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
Context

Objectives

- Develop multimedia *pronunciation* resources using *ultrasound* visualization technology
 - Part of a larger project investigating the utility of ultrasound in pronunciation learning across a wide range of languages
 - (e.g., Japanese, Cantonese, Mandarin, French, Spanish, German)











Evaluating the effectiveness of the videos
