Preface

The official registration for the 1944 Purdue Road School was 668. Although this is but approximately fifty percent of the maximum attendance (1,231 in 1941), it is still an increase over last year's figure of 610. The war has presented a number of very difficult problems in connection with the construction and maintenance of highways and, as a result, most of the officials attending appeared to make the best of the time which they had available.

Table I presents a comparison of classified registration by groups during the past six years, while Table II shows the classified registration by days for this year's School. Table III lists the officials of the various co-operating organizations.

The 1944 Road School was streamlined like the 1943 School, lasting only three days in place of the customary five. In addition, more hours were included in the daytime sessions, and some night sessions were scheduled.

Since last year's program dealt primarily with priorities and other war-time restrictions, the program committee decided early that it would be desirable this year to use post-war planning as a theme.

Accordingly, papers dealing with various phases of this subject were presented at most of the sessions. For instance, Mr. Raymond Pike, Director, Indiana Economic Council, discussed "What Public Officials Can Do on Post-War Planning" at the Monday morning general session. At the Tuesday afternoon meeting, some activities of the Joint Highway Research Project were described, and the application of research data to post-war work was discussed. On Wednesday afternoon Mr. S. C. Hadden, Chairman, State Highway Commission of Indiana, also discussed this subject. The post-war theme was climaxed by an address by Colonel William Carey, Chief Engineer, Federal Works Agency, Washington, D. C., on "Planning for Post-War Construction."

The Purdue Memorial Union was used again this year for all the formal sessions except the War Supper on Wednesday evening, which was held at the Educational Center of the Presbyterian Church in Lafayette since the Union ballrooms are not available for such purposes during the war. Other Union facilities have proved invaluable for such a meeting as the Road School.

The program was organized so that a general session was held each of the three days. Separate sessions were then scheduled for the remaining time. On Monday morning the program got under way very nicely with a session devoted to general highway problems and to postwar work. On Tuesday afternoon the Project Research activities received special attention. Wednesday afternoon was the highlight of the

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School since we were fortunate in having Mr. S. C. Hadden from Indianapolis, Mr. Roy W. Crum from Washington, Mr. H. S. Fairbank from Washington, and Mr. Stewart Mitchell from California, on the program.

On Wednesday morning a new type of program was initiated which turned out to be exceptionally successful. Questions had been obtained from various county and city officials before the meeting, and a panel of eight experts submitted prepared answers.

No entertainment was scheduled except for brief periods on Monday and Tuesday evenings. On Monday, Professor G. J. Mackey and Coach E. H. Burnham, from the Purdue athletic department, presented moving pictures of the Purdue-Great Lakes football game and discussed Purdue's athletics. The program was sponsored by the Lafayette Chapter of the Indiana Society of Professional Engineers. On Tuesday night sound moving pictures showing highway problems in foreign countries were presented for a little over an hour.

The Road School closed on Wednesday evening with a War Supper, attended by slightly fewer than 300. Dr. Edward C. Elliott presided. The addresses by Governor H. F. Schricker and Colonel William Carey brought the Road School to an inspiring finish.

If this year's School was a success—and we believe that it was—it was largely so because of the fine spirit of co-operation existing among the many sponsoring organizations.
