Cmdr. Leroy Gilbert, NPS Protestant chaplain, will be guest speaker.

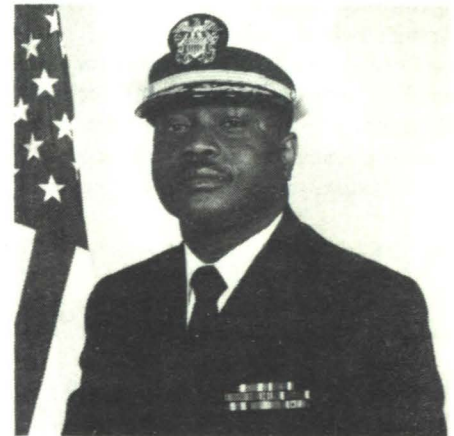

'State of NPS' - No change for change sake

(Ed. Note: Following is the first part of "The State of NPS" speech made by Provost Harrison Shull to the Faculty Council on November 28, 1989. It outlines significant organizational changes being implemented at the school.)

Once again it is my pleasure to appear before you with comments on changes at NPS this past year and our plans for the near future. Last year's report was that of a newcomer, full of first impressions and only glimmers of concepts that deserved some consideration. Today I want to spend my time in a more directed look at the organization of this University (or at least my part of it) and to outline for you some significant changes in the administrative structure that will be implemented during this next year.

There are some important general principles I try to keep in mind in making administrative changes.

I don't believe in change for change's sake. Any significant change should confer a positive benefit which out-

weighs to a considerable extent the cost to the institution of making the change.

Additional bureaucratic layers should be avoided if at all possible. Rather than imposing new ones, one should try to eliminate them.

Decision-making should be pushed down as far into the organization as decisions can be made appropriately and effectively.

In so far as possible, decisions should be made once, and, once made, these decisions should be reviewed once and only once.

It is incumbent upon management to prepare for smooth future succession to management with adequate development programs for potential new managers.

Management should be as cost-effective as possible, so that the maximum amount of available resources is made available in support of the basic mission of the institution.

With these in mind, let me make some general comments on our current situation.

Next week, the provost addresses such topics as academic leadership and how reviews, audits and inspections figure into the NPS climate.

Navy League seeks nominations for 1990 convention awards

Family home care

The Naval Postgraduate School has a Family Home Care program that allows La Mesa Village residents to obtain training, insurance and certification to operate a day care center in their government home.

Spouses who want to be day care providers are given 20 hours of training in first aid, health, safety and nutritional information and two hours of monthly follow-up training in bookkeeping and tax tips for small businesses. The spouse is able to operate a home business to bring in additional income, and at the same time parents who use the home care service are assured that each provider knows emergency procedures, meets rigorous health and safety standards, and receives regular training and inspections.

The FHC program is designed only for persons who provide regular, full or part-time child care and receive payment for their services. It's not a program for weekend babysitters or for organizations like the La Mesa Co-op or the La Mesa Women's Bible Study. The program is mandatory for spouses who live in La Mesa and want to conduct an in-home day care business.

Initial classes for FHC providers will begin Wednesday. Spouses interested in becoming providers can call 646-2821, or visit Debbie Charbonneau at the Family Service Center.
