

In general, libraries play a lead role in conceiving the policies, and then assume a supporting role in promoting them in tandem with a designated faculty committee.


RECIPES FOR SUCCESS: OPEN ACCESS POLICIES O AND ACADEMIC LIBRARIES IN NORTH AMERICA

Academic libraries often play a key role in the development and passage of open access policies. This poster highlights selected results of a survey of fifty-one institutions that have pursued open access policies.


TYPES OF POLICIES

THREE MOST COMMON POLICY TYPES

"Harvard-style" policy that grants the institution a non-exclusive license to faculty articles, requires deposit in an institutional repository, and offers waivers.



Hybrid policy, typically including elements of the Harvard-style model.




Statement of encouragement to publish future works open access.


In the Harvard-style policy all faculty are automatically covered and can choose to opt-out, while faculty must opt-in on their own under policies that are statements of encouragement.


THREE MOST COMMON REASONS USED IN CONVERSATIONS WITH FACULTY ON THE IMPORTANCE OF OPEN ACCESS



Open access supports public access to research funded by tax dollars.

THREE MOST COMMON FACULTY CONCERNS

Compliance creates a burden

Copyright is transferred to the institution, and unauthorized use of 65%the deposited article may occur.

THREE MOST COMMON RESPONSES TO FACULTY CONCERNS

Faculty may publish in any journal, not just open access titles.
