FOREWORD

Poverty has become a concrete reality in Mongolia since 1990 and the issue of how to alleviate poverty is a focus of attention of the Government of Mongolia, State agencies and non-government organizations, international and national experts, academics, researchers and international organizations, and this has called for implementation of this work.

We would like to express our deep gratitude to the Mongolian Open Society Forum who initiated and financed the work on developing this Bibliography of materials related to poverty in Mongolia.

This is the first time in Mongolia that a Bibliography of materials related to poverty in Mongolia has been developed.

In selecting works related to poverty in Mongolia, the research team studied materials from the Central State Library, libraries of the Mongolian Academy of Sciences, Economic Institute, other Universities and Colleges, libraries of the National Household Livelihood Capacity Support Program, Poverty Research Unit, Ministry of Science, Technology, Education and Culture, Ministry of Agriculture and Food, Ministry of Social Welfare and Labor, Ministry of Finance and Economy, Ministry of Health, National Statistical Office, Science and Information Park, the library of the Mongolian Open Society Forum, plus reports, papers and other documents of projects and research implemented by the UN and other international organizations. Materials by foreign experts, researchers and international organizations on the issue of poverty in Mongolia were selected from among over 1,200 internet materials, translated into Mongolian and included in the Bibliography. Members of the research team studied each work and included into the bibliography a summary of its contents along with a short review of the work by the member of the team.

We hope that readers will highly appreciate the works included in the bibliography as they examine the issue of poverty in Mongolia from different aspects, as they contain a vast amount of theoretical and practical information, and can help in mastering innovative research methodology.

With regard to the fact that a large part of the works related to poverty in Mongolia has been executed by foreign experts, researchers, international organizations, the Bibliographic methodology is consistent with international standard requirements, so this is a first attempt to develop a Bibliography based on the international bibliographic APA standard and the International Economic literature classification (JEL) in Mongolia.

The research team considers that by introducing the International APA standard and JEL classification into Mongolia, researchers will gain experience in searching for international and local works, and in usage of standard international principles, style, language and classification of social and economic research works, which will become a basis for developing information exchange between Mongolia

and the world in the era of globalization.

Another feature of this Bibliography is the special attention paid to sources gathered from internet, and accordingly their internet addresses and links are indicated.

HOW TO USE THE BIBLIOGRAPHY

General information on each item is organized according to the international APA standard, the contents are coded according to the international JEL classification, and other related information is indexed. Information included in the Bibliography is determined as follows:

Indicators		Explanation
1	Code	With regard to the specific issue related to poverty, its kind and its sector, each work has its own code. The code is given according to the general order and one work has only one code.
2	The name and title of the work	The name of the author and the title of the work are given in Mongolian, titles of foreign works are given in their native language.
3	The profession and official position of the author	The name, citizenship, profession, workplace and position of the author are given.
4	Source	The form and size of the work, organization, individual, library, newspaper, magazine or a web page where it is available are given.
5	Language of publication	The language in which the work was published.
6	Year of publication, pages	When the work was published and the total number of pages.
7	Short contents	The content of the work is described in brief, as follows: the goal and the object of the study, its methodology and the main conclusions.
8	Key words	The key words that can express the basic contents of the work, the goal and object of the study. For example, poverty line, vulnerability to poverty, measurement etc.
9	Recommendations and evaluation made by the team	Included are such points as: advantages and disadvantages of the research work, the main issues and the focus, for what purpose it can be used, and for which people it is suitable.

General information on the work is presented according to APA standard. The international bibliographic APA standard is a bibliographic classification system of social research work, first developed in the USA. At present, it is used worldwide and is a flexible, very upgraded classification, which is constantly renewed with regard to development and progress in internet and communications area.

Because the APA standard organizes bibliographic information in the frame of an established concrete pattern, it helps readers looking for certain books and other works to find easily all the information they require.

Classification in accordance with the APA standard

An article published in the press (a newspaper or a magazine) is classified according to the APA model as follows:

The surname of the author A, the first letter of the author A's name, the surname of the author B, the first letter of the author B's name. (Year). The title of the article. The title of the magazine, the number of the issue, and finally the number of pages.

If published in a newspaper, the number of the issue and the date of publication are also included.

A book chapter:

The surname of the author A, the first letter of the author A's name, the surname of the author B, the first letter of the author B's name. (Year of publication). The name of the chapter. The book editors A & B (Ed), the name of the book (the number of pages in the chapter). Location: the publishing house.

From its content, material included in the Bibliography is assigned a code according to the JEL classification scheme. This scheme was introduced in 1991 and is currently used by authoritative economic magazines and scientific institutions all over the world. Works of all kinds in economics, business studies, finance, banking, management and other social and economic fields are classified with regard to their contents in accordance with the JEL classification.

- Politics (political regimes, State systems, party platforms, concepts etc.)
- Natural environment

Materials within the topic:

Books (textbooks and theoretical works)

Academic works (MA and PhD research)

Project reports (reports of research projects aimed at development of research and policies, decision making)

Publications and articles (articles and other forms of publications published in daily newspapers or magazines).

Search of indexes and lists:

All works included in the Bibliography have a general number and a bibliographic code. For example, the 52^{nd} work has the code 052. As all materials have such a general bibliographic code number, the name of the author and its work can be searched by the code.
