

Director's Report Calls for Saving of Six Million Dollars

The State Director of Finance, Roland Vandegrift, submitted a report to the Legislature which called for an approximate saving of \$6,000,000 biennially. The report included the temporary elimination of three state teachers' colleges, proposed reduction of teacher's salaries, and increased registration fee.

The salaries of the faculty were proposed to be reduced on the scale of: \$70 per month or under, no cut; 5 per cent on the first \$100; 15 per cent on the next \$400; and 25 per cent on all above 8500 per month.

By the new plan, Chico, Arcata, and Santa Barbara State Teacher's Colleges would be eliminated. thereby decreasing the expenditres of the State Board of Educa-

The most drastic change, so far as San Jose State, and other teacher's colleges are concerned, is the increase of the present registration fee to \$25 per semester, which would be estimated to save the State \$500,000 according to friends who might be interested, the present computations. It has not been taken into consideration, is Schofield Hall in the Y. W. The plan also proposes to abolish state support of adult education.

In addition to all the changes involving State teachers' colleges, other plans have been proposed which would hit the jails, hospitals, and asylums.





To prove it, he caused the subject to rise into the air and hoat apparently suspended. He passed a hoop around the body to show there were no wires or supports.

EXPLANATION:

EXPLANATION: There are many, many explanations for this old trick. One is that the girl wears a concealed harness, which ends in a socket between her shoulder blades. This is attached to a piston below the stage. The piston is pushed up from below, causing her to the in the air. The piston is invisible, because it is covered with mirrors which reflect surrounding drapprices, similar to the background. The magi-cian can pass the hoop over her body because it is cut in one place. It can be pulled apart for a second when it passes the piston.

Babes Score 35-21 Triumph as Last Quarter Scoring Spree Yields Points




