The University of New Hampshire School of Law Library has been a selective Federal depository library since 1973 and is one of nine depository libraries in the State of New Hampshire. In addition, the Law Library is designated as a Patent and Trademark Research Center (PTRC). The mission of a PTRC is to disseminate patent and trademark information and support the public's diverse intellectual property needs. Training and research instruction for members of the public interested in searching patent and trademarks is provided by our Intellectual Property Librarian.

The librarians provide various traditional services to our faculty, staff and students such as interlibrary loan, reference, faculty liaison services, collection development and subject area LibGuides. We also have worked to help develop a community environment within the library. We celebrate National Library Week where we intertwine a bit of fun around exams and educate our users about the importance of libraries at the same time.

In addition to our print collections, the librarians maintain our web pages to provide access to a variety of general and specialized legal databases as well as open web resources and research pathfinders using LibGuides. The librarians also maintain a library blog and Facebook page. The IP Librarian creates and maintains the internationally acclaimed, IP Mall and IP Twitter feed.
