Governors State University Granted Candidacy for Master of Social Work Program

When the master of social work (MSW) program was designated a candidate for accreditation recently, it marked a significant victory for Governors State University and the administrators and faculty who worked hard throughout the year to bring about the successful status change.

Proud of the accomplishment, GSU officials quickly announced to the media, the public and other stakeholders that the Council on Social Work Education had approved the first step in the process leading to accreditation of the university's MSW program. The Council is the national

organization that accredits all undergraduate and graduate social work programs in the United States.

Stuart Fagan, president of Governors State, said, "The council granted us program candidacy status. In other words, they have given us the green light to proceed in the

detailed and time-consuming process of securing accreditation for our MSW degree. They have put us on a fast track for full accreditation for the program. We can now be confident to admit students to the MSW program in the Fall semester of 2002."

Earlier this year, representatives of the council visited the campus to evaluate academic and administrative policies and procedures and to interview faculty, administration, students, and former students.

Based on that investigation, the council issued a report citing the quality and expertise of the faculty and their ability

and commitment to teaching "non-traditional" students. Their report also cited the strong support the program receives from the University's administration, as well as the availability of part-time classes for students who cannot leave their jobs to pursue advanced professional credentials.

Dr. Wanda Bracy, chair of the Division of Social Work, Addictions Studies and Health Administration at Governors State, said, "We are very pleased with the council's decision. We have worked hard to meet their criteria. Over the past months we strengthened our faculty by recruiting some people who have incredible experience in social work and teaching. We have redesigned the curriculum to meet accreditation standards. And now we can admit students to our program next Fall, which is a pre-condition for full accreditation."

Dr. Fagan added, "We are moving quickly to resolve the problems of previous students who graduated before the university secured accreditation for the MSW program. By getting the MSW program on a fast track to accreditation, along with the legislation signed by the governor earlier this year, we are keeping our promise to help our earlier graduates achieve their goals of successful long-term careers."

A Success Story: GSU's Admissions Open House

Governors State University recently hosted its Fall Open House to showcase the outstanding academic programs that GSU has to offer.

Lincoln Laureate awarded to Board of Governors student at GSU

Timothy J. Bowler has received the Lincoln Laureate award for outstanding academic achievement and community service. Bowler is a student in the Board of Governors Bachelor of Arts program at Governors State University. He lives with his family in the Chicago community of West Lawn.

The Lincoln Academy of Illinois, located in Springfield, established the student laureate award in 1975 to honor the tradition of the state and the heritage of former U.S. President Abraham Lincoln. Each year, 52 students attending state colleges and universities receive the award.

Bowler was nominated by GSU faculty and staff for the prestigious award.

He studies hard to maintain an excellent grade point average, holds a fulltime, demanding job, and spends as much time as possible with his wife, Elizabeth, and daughter, Elise.

Bowler is a well-known figure in his community. He is a mortician at the Modell Funeral Home, and, for 17 years, he has volunteered at a support group for recovering alcoholics. Bowler is also a member of the West Lawn Chamber of Commerce and Knights of Columbus.

For Bowler, obtaining an advanced degree is primarily about fulfillment.

"When I finish my bachelor's degree, I am considering a master's degree, possibility in addictions studies. The degrees are largely for my fulfillment and sense of achievement. However, if the opportunity arises, I might consider something relating to addictions studies," he said.

Bowler said juggling the demands of family and work with school, was not as difficult as it could have been.

"I would recommend the Board of Governors degree for adult learners. It's made for those people who have a job, who have a family. It allows you to progress at your own pace and in a manner that is convenient. I've had courses over the Internet, on videotape and correspondence. Because of that, it has been easy getting to this point," he said.

GSU Partnership Receives Funds for Regional Ecosystems Projects

The Thorn Creek Ecosystem Partnership at Governors State University has received more than \$250,000 in state grants to fund a number of ecosystems conservation projects in the south suburban region.

The partnership is composed of local conservationists and environmental groups, educators, state agency representatives, local government officials and concerned citizens. Over the past two years, the group has worked to develop a regional watershed plan to improve ecosystems in the south suburban region.

The projects that were recently funded by the Illinois Department of Natural Resource (IDNR) are outgrowths of the watershed plan.

Karen D'Arcy, coordinator of the partnership and a GSU professor of analytical chemistry said "We want to thank IDNR officials for their support. We are very excited to have received support for projects ranging from wetland restorations and land acquisitions to community outreach and education."

The Thorn Creek Ecosystem Partnership will meet on Monday, January 7 at 4:30 p.m. at Governors State University to discuss the next round of grant proposals to submit for funding consideration. The public is invited to attend.

The projects funded are:

--Thorn Grove Preserve Acquisition-Funds will be used to purchase a 10.5 acre parcel bordering the Thorn Creek Preserve.

--Central Park Wetland Restoration-Funds will be used to continue management and restoration of a 40-acre site and will allow for the movement toward interpretation, education and public enjoyment of the site.

--Survey of the Thorn Creek Watershed project will increase awareness and participation in the Thorn Creek Ecosystem Partnership.

-- Thorn Creek Reserve: Fire, Restora-

tion, Education, and Recreation - Equipment will be purchased for long-term maintenance and restoration of the reserve.

--Small Site Water Stewardship Workshop project will promote the use of management techniques on small sites, both developed and redeveloping, in order to improve habitat and biodiversity, retain storm water and encourage infiltration, and reduce the use of chemicals on landscapes.

--Visioning and Indicators - funds will be used to conduct workshops in the watershed in order to gain knowledge of the watersheds, the concerns for its residents, and the hidden assets of the communities.


He resides in Homewood. One of his sons is a graduate of Governors State University.

GSU Gets New Director of Student Life

It took three days for Lorraine Sibbet, accompanied by her dog, Mr. Bronson, to drive from Sweetwater, Texas, to Park Forest, Ill. At the end of the journey, Dr. Sibbet stepped into her new position as director of student life at Governors State University.

"The moment we got here, Mr. Bronson immediately noticed the climatic changes. He became more energetic," Dr. Sibbet said.

Dr. Sibbet, who now resides in Park Forest, started at GSU on September 4th. She was chosen by GSU officials from a crowded field of competitors who also responded to the national search. Her broad experience administering student programs in higher education placed her far ahead of her competitors.

Since coming to GSU's campus, Sibbet has earned high marks from GSU administrators, staff and students for her

ability to hit the ground running.

In just three months, she has restructured the student life division, created a new Student Media Communications Board, held student elections, and moderated two provost forums.

Currently, Dr. Sibbet is planning the university's Black History month celebration with the assistance of students and staff. She is also laying the groundwork for a student health fair.

"I want to improve student involvement in a wider, more diverse array of clubs, activities, and programs," she said.

Dr. Sibbet is the former dean of students at Texas State Technical College. She has also been vice president for student development at Notre Dame College in Cleveland, Ohio, and vice president for student affairs and dean of students at D'Youville College in Buffalo, N.Y.



Sibbet's professional credentials also include her service as the associate dean of students at Westminister College in New Wilmington, Pa., and associate director of university housing at the University of Pittsburgh.

She has a bachelor's degree in English and secondary education from Allegheny College. From the University of Pittsburgh, Dr. Sibbet earned a master's in counselor education and a Ph.D. in higher education and student personnel.

GSU Nursing Students Inducted Into Honor Society

The Sigma Theta Tau Honor Society of Nursing at Governors State University recently inducted thirty-six undergraduate and graduate nursing students into its ranks. The induction ceremony took place at GSU in the Sherman Music Recital Hall.

The nationwide program recognizes students who demonstrate leadership and scholarship in practice, education, and research to enhance the health of all people. The society boasts an active membership of 120,000 nurses from 90 different countries. The organization annually contributes more than \$650,000 to nursing research through grants, publication scholarships, and monetary awards.

The GSU chapter was chartered in 1989 and its first members were in-

ducted in 1990. Its membership is comprised of undergraduate and graduate students, faculty, and nursing community leaders. Qualifications for membership include a 3.0 grade point average for undergraduates or 3.5 grade point average for graduate students.
