A Brief History

- Trial run on Computing BSc in 2001.
- Initial problems lead to a suspension of PAL on Computing
- Resumed on BIT in 2002 and Computing in 2004.
- Courses continued to evolve
- Computing is now part of a larger Software Systems Framework with 220+ students.
- PAL is an integrated part of the Framework.



Teething Troubles

- Initial introduction of PAL
 - Started 3 weeks into term
 - Did not include PAL on the timetable
 - Sessions were arranged, advertised and promoted by PAL Leaders.
 - Was not taken seriously by all staff




Teething Troubles Resolved

- When PAL resumed 4 PAL Leaders were trained centrally.
- PAL was introduced from the first week.
- PAL was timetabled and embedded into the course.
- Registers of attendance taken.
- Staff were encouraged to participate by providing notes, work etc to PAL Leaders for inclusion into PAL sessions.

Challenges

- New challenges has meant large changes in the way we teach students.
- Much less emphasis/opportunity for small group teaching.
- PAL is one of the few places this has been retained.
- This has in some ways increased it's importance in helping students settle into University life.

PAL in 2008/2009

- 18 PAL Leaders
- PAL Leaders work in pairs
- Course Based PAL Co-Ordinators
- Meet regularly with PAL Co-ordinators, approx every 2 or 3 weeks or as needed.
- Trained centrally by PAL Project Manager with PAL Leaders from all over University
 - Initial and Follow-Up training.



Formality

- Recruitment
 - Application form
 - Job specification
 - Interview
 - Training
 - Paid for sessions and planning
 - Observations
- Timetabling
 - Managers need to understand
 - Correct type of room
 - Timing issues
 - Importance



Informality

- The sessions are flexible
 - Topics are determined by Students possibly even on the fly during session

- Loose planning
 - Training includes first session planning
 - Assignment Calendar used for planning



Perceptions of PAL

- PAL is often largely ignored by staff.
 - Perceived as informal gathering for students to help each other.
- Is that the same for the students?
- How do PAL Leaders perceive their role?
- How do 1st year students perceive PAL and the role it plays in their experience of University?



Our Initial Approach

- Surveyed students and PAL Leaders looking at attitudes towards PAL.
- 2 separate questionnaires
 - PAL Leaders
 - 1st year students.
- 60 out of 220 first year students responded.
- 10 out of 18 PAL Leaders responded.



The majority (80%) of respondents regard themselves as regularly attending PAL sessions.

Under 7% did not regard themselves as regularly attending.

Between 48% and 53% regard PAL Sessions follow a "structure" or "particular pattern"

PAL Sessions do not follow any particular pattern



PAL has helped you to cope with University better







Very large percentage of 1st years agree. 63% and 83% respectively.

Student Survey Conclusions

- Majority of students find PAL provides a structure for discussion and support.
- The structure is formal and well embedded in the infrastructure of the course.
- Students like this approach and for the most part attend reasonably well.
- Students have respect for good PAL Leaders



Conclusions

- Students like the formal structure
- First Year students like flexibility within a familiar structure
- Formal training builds confidence
- Inclusion in timetable at appropriate times improves attendance
- Strong PAL Leaders increase likelihood of successful PAL group
