Honey Dear:-

Today our operating team is on duty again and Frunt be constantly on dall. Fortunately there is nothing to be done right now as everything has bern fairly quiet the postday or two Jan mighty glad of ittoo as I don't like to have to take care of the poor lads and if I hadring way there would be no further used of surgery in this war. It is stell very cold and last night it started raining at about 9:00 o'clock after a perfectly brautiful survey afternoon. Iwrote you a long letter yesterday and had just finished it where I heard a band playing outside. I wreet to the window and there was the same band I heard the other day out in the court playing for the patients. I tell you it

sounded good too and I was mighty glad to hear some real ragtime again. after mess last night I swalled down tour and wrest to the y. M. C. a. hall and saw a very good show. It was quite a diversion and I most thorough enjoyed it. It was raining ale Litel dark where we came home land I wish to tell you that nothing Ever was handies those that little tearch light you gur me on Christinas (Do you remember Christmas dearest? Wasnit it a wouler Aul Christinas ? We were all to gether and while we were not at home still I think it was one of the most memorable Christingses we have ever passed. Inever will forget how Isly lutte marie was liette morning, about that tree. Do you remember? Iwouldest have missed for augiting

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on earth, seeing Brother enjoy his first Climituas tree. There you Carling Tuever will Horget the John of that time and the wouderful visit we had. I remember it all so vividly and I think of it thousands of trues. well that is all past and gone. now Jam over here. and all of you are over there. "Over there" has a different meaning to me now than it ded at that true dear, and still the war goes merrily one. each day very much like the last. It does act monotomis but we know we wust stick it out now this is the truth dear - I know of two young officers near here, who
