Polly Diven, Assistant Professor of Political Science, presented a paper titled "The Allocation of U.S. Food Aid Abroad: Merging Humanitarian, Domestic Economic, and National Security Objectives" at the annual meeting of the American Political Science Association in New York City on September 2, 1994.

Frances B.
