AN ANNOTATED LIST OF THE STONEFLIES OF OHIO (PLECOPTERA)

While stoneflies constitute one of the smaller orders of insects, they are nevertheless one of the most important groups to both fisheries and sanitary biologists. In mountain streams, they are one of the principal sources of food for trout. Because of their preference for clean, well aerated water, they are becoming increasingly important to sanitary biologists as indicators of clean water conditions in pollutional surveys.

From 1950 to 1953, the author made extensive collections of stoneflies from many of the rivers and smaller streams in southern Ohio. Specimens in the insect museums of the Illinois Natural History Survey, Ohio State University, and Ohio University were also made available for study by the curators of those collections.

The first extensive list of the stonefly fauna of Ohio was published by Walker (1947). In that paper, he reported twenty-four species which he collected during his survey of the stoneflies of southeastern Ohio. In addition, he listed seven other species not taken in that region but reported for elsewhere in the state in publications of Needham and Claassen (1925), Claassen (1931), and Frison (1937, 1942). Seven other species are recorded for the state in publications of Claassen (1939) and Ricker (1952). Eighteen additional species are reported in this paper. Each of these species is indicated by an asterisk preceding the species name. The systematic arrangement followed in this paper is that of Ricker (1950, 1952).

The recorded distribution of each species in the state is given by counties. The names of collectors other than the writer are indicated by initials in parentheses following the county record. Two asterisks following a county name indicates that the writer as well as the collector cited has taken the species in that county. The dates following the lists of counties are the earliest and latest dates of observation or capture of adults of the species in Ohio. Specimens collected by the writer are in his personal collection; all other specimens are in the insect museums previously listed.

The following initials are used for collectors. The abbreviations following each collector's name indicate the location of the collections.
