





You should write a closing statement for this complicated trial (in case you have chose the attorney for the plaintiff, your closing statement should be different from that you heard in the film).

Follow the tips on writing a closing statement given below.

Closing statement is a summary of the trial told in a way that twists everything that was done through out the trial. You are to take all statements and turn them in your favor before the jury so that you can convince them that you are correct and the other party is incorrect.

- <u>Step 1:</u> Reestablish your theme and theory. Start with a story again, returning to the theme that was introduced during the opening statement.
- <u>Step 2:</u> Review your evidence. Remind the jury of the facts you promised to prove to them, and take them step by step through the facts of the case as your side sees them. Include expert testimony, witness testimony and physical evidence that support your theory. Point to the promises that have been fulfilled and the ideas proven from the opening statement.
- <u>Step 3:</u> Attack the opposition's case. Use this opportunity to point out discrepancies in the other side's theory. Highlight inconsistencies to discredit anything the other side tried to prove or defend.
- <u>Step 4:</u> Conclude with emotion. Once you have finished reviewing the story as your side sees it, appeal to the emotions of the jury. Make your final statements memorable, so they have your words in their minds as they begin to deliberate. End the argument on a strong and notable message.
