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

PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

SJSU to construct new Science building

San Jose State University continues its trend to renovate and construct new buildings as part of the school's master plan that was first established in the '80s. Last Wednesday, the school held a presentation that unveiled plans for the next step in SJSU's future campus, a new Science building.

The presentation displayed early designs for the building that is expected to begin in 2018 and will be completed by January 2021. The three-year project will be built near Duncan Hall in order to connect the sciences.

"A new Science building to replace 'Old Science' has been on the campus master plan since the 1980s," said Michael Parrish, Dean of the College of Science. "This year is the first time such a building has been approved by the Capital Planning Design and Construction office of the CSU."

Josee Larochelle, Interim Vice President Administration and Finance Division and CFO, said the President's Office, the Office of the Provost, Administration and Finance and the College of Science worked together to make this plan happen.

The process is currently in its programming phase and the total projected cost of the new science building is expected to cost \$87 million.

The announcement of the new projected building is the fourth building SJSU will build that will cost the school more than \$65 million. The total amount the school will have spent from 2010-2021 once the new Science building is completed will add up to over \$534 million.

Part of the total number includes the recently announced Student Recreation and Aquatic Center, Campus Village 2, the Student Wellness Center, the Spartan Complex renovation and the Student Union expansion and renovation.

"The building will be placed strategically near Duncan Hall to allow for synergies between the programs within each building," Larochelle said.

According to Patricia Harris, SJSU media relations director, several placement options are being looked at, including the potential removal of the A.S. House.

Daniel No, Associate Director of Planning and Design, said they expect the building to be no more than seven stories high to match Duncan Hall.

Nursing fraternity helps house pregnant mothers

Cityteam's Heritage Home on North Third Street has gotten a huge room makeover this past April 23 and 24 after San Jose State's professional nursing fraternity, Alpha Tau Delta, lent their services.

Heritage Home is a shelter that helps give poor and homeless women who are pregnant a space to live under.

Founding member and current Vice President of Alpha Tau Delta, Mackenzie Thomas, was the one who proposed the idea of remodeling the room. It was an idea she had when she was in high school.

"So I kind of knew the contacts for this home from years ago when I was in high school," Thomas said. "We reached out to them and we were like, 'Is this something you want?' and they were overwhelmingly like, 'Yes!'

The members of Alpha Tau Delta were in charge of redoing the first room of the shelter, which is also the largest room and the first room that the soon-to-be mothers see when they come into the home. According to Thomas, before the makeover, the room was dark and dull, with a brown and green color scheme.

"Our goal was kind of to make a new, brighter sanctuary," Thomas said. "So that when these moms first enter, they can really be inspired to stick with the program that Heritage Home puts forward."

Aside from Thomas, Alpha Tau Delta's president, Radelle Liban, their treasurer, Asia Marie Sison and their corresponding secretary, Bethanne Ellithorpe, were the head crew for Heritage Home. They were in charge of figuring out the color schemes and decorations.

"We, as officers, fell in love with the idea of doing this project because it was a great and unique way of giving back to our surrounding community," Liban said. "Planning the project itself took some time as Mackenzie and I had to plan out how we could get our members involved in different aspects of the project, but also to accomplish everything from a certain amount of time."

Alpha Tau Delta also had support from companies like Orchard Supply Hardware and Mancini Sleepworld, who provided donations and discount on supplies.

"Orchard Supply donated quite a few things for the room like ceiling fans and curtain rods... Kelly Moore donated all the paint we needed," Thomas said. "Bethanne's dad is a professional painter, so he brought his guys in and made sure the room is perfect."

The service was a two-day project, which was split into the first day of just painting and getting supplies to

Vegetarian prepares for weightlifting meet

Dane Murphy visits the gym frequently. If you saw him there you might not be able to pick him out from the crowd. However, Murphy has the distinction of being one of the few vegetarians lifting weights.

Murphy, a sophomore kinesiology major, has been a vegetarian for four years.

He said the process was set in motion back in middle school when he watched the documentary "Food Inc.," which exposed him to how the meat industry works.

Initially his family tried switching over to organic meats only, but it proved to be too expensive for a family of four.

He said the actual switch to a full vegetarian diet began in high school.

"I did a thirty day vegetarian challenge where the point of it was to

see how far you could go and I just stuck with it after that. It's been four years since," Murphy said.

Being a vegetarian who's into weightlifting may seem like a weird combination, but according to Murphy, it's completely possible.

He said his interest in weightlifting started in high school when he had to take weightlifting for physical education. He knew he was hooked when he realized it was something he could see progress on after putting in the effort.

This year, Murphy's focus switched from aesthetics to building strength and powerlifting. In fact, he's looking to compete in his first weightlifting meet in August.

Murphy is an ovo-lacto vegetarian, one that still consumes dairy products. For this reason he says he doesn't worry about getting enough protein at all.

"One of the big stereotypes with vegetarians ... is that it's hard for us to get protein, which is not true at all," Murphy said. "Most of the protein I get is from dairy. I drink like half a gallon of milk a day — that's mainly because I'm trying to gain weight. And I eat upwards of four to six eggs a day. That's six grams of protein for each egg.'

Murphy also mentioned that besides dairy, protein options include supplements, beans and tofu.

Despite the title, Murphy reportedly doesn't eat vegetables very often.


"Even though I'm a vegetarian, I tend to not eat as many veggies as I should. That mostly comes from the fact that I'm

trying to gain weight right now," Murphy said. "Veggies tend to be filling, and not have a lot of calories, while boosting your metabolism. If I'm eating to where I'm full off of veggies and if I'm not getting enough calories, I'm going to be losing weight, not gaining."

The Student Union has a number of vegetarian options available to students. Despite this, Murphy said he avoids eating on campus. He said even with the vegetarian options, it's not something that he wants to incorporate into his diet.

"There are still vegetarian options at fast food chains, like they have Taco Bell there. But not something I wouldn't rather go to say Iguanas for, which has much higher quality ingredients than any fast food chain," Murphy said. "The Student Union is just not the best option for me."

"(It will be) approximately 107,000 gross square feet," No said. "This includes the science program only. If we include all interdisciplinary spaces, the building size can grow to 165,000 gross square feet."

Parrish said the current facilities in the Science building are completely outdated and do not allow professors to teach students effectively and safely.

"The building was determined to be impractical for renovation in the 1990s,"

According to the project's website, when the building is completed, it will feature new labs, an informal student lounge, a food service/cafe, a graduate

teaching area and science displays. "The state is providing funding for upgraded 'wet lab' teaching and research facilities for the departments of biology and chemistry," Parrish said. "We are also seeking external funding for a number of collaborative and innovative facilities that may include a visualization theater, a science museum, a STEM Education facility, a center for Cybersecurity and Big Data, a high performance computing center, and a 'Maker Space."

According to No, once the new Science building is completed, the current Science building will be demolished.

"The plan is to build a new Science building first to replace wet labs and

faculty offices in Duncan Hall and (the) old Science (building)," No said. "Then, the departments and other functions in old Science (building) will move to vacated space in Duncan Hall."

The SJSU Master Plan, which is the overall planning guide for the physical development for the campus, states as of 2001 that the next potential buildings to be replaced or upgraded is the Administration Building, Dudley Moorhead Hall/Lewis IRC, Hugh Gillis Hall, Corporation Yard, Industrial Studies Building, Art Building, Faculty Office Building, Sweeney Hall, MacQuarrie Hall and the Music Building and Concert Hall.

The project is still in the planning stages and for now everything is tentative until the planning committee comes to a decision.

Trujillo called them up to the stage and explained the rules. There was a Q&A portion where the candidates would have two minutes to answer questions jotted down on notecards by the crowd. The candidates could interrupt with a rebuttal card to respond to one another or add another minute to their time.

Following the Q&A, there was a lightning round where candidates would have to answer shorter questions as

quickly as possible. The forum kicked off with an opening statement from each candidate introducing themselves and explaining what they stood for to the community. Nguyen introduced herself first as a long-time member of San Jose politics and touched upon her experience as Vice Mayor. Kalra went second and emphasized his work as an educator and what his focus to "bring the district

forward." Herrera went last, emphasizing

his San Jose heritage and explained his focus on green jobs, strong schools and safe neighborhoods.

Afterwards, the candidates discussed topics ranging from the Friends of Five Wounds Trail, school funding, public transportation and San Jose's homelessness. Throughout the event, the candidates explained what they would do for the community and bring to the table in state government if they were elected. Although they disagreed on the specifics, all candidates agreed that whoever chose to represent them would represent them proudly and was happy about the turnout.

"I'm glad that students are here, it's good to see," said candidate Kalra. "I hope everybody here can take something from this, and continue to learn and act in local politics."

'Civil War' crushed beneath giant cast

Marvel's latest triumph over the box

office, "Civil War," is a mediocre addition to the best franchise of all their monster franchises. The massive cast overwhelms a forced narrative filled with plot holes and predictable storytelling. Congestions aside, "Civil War" contains the greatest nerd porn of any Marvel movie.

The civil war in question is more of a brocode squabble among friends with basic and weak arguments forced into the plot in order to justify the epic superhero battles.

The movie was good, but it stands as the worst of the best of Marvel properties. Captain America continues to set a high standard for Marvel films, but "Winter Soldier" still takes the top spot for the franchise.

Anthony and Joe Russo's directing is well done for the most part and the acting is great, but there are too many characters needlessly shoved into the story. The oversized cast makes the story congested, and when it comes time for plot, the arguments are summed up poorly in extremely slow talking scenes which drag the movie down. Every scene just reiterates the conflict for the audience and forces the plot ahead without letting the story unfold organically.

The conflict between characters wasn't strong enough for anything outside of a superhero popcorn flick, but it still made for an engaging story—just a bit overdramatic.

The fight choreography looks fantastic. Unfortunately, so much of it is hidden by shaky camera techniques and quick cutting— but it could be a lot worse if compared to most blockbusters.

The death of Stark's parents is a massive eye-roll-inducing cliche. It is so obvious from the beginning of the second scene that if you missed it, you either need to watch more movies (or I need to watch less movies).

Stark's reaction to the situation makes no sense. He should not have blamed Bucky for what he did under mind control. Stark witnessed mind control firsthand from Scarlet Witch (Elizabeth Olsen) in "Age of

Ultron" and should know that it isn't the fault of the puppet, but the fault of the puppeteer.

The directors seem overwhelmed by their massive cast and fall victim to their own story when they fail to keep everyone's powers consistent. The conflict between the two frenemies may be weakly held together, but Robert Downey Jr. and Chris Evans play off one another extremely well. Both actors are very talented and their range is showcased exceptionally.

Tom Holland does a good job pulling off the witty web-slinger from New York but overstays his welcome. With two franchises behind Spider-Man and an already familiar audience, the Russo brothers manage to find a new way to introduce Spidey into the Marvel universe without giving us more of the same, which is great.

The witty banter is charming at first, but gets annoying by the time his fight scene comes. He is supposed to be an amateur superhero yet he manages to keep up to par with his well-trained adversaries. The CGI of his costume is poorly done and should have taken note from earlier Spider-Man films, it was the only thing they got right. This version is too lightly colored and looks painted on by artists.

Scarlet Witch cripples Vision (Paul Bettany) and sends him flying through the ground, yet she is useless during the airport battle scene. She should be able to take everyone out with a twitch of her hands.

Paul Rudd was hilarious as the returning Ant-Man and it was great to see him interact with the rest of the Marvel universe. His nerd-gasmic transformation to Giant-Man stole the already awesome airport fight scene.

"Civil War" stumbles over its own feet as it fits too much into one movie. But, by the end, it manages to regain balance and deliver some iconic superhero glory.

Cuatro Con Tres performed after the readings and played Chicano music, a fitting choice for Cinco De Mayo.

Legacy of Poetry Day was planned by Director of Creative Writing Alan Soldofsky, who has directed the event for the past nine years. Luke Goebel, creative writing teacher at SJSU, worked under Soldofsky during the event.

"The Hammer Theatre recently being reopened and Alan's close relationship with Juan Felipe Herrera is what brought this event together," Goebel said. Many of Goebel's students were in attendance, looking to expand their knowledge of poetry.

Steven Perez, a senior English major and one of Goebel's students, went to the poetry reading to support some of his literary arts classmates. Perez said he can learn a lot as a writer himself by attending an event like this.

"Brushing shoulders with some people you look up to ... it's pretty inspiring," Perez said. The Poet Laureate is appointed annually by the Librarian of Congress and during his or her term from September to May, seeks to raise the national awareness of the appreciation of reading and writing of poetry. He is the author of 28 books of poetry, novels for young adults and collections for children, according to the

Library of Congress.

Pachanga on the Paseo: A Roving Spectacle of Public Art performed at Paso De San Antonio. Performers were dressed in Latino and Chicano attire and danced and sang while walking through the Paseo. The show was directed by Kinan Valdez and written by Luis and Kinan Valdez.


U.S. Poet Laureate Herrera blessed the theatre by reading a poem out loud to the crowd gathered inside the Hammer.





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

Model Grace Mahary said, "I am proud to be representing interracial love, multiculturalism, and most importantly, a mentality that supports opportunity for all ethnicities."

Anti-choice is literally anti-freedom

The abortion debate is a subject of discourse that has generated some of the most hateful rhetoric in our country and even tragic violence in multiple cases. Arguments over when life begins and insults like, "baby-killer," create barriers to rational discussion.

The three most important issues at stake in the abortion debate are liberty, morality and public health.

America is founded on principles of freedom and selfdetermination. The pro-life movement, as an effort to deny people a profoundly significant choice, is inherently in conflict with those values. It is obscenely hypocritical to tout oneself as a paragon of morality for one's position on abortion while condoning objectively immoral acts such as murder, the very act that pro-life advocates so staunchly oppose in their most heated rhetoric.

I understand that the vast majority of pro-life advocates are not so committed to their belief that they would commit or condone murder, but I have yet to hear of one pro-choice believer killing someone because they oppose abortion rights.

There are additional moral wrongs, such as falsehood and deception, that the pro-life side continually uses as weapons in their war on abortions. The debunked, heavily doctored video used to accuse Planned Parenthood of selling baby parts is one example. Crisis pregnancy centers, the businesses that dress themselves up like

abortion clinics and only try to steer women away from getting abortions are another example of these deceptive practices.

There is also a lot of misleading rhetoric thrown around, like the argument that abortion is not a women's issue. In a sense, that argument is almost right. If a man is a part of the woman's life, say in a marriage or a strong committed relationship, getting an abortion is a decision that affects both of them. Regardless of relationship status though, 100 percent of the time it is a woman who carries a child.

If a man gets a woman pregnant then abandons her, or if a woman is in a lesbian

> More than anything else, abortion should be a private matter discussed only between a woman, her partner and her doctor. It is one of those emotionally rich issues that make for harsh politicization and juicy rhetoric, so it gets thrust into the limelight in a way that no other medical procedure does.

The fact of the matter is that some people want abortions, and always have. There are historical

records dating back to 1550 BC that describe various chemical and surgical methods for terminating pregnancies. To deny this is to deny reality, and to restrict access to abortions is to force people to find other means to do something that has always been a part of human societies.

When legislation is passed restricting access to abortions there is a distinct observable increase in the number of people researching and resorting to dangerous DIY abortion methods. According to research done by the Guttmacher institute and New York Times contributor Seth Stephens-Davidowitz, Google searches for various home abortion methods have increased in frequency since 2011, particularly in states with the heaviest restrictions on abortion. Mississippi, which now only has one abortion clinic due to recent restrictions, is the state with the highest rate of these searches.

Society and technology have progressed to a point where we shouldn't even be discussing the consequences of criminalizing a medical procedure. When you legislate against abortions, you create a very real public health issue by forcing people to seek these unsafe alternatives. That is unacceptable.

We need to move past this debate, keep abortion legal and start fixing problems that are actually problems.

Concrete Canoe took over Reno, NV when the team got second place overall on their annual competition. San Jose State's Charles W. Davidson College of Engineering's Concrete Canoe team ended their successful season this past April.

Concrete Canoe is a team comprised of 25 engineering students that prepare for the Mid-Pacific Regional Conference against teams from different states, sometimes even other countries. The team came in second place out of eight schools in the American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE) competition. The ASCE was founded in 1852 and is America's oldest national engineering society.

According to ASCE, "This competition challenges students to improve skills in construction management, concrete mixture design, canoe paddling, technical paper writing, professional presentation and teamwork."

Team members prepared for the competition by buying all of the materials, as well as coming up with an idea for how they wanted to build their canoe.

According to SJSU's Academic Spotlight, the team raised

more than \$9,000 for all of the materials thanks to alumni, local sponsors and engineering firms.

"There are four categories in the competition," said leader of the team Hester Yu. "The final product, the professional and technical presentation, the design report and the race."

The canoe, Axiom, mainly displayed the theme of geometry and focused on building a strong foundation for future teams to work from.

"We learned a lot this year," Yu said. "It was about setting the foundation to just improve off of and getting that jump from sixth place last year to second place this year was a great start."

The last time Concrete Canoe was in second place was in 2010. Yu will not be part of the team next year, because she is graduating, but said her teammate Kyle Maley is going to be one of the co-project managers next semester.

"He (Maley) is going to have all the knowledge they learned this year and going to work on things we could improve on, such as better construction methods and more emphasis on certain parts of the project," Yu said.

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Yu also said the team will be reusing the shape of the canoe, but will make it even better by trying to get it smoother and make it have less bumps, be more consistent and wider.

Maley said the team got ready for the competition by practicing at Lake Cunningham every weekend from September through March.

"All the work we did paid off because we made a massive improvement," Maley said. "We had a canoe that was very superior than the ones from past years and I'm very proud of it."

It was a year long process to create the concrete canoe because the team had to make a mold of the canoe out of a piece of foam first then work from that.

"To paddle the canoe and be on the team you have to be an engineering student and anyone who wants to help build it from any major can help," Maley said.

The next competition will take place at the University of California, Davis in Davis, CA with a date to be announced.
