Save the Date for ILOC 2017:

And that date is January 19, 2017! While that sounds really far off, plans are already underway for this annual online conference sponsored by the State Library.



ILOC stands for **Innovative Libraries Online Conference**, a winter education event that showcases Iowa library programming, practices, and accomplishments. The **2017 theme** is already decided: "**Lean Mean Library Machine!**" Sessions will demonstrate how Iowa

libraries are finding process improvements and time-saving practices -- all-around time management tips worth replicating.

Brand new for ILOC 2017 will be Library Hacks! If you're not heard this term, a library hack is any procedure or action that saves time and/or money while still increasing awesomeness. These presentations will be very short 5-6 minute segments sharing what libraries are doing to make life a little easier.

So it's time to save the date for ILOC 2017—January 19!

Science Vocabulary & STEM Programs

With all of the current emphasis on library involvement in STEM education, you may have noticed that science involves a lot of new vocabulary. Children will learn some of these at school, of course, but breaking down words commonly used in science experiments or projects can really add to your programs. Here are a few examples that you can use to help children understand some STEM vocabulary:

- "Photo" means "light." Used in words like photography, photosynthesis.
- "Therm" means "heat." Used in words like thermometer, thermos.
- "Micro" means "small." Used in words like microwave, microscope, microchip.
- "Scope" means "see." Used in words like microscope, telescope, stethoscope, periscope.
- "Geo" means "earth." Used in words like geography, geode, geometry, geology.
- "Graph" means "write." Use in words like autograph, geography, graphs.

Make a game of introducing or analyzing new words as they come up. For example, if a thermometer is mentioned or used, ask children what other "therm" words they have heard. Explain the meaning of "therm" and have more examples in mind to point out. Write the word on a notecard for use in a future game. When you have enough cards, you might play a spelling bee- or family feud-type game with them.

The Holidays are Coming!

I'm sure that you don't need a reminder, but it's that time of year again - time to finish planning for the winter holiday season.

Here is some "food for thought" related to holiday programming: I'm finding some libraries across the country are not providing programs with specific holiday content. The argument is that we can't possibly celebrate all of the many holiday traditions in our diverse society – especially those based on religion or ethnic tradition. For example: If

you do a storytime for Kwanzaa, perhaps you should do one for Hanukkah? Has anyone in your community ever mentioned that some holiday décor or programming violates their beliefs? How do your holiday season events reflect the diversity of <u>your</u> community? Does your community expect Christmas-y programs? What can you substitute (the winter season, winter sports, simply "snow") that is seasonal? Perhaps this is a topic for the LibraryTalk [<u>https://lt.silo.lib.ia.us/</u>] discussion board?

No matter what you decide to focus on, here are a few ideas borrowed from other libraries for your holiday programs:

*Play "Stuff the Santa" - purchase 2 sets of the largest sweat pants and sweatshirt you can find (preferably red) and have teens stuff the suit with small balloons while one team member is wearing it. The team that uses the most balloons (inflated and counted beforehand) during a set time period wins. Popped balloons don't count toward the total!

*Have a gift wrap contest - participants wrap an empty box any way that they choose. Award ribbons or small prizes and use the "gifts" to decorate your library. You might have a prize for the ugliest gift, too!

*"Clean the Closet" Craft Day: Offer all sorts of leftover odds and ends for making tree ornaments or collage artwork.

*Feed winter wildlife: Find simple ideas for bird feeders such as <u>http://raisinglittlesuperheroes.com/homemadebirdfeeder/</u>

*Craft idea: Make winter shadow pictures by cutting a sheet of black paper in half, carefully cutting simple shapes like snowmen or fir trees and gluing on white paper as shown at right. (I used our die cut machine to save time, but children can cut simpler shapes. See the website <u>http://www.artsonia.com/museum/art.asp?id=17176182</u> for an example.)



*You may have heard about the plastic wrap/clear tape ball party game. Basically, you create a large ball by wrapping candy or trinkets between layers of clear tape or plastic wrap. Pass the ball around a circle and allow each player to try to "dig out" a prize in the time allowed.
