Of Ephesus Paul wrote,

"But I will tarry at Ephesus until Pentecost; for a great door and effectual is opened unto me, and there are many adversaries."

It is significant that Paul looked on this great city as an opportunity, and not as a source of frustration. It was a chance for him to express the claims of Christ to a great number of people. It is true that the Apostle was aware that the city contained "many adversaries," but even this prospect was not insurmountable to Paul.

The city is home to 70 percent of American families. There aren't many people down on the farm any more. If the Church is to reach the unevangelized it must penetrate the urban areas with the Lord's Word.
