Educational rights and privacy act

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, as amended (FERPA), was designated to protect the privacy of education records. This Act established the right of students to inspect and review their education records and provided guidelines for the correction of inaccurate or misleading data through informal and formal hearings. Students also have the right to file complaints with The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act Office (FERPA) concerning alleged failures by the institution to comply with the Act.

Local policy explains in detail the procedures to be used by the institution for compliance with the provisions of the Act. Copies of the policy can be found in the Office of Records and Registration, second floor, Lake Huron Hall. The policy is also printed on pages 39-43 of the 1978-79 Student Code Book. The Office of Records and Registration also maintains a Directory of Records which lists all education records maintained on students by this institution.

Questions concerning the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act should be referred to the Office of Records and Registration.

STUDENT LIFE OFFICE

PEOPLE TO PEOPLE SERVICES

The Student Life Office provides its services to students through the offices of Residence Life, Records and Registration, Scheduling Services, and Student Activities. Other service functions of the Student Life Office are the Health Center, Day Care Center, Campus Judiciary, Substance Abuse Program, Commuter Services, and management of the Campus Center and

Buzz 206 (our campus information center). As you can see from this wide variety of services, the Student Life Office affects a great deal of the environment at GVSC.

The people involved in the Student Life Office, including administrative staff, clerical staff and student workers are available to you for access to the student life services. Every office offers services which help people. The thrust of the Student Life Office is people to people services making the red tape of administering programs seem as non-restrictive and uncumbersome as possible.

The Dean of Student Life, Richard G. Mehler, is located in the Campus Center, ext. 585. If you have any concerns in general about operations of the Student Life Office (or anywhere on campus) and have talked to the Director of the particular office in question and desire further discussion, the Dean's office is always open for comments suggestions and interactions. The Student Life Office is charged with the quality of the student life environment and no issue is too unimportant for the staff to consider. Facilitating a pleasant, meaningful environment in which you can complete your educational goals is our overriding goal.

The purpose is to educate the campus community and encourage awareness in the area of alcohol use and abuse.

Some of the services available are:

--Referral service: We explored and made contact with campus and community resources and are prepared to advise and assist individ-

uals with problems/concerns about their own drinking style, or that of a friend. Referrals may be for personal counseling or consultation. "Any contacts or information revealed by the person seeking assistance will be strictly confidential.

--Education pamphlets covering a wide range of information regarding various aspects on alcohol and other drugs.

--Development and distribution of publications specifically relevant to GVSC.

--Research regarding drug and alcohol use and effects on campus.

--Coordination of the Substance Abuse Committee composed of faculty, students, Campus Police, Campus Ministry, and counselors.

--Films on alcohol/drug abuse and use.

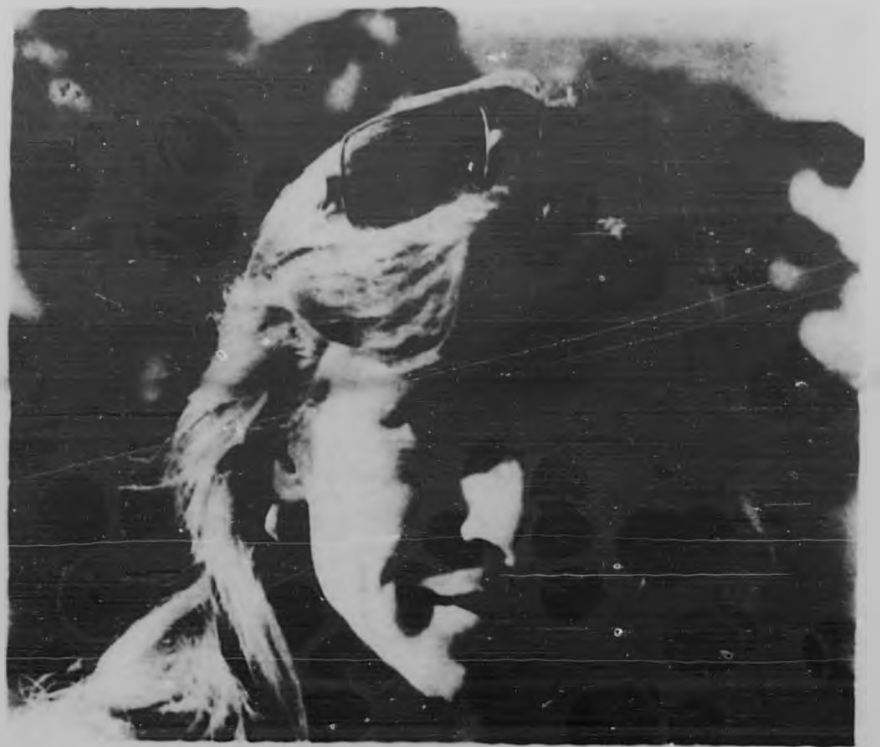

Student Organizations

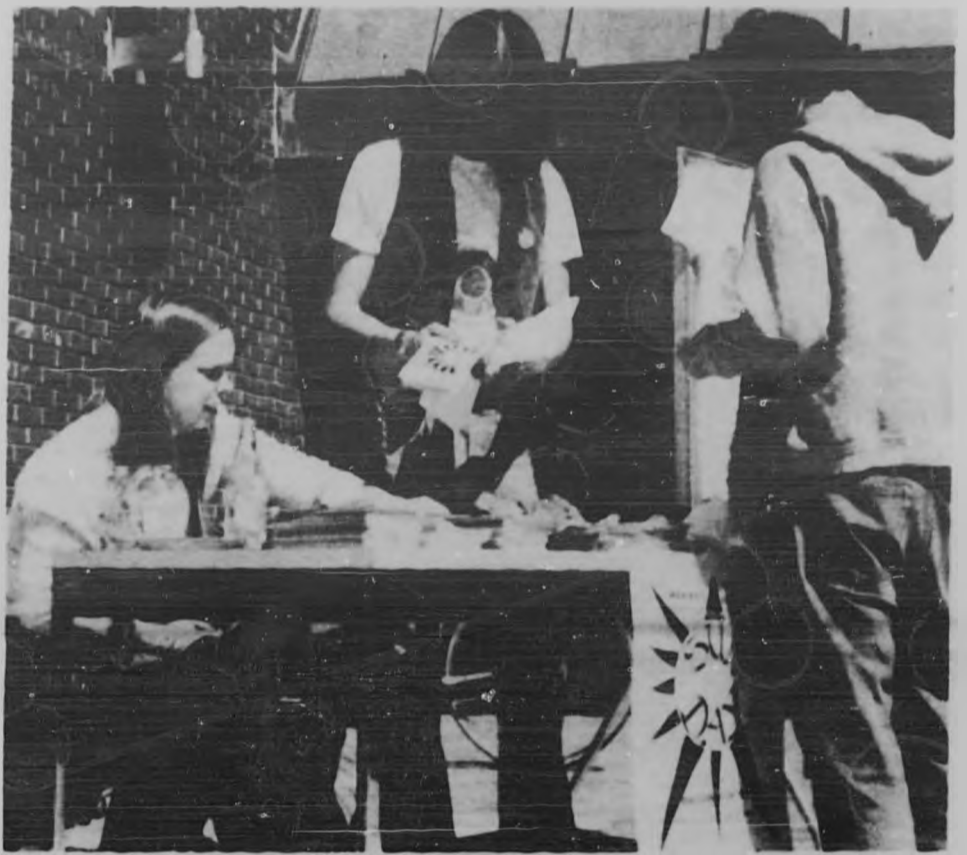

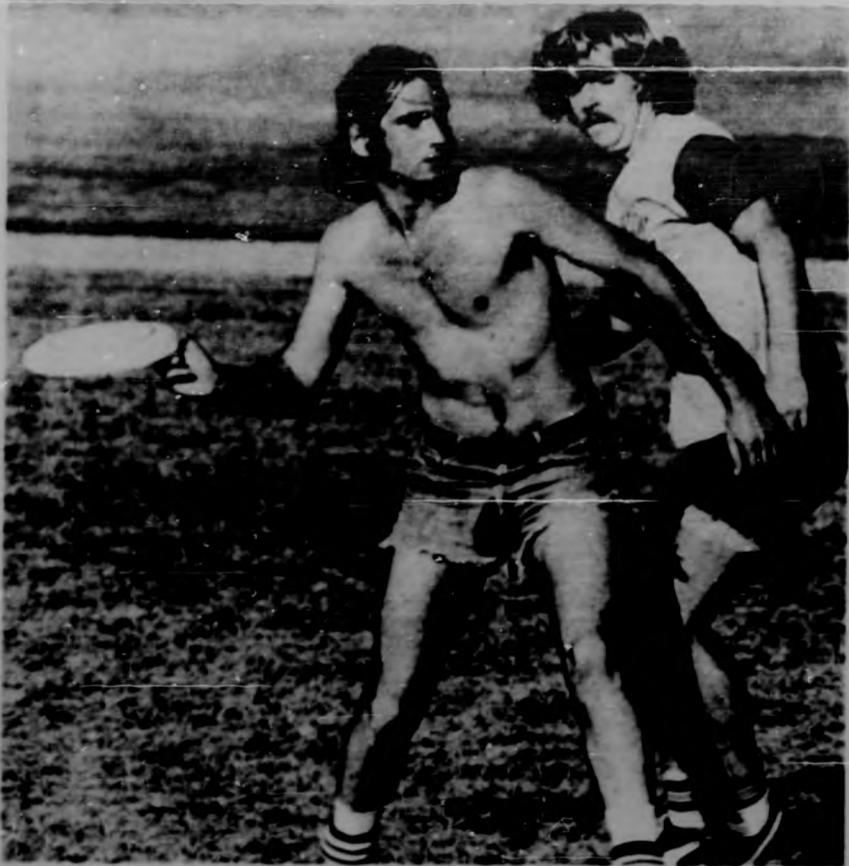

Medical Care Facilities



Dr. Harvey DeMaagd - Director Health Services.

Need an allergy shot? Wondering if medication might knock out that nasty cold? Got a cut or some other minor injury that could use medical attention? Grand Valley's Health Service staff can help you with these and other health problems.

A wide range of out-patient services is available, including medical treatment of illness, laboratory testing, contraceptive services, allergy injections, health care counseling,

and referral to specialists when needed.

Our staff doctor is available for consultation in the mornings, and nurses are on duty all day. Evening services are available at local health care facilities.

The Michigan legislature has directed that tax-payer funds not be used to provide health care for college students and personnel. For this reason, we charge students minimal fees for our services. Faculty and staff members pay higher

rates than students.

What we can do for you:

- Set up an appointment in advance for you to see the doctor at a particular time
- Prescribe drugs if the doctor determines there is a need for them.
- Perform lab tests such as blood, pregnancy, urinalysis and others.
- Treat minor emergencies and illnesses.
- Administer allergy shots.
- Provide physical examinations.
- Offer medical consultation.

- Provide pre-marital examination.
- Provide birth control services.

What we can't do for you:

- Provide in-patient care (no hospital beds on campus)
- Take X-rays.
- Offer services after regular operating hours.
- Fill your prescriptions.

The Health Center is located in the lower level of Seidman House on the south end of campus near the library.

Campus System of Justice

Standards of conduct are established to foster a climate in which the college community can function orderly, realizing that individual rights can be ensured only with the acceptance of group responsibilities.

Individuals attending Grand Valley State Colleges automatically place themselves under the applicable rules and regulations of GVSC. Such regulations, in addition to the judicial procedures, are published in a separate publication, available at the Office of the Coordinator of Campus Judiciaries (Robinson House). The judicial system is based upon the principle that due process of law will be observed in each case.

You are encouraged to become involved in the Campus Judiciaries. Students are a very important part of the judicial system. The Housing Judiciary membership is composed entirely of students, which are elected at the first House Council meeting in each Residence Hall. Students are also appointed to the Court of Three (composed of a student, a faculty member, and an administrator), and to the All-College Judiciary (composed of students, faculty, and administrators).

activities on campus.

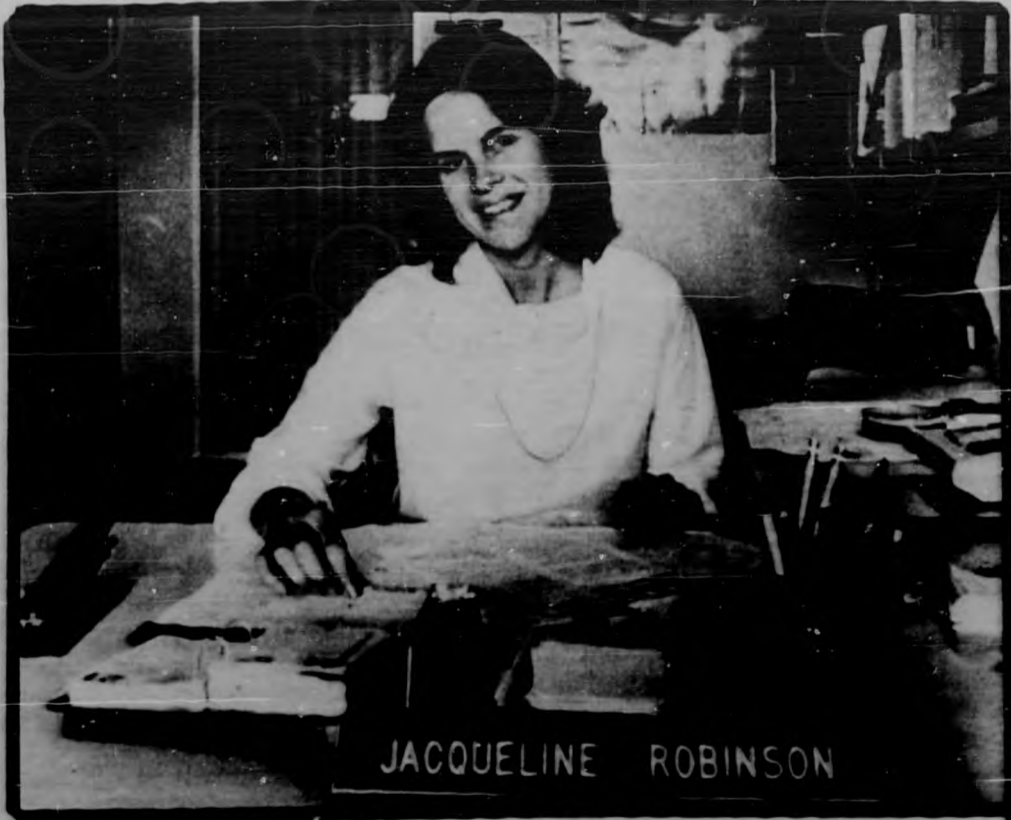
Dee, a native Michigander, is 19

Keeping Informed at the Valley

Student Media at Grand Valley is just that—student media. The Lanthorn, which is the student newspaper, is located on the first or basement floor of the Campus Center and is managed and completely produced by students. The Lanthorn is as always searching for writers, artists, ad sales people, typesetters, and other interested layout people to assist in putting out the paper. Some paying jobs are available through The Lanthorn, and any student interested should call ext. 120 and ask for "The Mace."

WSRX-FM, 88.5 on your dial, is the student managed and operated 10 watt radio station. It is also located on the first floor of the Campus Center. Both studios and offices are available for your viewing. Opportunities available are disc-jockey, programming, news, traffic, and continuity, or assist in the business management of the office. For information regarding WSRX and possibilities for involvement contact John Keating at ext. 128.

Students are urged to keep in touch with their student media to express concerns and to participate in the process of communicating with other students through the media. Articles, issues, or programming ideas are solicited constantly by the management of The Lanthorn. Be sure to take some time to stop by, check out the facilities, and discuss the media with the staff, and possibly, you may find some interest in directly participating in these student leadership options.

Each student media at Grand Valley also has a student/faculty/staff advisory board. Both boards meet regularly and all meetings are open to students. Four students are appointed annually by the Student Senate to sit on the Newspaper Board, which oversees and advises the operation of the newspaper. The Radio Advisory Board also has several student appointments by the Student Senate available. Anyone interested in attending meetings or participating in addressing concerns about the Radio Station or The Lanthorn should contact the Student Activities Office at ext. 295, or the Student Senate, ext. 231.

Long Hours Pay Off

Six students spend two hours twice a week debating what concerts to put on.

Another student spends fifteen hours a week planning canoe trips, and rock climbing excursions.

Ten students work until 4 am twice a month to put out a news letter.

A group of students cram FCC regulations in with other "regular" exam information and drive to Detroit to test for a third class radio license.

What do they get out of it? Most aren't paid for their hours. Nobody gives them more time to write term papers or gives them better grades. The student media often criticizes their decisions and openly attacks their policies. What then is there in it for student leaders?

Some of the "good stuff" that student leaders get comes from effecting their environment. Taking an active part in creating the things around them instead of being a passive object of somebody else's design.

Self knowledge comes from a variety of experiences in life. Certainly one of the most valuable is interaction with other human beings. Working thru problems, taking responsibility for ones own actions, making tough-sometimes unpopular decisions, these things are all part of the "real world" and student leaders learn to cope with their "real world" in the living/learning environment of the College.

Head for the Campus Center building if you are a commuter student wondering where to take your commuter questions or problems. Located there in the Dean of Student Life Office is the Commuter Services Office. The proportion of commuting students at GVSC has grown over the years and reached 82% of the total student population; thus, the establishment of the Commuter Services Office. Through this office we are committed to servicing the commuter student. The Commuter Services Office acts as your advocate, we assist you; we assess your commuter problems and needs; and we foster campus planning and environmental management to meet your commuter needs. Presently, we coordinate the following services for you:

CARPPOOLING: This is a free service with no obligation. Carpooling is a great way to save money and wear and tear on your car and yourself. Also you will be meeting other commuting students. We will feed your name, address, and the times you are coming and going from campus into a computer. In return, you'll receive a list of names, addresses, and telephone numbers of Grand Valley students, faculty and staff who live in your area. The rest is up to you.

BUS SERVICE: "We're going your way, more times a day"; 11 different departure times to and from GVSC Monday through Friday; free transfers to and from other bus routes; Allendale bus runs; Woodland Mall Bus run; term break bus run.

STORAGE LOCKERS: Various locations throughout the campus; \$.10 per use and a great convenience.

DAY CARE CENTER: Lake Michigan Drive. The Center is open from 7:45 to 5:15 Monday through Friday and welcomes children from age 2½ to 5 years. Call 895 4146 for fee and registration information.

EMERGENCY CAR START: An arrangement has been made with Campus Safety and Security to assist stranded motorists on campus in an emergency situation. They will do what they can to assist you when you're in trouble with a dead battery, etc.

EMERGENCY GUEST HOUSING: If for some emergency reason (snow storm, car accident, etc.) you are unable to return home, we can aid you by providing emergency guest housing.

OFF CAMPUS HOUSING: We maintain a list of those available off campus housing listings.

STUDENT OUTPATIENT HEALTH CARE: We have nursing service at the Health Center Monday through Friday. The Health Center is located in the lower level of the Seidman House.

Are you an average veteran on campus? If so, we'd like to meet you, because we can't find one.

Vets come in all different sizes, shapes, colors, and ages, and we are here to help one and all with any and all problems. Of course, the Veterans' Affairs Office (VAO) has as its main thrust your VA-related problems, but we can also help with all those other hassles that come into your life from time to time. We may not have all the answers but we will be able to get you to the person with those answers.

Staffing for the VAO consists of the Coordinator, Chuck Kozal; a Veteran Representative on Campus, Keith Bowhuis; and five or six workstudy students. These seven or eight people handle the paper work and any problems of the 600 or so recipients of VA benefits on campus.

The Coordinator is best described as the liaison between the veteran and the school, while the Veter-

an Representative on Campus is the liaison between the vet and the VA. The workstudy people are a combination of the two programs, and are able to inform the Coordinator or Veteran Representative of any needs of the veterans.

The VAO can supply students with information on the availability of many different types of programs, a few of which are: VA Home loans; VA Educational loans; VA tutoring; VA Disability Compensation; VA Life Insurances; VA Vocational Rehabilitation.

If a veteran or dependent would like information on these programs (or others), the VAO is here to provide it.

There is an open door policy at the VAO, so if a student just wants to stop by and rap, that's OK. We will be more than happy to discuss anything the student needs to talk about. The most important thing is: **WHATEVER THE REASON. STOP BY;** we enjoy the company.

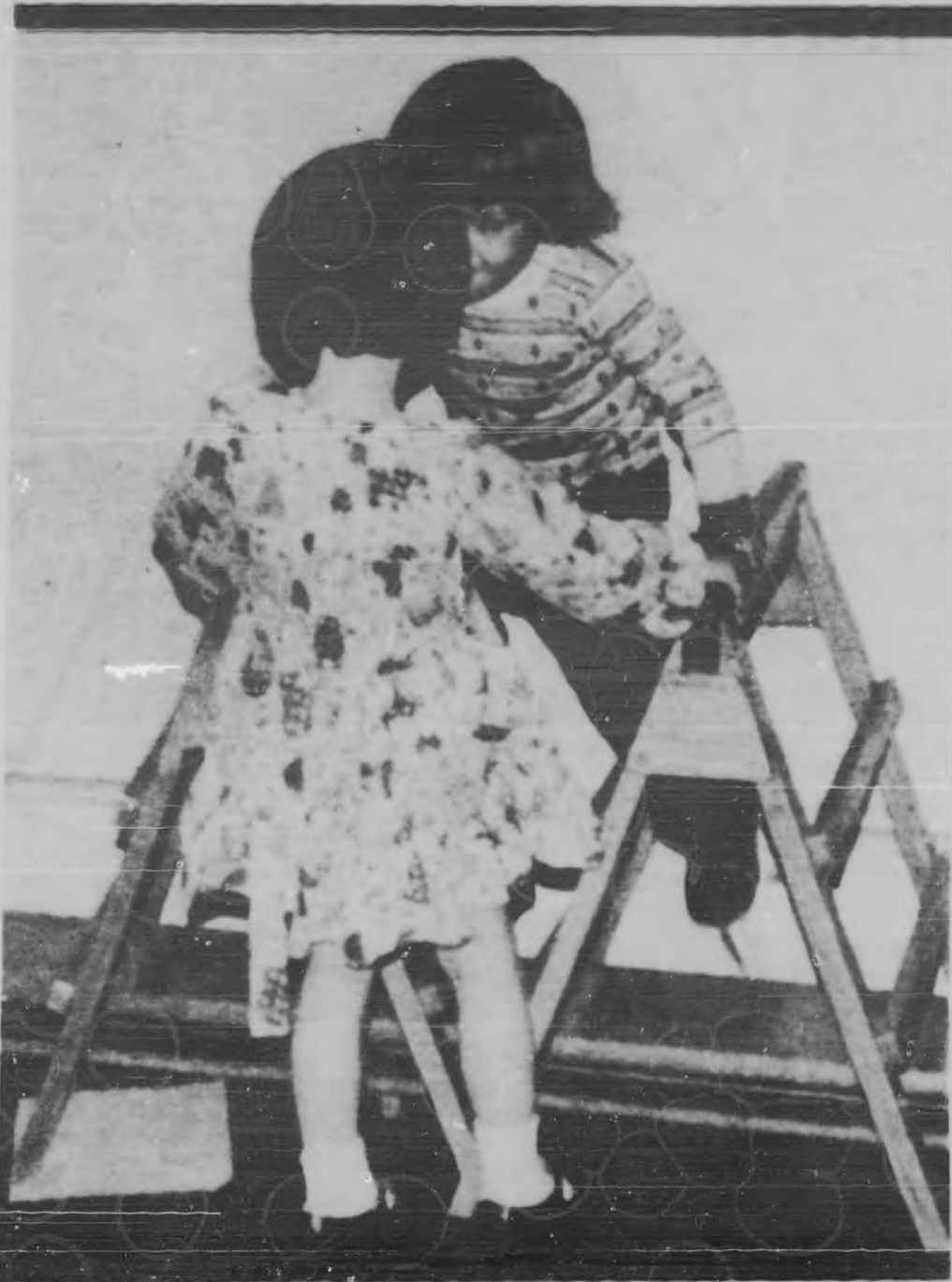

How often have you heard the statement, "All dorms are alike. It's a place to sleep - that's all"? According to Dennis Batt, Acting Director of Residence Life, nothing could be further from the truth. "At Grand Valley," says Batt, "we don't try to force the student to conform to a life style. Rather, we encourage the student to choose a life style that suits his or her needs. We urge the student to personalize his or her living space as much as possible, thereby maximizing the individual's comfort and personal growth potential. After all, a resident student spends a great deal of time in his or her room or apartment. That's why we don't refer to our buildings as dorms - a dorm is a place where you live while you learn. A residence hall is a place where you learn to live."

Residence halls at Grand Valley

indeed offer a variety of life style options. Robinson House is the Quiet Hall this year. All buildings, of course, have some quiet hours, but in the Quiet Hall quiet hours are extended and combined with courtesy hours to provide a more tranquil atmosphere virtually around the clock.

A new option this year is the upperclass hall. Located in Copeland House, this option is available to any student who has lived in residence halls before or who has attained sophomore standing or higher.

Other options include quiet floors in Kistler or Copeland, non-smoking or non-drinking roommates, and single rooms (on a space available basis). Also, each term there are a very limited number of room only contracts signed. Lastly, for those folks who com-

mute most of the time, but cannot travel easily in inclement weather, winter term only contracts are available.

Within the halls, students can participate in several programs which allow them to personalize their individual rooms. Self-paint programs exist in both the halls and in the Ravine Apartments. Using paint and equipment provided by the Residence Life Office, students can re-paint their rooms to their own taste (within certain guidelines, of course). All the student needs to do is provide his or her Resident Life Coordinator with a plan of what he/she wishes to do, have the plan approved, pick up the paint at the Paint Room, and go to it.

Additionally, the student can participate in the Room Renovation program. This program in-

cludes re-furnishing, loft building, re-carpeting, etc. Again, permission from the RLC is necessary and guidelines are provided, but essentially the student is bound only by his or her imagination.

The Residence Life Office itself in conjunction with the Buildings and Grounds Department, has begun an extensive redecoration process which eventually calls for re-carpeting, re-painting, and providing new drapes in every residence hall room and lounge. The trend is definitely away from institutional drab, as evidenced by the colorful plaid drapes and shag carpeting.

Add to these programs and plans such current features as fireplaces, conversation pits complete with color tv's, quiet rooms, and kitchenettes, and you must agree that the residence halls at Grand Valley are far from "just places to sleep."

and two courts available for playing squash. All courts are used on a reservation basis by calling 895-7812. For a copy of the Court Reservation Policy stop by the Equipment Issue Room, no. 45.

3. TENNIS COURTS

Northwest of the Field House are located 6 outdoor courts. These courts are available on a first come, first served basis.

4. WEIGHT ROOM

The weight room is located in the basement, red wing, Room 32. In this room are various types of weight lifting devices and loose weights to improve the physique.

5. MULTI-PURPOSE ROOM

With the closing of the Dome, the Gymnastics Room, located in the sub-basement, is being converted for basketball, volleyball, badminton, other court type games, and gymnastics. Although tight, it will offer opportunity for much free play.

6. LOCKER ROOMS

Preparing for or "cleaning up" after activity, use the spacious locker rooms, located in the basement. Women's locker room no. 22 and Men's locker room no. 64 are available for student use. Students enrolled in physical education class may obtain lockers through their instructor. Other students may obtain lockers through the Physical Education Office, room no. 12, located in the basement. Men's locker room no. 47 and Women's locker room no. 42 are for use by faculty and staff. Lockers may be obtained through the Student Activities Office, room no. 82. Combination locks may be purchased at the bookstore. There is no

charge for lockers.

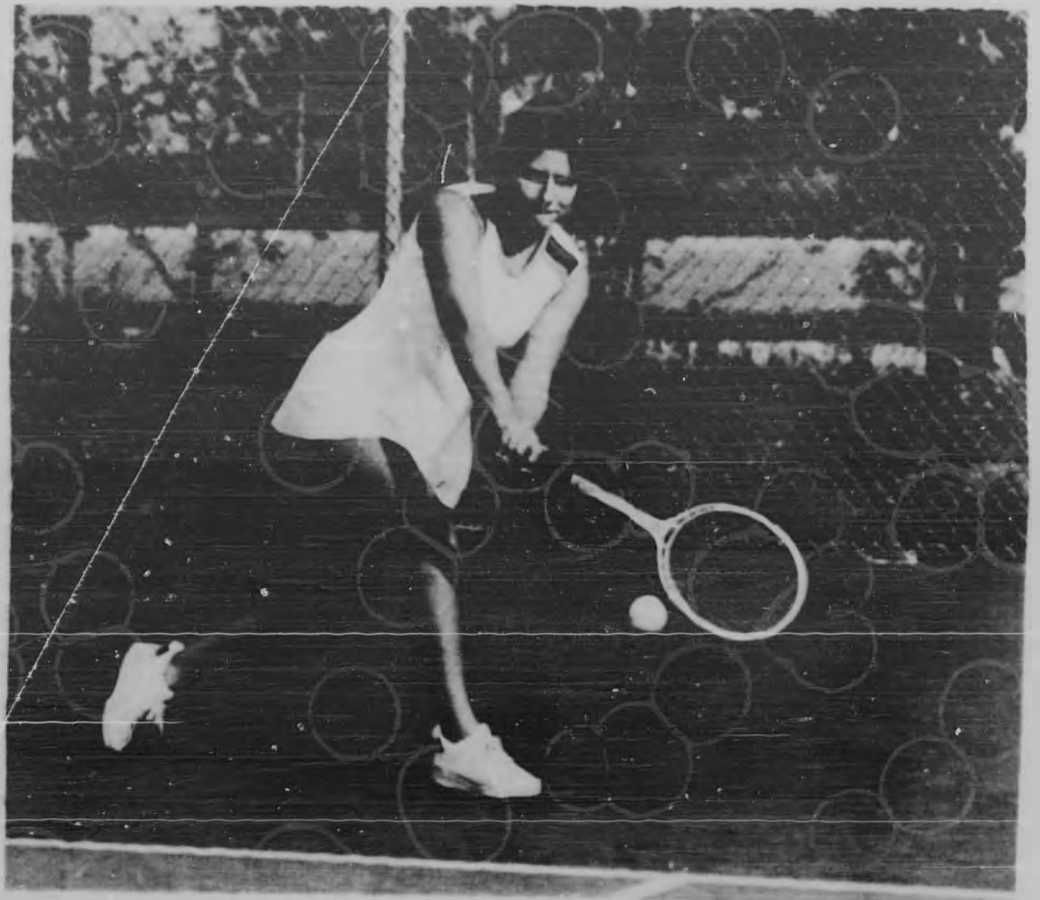
