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
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Visual Curriculum Mapping: Charting the Learner Experience

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BEST PRACTICES

Annotations

- Symbols (e.g.,) to indicate: where library currently supports, opportunities to be involved, and/or non-productive avenues
- Note course faculty, times, dates, texts and course descriptions
- Links to personal or course pages if available
- Note classes with a heavy research component

Design Tips

- Hyperlink whenever possible
- Add images/photos/video
- Use color coding and themes to your advantage
- Be careful when indicating connections with lines or other visual devices that quickly become cluttered

Structure – Why/How?

- Have a set template whenever possible
- Structure the map so that it best fits the way you or your audience will use it
- For curriculum, branches for courses, faculty, degree requirements
- For outreach, branches for student groups and organizations
- For collection development, collecting levels based on subject or curriculum offerings

- Image exports to multiple formats, including PNG and PDF
- Download to Excel
