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


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What is Open Access?

International Open Access Week

Simply put, "Open-access (OA) literature is digital, online, free of charge, and free of most copyright and licensing restrictions [...]. OA is compatible with peer review, and all the major OA initiatives for scientific and scholarly literature insist on its importance.

As the cost of accessing research continues to escalate, open-access works makes publicly-funded scholarship accessible to the public rather than just to the institutions that can afford to subscribe. Increased access to research can improve readership and visibility, and makes it possible for more people to benefit from the work being done at our academic institutions. A growing number of countries and institutions require OA to publicly-funded research.


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5,386 papers written by researchers at UWindsor have been added and 74,443 full-text articles have been downloaded between November 1, 2012 and October 17, 2013.

Open Access in Canada

In Canada, both NSERC and SSHRC recognize the importance of open access to research and are moving towards a policy that will mandate open access for all of the research that they fund.

"Making research results as widely available and accessible as possible is an essential part of advancing knowledge and maximizing the benefits of publicly-funded research for Canadians. As major funders of research and scholarship in the higher education sector, NSERC and SSHRC have a fundamental interest in ensuring that the results of publicly-funded research are broadly disseminated, enabling other researchers as well as policy-makers, private sector, not-for-profit organizations, and the public to use and build on this knowledge. In keeping with global trends on open access, NSERC and SSHRC ("the Agencies") are considering a policy that would require federally funded peer-reviewed journal publications to be made freely available within one year of publication."
