

All of the newspapers digitized for the Texas Digital Newspaper Program will be created according to the national standards set by Library of Congress for the National Digital Newspaper Program. View Library of Congress's Technical Guidelines. We feel it is vital to meet the national standards for digitizing newspapers for preservation purposes and to meet a high level of functionality. The intention is to create a good quality product that will stand the test of time. Here's a very basic list of the file types created in the digitization process for this standard:

- Create digital images from a preservation copy of microfilm, a clean secondgeneration duplicate silver negative.
- Scan at 8-bit grayscale with a resolution of 400 dpi, if possible; otherwise between 300 and 400 dpi (relative to the size of the original newspaper.)
- Create image output file as an uncompressed TIFF 6.0, from which PDF and text derivatives with the same file name will be made.
- Capture a standards-based target film strip at the start of each session, to monitor equipment performance.
- Split dual images into individual newspaper images as necessary.
- Deskew images with more than 3% skew.
- Crop page image files to the edge of the newspaper, retaining the original edge and up to a quarter inch beyond.
- Produce grayscale images that have exactly the same dimensions, spatial resolution, skew, and cropping as the images used for OCR.

HOLLAND MAN KILLED BY SON WEDNESDAY

Holland, Dec. 19,—Will Lanham, 48, well known farmer ilving five and a half miles north of here, was shot to death early this afternoon at his home by his son, Jim.

He was shot with a Li calibre automatic pistel, being struck five times—twice in the right breast, once above the right ear and in the neck. He died almost instantly.

After the shooting the boy went to a telephone and called Justice of the Peace Dan Crow here, asking him to come to the Lanham home. Later he was carried to Belton and was held without bond awaiting investigation of the case by the district and county actorney's offices.

The shooting is said to have resulted from a family quarrel which arose when Mrs. Lanham and her daughter, Lois, began to rearrange furniture in the house for Christmas. Mr. Lanham is said to have rained objections when the Christmas decorations reached his room and a dispute arose.

Only Mr. and Mrs. Lanhom, the daughter, Lois, and the son, Jim, were at home at the time. Jim is said to have stered the room and started firing. An exact account of the words that passed in the room preceding the tragedy was not obtainable yesterday pending examining trial.

There had been some ill-feelng existing in the family for the elder Lanham and his son, Jim. Jim fired on his father in a quarrel several months ago, wounding him only slightly.

Mr. Lanham is survived by his wife, several brothers and sisters, two sons, Jim and A. J., and three daughters, Lois, Louise of Temple and Mrs. Limmer of Bartlett.





Metadata

- Metadata may also contain "preservation" components that help us to maintain the integrity of digital files over time.







OCR & Quality

- What affects microfilm quality?
 - Quality of printed newspaper
 - Reduction ratio: Lower is better (≤ 20x)
 - Variation in density: Narrow range is better (≤ .2; .90-1.20)
 - Measurement of light able to pass through film
- Technically suitable film: Can produce a 300-400 ppi digital image

Example: 400 ppi image

- Optical resolution of scanner: 8,000 ppi
- Microfilm reduction ratio needs to be $\leq 20x$
 - 8,000 ppi / 400 ppi = 20:1




OCR Text: Cost v. Quality

- \$ Layout irregularities
 - If inconsistent, cannot automate parameters
- \$ Training the OCR software
 - Human mediation to confirm or correct "best guesses" of software
- \$ Segmenting articles (including con't. articles)
 - Requires additional resources
 - Offered by fee-based archives
 - The British Newspaper Archive
 - The New York Times Archive

Bowles-Perry Family Tree





Bowles, the war chief, and Big Mush, the civil chief of the Cherokees, with three other chiefs, are now on their way, as members of the Convention, with full powers to represent all the northern Indians; and although it is questionable whether they could be induced to act against the Mexicans, at the present moment, we think they could be induced to act against the Cadoes, Ironois, Kechis, and Wacoes. Owing to the many misrepresentations which have, of late, been made, the Indians have appointed their present delegation to represent them, and desire that the Americans will listen to nothing but what comes from them. They also desire to have one particular channel of communication, on the part of the Americans; colonel Austin, or general Houston, would be probably the best, and during their absence, we would suggest the propriety of appointing a standing committee, to communicate with them.


