July 1 following the election.

SECTION 6. There shall be an Executive Committee of the Board, to consist of the President, President-Elect and Past President, with all the authority of the Board to act between meetings of the Board, except with respect to the following matters which are prohibited by the New York Not-for-Profit Corporation Law, Section 712:

- (a) The submission to Association members of any action requiring Association members' approval under the New York Not-for-Profit Corporation Law;
- (b) The filling of vacancies in the Board or in any Committee;

(c) The fixing of compensation of the Directors for serving on the Board or on any Committee;

(d) The amendment or repeal of the Bylaws or the adoption of new Bylaws;

(e) The amendment or repeal of any resolution of the Board unless so authorized by the Board.

Article IV: Officers

SECTION 1. The President shall be the chief executive officer of the Association and, subject to the Board, shall have general supervision and control over its affairs. He shall serve as Chairman of the Board and shall preside at all meetings of the Association and the Board. He shall recommend to the Board such measures as he considers desirable to further the objectives and broaden the effectiveness of the Association. At the Annual Business Meeting he shall report for the Board on the general state of the Association and shall present for information or consideration any matters of policy or program that he or the Board desire to bring to the attention of the members. He shall be a member ex officio, without vote, of all Association committees except the Nominating Committee. In the event of disability, absence or withdrawal of the President, the title and all duties and obligations shall be assumed by the President-Elect. Should further succession to the office become necessary, the title, duties and obligations shall be assumed by the most recent Past President. A vacancy in the Board created by such succession shall be filled as a Director.

SECTION 2. The President-Elect shall perform such duties as the President may assign.

SECTION 3. The Chairman of the Chapter Cabinet shall preside at all meetings of the Chapter Cabinet and shall direct and coordinate its activities. He shall represent Chapter interests in relationships with the Board and shall inform Chapters of decisions and policies affecting their interests. He shall communicate to the Board and to the Chapter Cabinet such matters and suggestions as may, in his opinion, increase the usefulness of the Chapter Cabinet.

SECTION 4. The Chairman-Elect of the Chapter Cabinet shall perform such duties as the

Chairman may assign. In the event of disability, absence or withdrawal of the Chairman, his title, duties and obligations shall be assumed by the Chairman-Elect. A vacancy in the Board created by such succession shall be filled as a Director.

SECTION 5. The Chairman of the Division Cabinet shall preside at all meetings of the Division Cabinet and shall direct and coordinate its activities. He shall represent Division interests in relationships with the Board and shall inform Divisions of decisions and policies affecting their interests. He shall communicate to the Board and to the Division Cabinet such matters and suggestions as may, in his opinion, increase the usefulness of the Division Cabinet.

SECTION 6. The Chairman-Elect of the Division Cabinet shall perform such duties as the Chairman may assign. In the event of disability, absence or withdrawal of the Chairman, his title, duties and obligations shall be assumed by the Chairman-Elect. A vacancy in the Board created by such succession shall be filled as a Director.

SECTION 7. The Treasurer shall perform the usual duties of the office and those assigned by the Board. At the Annual Business Meeting he shall report to the members on the financial status of the Association.

SECTION 8. The Secretary shall perform the usual duties of the office and those assigned by the Board.

SECTION 9. The terms of office of President, President-Elect and Past President of the Association, Secretary, Chairman and Chairman-Elect of the Chapter Cabinet, Chairman and Chairman-Elect of the Division Cabinet shall be one year. The terms of office of Treasurer and Director shall be three years. All officers shall serve until their successors are elected and assume their duties. The term of office shall commence at the adjournment of the Annual Business Meeting or, if there is no Annual Business Meeting, on July 1 following the election.

Article V: Chapter Cabinet

SECTION 1. There shall be a Chapter Cabinet whose major areas of interest and functions shall be assigned by the Board. The Cabinet

may request and receive reports from its members, shall advise the board on matters pertaining to its assigned interests and may initiate proposals for consideration by the Board. It shall consider matters referred to it by the Board, the President or the administrator of the Association Office.

SECTION 2. The Chapter Cabinet shall consist of each Chapter President and President-Elect. If either is unable to attend a meeting of the Cabinet, the Chapter President shall designate an eligible member of his Chapter to represent the Chapter Cabinet member unable to attend.

SECTION 3. The Chapter Cabinet shall hold two regular meetings annually at the call of its Chairman, one of which shall be held during the annual Association Conference. Special meetings may be held upon call of the Chairman or upon written request of 15 members of the Chapter Cabinet. Joint sessions with the Division Cabinet may be requested by the Chapter Cabinet Chairman or the Association President. Meetings of the Chapter Cabinet shall be open to all Association members.

Article VI: Division Cabinet

SECTION 1. There shall be a Division Cabinet whose major areas of interest and functions shall be assigned by the Board. The Cabinet may request and receive reports from its members, shall advise the Board on matters pertaining to its assigned interests and may initiate proposals for consideration by the Board. It shall consider matters referred to it by the Board, the President or the administrator of the Association Office.

SECTION 2. The Division Cabinet shall consist of each Division Chairman and Chairman-Elect. If either is unable to attend a meeting of the Cabinet, the Division Chairman shall designate an eligible member of his Division to represent the Division Cabinet member unable to attend.

SECTION 3. The Division Cabinet shall hold two regular meetings annually at the call of its Chairman, one of which shall be held during the annual Association Conference. Special meetings may be held upon call of the Chairman or upon written request of 8 members of the Cabinet. Joint sessions with

the Chapter Cabinet may be requested by the Division Cabinet Chairman or the Association President. Meetings of the Division Cabinet shall be open to all Association members.

Article VII: Association Meetings

SECTION 1. An annual meeting of the members (herein referred to as the "Annual Business Meeting") shall be held at such time and place as the Board determines.

SECTION 2. Special Business Meetings may be called by the Board. Notice of a Special Business Meeting shall specify the business to be transacted, and no business other than that stated in the notice shall be considered.

SECTION 3. Notices of meetings in writing or printed in the official journal shall be sent to each voting member at least 30 days before all Association meetings.

SECTION 4. A quorum for the transaction of business shall be 100 members entitled to vote.

SECTION 5. When not in conflict with these Bylaws *Robert's Rules of Order Revised* shall govern all deliberations.

SECTION 6. Whenever, in the judgment of the Board, a question arises that should be put to a vote of the entire membership and cannot await the Annual Business Meeting, the Board may submit the question for vote by proxy or by mail unless otherwise required in these Bylaws. The closing date for the return of proxies and mail votes shall be established by the Board. The question presented shall be resolved by a two-thirds vote provided that, of the total members eligible to vote, at least ~~40~~ ³⁰ per cent shall have voted.

Article VIII: Chapters

SECTION 1. Chapters may be established by the Board upon written petition of 25 or more voting members of the Association who reside or work in the geographic area defined in the petition.

SECTION 2. Membership eligibility in Chapters shall be in accordance with Article II. An eligible member may affiliate with more

than one Chapter upon payment of an additional fee for each additional Chapter as determined by the Board and approved at an Annual Business Meeting.

SECTION 3. Bylaws for its own government shall be adopted by each Chapter. Chapter Bylaws shall not be in conflict with those of the Association, in particular Article I, Sections 3, 4, and 5, and shall be submitted to the Association Committee concerned with Bylaws for approval.

SECTION 4. Groups within a Chapter may be established by the Chapter. A Chapter shall provide needed operating funds for its Groups, if any. A Group shall submit an annual report to the Chapter including an annual financial statement. Upon dissolution of a Group its assets shall revert to the Chapter.

SECTION 5. Each Chapter shall submit an annual report on its activities and a financial statement to the incoming Chairman of the Chapter Cabinet.

SECTION 6. Funds for the operating expenses of a Chapter shall be provided by allotment of a share of the annual Association dues paid by its members. Each year eligibility to receive an allotment shall be determined by the Board on the basis of the Chapter's financial statement for the previous year. Requests for additional funds or loans may be submitted to the Board and may be granted by the Board at its discretion. All funds received by a Chapter shall be used exclusively for purposes incident to fulfillment of the Association's objectives.

SECTION 7. Dissolution of a Chapter, when its usefulness has ceased, may be authorized by the Board. All assets of the Chapter and its Groups, if any, shall revert to the Association.

SECTION 8. The Board may authorize Provisional Chapters subject to such requirements as the board may determine.

Article IX: Divisions

SECTION 1. Divisions relating to areas of interest actively represented among the members may be established by the Board upon written petition of 100 voting mem-

bers of the Association who desire to participate in the activities of the proposed Division.

SECTION 2. Membership eligibility in Divisions shall be in accordance with Article II. An eligible member may affiliate with more than one Division upon payment of an additional fee for each additional Division as determined by the Board and approved at an Annual Business Meeting.

SECTION 3. Bylaws for its own government shall be adopted by each Division. Division Bylaws shall not be in conflict with those of the Association, in particular Article I, Sections 3, 4, and 5, and shall be submitted to the Association Committee concerned with Bylaws for approval.

SECTION 4. Sections relating to definite areas of interest within a Division may be established by the Division. A Division shall provide needed operating funds for its Sections, if any. A Section shall submit an annual report to the Division including an annual financial statement. Upon dissolution of a Section its assets shall revert to the Division.

SECTION 5. Each Division shall submit an annual report on its activities and a financial statement to the incoming Chairman of the Division Cabinet.

SECTION 6. Funds for the operating expenses of a Division shall be provided by allotment of a share of the annual Association dues paid by its members. Each year eligibility to receive an allotment shall be determined by the Board on the basis of the Division's financial statement for the previous year. Requests for additional funds or loans may be submitted to the Board and may be granted by the Board at its discretion. All funds received by a Division shall be used exclusively for purposes incident to fulfillment of the Association's objectives.

SECTION 7. Dissolution of a Division, when its usefulness has ceased, may be authorized by the Board. All assets of the Division and its Sections, if any, shall revert to the Association.

SECTION 8. The Board may authorize Provisional Divisions subject to such requirements as the Board may determine.

Article X: Committees

SECTION 1. Standing Committees and Special Committees of the Association and Special Committees of the Board shall be established by the Board. These Committees shall be responsible to the Board which will delegate such powers and functions to them as the Board finds desirable for the conduct of its business and for carrying out the objectives of the Association.

SECTION 2. The President shall appoint the members and designate the chairman of all Committees except the Nominating Committee. Appointments to Standing Committees shall be made to provide continuity of membership. No member may serve on any one Committee in excess of six consecutive years.

SECTION 3. Each Committee shall submit to the Board a written annual report of its activities which shall contain any recommendations considered necessary or advisable. Additional reports may be submitted at the option of a Committee or as requested by the Board or the President.

SECTION 4. Funds for Committee expenses shall be authorized by the Board through an annual allotment or upon submission of an estimated budget.

SECTION 5. Standing Committees and Special Committees may establish subcommittees to assist in their work. Subcommittees may include nonmembers of the Association.

Article XI: Nominations and Elections

SECTION 1. A Nominating Committee for each election of Members to the Board shall be elected by the Board at least one year before the closing date established for the Committee's report. This Committee shall be composed of five Members, no one of whom shall be a member of the Board. The senior two of the six Directors shall present to the Board the names of five candidates for election to the Nominating Committee, one of whom shall have been the chairman of the Nominating Committee in the immediately preceding year, and the two senior Directors shall also designate the candidate to be chairman of the Committee.

SECTION 2. Nominations for membership on the Board shall be presented as follows: The Nominating Committee shall present each year two candidates each for President-Elect of the Association, Chairman-Elect of the Chapter Cabinet, and for Chairman-Elect of the Division Cabinet, and four candidates for two Directors, and every three years two candidates for Treasurer. The names of nominees and their written acceptances shall be presented to the Board not later than October 15 and their names shall be printed in the official journal at least five months prior to the Annual Business Meeting. Further nominations, accompanied by written acceptance of the nominee, may be entered by petition of 25 voting members and shall be filed with the administrator of the Association Office at least four months prior to the Annual Business Meeting.

SECTION 3. Election shall be by secret ballot mailed to each voting member at least six weeks prior to the Annual Business Meeting. The candidate who receives the largest number of votes for an office shall be elected, except that of the four candidates for Director the two receiving the largest number of votes shall be elected. In event of a tie, election shall be by a majority vote of voting members present and voting at the Annual Business Meeting.

SECTION 4. A Tellers Committee shall be appointed annually by the President to count mail ballots and votes at the Annual Business Meeting, and to report the election results.

Article XII: Publications

SECTION 1. The Association shall publish an official journal and such other publications as the Board may authorize. Control of all Association publications shall be vested in the Board.

SECTION 2. The Association shall not be responsible for statements or opinions advanced in its publications or in papers or discussions at meetings of the Association or at meetings of Chapters and Divisions and their subunits, or for statements by any of its members, officers or staff, except those authorized by the Board or those reflecting duly established policies of the Association.

Article XIII: Dues and Fees

SECTION 1. Dues shall be payable annually in advance. An Honorary Member shall be exempt from payment of dues.

SECTION 2. Dues for Association membership and fees for additional Chapter and Division affiliations shall be determined by the Board subject to approval by two-thirds of the voting members present and voting at an Annual Business Meeting, provided that written notice shall have been given to all voting members at least 60 days in advance of the meeting.

SECTION 3. Membership shall cease when dues are three months in arrears. Reinstatement is possible only within the following nine months and upon payment of dues for the entire twelve month period. If reinstatement is not accomplished within the above nine month period, reapplication for membership is required.

Article XIV: Association Office

SECTION 1. The location of the Association Office shall be determined by the Board.

SECTION 2. The administration and management of the Association Office shall be the responsibility of a salaried staff administrator who shall direct the functions and activities of the office and shall perform such other duties as the President or the Board may assign. He shall be appointed by the Board and shall have such title as the Board determines.

Article XV: Association Affiliation and Representation

SECTION 1. The Association may have as an affiliate or become an affiliate of an organization whose objectives are consistent with those of the Association and whose activities are not in conflict with Article I: Sections 3, 4, and 5, of these Bylaws. If continued affiliation becomes undesirable, it may be cancelled. Affiliation or disaffiliation shall be authorized by the Board.

SECTION 2. A Chapter may affiliate or disaffiliate with a local common interest organization in accordance with the provisions of its own Bylaws, and a Division may affiliate or disaffiliate with a common interest orga-

nization in accordance with the provisions of its own Bylaws, provided that in either event:

- (1) The objectives of such organization are consistent with those of the Association, and
- (2) The activities of such organization are not in conflict with Article I: Sections 3, 4 and 5, of these Bylaws;

any other affiliation including that with a national or international organization, must be approved by the Board. Notices of affiliations and disaffiliations are to be reported to the administrator of the Association Office.

SECTION 3. Establishment of Association Representatives to other organizations and to Joint Boards and Joint Committees shall be authorized by the Board and appointed by the President. The Representatives shall be responsible to the Board which will delegate such powers and functions to them as the Board finds desirable for the conduct of its business and carrying out the objectives of the Association. Each Association Representative shall submit to the Board a written annual report of his activities and of the body to which he is an Association Representative, which shall include recommendations considered necessary or advisable. Additional reports may be submitted at the option of a Representative or as requested by the Board or President.

SECTION 4. The President may appoint Representatives of the Association to meet

ings of other organizations or to special events in response to invitations.

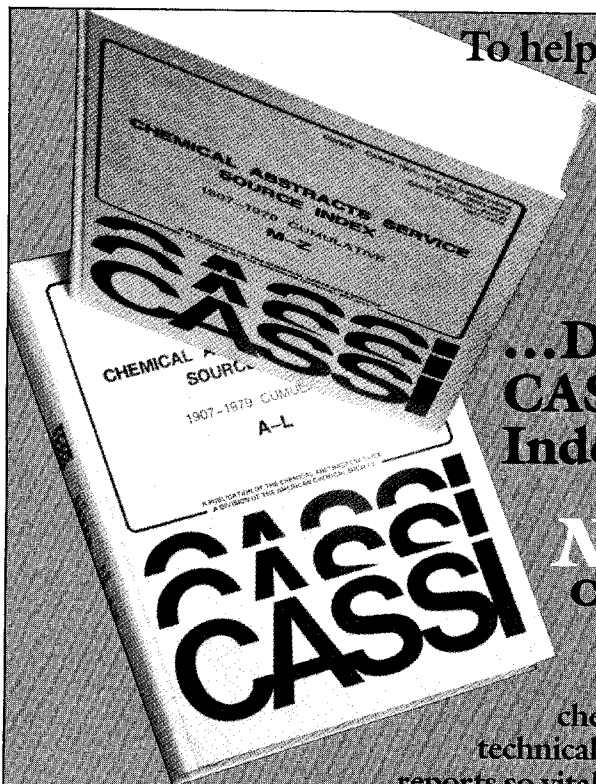
Article XVI: Amendments

SECTION 1. Amendments may be proposed by the Board, the Association Committee concerned with Bylaws or 25 voting members of the Association. Proposals originating in the Board or in the Association Committee concerned with Bylaws shall be approved by a two-thirds vote of the Board before submission to the members. Proposals originating by petition shall be submitted in writing to the Board and shall be presented to the members with the recommendations of the Board.

SECTION 2. Notice containing the text of any proposal shall be sent to each voting member at least 30 days before the Annual Business Meeting at which it is to be discussed. If approved by a majority of the voting members present and voting, the proposal shall be submitted to the entire voting membership for final decision by mail ballot. A proposal not approved at the Annual Business Meeting may be referred to the Association Committee concerned with Bylaws.

SECTION 3. These Bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the returned mail ballots sent to the entire voting membership provided that, of the total members eligible to vote, at least 40 per cent shall have voted.

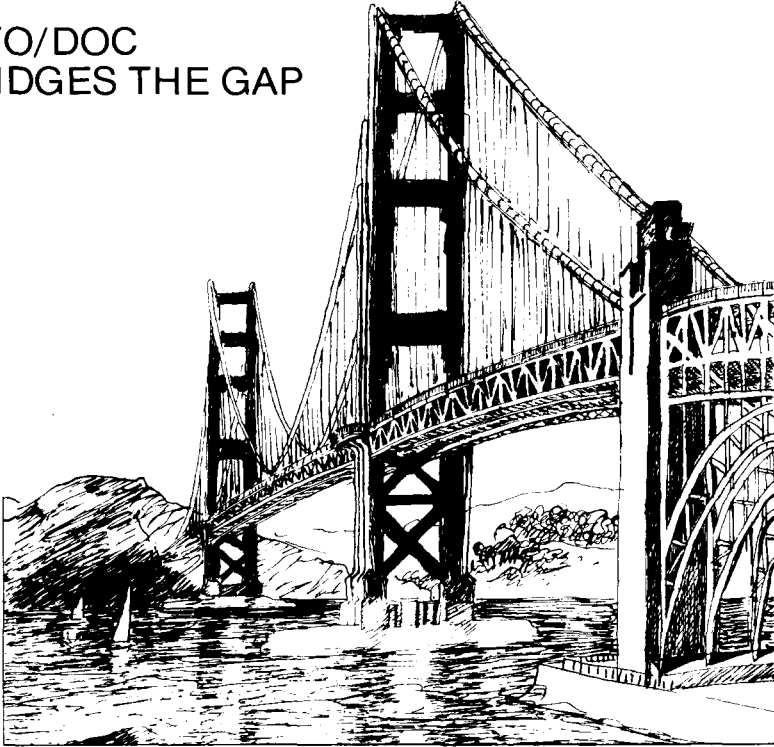

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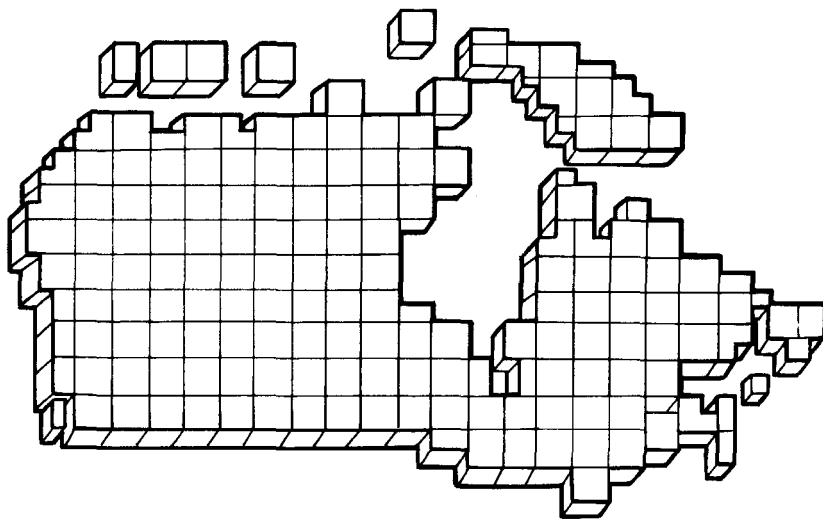
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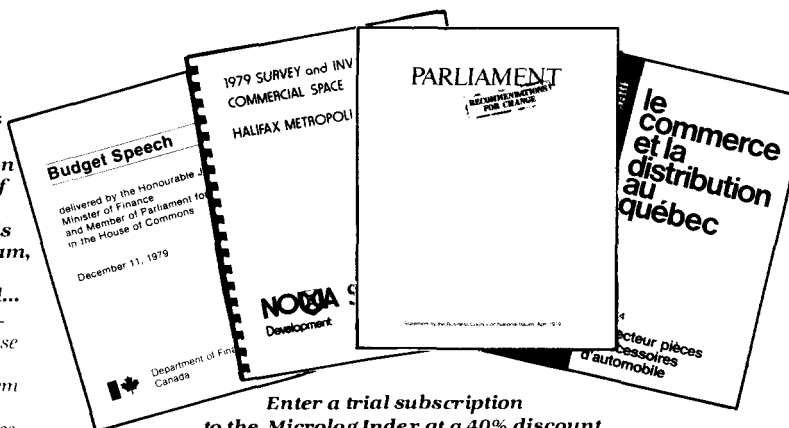

COMMITTEES

All Association Committees are appointed by the President and are responsible to the Board of Directors to which they must submit a written report at least once a year. Each Committee is responsible for:

- 1) Recommending and implementing Association policy;
- 2) Recommending an annual budget for its own work;
- 3) Keeping informed of activities and progress in the field of the Committee's assignments through the literature and attendance at meetings which involve these activities;
- 4) Speaking for the Association on matters which pertain to the Committee's general responsibility and interests on which they should be fully informed.

Association Bylaws Article X: Committees

SECTION 1. Standing Committee and Special Committees of the Association and Special Committees of the Board shall be established by the Board. These Committees shall be responsible to the Board which will delegate such powers and functions to them as the Board finds desirable for the conduct of its business and for carrying out the objectives of the Association.

SECTION 2. The President shall appoint the members and designate the chairman of all Committees except the Nominating Committees shall be made to provide continuity of membership. No member may serve on any one Committee in excess of six consecutive years.

SECTION 3. Each Committee shall submit to the Board a written annual report of its activities which shall contain any recommendations considered necessary or advisable. Additional reports may be submitted at the option of a Committee or as requested by the Board or the President.

SECTION 4. Funds for Committee expenses shall be authorized by the Board through an annual allotment or upon submission of an estimated budget.

SECTION 5. Standing Committees and Special Committees may establish subcommittees to assist in their work. Subcommittees may include nonmembers of the Association.

Association Office Operations

The Committee consists of five members from the Board of Directors, with the President as chairman. Members, in addition to the President, are the Past President, President-Elect, Treasurer and Secretary. The Committee shall be responsible for Association Office operations review including, but not limited to, personnel functions. It shall also be responsible for a review, at least annually, with the Association's auditors and the Executive Director concerning the financial functions of the Association.

The Committee shall initiate any proposals for changes in salary for the Executive Director. Recommendations on salary and personnel policy shall be submitted to the Board of Directors for action. The Committee shall meet either on call of the chairman or at the request of the Executive Director. The Committee shall be the Trustee of all SLA Employee Benefit Plans. 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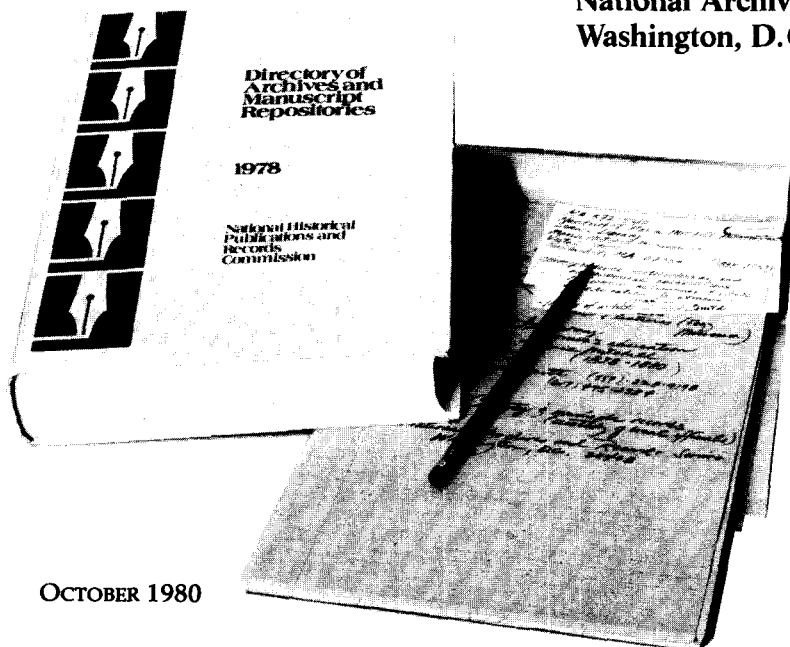
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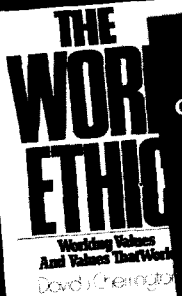
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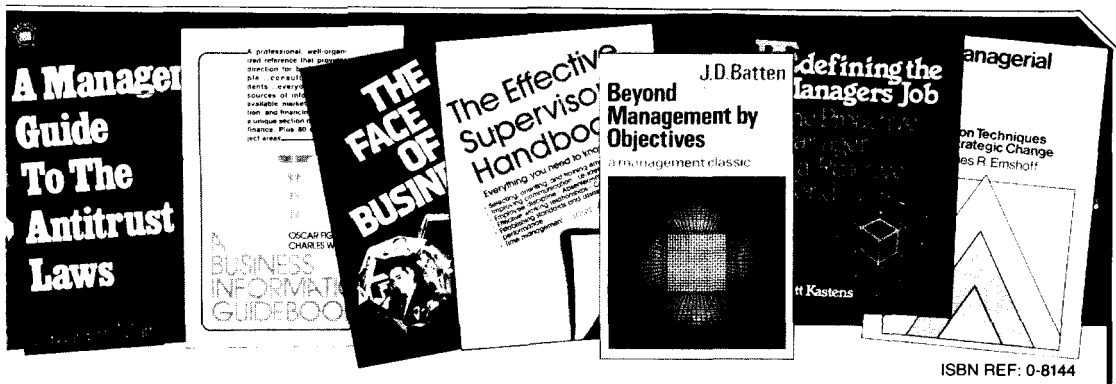
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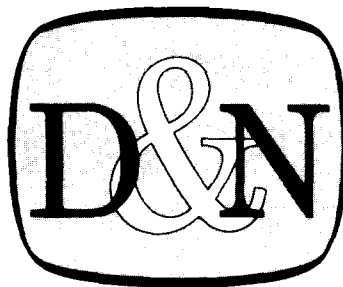
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HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

AS EARLY AS 1830 that shrewdly observant visitor Alexis de Tocqueville noted the American genius for committees and associations. It was only natural, then, that the people who were energetically bringing American libraries out of their ivory towers should follow the trend. The American Library Association was founded in 1876. It progressed so rapidly that in 1910 the *Encyclopaedia Britannica* called it the largest and most important library association in existence.

Specialized problems in librarianship were recognized almost simultaneously, as evidenced by the formation of the National Association of State Libraries in 1889, the Medical Library Association in 1898, and the American Association of Law Libraries in 1906. The stage was well set for a productive discussion by John Cotton Dana, who had recently established the Business Branch of the Newark Public Library, and Mr. F. B. Deberard, a statistician of the Merchants' Association of New York, on the importance of library service in the field of business. An informal conference at a meeting of the New York and New Jersey Library Associations in Atlantic City early in 1909 resulted in letters to *specialized libraries* suggesting a gathering of interested persons during the July meeting of ALA.

The ideas that had germinated in the corridors of an Atlantic City hotel were intensively discussed by a group of 20 librarians on the verandas of the Mt. Washington Hotel in Bretton Woods, New Hampshire. The participants in this "Veranda Conference," as it came to be known, decided that the demands of their jobs had actually *created* a new kind of librarianship—that of library service geared to meet the needs of specialized situations. These librarians were breaking completely new ground. There were no patterns to follow. They had to play it by ear—a challenging but often difficult feat. They felt that they had everything to gain by forming their own working group to tackle their problems cooperatively. So, with Mr. Dana as its first president, Special Libraries Association was formally organized, complete with its Constitution, on July 2, 1909, and the term "Special Library" came into being. The first conference of the new Association was held in New York City on November 5, 1909, with about 40 members participating.

As history was soon to show, the new organization had "hitched its wagon" to the most spectacular scientific and industrial development the world has ever known. The very year of its founding was the year Henry Ford set up the first assembly line to produce his revolutionary Model T. The following years saw the birth and development of aviation, motion pictures, radio and television. An industrial and business environment developed that produced the material to win two world wars and split the atom. The half century also saw far-reaching social changes—the universal concern for social welfare from "square deal" to "new deal," sweeping developments in public health and medicine, and the labor movement, to mention only a few.

Keeping pace with all this activity was an ever-growing flood of knowledge. Access to knowledge recorded in such profusion has become as vital to industrial and scientific success as good machinery. It was necessary to devise more efficient methods and tools to produce the needed information from the mass. Special libraries were on the ground floor of an effort that continues to gain momentum every year.

The Association Office

In the usual way of young associations, the management of SLA was at first handled by the volunteer services of the members—and hard-working members they certainly were. In 1927, however, a general office, with Mrs. Herbert Brigham as part-time paid Secretary, was established in Providence, Rhode Island. In 1928 SLA's Charter of Incorporation was issued, in the "State of Rhode Island and Providence Plantation." In 1931 the office was moved to New York where free space was provided by Standard Statistics Company (under persuasion of its librarian, Eleanor Cavanaugh); a full-time paid Secretary, Elizabeth Lois Clarke, later took charge.

In 1939 the Association took over financially independent quarters at 31 East Tenth Street in Manhattan, and Mrs. Kathleen B. Stebbins became Executive Secretary in 1940 to be succeeded by Marian Lucius in 1953.

After the resignation of Miss Lucius in 1959, Bill M. Woods served as Executive Secretary (later Executive Director) until 1967. During the summer of 1967, while Eleanor B. Gibson was Acting Executive Director, the Association's offices were moved to new facilities at 235 Park Avenue South. George H. Ginader served as Executive Director from September 1967 to July 1970; he was succeeded by Frank E. McKenna, Executive Director from October 1970 until his death in November 1978. David R. Bender was appointed Executive Director in July 1979.

Publications Started

After its organization in 1909, the new association lost no time in establishing its voice. Its journal, *Special Libraries*, began as an eight-page pamphlet in January 1910. The journal was a means of furthering effective cooperation and served as a clearinghouse for news and information of interest and use to members. The issue of April 1910 contained the first directory of special libraries, devoted to 23 subject fields. Badly needed book lists and bibliographies were featured from the beginning. In 1916 Dr. John A. Lapp, then editor, effectively defined "the basic purpose of the special library, namely to *put knowledge to work.*" This gave the Association its motto—PUTTING KNOWLEDGE TO WORK.

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

The Structure Evolves

The groundwork for SLA's present structure of Divisions representing different subject fields or special types of organizations was laid at the Association's first New York meeting. At that time committees were set up to consider the problems of agricultural libraries, commercial associations, insurance libraries, legislative and municipal reference libraries, membership libraries, public utility libraries and sociological and technical libraries. These original committees were gradually formalized first into Groups and later into the present 29 Divisions. The Divisions are important and unique because they demonstrate the integration of the library function into a subject field, into the operation of an organization, or in a new technology.

The idea of local meetings was popular and spread very rapidly. At first such groups were called "Responsibility Districts," each one presided over by a "District Head." The first one was formally set up in Boston in 1910. By 1913 the United States and Canada were divided into 14 Districts and the District Heads became an advisory board to act with the executive officers of the Association. In 1924 the SLA Constitution was amended to call these local organizations Chapters instead of Districts, and to provide for their full affiliation with the Association. Besides helping with technical problems, these regional meetings provided an ideal medium for mutual acquaintance and for the constant exchange of information about the resources in each other's libraries. Such informal exchange, a potent factor in everyday service, has been called the special librarian's "secret network." Without it, it would not be possible for individual libraries to concentrate so economically in their own specialized fields.

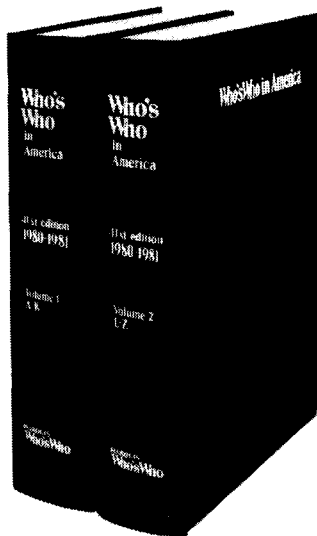
The Advisory Council was first conceived in 1919 as an aid to the Executive Board. It was formally organized with its own officers in 1956 as a medium to express the opinions of the diverse elements in the Association. By the Bylaws revision of 1974, it was reconstituted as the Chapter Cabinet, consisting of presidents and presidents-elect of Chapters, and the Division Cabinet, consisting of chairmen and chairmen-elect of Divisions.

Among the committees set up at that first meeting, two were concerned with Association-wide problems, as urgent today as they were then. These were committees on publication and publicity. A committee on special library training is mentioned in 1913, one to study classification schemes in 1914, and one on employment in 1917. Obviously basic problems of special libraries were recognized from the outset. There are today, for example, Committees on Standards, Consultation Service, Education, and Research. Other committees throughout SLA's history have devoted their efforts to specific projects. In 1913 there was a committee to investigate the use of methods of handling and filing newspaper clippings; today there is a Committee on Copyright Law Implementation.

The growth and complexity of the Association's activities added coordinating units to the committee structure. A Committee on Committees is a permanent monitor for all this activity.

Looking toward the future, there will always be the excitement of new challenges; special librarians and information specialists will meet them as they have in the past. ■

Honorary Members

An Honorary Member shall be an individual elected to this honor by the Association members. At the time of his election, a candidate shall not belong to the Special Libraries Association. Nominations shall be presented in writing to the Board and may be proposed by one or more Association members. Upon endorsement by a two-thirds vote of the Board, the nomination shall be submitted by the Board to the members for election at an Annual Business Meeting. The total number of Honorary Members shall not exceed 15 at any one time and not more than two may be elected in any one year. An Honorary Member shall have the right to affiliate with one Chapter and one Division, and to receive the official journal free.
