### Faculty and Students Honored by State Association

Christine Rydel, professor of Russian, and Howard Stein, professor of biology, will be honored at an Awards Convocation of the Michigan Association of Governing Boards of Colleges and Universities at the Kellogg Center, Michigan State University, on Wednesday evening, April 20. Two students, David Groh and Mariel Versluis, will also receive honors.

Rydel has taught at GVSU since 1970. In addition to her teaching responsibilities, she has served as chairman of the Foreign Language Department and director of the Honor's Program. In 1984, she received Grand Valley's award for Distinguished Contribution to a Discipline for her work as editor of the Russian Literature Tri-quarterly, editorial consultant for Ardis Press, an author of numerous books and articles focusing especially on Nabokov and Russian romanticism. Rydel is currently completing three books which she has under publisher's contract.

According to Dean of Arts and Humanities Forrest Armstrong, "Multi-faceted excellence and intense commitment are hallmarks of Professor Christine Rydel's 17 years at Grand Valley. Regardless of what she teaches, her classes challenge and inspire excellent students."



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Stein has been teaching at GVSU since 1965. He founded and currently serves as director of the University's Research and Development Center. In addition to teaching, his professional endeavors include numerous publications and National Science Foundation (NSF) grants. He served as a staff biologist for the American Institute of Biological Sciences and has consulted with NSF's Science Education Directorate.

At the state level, Stein has served in executive positions for the Michigan

Association o f Biology Teachers and the Michigan Science Teacher's Association, for which he serves as president. Stein is the founder and editor of the GVSU Science and Math Update, which is circulated to over 4,000 middle and high school teachers around the state. He also played a major role in development of the the Coalition for Excellence in Science and Mathematics Educa-

# West Michigan Public Broadcasting Moves to New Facilities

On Saturday, April 9, at 7 a.m., WGVU/WGVK-TV and WGVU-FM signed on the air from their new home - the Meijer Public Broadcast Center. After nearly two years of planning and construction, the west Michigan public television and radio stations have moved from their long-time location in Allendale to their new facility in downtown Grand Rapids.

Michael T. Walenta, general manager of public broadcast-ing, noted that the move to the new downtown broadcast center will allow the stations to be become more active members of the west Michigan community. "As we move into our new facilities, certainly thank everyone in west Michigan who has made this all possible," said "And now it is our Walenta. turn to return your investment in us, with new and exciting programming we are preparing to bring you from WGVU-FM and WGVU/WGVK-TV."

Local programs will originate from two new television studios, featuring state-of-the-art equipment. According to Chief Engineer David Wiswell, "This includes five lkegami HK 323 color cameras, production and master control switchers, videotape decks,

and audio components capable of stereo broadcasting." WGVU/WGVK-TV plans to begin broadcasting selected programs in stereo this month.

Sam Eiler, Station Manager of WGVU-FM, commented that the move to the broadcast center is part of the radio station's ongoing effort to provide better service for its listeners. "This move continues the upgrade of WGVU-FM and complements the new tower, new transmitter, and power increase of last December," said Eiler. "Our next step will be the addition of National Public Radio programming in the fall."

### Oldenburg Competition Winners Announced

#### **Summer Remodeling Plans**

With the moves of various departments and personnel to the Eberhard Center, space will become available on campus for other uses. "The highest priority use for this vacated space will be additional classrooms," according to Terry Sack, physical plant director.

"Utilization rates of our classrooms is at a ten-year high and future growth would be limited without more classroom availability. Our basic remodeling plans for vacated space will add an additional six classrooms and 300 student stations. This represents a 15 percent increase in classrooms and an 18 percent increase in stations. A public microcomputer lab, with an ultimate capacity of 90 stations, will be part of the overall project," he said.

Some highlights of this year's remodeling will include:

Manitou Hall--The former TV studio will be converted to a lecture hall. Room 108, formerly occupied by the television station, will be converted to a classroom. The TV control room will be converted to a communications room and records storage area. The former TV offices on the second floor will become a new microcomputer lab.

Lake Huron Hall--Admissions mailing, now in Room 205, will be moved to the Service Building; Room 205 will be converted to a classroom. Computer room, located in Room 101, will be moved to Manitou Hall; and Room 101 will be converted to a seminar room.

Lake Superior Hall--A permanent partition will be constructed between Rooms 134 and 136. Room 259 will be converted to a class-room.

The symposium is being held as part of the 14th annual Great Lakes History Conference sponsored by GVSU.

The symposium is one aspect of the ongoing joint faculty and student exchange programs that Grand Valley has had with the University of Sarajevo since 1975. In addition to the delegation from Yugoslavia, there will be two participants from the Cracow Institute of Economics, with whom Grand Valley maintains a similar scholarly exchange.

"The symposium provides an interesting opportunity for faculty and students to consider scholarly papers and to discuss issues from the combined perspectives of the two countries," Dorothy Armstron, coordinator of the event. Presentations of papers and discussions will be held each day from 9 a.m. to 12 noon, and from 2 to 4 p.m. All sessions are open to the public free of charge and will be held in the Thornapple Room of the Amway Grand Plaza Hotel.

GVSU faculty members who will be presenting papers are Donna Larson, Holly VanScoy James Sanford, and David Bernstein. On Tuesday, April 19 at 3 p.m. in Cabins D, E, and F of the Kirkhof Center, Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs, Glenn A.
