### **GVSU Calder Gallery Features Work of Natural Artists January 9 - February 16**

Beginning January 9, the Grand Valley State University (GVSU) Calder Gallery will feature the work of artists who are referred to as folk, untrained, or primitive artists. The exhibit will continue through February 16.

According to Tim Nowakowski, GVSU Calder Gallery Director, "The works in this category have intrigued schooled artists, who are often inspired by folk art, while at the same time these works have baffled art historians and critics. For example, most writers on the topic cannot even agree upon a general term for this type of art, hence the many names and concepts associated with 'folk' art."

The style is also referred to as naive, visionary, innocent, or natural. The Calder Gallery exhibit will include carved and painted wood pieces, paintings on saw blades, enamel and wood, and other pieces assembled from a variety of objects.

Pieces by nationally-known artists such as the Reverend Howard Finster, Sam Doyle, Mose Tolliver and William Dawson, as well as Michigan artists Wesley Merritt, Ivan Laycock, and Dewey Blocksma, will be included in the exhibit.

"Blocksma is interesting since he represents a new category of artists who are untrained, yet maintain an awareness of contemporary 20th Century trends in the art world," adds Nowakowski.

Blocksma will present a slide presentation in the Louis Armstrong Theatre, adjacent to the Calder Gallery, on January 12, at 3 p.m. Following the presentation, a reception will be held in the Calder Gallery at 5 p.m.

The Calder Gallery is located on the Allendale campus of GVSU. There is no charge for admission and the gallery is barrier free. Gallery hours are Monday through Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Thursday. For more information call: (616) 895-2563, 895-2564, or 895-2566.

John Zaugra, coordinator of Career Counseling and Career Testing, has been with the GVSU Counseling Center for 14 years. He holds a Ph.D. in Counseling from the University of Montana and a Master's in Counseling from Roosevelt University in Chicago.

Zaugra notes that most New Year's resolutions are a positive factor in an individual's life. "My experience is that they are a positive factor, a positive way to address a problem." He says people fail to uphold their resolution "when they overextend, trying too many resolutions or unrealistic ones that they cannot accomplish. For example, you hear someone say they're going to lose 50 pounds in 10 days; it's just pie-in-the-sky."

Zaugra suggests two things are crucial to success in upholding a resolution: breaking down the long term goal into smaller components such as weeks and months, and establishing sub-goals so that the main goal is achievable over time.

"If people can establish positive practical goals, they can be a realistic springboard for a change in lifestyle."

He notes a majority of people fail to keep their resolutions because they are unrealistic. To make them realistic, Zaugra says you should "first personalize your commitment and make it a priority, and second, you have to assume personal responsibility for your own behavior; if you don't, you're wasting your time." He also suggests that "if you delay you won't do it, do it right away and make it part of your lifestyle and a part of your thought process."

**Comment on the  
current revolt in  
Chechnya, Russia**

A history professor, Cole has taught Russian History at GVSU since 1991. He holds a Ph.D. in Russian History from the University of California, Berkeley.

Professor Cole notes several interesting questions, based on historical context, emerge when he reflects on the Chechen situation. According to Cole, "The Grozny event has served to reveal so many weaknesses in Yeltsin's Russia."

Among the questions it raises, says Cole are, "Why would the president order a military attack when he could probably get his way in the long run without violence? Chechnya is not viable as an independent state. Is this the price he has had to pay for the military's support during the constitutional crisis? Is it an attempt to outflank the political opposition--Zhirinovsky? Or did he think to pick a fight he could win and thus establish--or re-establish his credentials as a leader?"

Cole also wonders, "What explains the ineptness of the Russian forces, beginning with the outlandish composition of the so-called strike force and its lack of a clear mission statement?"

Additionally, Cole asks, "Why has the Russian public remained so silent and sullen? Opinion polls--which may not in fact reveal anything of importance about anything in Russia--indicate widespread disapproval, but no real protest has emerged either."

"On the surface this seems to point out the fact that the Russians have not developed anything approaching a democratic mentality. Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty. The Russians' apathy seems to indicate that they are ripe for dictatorship, and perhaps they want it. And perhaps they'll get it."

### **Fundraising Underway for Second Research Vessel at Grand Valley State University**

Grand Valley State University (GVSU) in Allendale, Michigan will operate a second research vessel based in Muskegon, Michigan as early as May 1996.

The GVSU Water Resources Institute will continue to operate the current 45-foot research vessel, the *D.J. Angus*, from its base in Grand Haven. Annually, more than 4,000 people learn about Great Lakes ecosystems, pollution, ecology, and biology aboard the *D.J. Angus*. In addition to serving as a floating laboratory for university students, the *D.J. Angus* hosts cruises for K-12 school groups, civic and environmental groups, and others.

"Requests continually exceeded the availability of the *Angus*, so need for a second vessel rapidly became apparent," said Ronald Ward, Director of the Water Resources Institute.

"The second vessel will enable us to fill the demand for educational cruises and to expand our service area northward to Ludington and beyond, making this unique educational opportunity available to schools and groups we are not presently able to serve."

The university's plans for a second research vessel first received significant backing in September 1994. In honor of a \$250,000 gift from West Michigan environmentalist Dr. William Jackson and his wife, Kay, the second vessel will be named the *W.G. Jackson*.

At the same time, a State of Michigan Commerce Department grant of \$250,000 was announced by Michigan Representative Leon Stille.

The campaign for the *W.G. Jackson* received its most recent boost when the Muskegon-based Brunswick Foundation donated \$150,000 for the acquisition of the second research vessel in recognition of the company's 150th anniversary year, 1995.

Headed by Muskegon businessmen, Roger A. Andersen and Dr. William Schroeder, the "Making Waves in Muskegon" fundraising committee hopes to raise a total of \$1.6 million to purchase, equip and endow the *W.G. Jackson*. The campaign will be conducted in partnership with the Muskegon County Community Foundation, which is accepting gifts for a permanent endowment to help support the project.

"I think it's important for all of us to give back to the world," said Malea Quimbach, an Education major and coordinator for the GVSU chapter. "By working on the house, I'm helping Colleen and the community. It's great to see how many people get involved," she added.

"Without the Grand Valley student crew and Habitat, it would probably be years before I could afford my own home," says Knight. "It's really exciting. Now, my children will have a stable place, it's important for them to have stable place, a place to come home to."

Knight, who hopes to receive her bachelor's degree in criminal justice from GVSU in 1996, was required to spend 300 hours working on Habitat for Humanity projects before she was eligible to move into the home. She was also required to take home ownership courses and make a small down payment.

Upon receiving her degree, Knight plans to further her career in substance abuse counseling, becoming a case manager or full-time counselor.

### **West Michigan Public Broadcasting Urges Reason and Compromise in CPB Debate**

(Grand Rapids) — West Michigan Public Broadcasting's general manager today expressed deep concern over a U.S. House subcommittee's approval of a proposal to take back federal funding of the Corporation for Public Broadcasting (CPB).

CPB dollars help support the educational and cultural program that are the hallmarks of public television and radio.

Michael Walenta, who directs Grand Valley State University's WGVU AM-FM and WGVU-WGVK TV called on West Michigan's members of Congress to bring a "voice of reason" to the debate over public broadcasting's future.

Walenta's statement follows:

"Obviously, we are dismayed by the apparent movement in the U.S. House of Representatives to bring about an end to the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. We fully understand and appreciate the change in philosophy among the congressional leadership that has placed CPB under a new level of scrutiny.

"It has been our wish all along, however, that Congress would seek ways to work together with the public broadcasters like us who want to reform and restructure the system. We urge them again to do so now.

"We have yet to hear from our own West Michigan members of Congress, Vern Ehlers, Pete Hoekstra, and Fred Upton. They have always been on our side, so we look to them now to provide leadership and a collective voice of reason and compromise in the growing debate."

When asked about the number of Contract items that can realistically be accomplished, Armstrong notes "inevitably the Democrats will not want to object to everything, hence be called 'obstructionists,' so I think some will pass, the question is which."

He adds, "the GOP will try to figure out which items the Democrats will have to accept in order not to be seen as obstructionist. Then the GOP will add to those same bills items that the Democrats would not otherwise support."

Addressing term limits, Armstrong says, "I'm from Missouri about the salability of term limits, even among Republicans: Show me--I'll believe it when I see it." Armstrong also says there is the possibility that the GOP might try to do with it what the Democrats did with campaign finance reform under Bush: pass it even though they did not want it because they knew the President would veto it, hence get the blame.

Regarding the time needed to accomplish items on the Contract, Armstrong says, "if there were no consideration besides straight party discipline, all could be accomplished overnight in the House. The GOP rules, hence could set limited time for debate and allow no amendments. But the filibuster in the Senate could defeat anything--or delay anything indefinitely if and when the Democrats choose to use it. And while party solidarity would help in such endeavors, it is certainly not essential. Many filibusters have succeeded with only a handful of determined supporters. We will not know how it is all going to work until we see how both sides are going to play it. I suspect each wants to be as cooperative as possible initially, but I also think that will wear off fast! Only time will tell."

**Comment on the effects of the Japanese earthquake on the automotive industry**

Asked whether some of the Japanese cars sold here in the U.S. be more costly because of the earthquake, Gillette says generally they will not. "Cars and light trucks, including minivans and sport utility vehicles, are less expensive in the United States than anywhere else in the world due to the intensive competition in this market. The Japanese manufacturers have had to price their imports into the U.S. to meet market-based prices, regardless of cost pressures. These pressures have been severe in recent years due to the strong yen vs. the dollar.

"A very small amount of price pressure could come because certain models may be less available and anxious buyers will bid up the transaction price and/or not ask for rebates or discounts. One example might be the new Lexus LS400. Production was temporarily halted due to a lack of parts. For the most part, consumers shift their purchases to other models when shortages occur."

Commenting on possible increases in the cost of "U.S." autos containing Japanese parts, Gillette notes, "Chrysler has not been able to get V-6 engines it purchases from Mitsubishi through the Port of Kobe. The engines are used in both the popular minivans and the new Cirrus sedan. If the situation is not resolved, availability of those vehicles in the U.S. would certainly be curtailed. Due to heavy competitive pressure however, it is unlikely that Chrysler will be able to raise prices on the two."

He adds, "Because of the strong yen, Japanese auto companies have been shifting vehicle production off-shore to North America, Europe, Southeast Asia, and elsewhere. Due to economic reasons, more than political pressure, companies in Japan have been increasing their parts purchases from the U.S. and other low-cost manufacturing regions. Fewer parts are imported to U.S. manufacturing facilities from Japan each year, lessening the impact of the earthquake on costs here."

Terry Fisk, Director of Criminal Justice Training at Grand Valley State University (GVSU), teaches a variety of criminal justice courses. The former Lapeer Police Chief and 17-year veteran of the Battle Creek Police Department, Fisk is the Director of the GVSU Police Academy, an annual GVSU program.

"There is no real national standard for training officers in evidence handling," says Fisk. "The closest thing to standardization is through CALEA (the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc.) an organization that accredits police departments nationwide. But only about three or four departments in Michigan are accredited through it. CALEA says departments should have standards for processing evidence at the scene, but it doesn't say what they are.

"At the GVSU Police Academy, recruits receive six hours of evidence collection and preservation training, plus a two-hour class on processing property. Occasionally, officers will receive additional training if their departments offer in-service programs. Quite often now, though, a crime scene technician's sole job is to collect evidence."

Asked what standard training officers receive regarding courtroom presentations, Fisk notes, "generally what happens prior to trial is that key witnesses will spend time with the prosecution and discuss what they will present. In the most serious felonies, or in a high-profile case like this, lots of time is spent getting their case together. Frequently, law firms put witnesses through a training program, looking at what you're saying and how your saying it. For most officers, that's when they get their training; in the courtroom. At the GVSU academy, we have a short course on testifying in court."

"Given his years as an officer, Officer Mark Fuhrman, a prosecution witness, has lots of courtroom experience. Witnesses for both sides commonly receive training, so I am sure the Simpson defense team did training with their witnesses."

John Bornhofen is a professor of Economics and Finance in the Seidman School of Business at Grand Valley State University (GVSU). He teaches courses in economics, financial markets and institutions, and monetary theory and policy. Bornhofen holds a Ph.D. in Economics from the University of Illinois.

Bornhofen says the public blames the Fed for raising interest rates. "Many people apparently believe that if the Fed hadn't raised rates, rates would have stayed low. This is not true. Clearly, even if the Fed had not been targeting interest rates, and not raised its target, interest rates would have increased on their own--because of market forces.

When the economy expands as it has, the demand for credit tends to out-strip supply, pushing rates higher. Those increases would have been more gradual, less abrupt, and would have drawn less scrutiny."

He adds, "there is a problem with the Fed targeting interest rates, and that is if the economy slows dramatically or goes into recession, the Fed will be blamed. Thus, the Fed's targeting of interest rates runs the risk of politicizing our central bank and monetary authority. This could lead to attempts to change the Fed, and those could weaken the effectiveness of the Fed as our monetary policy maker. If the Fed were targeting bank reserves, however, rates would have risen because of market forces, but the Fed would not be directly blamed."

Commenting on the one-half percent increase, Bornhofen says, "this latest increase will slow the growth of the economy somewhat more than previous increases. The fourth quarter Gross Domestic Product results are in, showing the economy grew at a very strong seasonally adjusted annual rate of 4.5 percent in the last three months of 1994. This is the strongest quarterly performance since the late 1980s.

"The Fed is concerned that if the economy stays strong, or the demand for goods and services continues to grow as it has over the past year, inflation will worsen. Although the fourth quarter's activity was very strong, there are signs that the mini-boom is slowing.

Signs of weakness are showing up in the auto industry. Auto demand was very strong last year, but automakers are starting to trim production schedules as demand slows and as buyers get pickier and more reluctant to pay the high car prices the industry is asking." This will lead to rebates and other concessions.

### **GVSU Minority Student Groups Host Bone Marrow Drive**

On Tuesday, February 28, the Black Student Union, the Latino Student Union, the Asian/Pacific Islander Student Organization, the Native American Club, and other minority organizations at Grand Valley State University (GVSU), will collectively host a drive to locate possible donors of bone marrow for minority recipients.

Because bone marrow is ethnic-specific, minority participants are sought as possible donors to recipients of the same ethnic group.

All minorities in the Grand Rapids area are encouraged to visit the Kirkhof Center on the Allendale campus between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. to be tested. The free testing, conducted by the Grand Valley Blood Center, includes a routine blood test and is generally considered painless for most people.

Donald Williams, Sr., GVSU Dean of Minority Affairs, is co-chairman of the Kent County minority bone marrow drives. He says marrow donor drives bring hope to people like Grand Rapids resident Carol Stone-Williams, who suffers from leukemia, an often fatal blood disease. "If it were up to these student groups at Grand Valley, Carol would find her link to life," Williams said.

Figures from the 1994 National Marrow Donor Program show that of the 1.4 million volunteer donors in the National Registry, only a small percentage are minorities: 6.1 percent African American; six percent Hispanic; 4.4 percent Asian Pacific Islander, and 1.1 percent Native American.

Organizers hope the drive will help meet the urgent need for minorities to become registered. "This will be the first known drive of its kind in Michigan," said Sandra Jennings, co-organizer of the county-wide minority bone marrow drives. Jennings is employed in the GVSU Seidman School of Business.

If a person is found to match someone needing a transplant, the expense is then incurred by the patient, not the donor. For additional information regarding an eventual donation, contact Barbara Hile, Director of the Bone Marrow Program at the Grand Valley Blood Center, at: (616) 776-1896.

### Water Resources Institute Study Details Pesticide Use in the Grand River Watershed

According to a new report on pesticide use in the Grand River basin, Kent and Ottawa lead all other counties in the Grand River Watershed in pesticide application, using more than 1.2 million pounds of the active ingredients in insecticides, herbicides, and fungicides.

The report, published by the Water Resources Institute at Grand Valley State University (GVSU), was written by student research assistant, Matthew Hester. The *Atlas of Pesticide Usage Trends and Environmental Risk Potential in the Grand River Watershed* details pesticide usage in the Grand River Watershed, providing statistics and environmental risk information which, says Hester, should encourage change.

"Just in active ingredients, 3.6 million pounds of pesticide's active ingredients are applied to agricultural crops, golf courses, and lawns in the Grand River Watershed. Of that amount, 20-percent were used in Kent County alone," said Hester.

The Grand River Watershed is the state's second largest watershed, including parts of 14 counties within a 5,572-square mile area covering more than 3.5 million acres.

"Although the Grand River watershed represents just 13 percent of the total Lake Michigan drainage basin, it receives 22 percent of the total amount of pesticides used in that basin each year," says Hester.

The study notes that over half of the pesticides used in the watershed are applied to crops grown for livestock consumption and nearly one fifth of the pesticides are used for aesthetic purposes on golf courses, nursery crops, and lawns.

"My hope is that these figures will encourage farmers to be mindful of environmental impact when they choose their pesticides," said Hester. "I also hope it provides food for thought for homeowners beginning to stock up for spring lawn care with weed killers and fertilizers."

In addition to tabulating and identifying the amounts and types of pesticides used in the Grand River Watershed, Hester's report provides information on pesticides' chemical characteristics and their potential threat to the environment. This information, combined with land use characteristics, is formulated into a pesticide environmental risk factor that can be used in assessing current and future environmental impacts.

The report also points out the relationship between geographic and geologic factors that influence the environmental risk. Using the Geographic Information System (GIS, a computer database), the institute can create soil maps illustrating potential ground contamination and run-off.

"These maps identify areas with a high risk for ground or surface water contamination," says Hester. "We hope people in agriculture and other industries will make this service a part of their planning process."

She also appreciates the fact that her business education there will open many more doors for her in the U.S. than it would in her homeland, The People's Republic of China.

Born in Chang Chun, China, Ihrman, 28, says she always dreamed of completing her education in the U.S. One of three children, her father was a chief engineer and vice president of a machine company where her mother also worked. "My parents encouraged me to continue my education so I attended Northeast Normal University in Chang Chun." In 1989, she received her undergraduate degree in English Language. "Even after I graduated, I still wanted more knowledge," says Ihrman.

While in her first year of teaching at Northeast Normal following her graduation, she met a professor from Michigan, David Ihrman, who was conducting research at the Chinese university. The colleagues wed in China in February of 1991.

When David Ihrman completed his research, he proposed a move to west Michigan where he had previously taught at Grand Valley State University. She agreed and the couple settled in Holland.

Ihrman says her English speaking skills helped make the transition easier and she soon found work with international companies such as Herman Miller and Amway, serving as a translator and cultural consultant. Working with such companies, Huang Ihrman learned she enjoyed working in international business and decided to pursue a career in the field.

She quickly points out that in China, women still mostly have very traditional roles. More are working now, but women are, in effect, barred from the most desirable business positions. "There, business is still male-dominated," says Huang Ihrman.

"I had heard good things about the Seidman School of Business; that it had a good reputation," says Huang Ihrman. Upon enrolling at Grand Valley State this past Fall, test results enabled her to waive five required courses. Now in her second semester, she plans to graduate with a Master of Business Administration (M.B.A.) degree in the spring of 1996.

Huang Ihrman chose a marketing emphasis to compliment her bilingual skills. "My goal is to work in west Michigan for an international firm, helping them develop business in China. I can help them market themselves in China," she says.

In addition to the Holland Center, Huang Ihrman attends courses at the Allendale and Grand Rapids campuses. She enjoys her classes and says, "There is a close connection to faculty in the classroom and you also get to know them as a person, in addition to knowing them as a professor."

She also says she benefits from working as an assistant in the Seidman School of Business. "By working with the faculty, I really learn what the cutting-edge issues are in the business world." The 20-hour per week position is in addition to the four classes she is taking this semester.

Huang Ihrman concludes her ambitions are worthwhile. "I feel strongly motivated because I experienced a lot of difficulties as a professional woman in China. The Seidman School of Business gives me more confidence and I don't consider it as a hardship because the opportunities I face are well-worth the effort."

### **GVSU Hosts Eleventh Annual Science Olympiad**

Students from 66 west Michigan middle and high schools will expand their knowledge of science and mathematics during the Eleventh Annual Science Olympiad to be held at Grand Valley State University (GVSU) on Saturday, March 25, from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Fourteen-hundred students from Kent and Ottawa counties will take part in a variety of activities demonstrating science and mathematics principles. The events will be held at GVSU's Allendale campus and will be supervised by 50 GVSU faculty and other science professionals, all part of a team of more than 300 volunteers. Volunteers also include GVSU students, parents and teachers from participating schools, and industry representatives.

Mary Ann Sheline, director of the GVSU Science and Mathematics Center, says the events are designed to encourage practical applications of science and mathematics.

"Despite the rise of technology in the workplace, students still tend to think math and science are difficult subjects that are irrelevant," says Sheline. "Grand Valley has hosted this event for so many years because it's important for students to see that these subjects are important and can also be fun."

Each participating school may send a team of up to 15 students to compete in events such as the aerodynamics contest, in which teams compete to see if the device they design and build can stay aloft the longest. Other activities include trajectory contests in which teams design, build and calibrate devices to shoot rubber balls at targets. Another event, Write It--Do It, helps participants build communications skills. A team member prepares written instructions for the construction of an original device and his or her teammates attempt to build it.

Awards are given to individuals winning first through fifth place, and teams placing first through seventh. Winners will compete at the state level at Michigan State University on April 29, and winners there will proceed to the national competition at Indiana University on May 19 and 20.

Asked what is causing the fall of the U.S. dollar, Dimkoff says, "There is no one single event, and no one really knows for sure, but the dollar has fallen about 12 percent against the yen, and 20 percent against the German Mark." Dimkoff offers four factors that may affect the dollar.

"The Federal Reserve announced that interest rates may have peaked in the U.S. Global investors are, therefore, selling U.S. Treasury securities, thereby flooding the world with dollars, and buying German securities which raises the value of the German Mark."

Dimkoff points out that, "To slow inflation, Germany announced that it would be raising interest rates, making German securities even more attractive to global investors.

"A Federal Reserve governor told a Japanese news agency that the dollar hadn't fallen enough yet to be considered critical," says Dimkoff. "That was the message to currency traders; that the dollar would be falling more, causing them to bail out of dollars by selling them.

"The failure of the balanced budget amendment means continued trade deficits, putting downward pressure on the dollar."

Dimkoff also cites the relatively large outflow of U.S. dollars by U.S. investors buying foreign stocks as another factor in the dollar's decline.

Stage director, Roger Ellis, has assembled an artistic staff for the Transylvanian spectacular that is well-known to local audiences. Musical director Michael Shansky, of Ferris State University, will coach the vocals and play keyboards for performances. Shansky's music is heard regularly at the Hope Summer Repertory Theatre, the Actor's Theatre, Circle Theatre, and others. Mary Rademacher will serve as choreographer for *Dracula*. In October 1994, two-and-a-half years after the outbreak of war, Cardinal Puljic, together with Cardinal Maida of Detroit and 28 other dignitaries, was promoted to the College of Cardinals, the highest body of dignitaries in the Roman Catholic Church. Cardinal Puljic entered the priesthood in 1970. Nearly 20 years later, he was appointed Vice-Rector of the High Theological School of Vrhbosna in Sarajevo. ### **GVSU Honors Three Alumni During Commencement Ceremony**

A politician, a professor, and a planetary scientist will share the stage at Grand Valley State University's (GVSU) spring commencement ceremonies on Saturday, April 29 at the Allendale campus.

GVSU will honor the three alumni during the 29th annual spring commencement ceremonies. Daniel Balice, the mayor of Ionia, Julie Coon, a nursing professor, and Virgil Sharpton, a scientist, were selected as the 1995 Distinguished Alumni. Recipients are chosen on the basis of their contributions to society. The trio will also be honored on Friday, April 28 at the Distinguished Alumni Dinner, at the University Club in Grand Rapids.

Daniel Balice was elected Mayor of Ionia in 1989, the youngest Mayor ever elected in that city. Balice earned a bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice in 1982 and then attended Thomas M. Cooley Law School, Lansing, where he obtained his juris doctorate in 1985. He entered private practice in Ionia, and was elected alderman in 1987.

Julie Coon, an associate professor of Nursing at Ferris State University, was named the 1994 Michigan Teacher of the Year by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching. Recognized for her teaching skills, she has spoken on nursing education throughout the country. Coon received her bachelor's degree in Nursing in 1975 and completed a master's degree in Nursing at Wayne State University in 1982. The Lake City resident is currently a doctoral candidate in Educational Leadership at Western Michigan University.

Virgil L. Sharpton may be best known as the chief investigator of a crater in Mexico, which he believes is the site of impact of an asteroid so large that it caused climate changes leading to the extinction of dinosaurs. A scientist with the Lunar and Planetary Institute in Houston, Sharpton received a bachelor's degree in Geology from GVSU in 1975. He later earned Sc.M. and Ph.D. degrees in Geology from Brown University, completing a postdoctoral fellowship with the Geological Survey of Canada in 1986. A widely published expert on impact craters caused by asteroids, Sharpton has been interviewed by numerous media including newspapers, journals, and television stations. This spring, the Houston resident was asked to make presentations at the Carnegie Institute and the United Nations.

The Distinguished Alumni Awards are presented by Grand Valley each spring.

### **GVSU BOARD OF CONTROL ADOPTS CHARTER SCHOOL CRITERIA**

The Grand Valley State University Board of Control today adopted qualification criteria for use by the university in evaluating applications to GVSU from entities wishing to obtain a public school academy charter from the GVSU Board of Control.

The criteria were developed and approved by GVSU's Charter School Advisory Board, that was established nearly a year ago to advise the university on various aspects of the state's new charter school statute. The Board, chaired by Roger Martin of Steelcase, Inc., included educators, parents and citizens interested in the state's new charter law.

Under the criteria adopted today by the Board, applicants will follow a three-step process, beginning with the filing of an "Intent to Apply" document, that spells out the conceptual design of the proposed academy. Applications that appear to comply with the university's criteria will then be subjected to a detailed review of the charter school's instructional program and business plan. University staff will then forward its recommendation to the Board of Control for final disposition; entities receiving charter approval will then be required to enter into a formal contract with the university.

"Grand Valley's charter school criteria are distinguished by two elements in particular: first, that the Academy must develop innovative programs and materials that are transferable to other K-12 systems; and second that the Academy will be a site for GVSU teacher training and other pre-professionals in training to serve in public schools," said Judith S. Hooker, Chair of the GVSU Board of Control.

"As a result of today's action, the Board is now ready to receive and process applications for school charters. We expect to be able to take action on charter applications beginning with the Board's June meeting," Hooker concluded.

**QUALIFICATION CRITERIA**  
**FOR**  
**CHARTER SCHOOL APPLICANTS**

Under Michigan law, State supported universities such as Grand Valley State University, are given the opportunity to establish criteria by which they will judge applications for Charter status. This document defines the criteria GVSU requires of Charter School applicants.

The process of application and chartering calls for three steps:

1. The applicant will submit an "Intent to Apply" document providing specified directory information and the conceptual design of the Academy. Based on the qualification criteria, the Intent to Apply will be reviewed and accepted or rejected.
2. The applicant will complete a detailed application that will include the planned instructional program and business plan. Applications will be reviewed by University staff and recommendations made to the GVSU Board of Control.
3. If tentatively approved, the GVSU Board of Control will direct the University President to enter into a contract with the applicant to implement the charter.

## QUALIFICATION CRITERIA

### Assurances:

1. Applicants will provide statements of policy, handbooks, and Academy Board of Trustee bylaws demonstrating how the school will comply with State and Federal laws covering employment, civil rights, affirmative action, due process, family rights and privacy, open meetings, governmental accounting, and open enrollment.
2. The applicant will provide a marketing plan to recruit students that assures the following:
  - a. There is a commitment to establish a diverse student population representing demographics of the area.
  - b. Equal educational opportunity without regard to sex, ability, national origin, race, religion, creed, or locality within the State of Michigan.
  - c. A lottery plan, consistent with forming a diverse enrollment, will be established should student applications exceed space availability.
  - d. Michigan's School Code for pupil personnel accounting will be maintained.
  - e. Special student needs will be anticipated in the plan and included in the operation of the Academy.
  - f. Parent information and handouts will accurately represent the school program.

### Students:

1. The Student Handbook must be submitted with the application.
2. Prospective students and their parents must be informed of all policies defining student conduct, attendance and off-campus/on-campus responsibilities.
3. Students' rights to due process will be stated in the policies of the Academy Board of Trustees.

4. The school calendar and school day requirements will exceed minimums established by State Code. For 1995, GVSU will require 195 days of student instruction and a minimum of 990 hours per fiscal year.
5. Extra-curricular/co-curricular programs will meet all Civil Rights Title IX provisions. Such programs should be described and presented to GVSU, if and when planned.
6. Methods for maintaining student records and files will be defined.

**Governance:**

1. The Academy Board of Trustees will be directed by its bylaws, which must be submitted with the application.
2. The Academy mission statement and goals will be non-sectarian and ensure open enrollment.
3. The bylaws will be established assuring parent/guardian involvement in the decision-making process.
4. Meetings of the Academy Board of Trustees will occur monthly. Proceedings will be open to the public and comply with acceptable parliamentary procedures. Official minutes will be maintained and available for public review.
5. The membership number and terms of office will be determined on a "class" rotation with no less than five or more than nine members serving.
6. The Academy Board of Trustees must provide proof of liability, errors and omissions, workers compensation, and other necessary insurances according to the specifications of the University.

**Instruction:**

1. The Academy must develop innovative programs and materials that are transferable to other K-12 educational systems.
2. The Academy will be a site for GVSU teacher training and other pre-professionals in training to serve in public schools.

3. The instructional program must include:
  - a. Methods of instruction that hold promise but are not generally practiced and available to area students,

OR
  - b. An adaptation of a practice of education that holds promise due to a unique process or instructional configuration,

OR
  - c. Utilization of alternative processes, curricular application, or unique sites to serve as a catalyst for the educational experience.
4. The curriculum will equal or exceed the requirements for Michigan's Core Curriculum and High School "Endorsed Diploma." Involvement of business, industry, and higher education in formulating measurable standards for student achievement is encouraged.
5. Assessment of student achievement will include standardized testing administered periodically and coordinated with the curriculum program. GVSU requires use of the MEAP testing sequence and other PSA generated alternative assessments of student performance.
6. All texts must be multi-cultural and non-sectarian.

**Personnel:**

1. The Academy will utilize Equal Employment Opportunity practices.
2. All State certification codes applicable to Charter Schools and Public School Academies must be met.
3. Employee handbooks and work rules are required.
4. Employee records and background checks, including Michigan's criminal records review, will be maintained as described in the application.
5. Personnel from the Academy may be invited to serve as adjunct faculty to demonstrate unique elements of the educational program. A policy allowing GVSU to arrange for such service through the Academy Board of Trustees is required.

**Facility:**

1. GVSU requires that State of Michigan standards for health, fire, and safety are met and certified.
2. Barrier-free access and ADA standards must be met in all facilities.
3. The school facility must be appropriate for the instruction design.
4. The university requires that any move to another facility must be first approved by GVSU prior to seeking approvals from Health, Fire, Public Safety, and Building Department officials.

**Other Services:**

1. Describe the food service system. If student lunches are to be provided by the parent or guardian, an emergency provision plan must be included.
2. Describe the student transportation system. Any contracted student transportation services must be specified.
3. Define the process for review and retention of student health records, i.e., immunizations.
4. Systems of accounting, employee bonding, accounting services, liability insurance, errors and omissions, and comprehensive casualty must be addressed in the application.

**Funding:**

1. List expected start-up costs for the school. Identify funding sources for those expenses as received, pledged, or endowed.
2. Organizers' vitae must be provided.
3. A projected financial statement and first-year budget are required.

### **GVSU Board Takes Tuition Action for 1995-96: No New Fees, Tuition Increases at Inflation, GVSU Students/Families Eligible for New Tuition Tax Credit**

Parents and students paying Grand Valley State University tuition and fees learned today that GVSU is the first institution in Michigan to take action qualifying them for eligibility under the state's new tuition tax credit act.

The Board of Control today adopted the proposal of GVSU President Arend D. Lubbers to increase tuition and fees by 2.6 percent for the 1995-96 school year, a rate that is equal to the rate of inflation. This puts GVSU into compliance with Public Act 7 of 1995, which authorizes a Michigan income tax credit for a portion of tuition and fee payments made by or on behalf of a student attending an institution that holds its tuition increase at the rate of inflation. Under the plan, existing mandatory fees will remain at their present levels and no new fees are being added.

"Tuition and fees that are as low as possible is a tenet of Grand Valley's mission," said Judith S. Hooker, chair of the GVSU Board of Control, noting that of Michigan's 15 public universities, only one charges a rate lower than GVSU. GVSU also receives the lowest per student appropriation.

Under the new rates, GVSU undergraduates who are Michigan residents will see tuition and fees move from \$3,030 in the current year to \$3,108 in the 1995-96 academic year. This is the rate paid by full-time students enrolled for 12 to 16 credit hours. Out-of-state students pay a rate double that charged to Michigan residents.

"My recommendation to the Board was in keeping with our university's philosophy of providing the best possible higher education at the lowest possible cost," President Lubbers said. "I'm sure that our students and their families will appreciate the new tax benefit the state has made possible," Lubbers added. "I also think students will appreciate the fact that my recommendation included no new fees and no increases in existing fees," he concluded.

# **ENROLLED SENATE BILL No. 237**

AN ACT to amend Act No. 281 of the Public Acts of 1967, entitled "An act to meet deficiencies in state funds by providing for the imposition, levy, computation, collection, assessment, and enforcement by lien and otherwise of taxes on or measured by net income; to prescribe the manner and time of making reports and paying the taxes, and the functions of public officers and others as to the taxes; to permit the inspection of the records of taxpayers; to provide for interest and penalties on unpaid taxes; to provide exemptions, credits and refunds of the taxes; to prescribe penalties for the violation of this act; to provide an appropriation; and to repeal certain acts and parts of acts," as amended, being sections 206.1 to 206.532 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, by adding section 274.

*The People of the State of Michigan enact:*

Section 1. Act No. 281 of the Public Acts of 1967, as amended, being sections 206.1 to 206.532 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, is amended by adding section 274 to read as follows:

Sec. 274. (1) For the 1995 tax year and each tax year after the 1995 tax year and subject to the limitations in this section, a claimant who has household income of \$200,000.00 or less and who is a resident of this state may claim a credit against the tax due under this act for fees uniformly required to be paid by all students and tuition paid by the claimant on behalf of the claimant or any other student to a qualified institution of higher learning.

(2) A claimant may claim a credit under this section equal to 4% of the sum of all fees uniformly required to be paid by all students and tuition paid, not to exceed \$250.00 for each student for each tax year.

(3) A credit shall not be claimed under this section for more than 4 tax years for any 1 student.

(4) The credit under this section shall be claimed on a separate form exclusive of any other form required by this act.

(5) The department may require reasonable proof from the claimant in support of the fees and tuition payments claimed under this section.

(6) The department may promulgate rules pursuant to the administrative procedures act of 1969, Act No. 306 of the Public Acts of 1969, being sections 24.201 to 24.328 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

(7) The total amount of credits claimed for tuition and fees paid by or on behalf of any 1 student shall not exceed the maximum amount allowable under subsection (2).

(8) As used in this section:

(a) "Qualified institution of higher learning" means an institution that meets all of the following criteria:

(i) The institution meets the criteria for an institution of higher learning under section 260.

(ii) The institution is located in this state.

(iii) The instructional programs of the institution are not comprised solely of sectarian instruction or religious worship.

(iv) The institution has provided a letter of notification to the state treasurer before July 1 of the tax year that states that the institution will not increase tuition rates during the ensuing academic year by more than the annual average percentage increase in the United States consumer price index in the immediately preceding tax year.

(b) "Tuition" means tuition paid for credits for an undergraduate degree program or credits granted by a community college toward a degree program or granted for the purpose of transferring those credits toward an undergraduate degree program less any refunds of tuition received by the claimant or student.

(c) "United States consumer price index" means the United States consumer price index for all urban consumers as defined and reported by the United States department of labor, bureau of labor statistics, and as certified by the state treasurer.

Section 2. This amendatory act shall not take effect unless all of the following bills of the 88th Legislature are enacted into law:

(a) Senate Bill No. 233.

(b) House Bill No. 4233.

This act is ordered to take immediate effect.

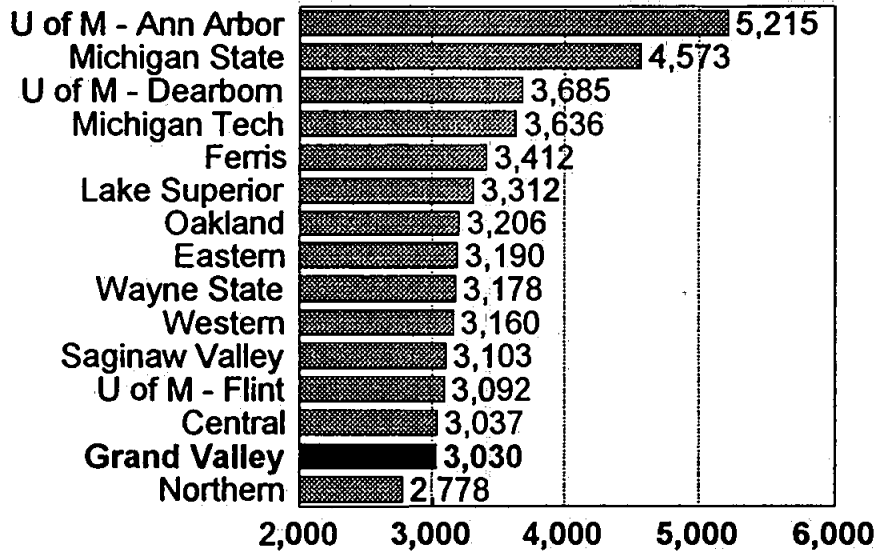

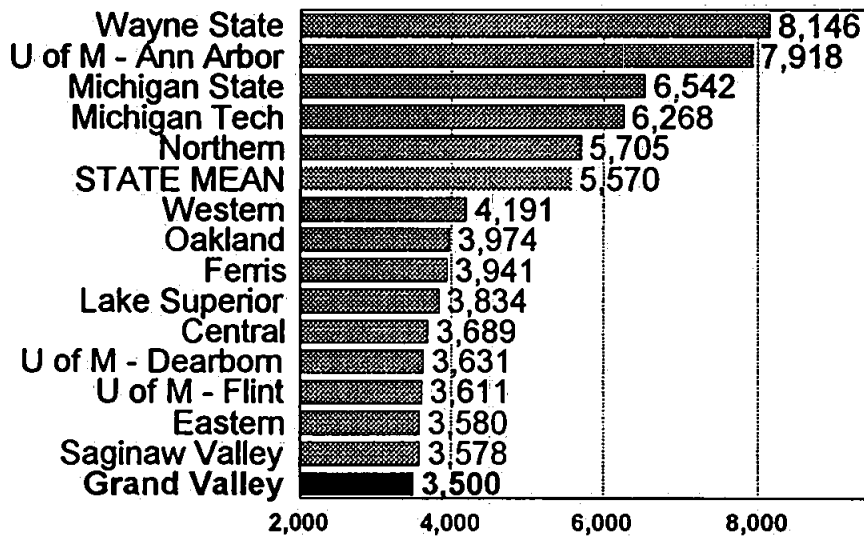
## University Tuition & Fees, 1994-95

### **GVSU Faculty and Students Honored**

Two Grand Valley State University (GVSU) faculty members, Lois Tyson and Shirley T. Fleischmann, and two GVSU students, Wendy Looman and Robert Cichewicz, II, were honored by the Michigan Association of Governing Boards of State Universities in East Lansing on April 5.

Tyson joined GVSU as an assistant professor of English in 1989. In 1994, she received the Outstanding Teacher award in recognition of her teaching excellence at GVSU. Her first book *Psychological Politics of the American Dream: The Commodification of Subjectivity in Twentieth Century American Literature*, was published in 1994.

Shirley T. Fleischmann joined GVSU in 1989 as an associate professor of Engineering. The published author of more than a dozen articles on mechanical engineering and engineering education, Fleischmann received the Michigan Society of Professional Engineers 1993 Joint Practice Award for her work on developing curriculum for a project titled "Design for Recycling." The project encourages students to develop environmentally responsible designs. In 1994, Fleischmann received an honorable mention from the American Society of Mechanical Engineers for "Innovations in Mechanical Engineering Curricula for the 1990's," which provides engineering instructors with sample classroom projects.

Wendy Looman, of Wyoming, anticipates receiving her bachelor of science in Nursing in December. Looman is a GVSU Presidential Scholar, a member of the Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society and the Sigma Theta Tau International Nursing Honor Society. She is also on the university's dean's list, which requires full-time students to maintain a minimum 3.5 grade point average.

Looman was recently named the recipient of the Fuld Institute's 1995 Fuld Fellowship, a financial award which enabled her to attend a recent national nursing convention and which will permit Looman to attend an international nursing conference in Great Britain in July. During the summer of 1994, Looman served as an intern in neurosurgery at the famed Mayo Clinic. Currently, Looman serves as a Parent Assistant with the Ottawa County Association for the Rights of Citizens, providing respite care for special needs children. She also serves as an active advocate for special needs children.

Robert Cichewicz, II received his bachelor of science degrees in biology and anthropology at the conclusion of the fall 1994 semester. While attending Grand Valley, Cichewicz received the Presidential, Daniel Kemp Memorial, and Koch Memorial scholarships. Cichewicz also received the GVSU Science and Mathematics Division Summer Undergraduate Research Award. He co-founded a Grand Valley Chapter of the Beta Beta Beta National Biological Society. Cichewicz is actively involved in a number of conservation projects, and has worked with the Muskegon and Grand Rapids public museums.

Grand Valley State University President Arend D. Lubbers said today that institutions of higher education must learn to do more for their students even as they strive to make college more affordable.

President Lubbers made his comments at a hearing of the Senate Higher Education subcommittee, held Friday morning at the campus of Lake Superior State University in Sault Ste. Marie. The subcommittee consists of Senators John Schwarz (R-Battle Creek), Jon Cisky (R-Saginaw) and Donald Koivisto (D-Ironwood).

"1995 is bringing change to some long-held notions in higher education," Lubbers told the senators. "Tuition hikes at inflation or less, wage restraint, increased productivity, improved student services and a renewed emphasis on teaching excellence are guiding principles at Grand Valley State University. A philosophy of putting the student first is not always the most popular idea in every campus constituency. But it is my philosophy. And it is the right thing to do," Lubbers said.

GVSU was the first institution to officially comply with the state's new tuition tax credit act (PA 7 of 1995) when, on April 28 the GVSU Board of Control voted to increase the school's 1995-96 tuition rate by 2.6 percent. This is the rate that the state of Michigan has said will permit eligible students and their families to claim the new credit. GVSU's total tuition and fee rate is Michigan's second lowest, with full-time Michigan resident students currently paying \$3,037 for two semesters of study.

Grand Valley State, with its main campus in the Ottawa County community of Allendale, enrolls 13,553 students and is the state's seventh largest public university. GVSU grants bachelor's and master's degrees in 77 program areas. GVSU also operates a campus in Grand Rapids and continuing education centers in Holland, Muskegon and Traverse City. GVSU also offers selected courses by satellite television to dozens of Michigan cities including several in the Upper Peninsula.

### **Former CIA Director Gates to Address GVV Foundation Luncheon; Hayes and Scanlon Named Recipients of Foundation's 1995 Leadership Awards**

Former Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) Director Robert M. Gates will be the featured speaker at the Grand Valley University Foundation All Members Luncheon at 12 noon on Thursday, May 25.

Gates, who served in intelligence posts under six presidents, capped his 27-year career as the Bush Administration's CIA Director from 1991 to 1993. He is the only person to rise from entry-level employee to the post of director. Gates' luncheon address will focus on global realities and international trade. Gates will be introduced by Peter F. Secchia, former U.S. Ambassador to Italy, who served with him during the Bush Administration.

Immediately prior to Gates' remarks, the GVV Foundation will present its 1995 Leadership Award to Doyle A. Hayes, president and CEO of Pyper Products Corporation, and Mary Scanlon, regional president of Comerica Bank.

The Foundation established the award to honor young leaders for their commitment to public service, economic development, educational and cultural enrichment, and whose ethical standards and integrity have contributed significantly to the quality of life in west Michigan.

"This GVV Foundation Luncheon is a special time to honor some of our younger leaders, and we are pleased to recognize Doyle and Mary for their work and accomplishments," said Richard M. DeVos, president of the GVV Foundation. "Robert Gates is a fascinating speaker who witnessed the end of the Cold War first-hand and who has special insights on the new world economy."

Hayes, of Grand Rapids, held three consecutive vice presidential posts at Diesel Technology Company in Wyoming before becoming president and CEO of Pyper Products Corporation in Battle Creek in January. Prior to joining Diesel Technology, Hayes worked for the Rochester Products Division of General Motors from 1969 to 1988.

Hayes has been actively involved with many community organizations, including: United Way; Grand Rapids Area Chamber of Commerce; Grand Action Committee; Student Advancement

Foundation; Public Education Fund; Research and Technology Institute of West Michigan; YMCA; West Michigan Public Broadcasting; and Project Rehab.

Hayes was appointed to Gov. Engler's Workforce Commission in 1993 and was the 1995 Seidman Alumnus-in-Residence at Grand Valley, where he is also a member of the GVSU Alumni Advisory Cabinet and a former adjunct professor. He is a trustee of the GVV Foundation and a member of FMB's corporate board.

Scanlon, of East Grand Rapids, joined Comerica Bank in 1982 and became regional president in 1988. Prior to joining Comerica, she was with Union Bank, now NBD. She entered the banking industry in 1969.

In addition to her banking career, Scanlon has been actively involved with many community organizations, including the Grand Rapids Symphony, the GVSU Seidman School of Business and the Grand Rapids Economics Club. A member of the Downtown Rotary Club, she also serves as operations liaison for the finance committee of the Grand Rapids Area Chamber of Commerce. She is honorary co-chair of Habitat for Humanity: Women Building the Dream. She led her bank into an education partnership with East Leonard Elementary School. Scanlon also brought to Grand Rapids the services of the Local Initiatives Support Corporation, a national urban redevelopment agency. In 1988, Scanlon received the Grand Rapids Area Jaycees Distinguished Service Award, the only woman honoree in the award's 64-year history.

Previous recipients of the GVV Leadership Awards, which began in 1989, include: Hank Meijer, Kyle Smith Irwin, Kate Pew Wolters, Fred P. Keller, Donna K. Brooks, and John C. Kennedy.

Students, alumni, and directors of federal TRIO projects will use a **Thursday morning news conference** to call on Washington to save the program that helps low income Americans prepare for and succeed in college. TRIO has been targeted for elimination in the federal budget bill before the U.S. House this week.

TRIO was established as part of the 1960s War on Poverty. Its programs identify potential college students, as early as the 8th grade, from low income families that have never sent anyone to college. TRIO programs provide these students with guidance and support to help them overcome class, social, academic, and cultural barriers to higher education. TRIO is not a financial aid program.

## TRIO PROGRAMS AT A GLANCE

**UPWARD BOUND** helps young people and adults prepare for higher education. Participants receive instruction in literature, composition, foreign languages, mathematics, and science on college campuses after school, on Saturdays, and during the summer. Currently, 579 programs are in operation throughout the United States.

**STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES** helps students to stay in college until they earn their baccalaureate degree. Participants, who include disabled college students, receive tutoring, counseling, and instruction. Students are now being served at over 700 colleges and universities nationwide.

**TALENT SEARCH** programs serve young people in grades six through twelve. In addition to counseling, participants receive information about college admissions requirements, scholarships, and various student financial aid programs. This early intervention program helps young people to better understand their educational opportunities and options. Over 310,000 Americans are enrolled in 312 Talent Search TRIO programs.

**EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY CENTERS**, located throughout the country, primarily serve displaced or under-employed workers. These Centers help people to choose a college and a suitable financial aid program. There are over 70 Educational Opportunity Centers in America.

**RONALD E. McNAIR POST-BACCALAUREATE ACHIEVEMENT** programs encourage low-income and minority undergraduates to consider careers in college teaching as well as prepare for doctoral study. Named in honor of the astronaut who died in the 1986 space-shuttle explosion, students who participate in this program are provided with research opportunities and faculty mentors.

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As Congress is seeking to build a real opportunity society in America, federal programs like TRIO, that enable poor people to finish high school, enter college and succeed academically must be expanded significantly.

### **GVSU Water Resources Institute Completes Manual to Help Businesses Comply With Air Quality Regulations**

West Michigan business and industry owners have a new resource to help them understand state and federal air quality regulations.

The Water Resources Institute (WRI) at Grand Valley State University (GVSU) has published *The Michigan Air Use Permit Technical Manual*, in cooperation with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

A reference for use in compliance with air quality permit regulations, the manual compliments WRI's first air quality publication, *Michigan Guide to Air Use Permits to Install*.

"The technical manual was produced under the supervision of a steering committee comprised of representatives of business and industry, government, and environmental organizations," said Janet Vail, Water Resources Institute research associate and publication editor.

"The manual includes information such as federal air quality standards, Michigan air quality regulations, emissions calculations, guidelines for stack sampling and emissions monitoring."

The *Technical Manual* was reviewed by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR), trade organizations and industries, and is endorsed by the DNR.

Copies of the manual are available from WRI for a fee. The fee includes the cost of updates WRI may issue through 1997. After 1997, the Michigan Clean Air Small Business Assistance program is planning to issue further updates.

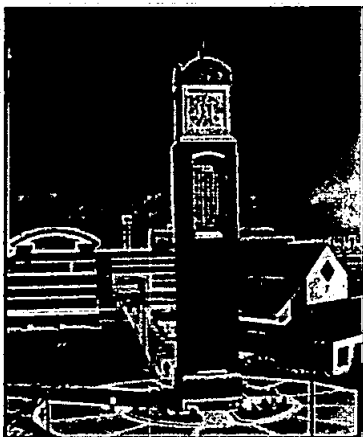

### **Carillon Rings in Free Summer Concert Series at GVSU**



West Michigan's newest jewel, the Cook Carillon at Grand Valley State University, will be performed in a series of free evening concerts on GVSU's Allendale Campus. Concerts are scheduled for every Sunday at 7:30 p.m. through August.

Each week's concert will feature a different west Michigan musician, trained on the Cook Carillon, performing a range of selections on the 48-bell instrument.

While carillons were first built in the Middle Ages, the Cook Carillon at Grand Valley is the first instrument of its kind in west Michigan. Its bronze bells were custom-cast in the Netherlands.

Each is carefully tuned to a different note on the musical scale. The carillon is performed by striking levers connected to cables that control the clappers inside the bells. All this takes place high inside the 10-story tower that rises over the campus.

Concert-goers should bring lawnchairs and blankets and sit on the grounds surrounding the tower. They will also be encouraged to explore the many new features of the GVSU Campus, including the \$41-million Science Complex.

The Grand Valley campus is in Allendale, on Lake Michigan Drive.



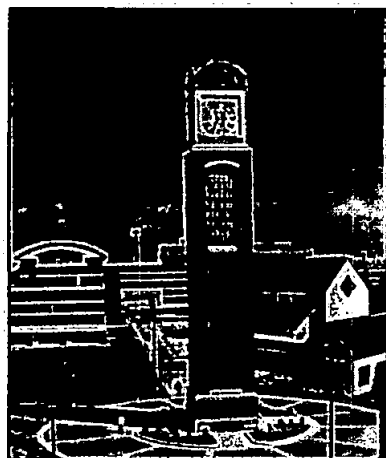

### **Guest Relations Are "Grand" at The Homestead Resort**

When Jamie Jewell began a Grand Valley State University (GVSU) internship at the Homestead Resort in 1987, she was certain she wanted a career in hotel and restaurant management. Her focus, her studies and her hard work paid off, as Jewell later landed a fulltime position with the top flight resort.

Now The Homestead's front office manager, Jewell employs a GVSU intern to whom she passes on her advice on dealing with hundreds of guests and their unique requests.

A 1991 graduate of the GVSU Hospitality and Tourism Management program, Jewell loves her work and her Glen Arbor location. However, managing the nerve center of the posh resort, site of some 500 condominiums and 75 hotel-style accommodations, is not always easy.

"If I weren't prepared for this career, there are some days that would be difficult," says Jewell. "But between the classes I took at Grand Valley, the internship I had here, and the help of my Homestead co-workers, I manage to handle just about everything that comes up."

This summer, she has the opportunity to pass on her guest relations acumen to Adam Considine of Orchard Lake, Michigan. Adam is the cooperative education student Jewell employs. A senior this fall in the Hospitality and Tourism Management (HTM) program at GVSU, Considine is working at the front desk, learning guest relations skills while getting a good overall perspective of resort management.

"I've already learned a lot," says Considine. "It's not always as easy as it looks." Considine began his position in May and will work through August, returning to GVSU for the fall semester. He says he hopes to find employment with a Traverse City area resort following graduation, and to one day own and operate a resort.

Grand Valley State will help many more students find practical experience with the resorts in the Traverse Bay area. The university will offer the first course in the HTM degree sequence in Traverse City this fall. "Hospitality and Tourism Systems" will be offered on the Northwestern Michigan College (NMC) campus for those working toward a degree, or those who simply wish to take a certain course.

"The hospitality industry is a growth industry in this part of Michigan, so we're offering a program that equips people for management positions in the business," says Gary Page, chairman of GVSU's HTM Department.

"We have been blessed with a good working relationship with the resorts. We hope to build on it and continue it. GVSU has also had a program with NMC for years. Hotel and restaurant management majors have been able to transfer to GVSU to complete their bachelor's degree in hospitality and tourism management. Now, we are able to bring our courses and degree program into Traverse City so people with an associate's degree can work toward their bachelor's, essentially without leaving the area or interrupting a career," said Page.

### **Comment on U.S. trade sanctions against Japan**

**Bennett Rudolph

**Bennett Rudolph, GVSU professor of Marketing in the Seidman School of Business, holds a Ph.D. in marketing and teaches international marketing at GVSU. A columnist and talk-show co-host, Rudolph can provide interesting insights on the trade sanctions the U.S. will likely impose on Japan.**

Rudolph believes the trade sanctions are most important for their symbolic value. "Once the U.S. starts a trade war, it tends to escalate. When you do this unilaterally, it can escalate because the Japanese will retaliate," says Rudolph. "It's not so important for the items covered by the sanctions, but more important will be the Japanese response."

"The next thing we'll see is a list of U.S. products they'll ban, and just like we did, they will pick those products (to embargo) that will be most harmful to us."

"Everyone wants to avoid this; the question is how. We're demanding open markets and that specific quotas of U.S. products be bought."

Rudolph notes that while the U.S. is implementing these sanctions, the Japanese point out that Europeans are selling cars there under higher tariffs and therefore the market is not closed.

Europe, observes Rudolph, has been successful in selling cars there because they have a distribution system set up there and U.S. automakers do not.

"This is why Chrysler is buying a dealership there," says Rudolph. "In addition, their culture is a very loyal one. Car dealers will not carry other products. Our major problem is that we don't have dealerships there."

### **GVSU's Rising Star Camp Helps Young People With Learning Disabilities**

Learning disabled young people from across the country are at the thirteenth annual Rising Star Camp on the Allendale campus of Grand Valley State University (GVSU).

The six-week camp, which began June 19, is for kindergarten through eleventh grade students (ages 6 - 17) and is co-sponsored by the Lake Michigan Academy. Directed by James O. Grant, professor of Education at GVSU, the camp offers an instructional program for each student based on individual needs. The instruction is intended to improve participants' academic and organizational skills, increase self-esteem and confidence, and improve social skills.

"Our main goal is to improve the students' reading, writing, and speaking abilities," said Grant. "Because of their difficulties, communicating is often awkward or uncomfortable, so we also help them learn to interact with others more effectively."

In addition to individual tutoring sessions and reading periods, there are computer, science, physical education, geography, mathematics, and art classes. Students at the camp are supervised throughout the day by 31 teachers who are also GVSU graduate students pursuing an endorsement in learning disabilities under the supervision of Professor Grant. Additionally, certified teachers help supervise recreational programs.

Students under 10 years of age may commute to the campus each day, while those over 10 may stay in university residence halls under the supervision of "house parents."

"Coordinating programs for more than 100 kids in all different age groups is challenging, but when I see the difference the camp makes, it's all worthwhile," says Grant.

### Record Number Attends GVSU This Summer

Grand Valley State University (GVSU) reached a record enrollment of 6,151 students for the 1995 Spring/Summer session, a 9.8 percent increase from last summer. "Grand Valley has been the state's fastest growing university for many years and this session's record enrollment shows that the trend continues," said Lynn M. Blue, GVSU Registrar. "Our gains are significant because they are spread over different class levels, indicating that Grand Valley is successfully fulfilling the educational needs of a broad variety of students."

Blue noted that the largest increase, almost 46 percent, was in the number of freshmen enrolled. The number of juniors increased by 21 percent, and the number of graduate students increased by 18 percent.

Many of the record number of summer students were among the first to visit the university's new one-stop Student Services wing in the new Science Complex. The area features a Student Assistance Center, which offers student record, registration, and cashiering services. It also includes the Admissions, Dean of Students, International Affairs, Financial Aid, Career Services, and Housing offices. The Career Planning and Counseling Center and the Office of Academic Resources and Special Programs are also located in the Student Services area.

The rest of the Science Complex is being completed in stages. A portion of the East Wing is already open and Henry Hall will open in time for the fall semester. The rest of the Complex is expected to be completed in December, at which time the entire \$41 million complex is to be occupied.

Other developments on the Allendale campus include an addition and renovations to the Fieldhouse, construction of a new child care center, and improvements to campus walkways and grounds.

"While we believe students returning in the fall will enjoy Grand Valley's new look, they will also find that the high quality of our faculty and programs remain the same," concluded Blue.

### **GVSU's Focus on Ability Challenges Gifted and Talented Young People**

More than 300 gifted and talented students from west Michigan are participating in the fifteenth annual Focus on Ability Program on the Allendale campus of Grand Valley State University (GVSU).

The three-week program, which began July 10, is for first-through-eighth grade students who have demonstrated a strong interest in learning, and who are gifted and talented in one or more areas of study. The program is conducted Monday through Thursday from 8:45-11:45 a.m.

"We don't require prior participation in programs for gifted or talented students," said Dorothy Armstrong, program director and GVSU professor of Education. "But we limit the enrollment to students who will participate in creating the learning experience for both themselves and their groups."

Focus on Ability offers participants the chance to explore a topic or topics of strong personal interest through guided and self-directed study. Participants are divided into interest groups and activities are designed to foster creative and critical thinking skills. While interacting with other high-ability students with similar interests, the participants are able to use tools and approaches not usually found in their regular school curriculum. Additionally, the Focus on Ability faculty are experienced teachers who have a particular interest in working with gifted and talented students.

"Every year we have a waiting list for this program so we know that there are a number of young people who enjoy the intellectual challenge this program provides," said Armstrong. The cost for the program is \$135 and a limited number of need-based scholarships are available. ### **GVSU Professor Elected as Chairman of the Michigan Humanities Council**

Milton Ford, Grand Valley State University (GVSU) professor of English, has been elected as chairman of the Michigan Humanities Council. The Jenison resident was elected at the organization's spring meeting in Lansing. Ford will lead the council for two years. He has worked with the Grand Rapids Area Council for the Humanities since 1981 and with the Michigan Humanities Council since 1991.

Ford joined GVSU as an assistant professor of English in 1973. In 1975, he was promoted to associate professor, and helped develop the advertising and public relations program. From 1976-79, he served as the director of curriculum development and directed a grant involving GVSU and 16 community colleges. He also coordinated a Michigan Department of Education Applied Studies Program for community college graduates with occupational degrees. He was promoted to professor of English in 1982. From 1991-94, he served as chairman of the GVSU Department of English.

Ford is perhaps best known for his book "*Life Journey: Literature and the Search for Meaning in the Stages of Life*," which serves as the basis for a series of three-to-five-week public seminars led by him. Sponsored by the Grand Rapids Area Council for the Humanities, The Grand Rapids Public Library and the Michigan Humanities Council, the seminars have been offered periodically since 1988.

Ford holds a bachelor's degree in English from Oklahoma Baptist University and a Master of Divinity degree from the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. Ford also has a master's degree in English from the University of Missouri at Kansas City, and a Ph.D. in English from Oklahoma State University. He was ordained to the ministry in 1967.

Since its founding in 1974 as Michigan's affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities, the Michigan Humanities Council has pursued its statewide work through public programs, resource distribution, grant-making, and publications to foster public understanding of the role the humanities play in enriching the lives of Michigan residents and the broader world.

The goal of the GVSU-Japan Summer Language and Culture Program is to improve cross-cultural communications, promote greater U.S.-Japan cooperation, and increase awareness of global environmental issues by bringing the students together.

### GRAND VALLEY STATE NAMES BUILDING, ENGINEERING SCHOOL FOR SEYMOUR AND ESTHER PADNOS

The School of Engineering and a new science building at Grand Valley State University will be named in honor of Seymour and Esther Padnos of Holland. The designations, which are effective immediately, were announced today on behalf of the GVSU Board of Control by Grand Valley President Arend D. Soljan also finds little encouragement from NATO discussion regarding lifting the arms embargo. "Lifting the arms embargo has been a topic of discussion for a year and a half."

### **GVSU Master's Program in Public Administration Receives Accreditation**

Grand Valley State University's (GVSU) Master of Public Administration Program has received accreditation from the National Association of Schools of Public Affairs and Public Administration (NASPAA).

The seven-year accreditation by the Commission on Peer Review and Accreditation for NASPAA was announced by Eleanor French, Director of the GVSU School of Public Administration.

"We are delighted that the program has received this important recognition," said French. "The Commission also commended the school for its efforts to focus on its mission and on approaches to achieving excellence in Public Affairs Education."

Grand Valley's School of Public Administration is one of 12 public administration programs at Michigan universities. Only four programs have pursued accreditation. Nationwide, of 205 NASPAA member institutions, only 124 are accredited.

"The accreditation is most important to our students and their current and future employers," said French. "It affirms the high quality and comprehensive nature of the program."

The accreditation process required GVSU to submit a detailed report on the program, followed by a three day visit by a NASPAA team. The NASPAA representatives interviewed students, faculty, advisory board members and administrators, and reviewed university and program resources such as the university's library and computer technologies.

Established in 1990, the School of Public Administration offers master's degrees in three areas: Public Management, Health Administration, and Nonprofit Management and Leadership. Previously, Public Administration Programs were offered through the Department of Social Thought and Public Affairs.

### Fremont Area Foundation's \$50,000 Gift Boosts GVSU's Campaign for Second Research Vessel

Grand Valley State University (GVSU) has announced that the Fremont Area Foundation has given the university a \$50,000 gift to help it purchase a second research vessel, the *W. G. Jackson*, which will be based in Muskegon.

Foundation Executive Director Elizabeth Cherin, said "An important part of our mission is ensuring that the people of Newaygo County have quality educational opportunities. We are happy to help Grand Valley State build the *W.G. Jackson* because it will provide unique educational opportunities for so many."

The proposed vessel will serve as a floating university laboratory and classroom, conducting research and public education cruises, including many cruises for west Michigan schoolchildren.

"This generous gift means that students in Newaygo County will soon have access to the University's new vessel and our onboard instructors," said GVSU President Arend D. Lubbers. "This hands-on education will make science come alive for young learners."

The \$50,000 gift brings the "Making Waves" campaign closer to its goal of \$1.6 million. Roger Andersen, co-chair of the fundraising effort, said "We are very pleased to see the Fremont Area Foundation become a part of this effort, as we near the end of our campaign. Both Muskegon and the Fremont area have much to gain from cooperating in this effort to strengthen science education in our communities."

Bids for construction of the vessel are now being received, and a construction contract will be awarded in early fall. The *W.G. Jackson* is expected to begin its first season in the spring of 1996.

The *W.G. Jackson* will be the second research vessel operated by GVSU's Water Resources Institute. The *D.J. Angus* will continue to conduct cruises from Grand Haven. Last year, 3,600 people participated in educational cruises aboard the *D. J. Angus*.

### Funding Raised for Second GVSU Research Vessel; Next Spring Launch Likely

Roger Andersen and Dr. William Schroeder, co-chairs of the volunteer fundraising campaign for the construction and operation of a Grand Valley State University (GVSU) research and education vessel, today announced the campaign is a success. The *Making Waves in Muskegon* committee has to date received more than 200 donations totaling \$1,602,000, surpassing the campaign goal of \$1.6 million.

"Thanks to the many Muskegon leaders who helped us, we will now be able to put science to sea for Muskegon area students," said GVSU President Arend D. Lubbers.

The planned 63- to 65-foot vessel will be operated by the GVSU Water Resources Institute, which will use the vessel as a floating laboratory and classroom. In addition to university classes and environmental research, the new vessel, the *W.G. Jackson*, will host cruises for schoolchildren, environmental and civic groups, and others interested in learning about our water resources.

"A major challenge grant from Dr. William G. and Kay Jackson was the nucleus and inspiration for the campaign's success. It resulted in tremendous support from a wide range of donors," said Schroeder. The vessel is named in honor of the Jacksons.

"Another major factor in our success was support from the State of Michigan, which Senator Leon Stille was instrumental in securing," said Andersen. "Our thanks also go to Pat Johnson, President of the Muskegon County Community Foundation, which was our partner in this home-grown effort to bring another university-based educational program to Muskegon." With the help of local contributors, the Foundation established an endowment fund to assist with the vessel's operation.

The community-wide fundraising effort resulted in state and county support, and private support from local and out-of-state corporations, foundations and individuals. Even young donors became involved, including high school students from the Muskegon County Community Foundation's Youth Advisory Council. Students from Muskegon's Steele Middle School donated proceeds from cans and bottles they collected.

With the campaign goal met, construction bids have been solicited from American and Canadian ship builders and six bids are currently being reviewed. A contract is expected to be issued within two months, pending a successful review.

The Water Resources Institute expects to launch the new vessel next spring and educational programs will begin in the summer. Initially, the *W.G. Jackson* will be docked at the Mart Dock in a slip contributed by West Michigan Dock and Market Corporation.

The *D. J. Angus*, the university's other vessel, will continue to conduct educational and research activities from its Grand Haven port.

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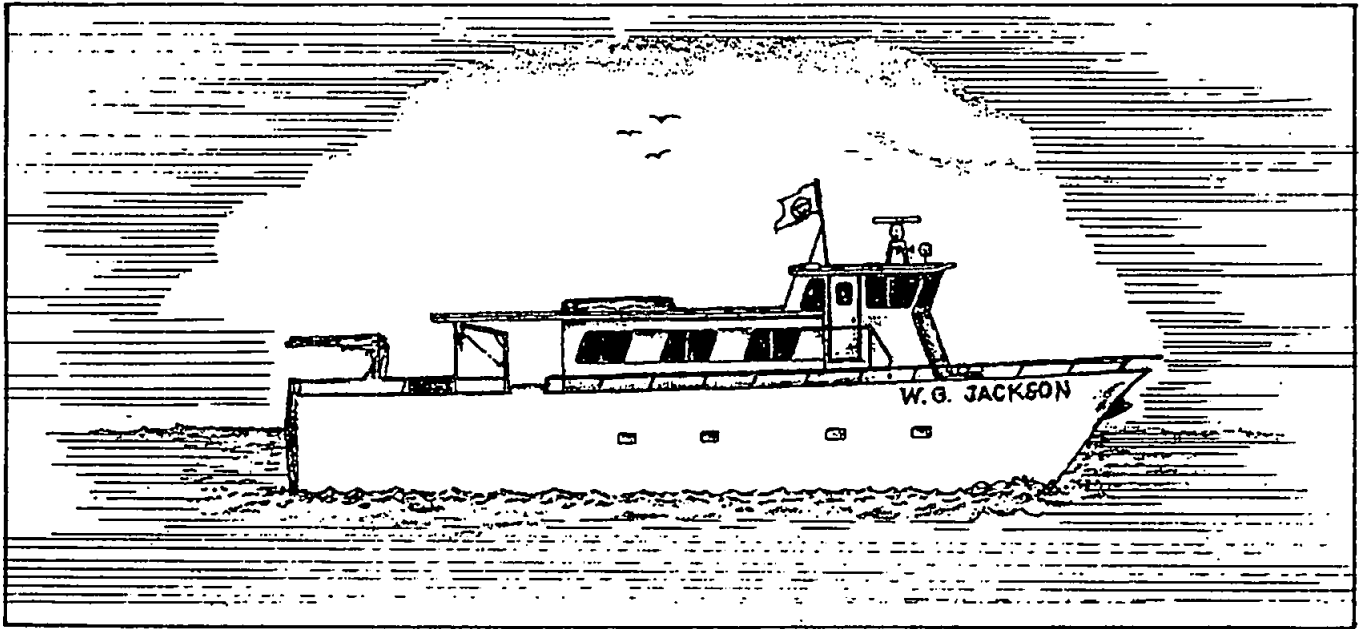

The 10-story carillon tower, housing 48 bronze bells cast in the Netherlands, is the first instrument of its kind in west Michigan. The carillon is played by striking levers connected to cables that control the clappers inside of the bells. The Cook Carillon Tower is adjacent to the Cook-DeWitt Center and near the new \$41 million Science Complex.

Those who attend the last two concerts can also tour Henry Hall in the Science Complex. The hall is named after the late Michigan Congressman Paul Henry, a one-time west Michigan educator who supported the sciences.

The first floor of Henry Hall includes six micro-computer labs, (with 24 new computers) and one interactive video classroom. The second and third floors are occupied by Physical Therapy and the Kirkhof School of Nursing offices and laboratories. The entire complex will be fully occupied by early 1996.

## **GVSU Professor to Serve as Program Director at the National Science Foundation**

Alverna Champion, a Grand Valley State University (GVSU) professor of Mathematics and Statistics, has been asked to serve as a visiting scientist at the National Science Foundation for two years.

Champion will serve as program director in the Instructional Materials Development Program at the prestigious foundation's national headquarters in Arlington, Virginia. Her duties will include developing goals, strategies and timetables for curriculum, as well as participating in the design and implementation of a review and evaluation process for elementary mathematics education. Champion will also have responsibility for projects leading to the development of instructional materials, which meet science and mathematics standards for content, teaching and assessment.

Champion joined the university in 1987 as an assistant professor of Mathematics. In 1990, she was promoted to associate professor, and in 1995 she was named professor. This year, she completed the Leadership Grand Rapids Training Program.

Champion will be on leave from GVSU beginning August 28.

### GVSU Dedicates State-of-the-Art Henry Hall

Hundreds of Grand Valley State University (GVSU) students, faculty, staff, and supporters gathered today on the Allendale campus for the opening of Henry Hall, part of GVSU's new \$41 million Science Complex.

"Today is a benchmark in Grand Valley's history," said GVSU President Arend D. Lubbers. "We are not only opening a magnificent facility, we are opening additional possibilities for more young people who will come here, learn, grow, and return to the community as teachers, scientists and healthcare professionals."

Named for the late U.S. Congressman from west Michigan, Paul Henry, Henry Hall houses the offices and laboratories of the Kirkhof School of Nursing, Physical Therapy Department, Physician's Assistant Studies, and the Occupational Therapy program. The first floor contains the university's largest lecture halls. Two lecture halls, each with a capacity of 150, flank a main hall which has a capacity of 300. All three acoustically-designed lecture halls feature state-of-the-art audio-video technology.

The building also houses six new computer classrooms with a total of 160 computers. Two are used mainly by Art and Communications students, three others are used by science and business students, and another is used by the Seymour and Esther Padnos School of Engineering.

In addition, students at locations around the state will get a glimpse of Henry Hall during courses based in the two-way interactive video classroom, which is also located on the first floor.

"As fast as we are growing, we had to have a new facility in order to maintain the high quality of our programs," said Douglas Kindschi, GVSU Dean of Mathematics and Science. "With many more students enrolling in programs in the healthcare professions and other sciences, our old facilities were overcrowded. The new building will also make possible full use of a wide array of the newest technologies."

The 62,532-square foot Hall is also where art meets science. Paintings, sculpture and a fountain adorn the lobby along with two large aquariums, a model of the DNA structure, a mineral and gem collection, and a gravity exhibit.

"It truly is a showcase," said Karen Henry, of the building named in honor of her late husband who was once a college professor. "It is fitting that in the facility bearing Paul's name, young people will develop knowledge, professionalism and compassion, the virtues Paul held among the highest."

Earlier, during a Fall Convocation Ceremony held in conjunction with the dedication, Paul Hillegonds, Speaker, Michigan House of Representatives, and Richard Posthumus, Majority Leader, Michigan Senate, were presented with honorary Doctor of Laws Degrees. The Convocation Ceremony was opened by Richard M. DeVos, Chairman of the GVU Foundation.

Henry Hall is located in the center of the Complex, which also houses the Student Services area and the Seymour and Esther Padnos Hall of Science. The Student Services area is completely occupied and the remaining portion of the Complex will be occupied in early 1996.

## **Bosnian GVSU Student Awaits Outcome of NATO Attacks**

As NATO bombing attacks on Serbs continue, halfway around the globe a Grand Valley State University student from Bosnia wonders about her family's safety and whether the latest attacks will lead to a solution.

Daniela Valenta [vah-LENT-ah], one of six Bosnian students at Grand Valley, says she telephones her family in Sarajevo whenever she can. She says there may be a new sense of hope in her home city that the Serbs will withdraw their weapons, but most people there still fear first that the Serbs will retaliate for the NATO strikes . . .

Valenta says her family tells her that Sarajevo today is like it was during the first year of the war — that most people stay off the streets and expect shelling at any time.

She says they say the streets are deserted and there's fear of Serb retaliation for the strikes against their weaponry.

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A record 13,887 students are enrolled at Grand Valley State University this fall, making this the 13th straight year of increases at GVSU, which has been Michigan's fastest growing public university for more than a decade.

"A record number of freshman came to Grand Valley this year, a 7 percent increase over last year," said Associate Provost Bob Fletcher. "We also had significant gains in the number of full-time students, up 4.1 percent."

"We believe all of these increases mean we are offering the right combination of degree programs and that students here find an unique campus atmosphere and a more personal education," said Fletcher.

Grand Valley's beautiful new \$41 million Science Complex greeted students this year. The complex includes a centralized student services wing, in which the Academic Services and Special Programs, Financial Aid, Admissions, International Affairs, Dean of Students, and Career Services offices are located, as are the Career Planning and Counseling Center and the Student Assistance Center.

A second wing, Henry Hall, dedicated on August 29, houses the Kirkhof School of Nursing, Physical Therapy Department, Physician's Assistant Studies, and Occupational Therapy Program. Henry Hall also contains state-of-the-art audio-video technology, making it a premier science and instructional facility.

A third wing, the Seymour and Esther Padnos Hall of Science, houses the Water Resources Institute, and the Physics, Geology, and Chemistry Departments, as well as the School of Health Sciences, Science and Math Center, and Science and Mathematics Dean's office. The Padnos Hall of Science is expected to be fully occupied by early 1996.

With more than 275,000 square feet, the Science Complex has increased Grand Valley's instructional space by nearly one third.

Another new campus attraction is the Fitness Center, a one-of-a-kind facility financed entirely by a fee GVSU students voted to assess on themselves. The building features state-of-the-art exercise equipment, an elevated running track, and complete intramural spaces, including basketball, volleyball, and badminton courts.

"Our goal is that such expansion of our facilities and academic programs, as well as the high quality faculty, match West Michigan's growing educational needs," said Fletcher. "Looking at this fall's numbers, I would say we are successfully filling those needs for a growing number of people."

### **GVSU Water Resources Institute and Alpine Township, Partners in Watershed Management**

Grand Valley State University's Water Resources Institute (WRI) has partnered with Alpine Charter Township in Kent County to provide a Watershed Management Decision Support System (DSS) to local officials. Developed by the WRI, this decision support mechanism is the first of its kind in Kent County.

The DSS was developed as part of the York Creek Watershed Project, a cooperative effort between the Institute and the Township to evaluate the water and habitat quality in the York Creek watershed, implement best management practices, and begin restoration of the stream system.

The Decision Support System is based on computer software, that allows the user to combine many layers of geographic and municipal information and display it in a variety of forms, including maps of the spatial information. The primary function of the DSS is the incorporation of natural resources information into the land use planning process. The objective is to ensure that local officials are able to make the best informed decisions possible.

Among the more than 40 data layers provided through the DSS, are the following:

- 1963, 1978, 1991, and 1993 Land Use
- Soil Survey Information, such as soil type, septic field suitability, stormwater runoff values, susceptibility to erosion, and pesticide loss potential
- Domestic Water Wells
- Water Quality Sampling Results.

WRI is taking steps to expand the use of the DSS to other areas in west Michigan. For more information, call Ed Frye, Grand Valley State University Water Resources Institute at (616) 895-3749.

### *Romeo and Juliet* Hits the Boards for Shakespeare Festival

GVSU opens its second annual Shakespeare Festival September 22, presenting stage productions, blockbuster Hollywood films, Renaissance-style entertainment, and critical panels on the Bard through October 1. This will be Matt's first appearance on the University stage, while Erica has been seen in a number of GVSU shows, including last season's *A Midsummer Night's Dream* where she played the role of Puck. Theatre major Dan Kloosterman will portray the villainous Tybalt, with film student Scott Baisden as Friar Lawrence and honors student Rachel Wisley as Lady Capulet. Rachel was seen last spring in the role of Bubu Padoop in the University's production of *Dracula, the Musical*. Jaiman Fisher will play the role of Lord Capulet, Aaron Parker will be seen as the Apothecary, and GVSU alumni Jon Mull and Tony Snell are cast in the roles of the Prince and the singer at Capulet's ball.

The guest artists have been working with the student and alumni cast since mid-August when the acting company assembled to begin rehearsals.

Of particular interest to area schools are two special performances of the play with free admission for high school students and their teachers. A 10 a.m. midweek performance is scheduled for Wednesday, September 27; on Saturday, September 30, GVSU will hold its annual "Shakespeare Day" for students, teachers, and teacher aides. The day will include numerous workshops, a free luncheon for all participants, free matinee performance of *Romeo and Juliet*, and a "rap session" with the stage artists following the show.

Other forms of Renaissance-inspired theatrical entertainment will accompany the performances of *Romeo and Juliet*, and play key roles in the GVSU Shakespeare Festival. Guest artist Nancy Elizabeth Kammer will take to the boards on September 29 in a staged reading of some of the Bard's most famous women characters titled "Beauties, Bawds, and Bitches from Shakespeare." The regionally acclaimed Last Minute Improv will join in the celebration when the hilarious comedy troupe trashes the Bard in an adults-only show called *The Last Minute Improv Does Shakespeare* on Tuesday evening, September 26 at 8 p.m. For movie buffs, the Festival Film Series features three of the Bard's most famous plays in big screen adaptations. On Sunday evening, September 24, Sir Laurence Olivier's landmark 1944 production of *Henry the Fifth* will be shown at 7 p.m. The following evening at 7 p.m., September 25, the Festival will present Franco Zefirelli's version of *The Taming of the Shrew* with Sir Richard Burton and Elizabeth Taylor. The final offering of the film series will feature Mel Gibson and Glenn Close starring in *Hamlet*, which will be shown at 2 p.m. on September 28. All the films are followed by audience discussions with a panel of scholars and GVSU faculty, and refreshments will be served.

Audiences who wish to combine their cultural fare with culinary pleasures at the Festival will find much to satisfy them this year. Complimentary catered receptions for the public will follow the opening performance of *Romeo and Juliet* on September 22, as well as the numerous midweek critical presentations on September 26, 27, and 28. An Elizabethan "Boarshead Feast" with a floor show from the Utah Shakespeare Festival and door prizes will be held on September 23. A Sunday "Brunch with the Stars" is also planned for October 1 when Festival visitors can mingle with the acting company, the artists, and Festival staff prior to the matinee performance of *Romeo and Juliet*. "Feast and Romeo" or "Brunch and Romeo" dinner-theatre pricing are available for these latter two events.

Festival director Roger Ellis of the Theatre Communications program notes the greater regional impact of this year's events, only one year after the Festival's inception. "We're fielding more activities for local schools this year," he remarks, "and more opportunities for our own GVSU students." Public support for the Festival has also grown this year, with major sponsors like MichCon, Rogers Department Store, the Charlevoix Club, and others joining to celebrate the Bard and his times.

Reservations for the plays, the Last Minute Improv and the Boarshead Feast are strongly encouraged, and reservations for the special high school programs are required. A colorful Festival brochure, as well as ticketing arrangements and complete information on events, dates, and locations can be obtained by calling the Festival office in the University's School of Communications, 895-2699, during business hours.

### **Calder Gallery Features Work of Two Photographers**

The Calder Gallery at Grand Valley State University (GVSU) will exhibit the works of two photographers, Steve Nelson and Jan Ballard, beginning October 19. A slide presentation and gallery talk will be held at 2:30 p.m., followed by a reception from 4-7 p.m. The exhibit runs through November 22.

"Nelson produces some haunting images using the photogram, a primitive method of making an image without a negative by exposing briefly to light objects laid on photographic paper," said Tim Nowakowski, GVSU Calder Gallery Director. "Sometimes he combines the photograms with imagery drawn from negatives as when he has a ghostly set of hands fashioned into what looks like a church steeple superimposed over a black-and-white snap-shot of the simple house in which he was raised."

"Jan Ballard is similar to Nelson in that her work is a critique of photographs inherited from family albums," says Nowakowski. Ballard fuses computerized images of the photographs into a composite.

"She differs from Nelson in that her critique is motivated by the desire to expose gender stereotypes found in the way people arrange themselves or are arranged in front of the camera," adds Nowakowski.

The Calder Gallery is located on the Allendale campus of Grand Valley State University. All events are free of charge and the gallery is accessible. Gallery hours are Monday through Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m.-5 p.m., and Thursdays from 10 a.m.-7 p.m.

### GVSU Showcases One of Its Own

As she marks her milestone 30th year of teaching at Grand Valley State University, pianist Julianne VandenWyngaard will present a recital Friday, October 13 at 8 p.m. in the Louis Armstrong Theatre on the Allendale campus, featuring works by George Walker, Pietro Domenico Paradisi, Ludwig van Beethoven, and Felix Mendelssohn.

VandenWyngaard came to Grand Valley in 1965 as a part-time instructor, and joined the faculty full-time two years later. She has chaired the Music Department for the past 11 years.

"I don't think I could have predicted where the university has gone over these years. When I look around our campus today, I just marvel," VandenWyngaard said.



She said she gave her first recital when the campus included just four or five buildings. She performed on a baby grand piano in a building that has long since functioned solely as an office building.

VandenWyngaard has maintained a full teaching load over the years. She currently has 16 GVSU piano students.

During this past year, she has been a regular performer on the university's new carillon, housed in the 10-story Cook Carillon Tower. She has coordinated training for the many other west Michigan musicians who have been inspired to learn to play the instrument.

VandenWyngaard says her department has kept pace with the university's growth, particularly during the last 10 years, as GVSU has been Michigan's fastest growing university.

"The Music Department is right where I thought it should be – offering an excellent program that effectively readies students to become music educators or prepares them for graduate study," she added.

VandenWyngaard says her upcoming recital, for which she started preparing last winter, has provided her a chance to focus on what she loves most, piano performance. She said she's especially pleased to feature the work of George Walker, with whom she studied in 1993.

"He is a great African American composer whose work I have admired for many years," she said. His *Sonata No. 2*, which VandenWyngaard will perform, was composed as Walker's thesis composition at the Eastman Conservatory, in Rochester, New York, which is also VandenWyngaard's alma mater.

"His work is contemporary, so the listener cannot predict the outcome," she said. "Contemporary music requires that we leave 19th century expectations at the door. We won't leave whistling a Mozart melody. That's not to say Walker's work isn't melodic. It's not so esoteric that the audience is bored with it," she added.

Other works on VandenWyngaard's program are: *Paradisi's Sonate in A Major*; *Beethoven's Sonata Op. 2 No. 3*; and *Mendelssohn's Trio in D Minor, Op. 49*.

VandenWyngaard has performed with the Grand Rapids Symphony Orchestra under Theo Alcantara and Arthur Fiedler. She has also performed in the Netherlands.

The recital is open to the public free of charge. The Louis Armstrong Theatre is located in the Calder Fine Art Center. Parking is available in Lot G, across from the Kirkhof Center. For more information, call the GVSU Music Department at (616) 895-3484.

### Universities Conduct Conference to Offer Information on Charter Schools

Grand Valley State University (GVSU), Saginaw Valley State University (SVSU) and Central Michigan University (CMU) are hosting a two-day conference on charter schools to help lay groundwork for the development of 200 charter schools by the fall of 1996.

The conference, to be held at McGuire's Resort in Cadillac on November 2 and 3, will focus on the history of the charter school movement and the steps that must be taken to develop successful charter schools. The application procedures at GVSU, SVSU and CMU will be reviewed, and legal issues will also be discussed. A review of Michigan's three new chartered public schools will also be presented.

Heading the list of representatives from GVSU will be Pat Sandro, special assistant for charter schools. "We want people to learn what is involved in planning, applying and receiving a charter," said Sandro. "We are sending brochures and information to those who have already inquired about charter schools as the conference is limited to the first 100 people who respond."

Presentations will be given by representatives from the Michigan Partnership for Education, the Michigan State Department of Education and the Michigan High School Athletic Association.

### **Third Department of Education Grant Boosts Total Awarded GVSU to More than \$3 Million**

The U. S. Department of Education has awarded Grand Valley State University (GVSU) three grants totaling \$3,138,339. Administered through the Department's TRIO programs, the funds will support three different educational support programs housed in the university's Academic Resources and Special Programs Division.

One of the programs, the Ronald E. McNair Post-Baccalaureate Achievement Program, is new to Grand Valley and will be funded by a \$775,562 grant effective November 1. Of 621 institutions that applied for McNair funds, only two other Michigan schools received grants.

The McNair program was created by Congress to honor the astronaut who perished in the space shuttle Challenger explosion. It will encourage first generation college students from low-income families to enroll in graduate studies at the doctoral level. Each year, the program will serve 25 students at or above the sophomore level. Participants may be paired with a mentor and take part in activities designed to ready them for graduate studies. Activities will include sessions on research methods, computer applications, preparation for graduate admissions tests, assistance securing financial resources for tuition, and other relevant areas. Summer research and internship positions will also be coordinated through the McNair program.

A \$1.3 million grant recently awarded to GVSU's Upward Bound Program will enable GVSU to continue this program geared for high school students. Upward Bound, for which GVSU previously received a Department of Education Grant, is designed to encourage low-income high school students to become the first in their families to attend college.

A \$966,562 grant will support the TRIO Math and Science program at GVSU. This TRIO program, previously funded by the Department, is designed to increase the success rate of low-income first generation college students enrolled in math and science curricula. These grant funds were available October 1.

### Shuttle Astronaut *Lands* In Allendale for Talk

Space shuttle astronaut Thomas D. Jones will talk about his experiences aboard the shuttle *Endeavor* during a 7:30 p.m. lecture on Thursday, October 26. Sponsored by the Regional Math and Science Center at Grand Valley State University (GVSU), the Grand Rapids Amateur Astronomical Association and N.A.S.A., the lecture is open to the public free of charge.

Jones was selected by NASA for astronaut training in 1990. He was tapped for his first mission, as a science operations officer aboard the space shuttle *Endeavor*, in April 1994. Jones served as the payload commander on his second mission, in October 1994.

Prior to joining NASA, Jones was a senior scientist with a Washington, D.C. firm. From 1988 to 1990 he was a program management engineer at the CIA's Office of Development and Engineering. From 1983-88 he worked toward his Ph.D. in Planetary Science at the University of Arizona in Tucson. Before beginning his doctoral program, Jones served as a U.S. Air Force officer for six years, retiring in 1983 at the rank of captain.

The program will be presented in Loutit Lecture Hall 102, which is located in Henry Hall, a part of Grand Valley's new Science Complex that opened just this fall. Free parking is available in Lot F, across Campus Drive, opposite the Science Complex.

## GVSU Stages Plays By Hispanic-American Writers

Grand Valley State University's (GVSU) Theatre Communications program opens its second production of the season on November 9 with "Common Ground," a presentation of four modern one-act plays by Maria Irene Fornes, Luis Valdez, Jose Rivera, and Migdalia Cruz. Seven performances are scheduled for the Louis Armstrong Theatre through November 19. The theatre is located in the Calder Fine Arts Center on the Allendale campus.

According to director Roger Ellis, the plays survey some of the major concerns of Hispanic playwrights. "Common Ground" suggests the mainstream qualities of these different writers. "Non-Hispanic audiences will recognize many connections between their own lives and the concerns of these plays," says Ellis. "Each one-act chronicles a different part of the experience of living in multicultural America, and the entire evening stimulates strong, positive ideas about the future of our multicultural society."

Jose Rivera's two-character play, *Tape*, leads off the evening, treating audiences to a darkly-comic view of life-after-death. In Rivera's version of Purgatory, the recently-deceased spend eternity replaying tape recordings of every lie they ever told while they were living. At first a strange and even boring prospect, the true horror of such an idea gradually overwhelms the person who has lived all her life by a series of denials.

The second one-act, *Los Vendidos*, by Luis Valdez, then shifts into high, satirical comedy as a bumbling Ronald Reagan attempts to buy used Mexicans to plant in crowds during his public relations campaign as California's Governor. Honest Sancho runs the "Used Mexican and Antique" shop where Valdez sets the hilarious action; and thousands of dollars quickly change hands as the Anglos line up to get their hands on cheap farmworkers, yuppie chicanas, and whomever else can be exploited for profit.

Maria Irene Fornes' absurdist piece, *Dr. Kheal*, concludes the first act. Here a lunatic professor harangues the audience until method finally penetrates the madness. A one-actress *tour de force*, *Dr. Kheal* demonstrates the limits of human reason running up against the paradoxical questions of human love, truth, and free will.

The second act of "Common Ground" is given over entirely to Migdalia Cruz's three-actress play, *Telling Tales*. A "testimony drama," Cruz's piece unravels the childhood experiences of three Hispanic-American women growing up today in tough urban neighborhoods. The poignancy of the women's shared memories creates a richly detailed tapestry of urban life that is far removed from the experience of most middle class Americans.

All of the writers have received much acclaim among audiences and numerous awards from critics over the past two decades. Maria Irene Fornes, the *doyenne* of Hispanic-American writers, is the author of more than two dozen works for the stage. A Cuban immigrant, her work is widely published and she was the founder of New York's acclaimed INTAR Hispanic American Arts Center. Jose Rivera is a Puerto Rican playwright who lives in Los Angeles. He has received sponsorship from the National Endowment, the Rockefeller Foundation, a Fulbright Fellowship, and other awards. Rivera's work has been widely produced on stage and screen, and his most recent play, *Cloud Tectonics*, just completed a successful run at Chicago's Goodman Theatre. Luis Valdez is the celebrated founder of California's Teatro Campesino, a popular theatre group which has toured nationally and internationally for more than 30 years. The ensemble focuses on the political rights of migrant farm workers, educating and radicalizing them in their labor struggles with government and agribusiness. He wrote and directed the films *Zoot Suit* and *La Bamba* in the 1980s, and has held academic appointments at the University of California at Berkeley and Santa Cruz. Migdalia Cruz hails from the Bronx and currently lives in Connecticut. A graduate of Columbia's playwriting program, her work has been regularly produced across the United States for the past 11 years. Many of her plays have been commissioned by professional regional theatres, universities, and arts organizations, and she is a recipient of numerous grants from the National Endowment, the McKnight Foundation, and others.

One of the highlights of GVSU's two-weekend project will be the Allendale visit of playwright Migdalia Cruz to attend the November 17 performance of her play. An informal conversation with the New York writer is scheduled for 3:00 p.m. in the University's main theatre. Ms. Cruz will be honored later that night at a free public reception in the theatre lobby, immediately following the performance.

GVSU students play all but one of the twelve roles in "Common Ground." Kerri Kekseo and Molly O'Rourke will perform as the person and the attendant in Jose Rivera's *Tape*. Staff member Sec Garcia will be seen as Honest Sancho in Valdez' *Los Vendidos*. He will be joined by Alison Ewing, Jeremiah Garza, Meagen Thraen, Shane Horan, and David Noonan as various used Mexicans and public relations executives. Actress Sara Reimers enacts the role of Dr. Kheal in Maria Irene Fornes' piece. Leticia Stong, Elena Garcia, and Sarah Yoder portray the three Hispanic-American women in *Telling Tales*. Lighting will be designed by Sec Garcia, and Jill Dole Hamilton will design costumes and settings.

Tickets for "Common Ground" are \$5 General Admission, \$3 for all students, and \$2 for seniors and the physically challenged. Performances will be held at 8 p.m. on November 9-11, and 17-18, and at 2 p.m. on November 12 and 19. Because of the adult nature of some of the language and situations in the plays, the program is not recommended for families with small children. ### **School of Education Receives Accreditation**

Grand Valley State University's (GVSU) School of Education has been accredited this month by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE), the agency responsible for professional accreditation of teacher education.

Grand Valley, along with 40 other schools that received either initial or continuing accreditation by NCATE's Unit Accreditation Board, joins the 500 schools of education across the country that are professionally accredited. The GVSU School of Education was reaccredited.

Schools seeking NCATE accreditation are required to meet high standards in areas including quality of faculty and graduates and program excellence. On-site visits, document review and accreditation decisions are all carried out by professionals from the education community, including teachers and teacher educators as well as education policy makers and school specialists.

"Continuing accreditation for the School of Education reflects the commitment of the university community, the administration, faculty and staff to the quality preparation of new professional educators and to quality continuing professional education of current teachers and administrators," said Dean Allan Ten Eyck.

The standards require the School of Education to formulate a conceptual framework for each program that is based on current and established research. Students and faculty alike are expected to be able to articulate the framework. Students should be able to explain instructional decisions from a base of knowledge about teaching and learning.

Citing examples of strengths of the Grand Valley program, the Board of Examiners stated "The unit's relationship to the world of practice is its strongest area. K-12 school personnel report excellent relationships with the faculty and students. There is a strong field practice in a multicultural setting, extensive university-school projects and teachers and administrators who report GVSU teachers are the most marketable in the area because of their quality teacher education programs." The cultural diversity of the faculty and the qualified students recruited to the School of Education were also noted as program strengths.

Dykstra's works focus on her interest in the problems of aging. "Dykstra searches for answers in the faces of the elderly, producing large canvases with unflinching close-ups of people who have aged," says Tim Nowakowski, Calder Gallery Director. "Her oils and prints bring the viewer face-to-face with the realities of living, the passage of time and death."

Jeff Jauch's paintings are influenced by his stay in Aix-en-Provence, France this summer. "His motif or subject matter is a patchwork of architecture, trees and fields similar in nature to the post-impressionist painter Paul Cezanne," says Nowakowski. "Like Cezanne, Jauch's works distill the landscape into large areas of light and color, which are then organized carefully in relation to other areas of color. His application of paint is very thick, showing the drags of the brush throughout the surface of each painting," notes Nowakowski.

The Calder Gallery is located in the Calder Fine Arts Center on the Allendale campus. Gallery hours are 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday through Wednesday and Friday, and Thursday from 10 a.m.-7 p.m. The Calder Gallery and the reception are open to the public free of charge. **From Russia With Questions: Business Student Is First Participant  
In New GVSU Exchange Program**



While west Michigan businesses are sizing up corporate opportunities in Russia, a St. Petersburg woman is here, settling down to the books.

Tatiana Soboleva will find no light reading however. As a student in the GVSU Seidman School of Business (SSB), she is enrolled in courses such as managerial accounting, financial policy for managers, marketing management, and an English composition course designed for those who speak English as a second language.

The 22-year old student is the first scholar to study at GVSU under an exchange agreement reached this past spring between the SSB and St. Petersburg State University's Department of Economics.

While academic demands may be great, two organizations have joined together to lighten the financial demands of international study.

The West Michigan/St. Petersburg Region International Exchange Council (WMSPRIEC) initiated a scholarship program at GVSU and presented Soboleva with a \$5,000 scholarship to cover tuition and some living expenses.

Soboleva was also awarded a United States Information Agency (USIA) scholarship of \$6,500 for living expenses. The USIA scholarship is administered by the NAFSA Association of International Educators.

A special orientation for international students at GVSU helped the new student learn where to find university services and become familiar with the facilities. Used to living at home with her parents, Soboleva admits she is still getting used to having roommates in the Ravines, on-campus university apartments.

Soboleva is attending GVSU to enhance her qualifications to work in Russia's emerging investment banking industry. In addition to earning her undergraduate degree in operations research in economics at St. Petersburg State in 1995, she has studied banking and finance in the Summer School of Economics held by the London School of Economics and Political Science, and has completed an internship in the Securities Department of the Northern Trade Bank. From 1993-95 she attended numerous seminars on international banking.

Halfway through her first semester at GVSU, Soboleva says her favorite class is the financial policy course, "But the other classes are very good too, and I really enjoy the school. The biggest difference in approaches to education are that in Russia there is more emphasis on theory, while here they stress the practical aspect; how you can apply theory to practice," says Soboleva.

Currently admitted as an undergraduate student, Soboleva is anxiously awaiting the results of the Graduate Management Admissions Test (GMAT). Her scores on this national standard test will determine her likelihood of being admitted to the Master of Business Administration (MBA) program, her goal at GVSU.

After obtaining her MBA, Soboleva plans to return to Russia where she plans to work for Coopers & Lybrand, an American business management firm, in the portfolio and risk management areas of investment banking.

Under the agreement that brought Soboleva to Grand Valley, students considered for the exchange program must have high academic qualifications, appropriate foreign language skills, two years of study at their home institution, and the ability to successfully complete the course work required by the institution they will travel to. During an initial three-year period, two St. Petersburg State students may attend GVSU, and one GVSU student may enroll there.

"We hope that the agreement will one day be broadened to include an exchange of faculty," said Emery Turner, dean of the GVSU Seidman School of Business. "Such an exchange will allow GVSU faculty to return to the classroom with first-hand knowledge of a developing capitalist economy that will impact world markets, while faculty returning to St. Petersburg can endow their students with strategies to cultivate and manage that growth."

Grand Valley has exchange agreements throughout the world, including those at The Academy of Economics, Krakow, Poland; The University of Sarajevo, Bosnia; Kingston University, Surrey, England; National Chengchi University, Tapei, Taiwan; International Christian University, Tokyo; The Japan Center for Michigan Universities, Hikone, Japan; East China University of Science and Technology, Shanghai, China; The School of Business, Angers, France; The School of Business, Worms, Germany; and The University of Finance and Economics, St. Petersburg.

"I invented a way to make the tones faster and cheaper," said Chren who came up with the idea while working on a paper for a conference. It occurred to him that all tone generators used the binary number system to represent internal operands or numbers. He realized that by using an alternate number system, the little known residue number system used by special purpose, high performance computer systems, he could change tones more quickly. Faster tone changes would mean more data could be sent via the electronic signals in the same amount of time.

"Besides hopping from tone to tone more quickly," Chren added, "my invention also allows the manufacture of tone generators more cheaply." He described how the computer microchip that would produce the tones would be much smaller, about half the size of chips used currently for transmitting data. A smaller chip would mean less cost in manufacturing.

Chren's next move is to find a company that would be interested in developing a prototype of his invention and purchase the rights. "There are definitely companies out there that are interested," he added. "People have been somewhat reluctant to work with an unfamiliar number system. But considering the benefits and advantages of the design, I expect to find a company interested in funding a prototype. While Chren is searching for seed money to develop a prototype, he is also developing one on his own using software tools recently acquired by the laboratory for Very Large Scale Integrated (VLSI) development in the Seymour and Esther Padnos School of Engineering.

Chren believes his invention reflects his teaching mission that includes more than just preparing and delivering lectures to students. "I believe one of the major goals of an instructor is to be a role model for students; I mean this particularly in a technical sense," Chren explained. "Because the material I teach stagnates quickly, I try to be aware of what's happening in the field and bring the tools I use directly into the classroom."

**Hari Singh, chairman of the Economics Department in the GVSU Seidman School of Business**, holds a Ph.D. in Economics from the University of Illinois at Chicago and a master's degree in economics from DAV College in Jullundur, India. He teaches graduate and undergraduate courses and his area of expertise is macro economics.

Singh believes long-term impact would occur if there was a Treasury default.

"The furlough of nonessential government employees, would not have much of an impact on a typical person in America," says Singh.

"It is not a healthy way of negotiating a budget deal," says Singh. "We have to make sure we don't send out the wrong signal to financial markets. Major Treasury Department payments due today and tomorrow will be covered and won't lead to a default now, but this game of political hard-ball with the financial obligations of the Treasury is a dangerous exercise that may have a negative impact on the bond market."

Singh concludes that "Default would really send a wrong signal to financial markets worldwide and therefore future borrowing would be relatively more expensive."

### **Shakespeare Sculptures Stolen; Reward Offered**

Two valued pieces of sculpture were stolen from the Shakespeare Garden on Grand Valley State University's Allendale campus during the Thanksgiving holiday weekend and GVSU President Arend D. Lubbers is offering a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the arrest of those responsible for the theft.

"When a piece of art is stolen, everyone loses," said Lubbers. "I am disturbed and disheartened that such a thing could happen on our campus and I want to do everything I can to facilitate the return of these two important and beautiful pieces of art created by a faculty member."

The two bronze sculptures, "Bust of Shakespeare" and "Robin Goodfellow Fountain," were created by Richard Paschke, Grand Valley professor of Psychology, and put in place in the garden when it was dedicated in October 1993. ### **Palestinian Negotiator to Speak at GVSU**

The Grand Valley State University (GVSU) Lecture Series will feature Salim Tamari, a negotiator in the Palestinian-Israeli conflict, in a 7 p.m. lecture on Thursday, December 14, at the GVSU Eberhard Center.

Tamari will discuss the Palestinian reaction to the recent assassination of Israeli Prime Minister Itzhak Rabin, and the peace process.

"Salim Tamari currently serves on a bilateral working group on refugees, one of the thorniest problem areas in the ongoing Palestinian-Israeli negotiations," said Jim Goode, GVSU associate professor of history and lecture coordinator.

Tamari is a professor at Bir Zeit University in Ramallah on the West Bank. A sociologist well known for his expertise on Palestinian society and culture, Tamari will visit Grand Valley while on a speaking tour in the United States. Tamari is also the director of the Institute for Jerusalem Studies.

The lecture is open to the public free of charge. The GVSU Eberhard Center is located at 301 West Fulton, Grand Rapids.

GVSU professor of Marketing in the Seidman School of Business, holds a Ph.D. in Marketing. He is a well known consultant who co-hosts West Michigan Business Beat, a weekly program on WGUV FM.

Rudolph says, "Consumer debt reached an all-time record last week. This holiday season appears better than most retailers expected. A lot of retailers cut back their open-to-buy accounts this year, expecting a slow down, but were surprised at the strength of the business on Thanksgiving weekend."

Predicting a good season for retailers, he adds "Business fell off sharply after Thanksgiving, but retailers are hopeful this season will end up being better than last year, and last year was a fairly good year.

"Computers are the hot product this year. Many people want to participate on the Internet and people want to try Windows '95. Everyone knew this would be a great year for computers, so retailers are well stocked and no shortage is expected."

The same is not true for soft goods says Rudolph. "The conventional wisdom was that apparel would not do well this season. That turned out to be wrong. Thanksgiving weekend was great for apparel. Since the buyers went light in that category, fewer than usual sales can be expected and some merchandise might be in short supply."

Regarding customers' spending habits, Rudolph notes "For a few years in the early '90s, people were paying off their credit card bills. That trend seems to have concluded. People are using their credit cards this season about the same way they did back in the 1980s. That is, they are spending on credit."
