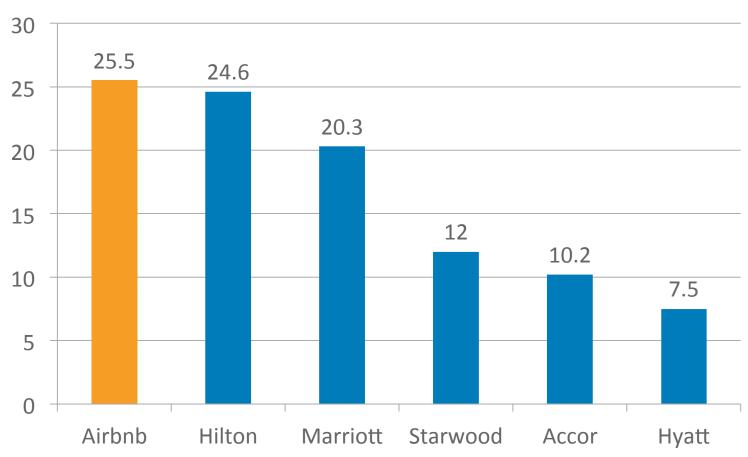

Hoteliers lobby for change on 3 primary pillars

### 1) Fire and life safety

Homes/apartments are not held to the same safety standards as hotels

### 2) Housing displacement

"Airbnb landlords" are taking housing off the market

### 3) Taxes

Short-term unit owners are not subject to the same taxes as are hoteliers



Hotels generate a lot of money in taxes

Tax case study: San Diego Short-term rentals could mean big money in taxes, too

### Hosts \$16.4 million

Short-term rentals generated \$16.4 million in hotel and sales taxes in fiscal year 2015.

### Hotels \$1.65 billion

Hotels rentals generated\$1.65 billion in hotel and sales taxes in fiscal year 2015.

Case study: San Francisco

Legislative rollout slow, iterative and (seemingly) without end.

2013-2014 Legislators hold countless meetings and forums to hammer out bill.

27 October 2014 Bill signed, legalizing peer-to-peer home sharing.

14 July 2015 Board of Supervisors rejects hard cap on use of short-term rentals.

November 2015 Residents will vote on ballot initiative to limit rentals to 75 days a year

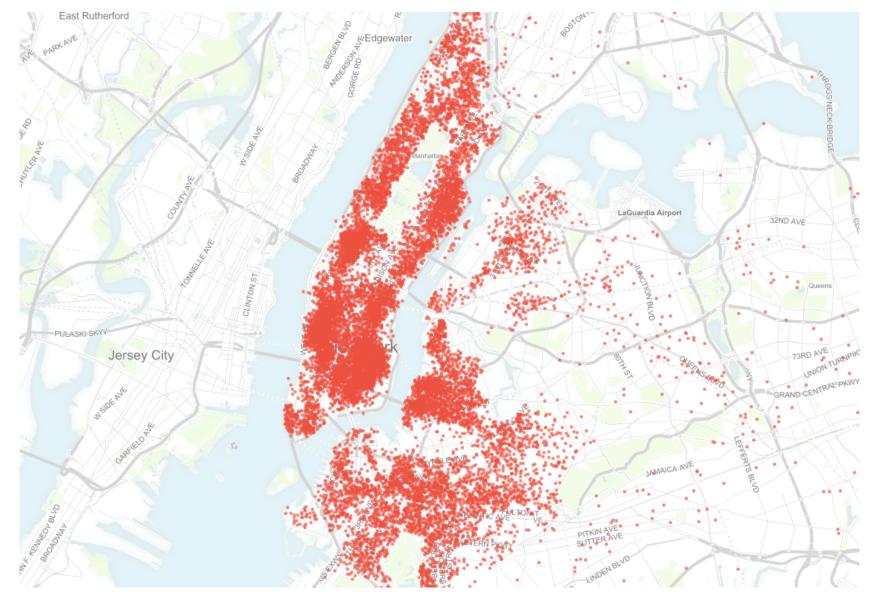

Total	100%



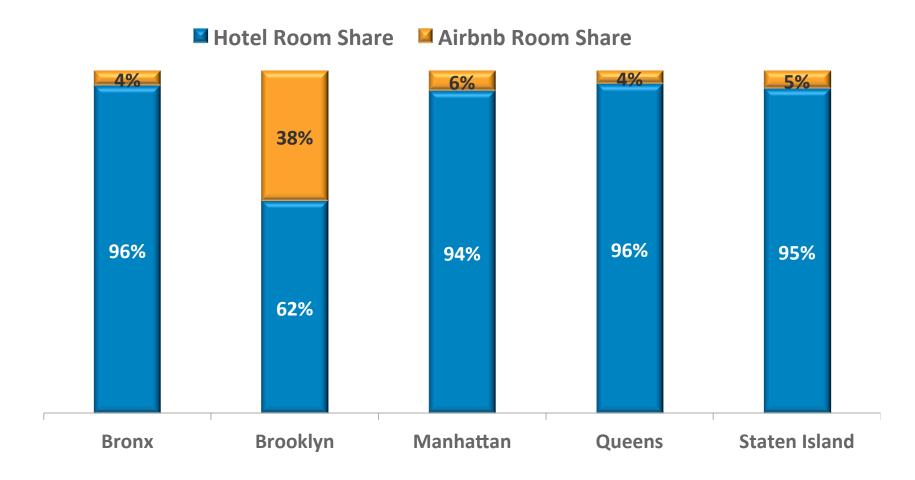
Methodology

Included	Excluded
Entire units	Private rooms, shared rooms
Houses, apartments, townhouses, etc.	Treehouses, houseboats, etc.
Real beds	Couches, air mattresses, etc.
Available at least 5 days in next 3 months	Available less than 5 days
Minimum stay of 2 nights or fewer	Minimum stay of more than 3 nights

# That left 8,600 Airbnb listings in May in NYC compared to 105,000 hotel rooms.

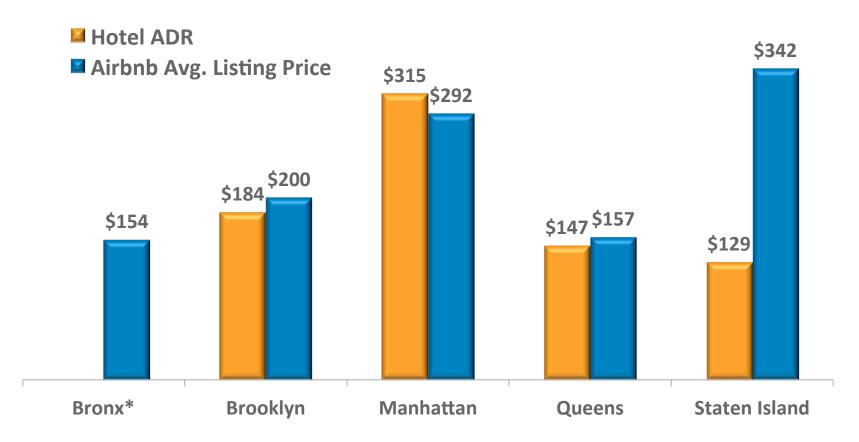


5 borough Airbnb inventory: Most pronounced in Brooklyn. *Room supply share, by borough, as of May 2015.* 





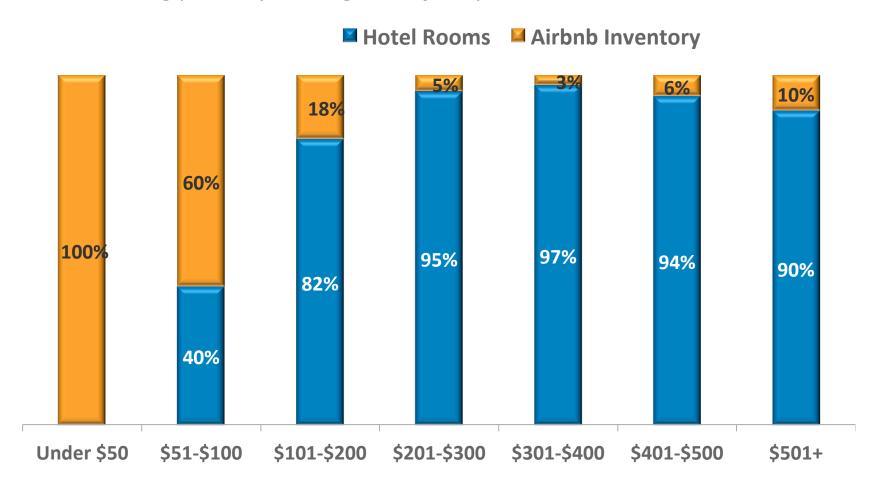
5 borough Airbnb listed prices: Often competing head-on. *ADR and listing price, by borough, as of May 2015.*

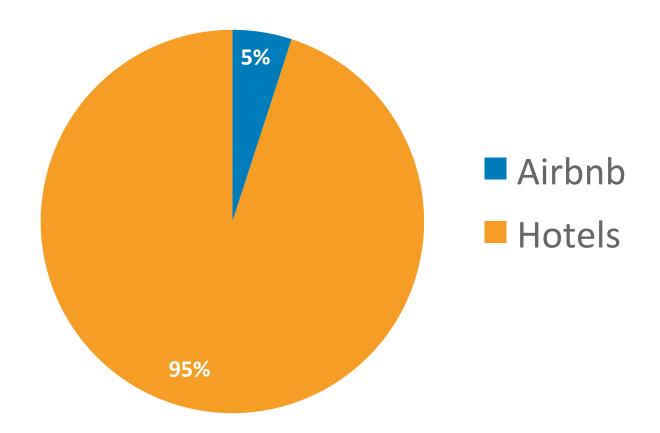
5 borough Airbnb listings: Competing at every price point *ADR and listing price, by borough, as of May 2015.*
