The original Art Resources Collective (Arc) at Yinnar in Gippsland had its origin in an active group of students finishing their studies at the Gippsland School of Art (now Monash's Gippsland Centre for Art and Design) and wanting somewhere to continue working in a collaborative manner.

The Gippsland School of Art was a radical experiment in Art Education, founded by Dutch painter/printmaker Kees Hos. He believed profoundly in freedom, and proved it by risking his life to hide and pipeline to safety fugitive Jews in nazi occupied Holland. His Gippsland art school had 24 hour access, no grades, no crit sessions and a sense of equality between lecturers and students. It valued collaboration and cross-disciplinary practice long before these became fashionable in contemporary art. Hos hired exciting contemporary artists to teach in the school and maintained an ambitious international visiting artist program. Word soon spread and the school attracted ambitious artists as lecturers and students, who were to go on to become some of Australia's leading artists and curators. Above all, the ethos of the school honoured resourcefulness and this was a quality certainly in evidence during Arc's first tenuous years of existence.

Inheriting many of the values of Kees Hos's free art school, Arc proved to be a refuge and lifeline for contemporary Gippsland artists who wanted to remain and practice in the ravishing Gippsland landscape when their courses ended. It helped quality artists to remain in the area, contributing to the exceptional contemporary art scene Central Gippsland enjoys today.

I remember the kerosene lamp-lit inaugural meeting to explore the idea of Arc at artist Rodney Scherer's hobbit-like dwelling in

the Jeeralang Hills. Scherer was the unstoppable motivating force behind Arc in its early years as it rented an abandoned school in Boolarra, then secured ownership of an ex Butter Factory, its present home, in Yinnar.

It has been suggested that Arc was the first artist-run initiative, as we now think of them, in Victoria. The collective work and passion of many artists and administrators and the support of the local community has sustained Arc over a long period when many similar ventures have come and gone.

Arc continues to provide a quality working and exhibiting venue for contemporary artists, curators and musicians in Gippsland and to honour the principles on which it was founded. Long may it thrive.

Opening Speech Arc at 30

I started my studies at Gippsland school of Art in 1980, lured there from Melbourne by its reputation as a radical art school, and my last year of undergraduate study was 1982, the year arc started.

As the end of art school loomed, I went along to a late night meeting at Rod Scherer's hobbit-like house in Bennet's Creek where the idea of arc was first discussed. I had no idea back then that I would end up as the head of the art school and Rod had no idea that he would become the Director of the regional gallery. It just seemed like finishing art school meant a return to the city and a boring day job

Rod and I had quite a good no-income collaboration going, designing and printing posters and t shirts. I remember that we did the other than a nine dash five poster, which celebrated the art school's 24 hour access, sadly a casualty of OHS policies, the inaugural Boolarra wood chop poster, and a tee shirt lampooning the publicity for the NGVs van Gogh blockbuster. That t shirt ended up in the wearable art collection of the Australian National Gallery - I guess that gave me my first inkling that you could forge an art career while living in the country.

A lot of other artists had the same feeling and I guess that's what created the idea of arc. Arc really is a treasure. With no recurrent government funding, it survives in a tiny country town like Yinnar and gives many Gippsland contemporary artists their first solo show as well as providing the focus for many great collaborative exhibitions.

I'm very honoured that arc has invited me to open this wonderful exhibition celebrating it's first thirty years. I was thirty when I first moved to Gippsland (you can do the sums)! I had my first solo show outside art school at arc and next Tuesday I'll be opening my 15th solo show at Australian Galleries just down that street there. (do come along!)

So don't let anyone ever tell you you can't launch an art career from the country. And I think arc's inspirational message is that when a group of people get together and cooperate they can defy all the odds.
