*PREFACE*

This bibliography grew out of two projects. One was the original annotated bibliography on the Law of the European Communities written by Gerhard Dahlmanns in 1975 for the *International Journal of Law Libraries*, of which Part II, *Monographic Literature*, was published. Parts I, *Primary Sources*, and II, *Research Aids*, were never completed. When the idea arose to bring this project to an end, it soon became apparent that the whole bibliography would have to be updated.

The other inspiration for the present bibliography was a draft of English language publications on the Law of the European Community. This author compiled that draft at the request of the AALL Committee on Foreign and International Law. Its purpose was to serve as an aid to librarians in small to medium-size libraries who wished to build up a core collection of materials.

A large part of the research on this bibliography was accomplished in May and June 1980, at the Max-Planck Institute for Foreign and International Private Law, Hamburg, West Germany, where this compiler was a Research Fellow and Guest Librarian.

Much appreciation is expressed to the following institutions and persons: the Max-Planck Institute which funded part of this project; Dr. Ralph Lansky, its Library Director, who always provided helpful advice and guidance; Dr. Ivan Sipkov, Chief of the European Law Section of the Library of Congress, for reviewing the AALL Committee manuscript and making some excellent suggestions. Special thanks are also to be given to the staff of the Duke Law Library for their assistance in preparing and typing this bibliography.

## INTRODUCTION

## A.

## PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The materials and sources of European Community law have been a favorite topic of researchers and librarians for several years. A wealth of information is available ranging from short introductory descriptions on how to do research in this area to fairly extensive bibliographies and catalogs of library holdings on the subject. The purpose of this bibliography is to select the most important works from the mass of documents available. It is intended for a wide variety of persons who are engaged in research concerning European Community law. In this sense, the approach in this bibliography is comprehensive, and should meet both the needs of scholars in the field as well as practitioners who may have only an occasional need or particular purpose to consult such materials. The annotations, which are brief and usually of a descriptive nature, should allow the reader to determine whether a particular work is of an academic or more practical orientation and what are its useful features.

The bibliography is to be used as a pathfinder which reveals the extent of the available literature, the various categories of materials with which readers should be acquainted, and how to proceed from general to more specific sources.

This bibliography is concerned with the law generated by the existence of the European Community and developed by its institutions, as well as the related literature. Research in Community law, however, will almost always include research in the national laws of the member states because of the nature of the new legal system which is superimposed on the existing national legal systems. In the same manner, the process by which Community law is applied will create conflicts of law problems. The areas of international law, international economics, and political science also overlap with Community law *stricto sensu*. Since this bibliography is limited in space and scope, readers are referred to foreign law bibliographies and research sources to find materials on the law of each member state. A few multi-volume sets have been included. These consist of studies of national laws on particular subjects (patents, competition, business regulations) and how they will be affected by Community law provisions. These studies have been included in this bibliography because they have been "triggered" by the growth of E.C. law.

Since the bibliography is intended for a worldwide audience, it is limited in its references to national sources on Community law in publications such as periodicals and current awareness sources of member states. These are too numerous to mention. (The national publications, it should be noted, are a good source of information which are not to be overlooked if these are available locally. In addition, the general international law literature of each country will necessarily contain references to European

Community law. Readers are hence referred to those sources which could not be mentioned in this bibliography.)

The bibliography emphasizes research aids and bibliographic tools that will lead readers to more specialized studies. It includes a chapter on how to find the law in various sources such as Treaties, Community Legislation and cases, in order to answer the question, "Where is the best place to go to find the most up-to-date text of the law, whether it is a Treaty provision or a regulation?" This is followed by a chapter on important monographic literature which is analyzed and commented upon. This section includes handbooks, treatises and commentaries on the Community in general, and works on special topics. The monographs are arranged in alphabetical order under broad subject headings. Cross references are given at the end of each major topic to related monographs and serials which have been classified elsewhere in the bibliography. The bibliography takes into consideration older works of fundamental value, but emphasizes recent publications. References are made to other bibliographies for historical research.

The bibliographic information contained in each entry includes the following: *main entry*—which is listed as the author's, editor's or compiler's name as found on the title page, or title if no author or more than three; *title*; *number of volumes and edition*; *place of publication*; *publisher*; *date of publication*; *page number*; *price* (when available and generally in the currency of the country of publication); finally, *series notation*, when applicable. Prices are indicated to give an idea of the cost of legal materials, in particular as a guide for the librarian who wants to purchase a publication. They are, of course, subject to change. Please see the *List of Abbreviations* section of the bibliography for conventional abbreviations of price and language.

This bibliography is limited to publications in the English, French and German for the reason (without prejudice to the other official languages of the Community) that these languages seem to be used more commonly. Several of the works originally published in other languages have been translated into English and French. These are noted throughout the bibliography.

A look at the *Table of Contents* should enable readers to have easy access to the specific field of European Community law of interest to them. An *Author-Title Index* is included as well as a *List of Abbreviations*.

The compiler apologizes in advance for the errors and omissions that may have escaped her attention. Suggestions for improvements are welcome. Annual supplements to the bibliography will be published.

## B.

### THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITY: FORMATION AND ORGANIZATION

Various expressions are used interchangeably to describe the phenomenon of European integration: "EEC," "Common Market," "European

Communities," "Community". . . . There are actually three European Communities which are separate legal entities but are closely allied. The term "European Community" has now found wide acceptance and will be used most often in this bibliography.

The first community to be created was the European Coal and Steel Community (E.C.S.C.) set up by the Treaty of Paris of April 18, 1951. As the creation of a common market in coal and steel, it was the first experiment with supranational institutions (a High Authority, a Common Assembly and a Court of Justice). The other two communities, the European Economic Community (E.E.C.) and the European Atomic Energy Community (E.A.E.C. or EURATOM), were set up by the two Treaties of Rome of March 25, 1957. EURATOM is a special market for atomic energy with the purpose of developing nuclear energy, distributing it within the Community and selling the surplus to the outside world. The objectives of the EEC are wider since it provides for the establishment of a common market and can be considered as an instrument of economic integration with considerable political potential. This bibliography is mainly concerned with EEC law.

A convention concluded simultaneously with the Rome Treaties provided for the establishment of a single Court of Justice and of a single Parliamentary Assembly to serve all three Communities. Further fusion of the Communities was achieved by a Merger Treaty signed in May 1965 and which took effect on July 1, 1967. It provided for a single Council and a single Commission for the three Communities. This institutional merger has yet to be consolidated in the Treaties, so that one has to speak of three legal entities, even though they have common institutions and general objectives. The founding members of the Communities were Belgium, France, Germany, Italy, Luxembourg and the Netherlands. The United Kingdom, Ireland and Denmark joined the European Communities in 1973.

The European Communities present a new legal order in international law. It is neither a national, nor an international system of law. It can be described as a *sui generis* system emanating from the will to create a European Community. It is a political organization with mainly economic objectives and a potential for development toward a federal organization.

The institutions of the Community are the following: The Executive branch consists of the Commission and of the Council of Ministers. The Commission is the executive arm of the Communities. It initiates Community policy and represents the Community interest to the Council. The Council of Ministers consists of the ministers of each member state who meet regularly and make decisions on Commission proposals. The European Parliament is a deliberate and consultative body whose members were recently elected by universal suffrage. The European Court of Justice is the guardian of the Treaties and the controlling body of Community acts.

## I. BIBLIOGRAPHIES

This is a very selected listing. A few bibliographies published as journal articles have been included when they were deemed to be particularly useful to researchers. It is assumed that readers will be familiar with sources such as the *Index to Legal Periodicals* and the *Index to Foreign Legal Periodicals*. The most important legal bibliography sources are also mentioned here when they are essential to research European Community.

1. BRITISH INSTITUTE OF INTERNATIONAL AND COMPARATIVE LAW. *Where to Find Your Community Law*. 2d ed. London: British Institute of International and Comparative Law, 1973. 25 p. (Guides to Common Market Law, No. 1).

Intended to be a bibliographic guide to the legal system of the European Communities for English lawyers. Selective, includes only English language sources.

2. COLLESTER, J. Bryan. *The European Communities: A Guide to Information Sources*. Detroit: Gale Research, 1979. 265 p. (International Relations Information Guide, V. 9). USD 22.00.

Covers mainly the literature concerning the political aspects of European integration generally and of the European Communities specifically. Legal sources are mentioned pp. 87-102.

3. COMMERCE CLEARING HOUSE. *Common Market Reporter*. 4 v. Chicago: Commerce Clearing House, 1965- . Loose-leaf. Weekly. USD 580.00 per year.

This important service (*see* 74 for complete annotation) includes a bibliography of books and articles on the EEC, arranged by paragraph number and headings to correspond with the division of the *Reporter*. The books are arranged in alphabetical order by title within the heading of each section.

4. COMMISSION OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITIES. *Bulletin on Documentation*. Brussels: Commission of the European Communities, 1964- . Weekly. DA/DE/EN/FR/IT/NL. BRF 1,000.

Published in two parts. Part I contains official texts of the European Community; part II, Community publications and studies. Supplement A (fortnightly) lists periodicals and articles on international economic activity or on national policies having a bearing on the European, international or world economy. Supplement B (occasional) lists bibliographies. Supplement C is a cumulative edition, by subject, of texts published over a period in the weekly issue or in supplement A. Supplement D contains other documentary material.

5. COMMISSION OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITIES. *The Court of Justice of the European Communities*. Luxembourg: European Communities Office for Official Publications, 1976. 23 p.

6. COMMISSION OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITIES. *List of Additions to the Library*. Brussels: Commission of the European Communities, 1960- . Monthly. DA/DE/EN/FR/IT/NL. BFR 1,100.

7. COMMISSION OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITIES. *National Decisions Concerning Community Law*. Brussels: Commission of the European Communities. Half-yearly. DA.DE.EN.FR.IT.NL. Free.

Selective listing of bibliographical references to published decisions. Contains separate indexes—chronological, by Treaty article, Community law provisions, subject-matter, country.

8. COURT OF JUSTICE OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITIES. *Bulletin Bibliographique de Jurisprudence Communautaire*. Luxembourg: Office des Publications Officielles des Communautés Européennes, 1977- . Half-yearly. BFR 100.

Bibliography of books and articles pertaining to the European Court of Justice and its case law. Also indexes certain decisions of the EEC Commission and national courts decisions in matters of European Community law.



9. COURT OF JUSTICE OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITIES. *Bibliographie de Jurisprudence Européenne Concernant les Décisions Judiciaires Relatives aux Traités Instituant les Communautés Européennes*. 1965-76. DE.EN.FR.IT.NL.  
English title: *Bibliography of European Case Law Comprising Judicial Decisions Relating to the Treaties Establishing the European Communities*.
10. DAHLMANN, Gerhard J. "European Communities Law. A Selective Bibliography with Annotations. Part Two: Secondary Sources. Monographic Literature." *International Journal of Law Libraries* 3 (1975): 215-272.  
Parts one and three of this bibliography written by a German author were to follow in the next issue of the *Journal*. They were never published. This good and comprehensive bibliography lists monographs only, in all languages of the Communities. The author indicates that he has not attempted to evaluate the importance of a particular work or to consider the requirements of a "Minimum Holding" classification.
11. *Etudes Universitaires sur l'Intégration Européenne. Thèses Terminées et Publiées. University Studies on European Integration*. Bruxelles: Institut de la Communauté Européenne pour les Etudes Universitaires, 1969- . EN.FR.  
Lists research projects or doctoral theses on European integration according to the stage of progress. Includes a university directory, author and research center indexes, as well as information on financial aid offered by various Community institutions. The studies focus mainly on legal and economic aspects of European integration, but the political and social aspects are also topics chosen.
12. EUROPEAN PARLIAMENT. *The European Parliament: Bibliography 1970-1978*. Luxembourg: Directorate-General for Research and Documentation, 1979. 121 p. Free.  
Selective bibliography of the more important European Parliament and other Community documents. Newspaper articles, most official publications and works of lesser importance are excluded. The materials are classified under 10 main buildings. Annual supplements are planned.
13. *Exchange of Information on Research in European Law. Echange d'Informations sur les Recherches en Droit Européen*. Strasbourg: Council of Europe, 1971. Yearly. EN.FR.  
Purports to facilitate the exchange of information among researchers of the legal scientific developments in European law. The information is collected by means of a questionnaire sent to specialized institutes and law faculties. Studies and research projects are listed in the alphabetical order of the states in which they are carried out. A classification scheme is appended and a systematic index gives information as to the title of study or research, summary, name and address of person in charge, sponsoring bodies, starting date and probable duration. Includes studies of the law of countries outside the common market.
14. FITZ GERALD, F.N. and L. EMRINGER. "Principal Source Materials on European Community Legislation." *International Journal of Law Libraries* 3 (1975): 208-214.  
Short bibliographic note written by the Heads of the Official Publications Office of the European Communities. Deals with the official sources of Community materials: Treaties, the *Official Journal of the European Communities*, case law reports, and bibliographic aids.
15. HARVARD UNIVERSITY. LAW SCHOOL. LIBRARY. *Annual Legal Bibliography*, 1960/61- . Cambridge, Mass., 1962- . Annual.  
Includes a listing of selected monographs and articles received in the Harvard Law School Library, cumulating the items which have appeared in the *Current Legal Bibliography* (published 9 times a year), with some additional material. Publications on Community Law are indexed under various headings.

16. JEFFRIES, John. *A Guide to the Official Publications of the European Communities*. New York: Facts on File, 1978. xii, 178 p. USD 20.00.  
Describes the publications of the Commission—general, non-statistical and statistical, the ones of the Council of Ministers, of the European Parliament, the Court of Justice, and other bodies of the European Communities. The approach follows the arrangement of the official catalogs. Appendix I sets out useful addresses, and Appendix II lists the European Document Centers and Depository Libraries throughout the world.
17. KAVASS, Igor. "Court of Justice of the European Communities: Annotated Bibliography 1951-1973." *Vanderbilt Journal of Transnational Law* 8 (1975): 523-650.  
Comprehensive bibliography on the European Court of Justice, including bibliographies, primary sources, monographic and periodical literature. Needs to be updated.
18. KIRCHNER, Hildebert, Josef MACKERT and Franz SCHNEIDER, eds. *Karlsruher Juristische Bibliographie*, München: Beck, v. 1, 1965- . Monthly. DM 276 per year.  
Bibliography of books and articles. Parts 10—economic law—and 15—international law—deal more specifically with E.C. law, as well as the international part of the other subject headings.
19. KUJATH, Karl. *Bibliography on European Integration—with Annotations*. Bonn: Europa Verlag (Institut für Europäische Politik), 1977. 777 p.  
Comprehensive in scope and very useful in spite of some omissions. The introduction, explanatory notes and subject headings are written in German, French and English. Covers the broad areas of the literature of international organizations and the process of European integration and unification in general. European Community law is given a full treatment in various parts of the bibliography. The books are annotated in the language of publication.
20. LUTYENS, C.R., Muriel ANDERSON and William STEINER, comps. *Community Law: A Selection of Publications on the Law of the European Economic Community and the Relevant Law of the Original Member States*. London: British & Irish Association of Law Libraries, 1973. 64 p. Out of print.  
Excellent basic guide to the legal literature of the EEC, as well as its original member states. Contains also a chapter on human rights and on general works.
21. PALMER, Doris M., ed. *Sources of Information on the European Communities*. London: Mansell, 1979. 230 p.  
Each of the several contributors describes a particular aspect of information sources about the European Communities, how one can find what has been published, what information is contained and where materials can be obtained in the United Kingdom. Some chapters deal with European Communities legislation, company information and sources of statistical and environmental information.
22. *Public International Law: A Current Bibliography of Articles*. Berlin: Springer, 1975- . Half-yearly. EN.DE.FR.ES. DM 29 per year.  
Compiled by collaborators of the Max Planck Institute for Foreign Public Law and International Law. Indexes contributions to journals and other collected works (for instance *Festschriften*), as well as some case comments and book reviews. Part 22 is devoted to the European Communities. Person- and subject-indexes.
23. PRYJMA, Marta M., comp. *A Catalog of the Collection on the European Economic Community in the Northwestern University School of Law Library*. Chicago: The Library, 1975. 1976 and 1979 supps. Free.  
Catalog of the holdings of a law library which has an excellent collection of European Community Law.

24. SIEMERS, J.P. and E.H. SIEMERS-HIDMA, comps. *European Integration: Select International Bibliography of Theses and Dissertations, 1957-1977*. Germantown, Md.: Sijthoff & Noordhoff 1979. xvi, 228 p. USD 47.50.
- Contains the titles of theses and dissertations on European integration written at universities in Europe, India and the United States. Includes an author and a key-word index in French, German, and English, as well as a list of universities.
25. "Statement of Minimum Holdings of the Law of the European Communities and Their Member Countries." *Journal of the Society of Public Teachers of Law* 13 (1974): 113-141.
- Recommended list of holdings for British law libraries. Contains references to British official publications and to basic materials on the law of the European Communities and also the national laws of the member countries. Needs to be supplemented.
26. SZLADITS, Charles. *A Bibliography on Foreign and Comparative Law: Books and Articles in English*. 5 v. with supplements. New York: Parker School of Foreign and Comparative Law; distributed by Oceana Publications. 1955- . USD 236.50.
- Comprehensive bibliography of all books and articles in the English language dealing with non-common law legal systems and with general subjects bearing upon the comparative study of law. Works dealing with the Law of the European Communities are listed in Part I(G)(3) entitled "Integration and Co-operation." Selected books are briefly annotated. For some reason the compiler does not indicate the publisher in the bibliographic information given on the particular item. The last *Supplement* was issued in 1979 and covers the year 1976. Interim supplements are published annually in the *American Journal of Comparative Law*.

## II. WHERE TO FIND THE LAW

### A. LEGISLATION

#### 1. TREATIES AND RELATED INSTRUMENTS

The treaties establishing the European Communities differ from typical treaties, i.e. agreements between member states, in many respects.

(1) They have created supranational institutions which provide for an Executive, an Administration, a Parliament, and a Court.

(2) The Treaties are "self-executing." This means that, when ratified, the Treaties become law within the member states and must be applied by the national courts as law of the land.

(3) The Treaties, in particular the EEC Treaty, do not contain detailed provisions, but merely provide general principles, basic rules that will be implemented by the Institutions created to that effect and according to certain procedures. The analogy has been made several times between the European Community Treaties and the U.S. Constitution.

The main Treaties are the three Foundation Treaties (ECSC, EURATOM, and EEC) with their Annexes and Protocols, which supplement the Treaties; the Convention on certain institutions common to the European Communities (1957); the Merger Treaty (1965); the Treaties on Budgetary Matters (1970 and 1975); the Treaty of Accession and its Annexes (1972); and the Council Decision concerning the Election of the Representatives of the Assembly by Direct Universal Suffrage (the Council Decision has the status of Treaty) (1979).

The official texts of the Community Treaties are available in the following forms:

27. *Treaties Establishing the European Communities: Treaties Amending These Treaties: Documents Concerning the Accession*. Luxembourg: European Communities Office for Official Publications, 1978. DA.DE.EN.FR.IT.NL. BFR 732.

This volume contains all the Treaties with their Annexes and Protocols which supplement the Treaties, as amended by the accession of Denmark, Ireland and the United Kingdom and adjusted by Norway's decision not to accede.

28. *Collection of the Agreements Concluded by the European Communities*. Luxembourg: Office for Official Publications of the European Communities, 1978. 5 v. USD 278.00.

The collection brings together agreements concluded by The Council and Commission of the European Communities with nonmember states or with other bodies governed by international law, particularly international organizations.

Volumes 1 through 3: Bilateral agreements concluded by the EEC with European Countries.

Volume 4: Bilateral agreements concluded by the EEC with countries in Asia, Africa, and America; bilateral agreements concluded by the EEC with international organizations.

Volume 5: Bilateral agreements concluded by Euratom; Bilateral agreements concluded by the ECSC; Multilateral agreements concluded by the EEC, Euratom, and the ECSC.

The basic 5 volume set contains the treaties in force as of Dec. 31, 1975 with their amendments. Yearly supplements are being published (v. 6 in 1979). There is an alphabetical index at the end of v. 3 and 4, and a general index at the end of v. 5, as well as a subject index.

## 2. SECONDARY LEGISLATION

The three foundation Treaties (or "primary legislation") provide the framework of policy and give power to the Council and to the Commission to draw up detailed implementing instruments, or "secondary legislation." This legislation is derived from the Treaties and, under the terms of the Treaties, must be related to the basic objectives of the Communities.

The Acts made by the Council or the Commission consist of regulations, directives and decisions in the cases of the EEC and EURATOM, and of decisions and recommendations in the case of the ECSC.

Regulations have a general scope, are binding in their entirety and are directly applicable in all member states (EEC art. 189(2) which correspond to the "decisions" of ECSC art. 14).

Directives are binding as to the result to be achieved, upon each member to which they are addressed. The choice of the method is left to the state concerned (EEC art. 189(3) which correspond to the "recommendations" of ECSC art. 14).

Decisions of the Council of the Commission are binding in their entirety upon those to whom they are addressed (EEC art. 189(4)).

Recommendations and opinions are not binding (EEC art. 189(5)).

35. *Official Journal of the European Communities*. Luxembourg: European Communities Office for Official Publications. 1958-. DA.DE.EN.FR.IT.NL. Daily. BFR 4,000.

The Journal appears almost daily in each of the official languages of the Communities (English since October 9, 1972). Since 1968, it appears in two series: *Legislation* (L) and *Communications* (C). Part L is devoted to secondary legislation. Part C contains reports of the sessions of the European Parliament including questions and answers, and notices of proceedings of the Court of Justice. It also contains Commission proposals and opinions. An annual index covers both parts.

*Special Editions* of the Official Journal covering the period 1952-72, contain authentic English texts of secondary legislation in force before the accession of the United Kingdom to the Communities. The Acts published in chronological order in the first series of the *Special Editions* have been collected under ten subject-headings and published in:

Subscription price USD 535.50. There are three kinds of subscriptions:

1. In book form with cumulative yearly supplements.
2. In book form with cumulative supplements on microfiche, twice a year. Two basic volumes plus seven microfiche supplements, subscription price USD 658.00.
3. Combination of either (1) or (2) with Telex service; time-lag for up-to-date information: three days. Additional subscription price USD 204.00.

A subscription covers a four-year period, the first period running from 1978 through 1981.

A total information package providing the key to all past, present, and projected legislation of the European Community, the guide is an excellent reference work which covers EEC legislation from 1958 on. It is systematically arranged to give both easy access to the detailed information and a general view of EEC legislation. Since most rules are published in the official *Journal*, this set constitutes an excellent subject guide to the *Journal*. An additional advantage of the Telex service is that it also enables subscribers to obtain information on draft legislation.

## B. CASE REPORTS AND DIGESTS

39. COURT OF JUSTICE OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITIES. *Report of Cases before the Court*. Luxembourg: Office for Official Publications of the European Communities, v. I- , 1954-. USD 36.00 per year.

The official texts of the judgments and opinions of the Court with the submission of the advocates-general are published in periodical parts by the

Court of Justice in each of the official languages of the Communities. The only authentic version is the one used in the language of procedure of the particular case decided upon.

Volumes I-XVIII (1954-1972) are published in German, French, Italian, and Dutch. The volumes for 1973 and the subsequent years are published also in Danish and English.

40. *Common Market Law Reports*. Edinburgh: T. Nelson, v. I- , 1962- . Weekly. USD 195.00 per year.

This commercial publication contains the English translations of the principal judgments of both the European Court of Justice and of the courts of member states on points of Community law, as well as decisions of the Commission on restrictive practices. Since 1970 the *Reports* also include the texts of the judgments in the procedural language used by the Court. The set is indexed annually and there is a cumulative index to vols. I-XII (1962-73).

*Common Market Reporter*. See 3, *supra*.

This loose-leaf service also contains English translations of judgments since December 1961.

41. EVERSEN, H.J., H. SPERL and J.A. USHER. *Compendium of Case Law Relating to the European Communities*. New York: North-Holland, v. 1- , 1953- . USD 69.60 per year.

This annual Compendium contains both extracts from judgments of the European Court of Justice and summarized decisions of national courts arranged in chronological order under the provisions of Community law to which they relate. The *Compendium* has been published in English since 1973. The English translation of the whole series (1953-1972) is still to be published. The 1953-72 edition was published in French under the title *Répertoire de la Jurisprudence Relative aux Traités instituant les Communautés Européennes*, and also in German under the title *Europäische Rechtsprechung*.

This revised edition, translated from the Dutch, is a concise introduction to European Community Law, taking into consideration the historical, political, social, and economic background in which it developed and achieved a compromise between economic interests. The book written by Dutch lawyers contains chapters on the institutions, the organization and the administration of the European Community, as well as chapters on the substantive law of the new legal order. The main purpose is to explain the specific character of Community Law as a new and coherent legal system with special emphasis on the inter-relation of the various elements of this new field of law. Indices and bibliographies accompany the text.

58. KERR, Anthony J.C. *The Common Market and How It Works*. New York: Pergamon, 1977. xv, 210 p. USD 12.50.

Introductory work to the European Communities. The format is very readable and the book deals with historical, economic, political and legal aspects of the Communities. There are several plates.

59. LASOK, D. and J.W. BRIDGE. *Introduction to the Law and Institutions of the European Communities*. 2d ed. London: Butterworths, 1976. xxv, 370 p. USD 10.70.

Very good introductory work. Explains the genesis, nature and general principles of Community law and institutions. Gives an outline of the substantive economic law of the Communities. Very well documented. The chapter on the sources of Community law and on where to find it is very useful. There are also some language tables showing the translation of some technical words in French and English, as an illustration of language problems in the translation of legal concepts. Bibliography.

60. LIPSTEIN, K. *The Law of the European Economic Community*. London: Butterworth, 1974. 400 p. USD 15.80.

Full and scholarly treatment of EEC law. Presents a narrative treatment of the substantive law of the Communities. Bibliography.

61. MATHIJSSEN, P.S.R.F. *A Guide to European Community Law*. 2d ed. London: Sweet & Maxwell; New York: Matthew Bender, 1975. xxxviii, 263 p. USD 15.00.

Gives an overall picture of the law of the EEC and shows how the law has developed and contributed to the political process of European integration. Includes bibliographical references, tables and an appendix.

62. NICOLAYSEN, Gert. *Europäisches Gemeinschaftsrecht*. Stuttgart: Kohlhammer, 1979. xv, 216 p. (Kohlhammer Studienbücher) DM 29.

Handbook geared toward students. The first part gives an overview of the structure of the new legal system, the second part discusses the economic law. There is a short bibliography at the beginning of each topic discussed.

63. PARRY, Anthony and S. HARDY. *EEC Law*. London: Sweet & Maxwell; New York: Matthew Bender, 1973. xlvi, 511 p. UKL 6.50.

Deals primarily with legal questions relating to the European Communities rather than discussing the history and economic background of progress toward European integration. The order of discussion of EEC law follows the EEC Treaty. The text describes the law as it stood upon the accession of the United Kingdom, Ireland and Denmark. It is written from the British point of view and contains numerous references to British sources (text of Treaties in H.M.S.O. documents, for instance). The format is



clear and concise. There is an informative section on "how to find your law", and a bibliography at the end of the book. Index.

64. PAXTON, John. *The Developing Common Market: The Structure of the E.E.C. in Theory and Practice*. 3d ed. Boulder, Colo.: Westview, 1976. 240 p. USD 25.00.

Factual and concise guide to the history, goals, institutions, economic structure and legal framework of the EEC. Written by the editor of the "Statesman's Yearbook". Contains statistical materials and a chronology.

65. PAXTON, John. *A Dictionary of the European Economic Community*. New York: Facts on File, 1977. 287 p. USD 31.70.

Compilation of definitions and statements about the EEC in a concise format. Other related organizations are included when appropriate. The dictionary is very useful especially for abbreviations and for quick reference information. It indexes leading Community cases and names of personalities.

66. RUNGE, Christian. *Einführung in das Recht der Europäischen Gemeinschaften*. 2d ed. München: Beck, 1975. xv, 206 p. (Schriftenreihe der Juristischen Schulung, 8). DM 19.80.

Handbook intended for law students and lawyers. Gives a good overview of E.C. law, its historical development, structure and legal system. There are bibliographical references at the beginning of each important development, mainly to German language literature.

67. SCHWEITZER, Michael and Waldemar HUMMER. *Europarecht. Das Institutionelle Recht der Europäischen Gemeinschaften. Das Materielle Recht der EWG*. Frankfurt a.M.: Metzner, 1980. 299 p. (Juristische Lernbücher, 16) DM 28.

68. STEIN, Eric, Peter HAY and Michel WAELBROEK. *European Community Law and Institutions in Perspective. Texts, Cases and Readings*. Indianapolis: Bobbs-Merrill Co., Inc., 1976. iv, 1132 p. USD 22.50.

Successor to the *Law and Institutions in the Atlantic Area*, this first comprehensive casebook on European Community Law is intended to be used as a teaching and research tool. The method of exposure brings European Community Law in perspective, that is, is comparative in nature, and contrasts EEC Law with U.S. Law, borrows materials from the fields of political science and international economics. The chapters discuss the institutions of the European Community and the law-making process and administration, the judicial process—national and supranational, the free movement of goods, factors of production and capital, the protection of competition, the external relations of the Communities and the common policies in the monetary, industrial, social, environmental, transport, and energy fields. The book contains much information tightly packed. The authors rely heavily on selected materials from legal periodicals written by well-known practitioners and scholars. It also includes materials from Latin-American institutions, for economic integration, The COMECON, and Japan. This excellent publication will serve the needs of the scholar and the practitioner. Includes bibliographical references and index.

69. WYATT, Derrick and Alan DASHWOOD. *The Substantive Law of the EEC*. London: Sweet & Maxwell, 1980. xxvi, 386 p. USD 66.30.

Deals in depth with the legal implementation of the major Community policies, including the common agricultural policy, the law of the free movement of goods, persons and services, custom duties, quantitative restrictions, state monopolies and social security. Intended for students of EEC law and as a reference tool for lawyers. Includes bibliographical references and index.

## 2. TREATISES

70. CAMPBELL, Alan. *Common Market Law*. 3 v. with 1973 Supplement and 1975 Cumulative Supplement. London: Longmans; New York: Oceana, 1969-1975. USD 150.00.

First major British treatise to be published on EEC Law. It is written by and intended for practitioners, and provides detailed information—both texts

and commentaries—in an encyclopedic manner. This is a pioneer work in the sense that the contributors had to work from foreign texts and compile their own translations, and visit abroad to get information. According to the Preface to the 1975 Supplement, the set will no longer be updated.

71. CONSTANTINESCO, Léontin-Jean. *Das Recht der Europäischen Gemeinschaften*. 2 v. Baden-Baden: Nomos, 1977- . DM 89.

V. 1, *das Institutionelle Recht*. 1977. 922 p.

V. 2, *das Materielle Recht*. In preparation.

Important work. Comprehensive study of Community law. The first volume is devoted to institutional law, the second one to substantive law. Only volume 1 has been published so far. It contains 7 parts, with a selective bibliography appended to each chapter or important problem. Part 1 deals with the historical and political aspects of the development of E.C. law; part 2 with the Treaties that led to the foundation of the Communities; part 3 with the Communities as legal subjects, their relationship to member states and legal nature; part 4 discusses the institutional construction of the Communities; part 5, the law of the Communities; part 6, the relationship between E.C. law and the national law of the member states; and part 7 is concerned with the European Court of Justice and its powers.

72. *Le Droit des Communautés Européennes*. Bruxelles: Larcier, 1969. cxiii, 1193 p. (Les Nouvelles).

Comprehensive treatise written by a team of specialists of European Community law under the direction of J. Ganshof van der Meersch. Each of the 60 or so writers has made an original contribution. Among the subjects treated, the case law of the European Court of Justice and the relationship between Community law and national laws are given special emphasis.

73. IPSEN, Hans Peter. *Europäisches Gemeinschaftsrecht*. Tübingen: Mohr, 1972. xl, 1092 p. DM 150.

Standard work, both teaching and research tool. Includes chapter on the development of doctrinal teaching and research in European Community law. The main focus is on institutional and economic law. Still basic book, even though written before the accession of Great Britain, Denmark and Ireland.

### 3. COMMENTARIES

74. COMMERCE CLEARING HOUSE. *Common Market Reporter*. 4 v. Chicago: Commerce Clearing House, 1965- . Loose-leaf. Weekly. USD 580.00 per year.

Volumes 1 and 2 contain the text of the EEC Treaty, broken down article by article, with pertinent regulations and directives, and explanations immediately following, together with digests and rulings from the European Court of Justice and other informative materials. Volume 3 reproduces the text of the judgments of the European Court of Justice and of national courts on Community law matters. The decisions are translated from the original languages by the C.C.H. editorial staff and have no official status. This volume also lists the offices and officials in the various institutions of the Communities.

A separate volume entitled "Doing Business in Europe" discusses the principal legal aspects of "doing business" in the EEC countries, as well as in Greece and Switzerland. Topics covered include limitations on investment, forms of doing business, tax provisions, business incentives, basic labor legislation, competition rules, industrial property, arbitration procedures, etc. Basic descriptions of the legal structure and court system are included.

75. *Dictionnaire du Marché Commun*. 4 v. Paris: Joly, 1968- . Loose-leaf. BFR 10,030. 5 updates per year. BFR 6,683 per year.

Commentary arranged in alphabetical order by broad subject headings. Each part is organized as follows: summary and alphabetical index, in-depth analysis of the EEC provisions with references to the Treaty and implementing regulations. An up-to-date version of the texts is also set out,

including the Treaty provisions, implementing legislation and main court decisions.

V. 1 deals with agriculture, v. 2 with competition, v. 3, external exchanges and associated states, internal harmonization of legislation, energy, enterprises, consumer protection, establishment and services, v. 4, EURATOM, taxation, Community institutions, economic and financial policy, industrial property, social law transports. A separate volume sets out the text of the Treaties and annexes with their amendments.

76. GROEBEN, Hans von der, Jans VON BOECK and Jochen THOESING, eds. *Kommentar zum EWG-Vertrag*. 2 v. 2d rev. ed. Baden-Baden: Nomos, 1974. 2832 p. DM 440.

Article-by-article commentary on the Treaty of Rome. Contains a bibliography at the beginning of each important development. Index.

77. *Halsbury's Statutes of England*. 3d ed. Vol. 42A: *European Continuation Volume I, 1952-72*. London: Butterworths, 1975-. Approx. USD 75.00. Since the accession of the United Kingdom, "directly applicable" legislation of the European Communities is now part of the statutory law of England.

The materials are arranged by broad subject-headings and references are provided to Communities publications and to implementing United Kingdom legislation and case law. Amendments made up to January 1, 1974 have been incorporated and later amendments noted when possible. The volume is kept up-to-date by supplements. (The 1977 *Cumulative Supplement* covers the period 1973-1976.)

78. MÈGRET, Jacques and Others. *Le Droit de la Communauté Economique Européenne*. Bruxelles: Presses Universitaires, 1970- .

Multivolume commentary on the EEC Treaty. Published since 1970 (1 volume every year) by a team of professors and practitioners under the sponsorship of the *Institut d'Etudes Européennes* of the *Université Libre* of Brussels. Intended to be a practical working tool for lawyers, but contains also doctrinal considerations and suggestions for improvement where judged necessary. The commentary follows the order of the Treaty articles. The outline followed is the setting out of the text of the article, its analysis and a general commentary of the topic, a listing of implementing regulations and the reproduction of selected ones, as well as the more important cases, and also the answers to the written questions of the European Parliament members. Contains numerous bibliographical references in the text and a bibliography on the articles dealt with at the end of each volume. Each volume is well indexed, with a chronological index of cases, decisions of the Commission, an alphabetical author and subject index, and a table of contents. So far, 9 volumes have been published, the last one ends with art. 198 of the Treaty. The topics treated are the following:

- Vol. 1, Preamble, general principles, free circulation of goods;
- Vol. 2, agriculture;
- Vol. 3, freedom of circulation of goods, workers and transportation;
- Vol. 4, competition;
- Vol. 5, taxation and harmonization of legislation;
- Vol. 6, economic policies (in 2 vols.);
- Vol. 7, social policy;
- Vol. 8, European Investment Bank, BFR 450;
- Vol. 9, the institutions of the European Communities, BFR 1,450.

79. SIMMONDS, K.R., ed. *Encyclopedia of European Community Law*. 3 v. London: Sweet & Maxwell, 1973-. USD 399.75 for set. Loose-leaf (quarterly updates).

Volume A covers that part of United Kingdom law to which amendments have been made as a result of entry into the Community.

Volume B (in three binders, BI, BII, and BIII) covers the basic Community Treaties together with their Annexes, Protocols, further Agreements

and a number of Treaties between the Communities and non-member states. The volumes are kept up to date by supplements.

Volume C (in five binders, CI-CV) contains the regulations, decisions and directives issued by the Council and the Commission of the Communities, grouped under general subject-headings and accessible through a detailed index. Excluded from coverage are the acts dealing with agriculture and customs duties because they were judged too numerous and technical to be of use to most lawyers. Short annotations are written whenever required to make the text more understandable, e.g. references are made to judicial decisions of the European Court of Justice and national courts if they have an impact on Community legislation.

80. SMIT, Hans and Peter HERZOG. *The Law of the European Economic Community: A Commentary on the EEC Treaty*. 5 v. New York: M. Bender, 1976- . Loose-leaf. USD 475.00.

This work is the product of the Project on European Legal Institutions begun by Columbia Law School in 1967. Prominent European authorities have contributed to the work which has then been somewhat edited to make it more accessible to common law lawyers. The format follows very closely the order of the EEC Treaty. Each article is cited in its official English version, then followed by an extensive bibliography and references to implementing measures and court decisions. Then the article is subject to an analytical commentary.

This work does not have any index, nor table of cases, and might have included a chapter on the general issues of Community Law. It is supplemented, but with some delay in publication.

85. *L'Espagne et les Communautés Européennes. Problèmes Posés par l'Adhésion.* Bruxelles: Editions de l'Université de Bruxelles, 1979. 432 p. BFR 900.

Proceedings of a 1979 Colloquium. Examines the political, legal, economic and social problems that would arise out of Spain's accession to the Community. The advantages of Spain's accession seem to outweigh the drawbacks and tend to strengthen the process of integration among the member states.

86. PUISSOCHET, Jean-Pierre. *The Enlargement of the European Communities: A Commentary on the Treaty and the Acts Concerning the Accession of Denmark, Ireland and the United Kingdom.* Leyden: Sijthoff, 1975. xi, 454 p. USD 49.00. (European Aspects Law Series, No. 15)

The first part discusses the enlargement of the E.C., the legal framework and consequences. The second part comments on the main provisions of the Treaty and Acts of accession article by article. Bibliography.

Examines the role of the Community judge in the progress toward European integration. Written in a practical way, elaborates on the facts submitted to the judge, his decisions on products and enterprises, competition and taxation, persons, workers and social law, freedom of services and establishment, personality rights. Also examined are the legal instruments of the European Treaties and the direct and uniform applicability of Community law.

Volume II reproduces the translation of cases decided between 1954 and 1960 by the Court of Justice of the ECSC and its successor since 1958, the Court of Justice of the European Communities. It is to be noted that Mr. Valentine is an editor to the *Common Market Law Reports* which has published the Court cases since 1962. The first cases decided were important because they determined some of the basic principles of interpretation of European law. They are grouped on chapters according to their subject matter.

Describes the task of the Court, its jurisdiction, organization, procedure (regular and special) and rules of procedure. Appendix. Tables of Treaties and cases. Index.

Explains the general principles of the EEC antitrust rules from a practical point of view.
