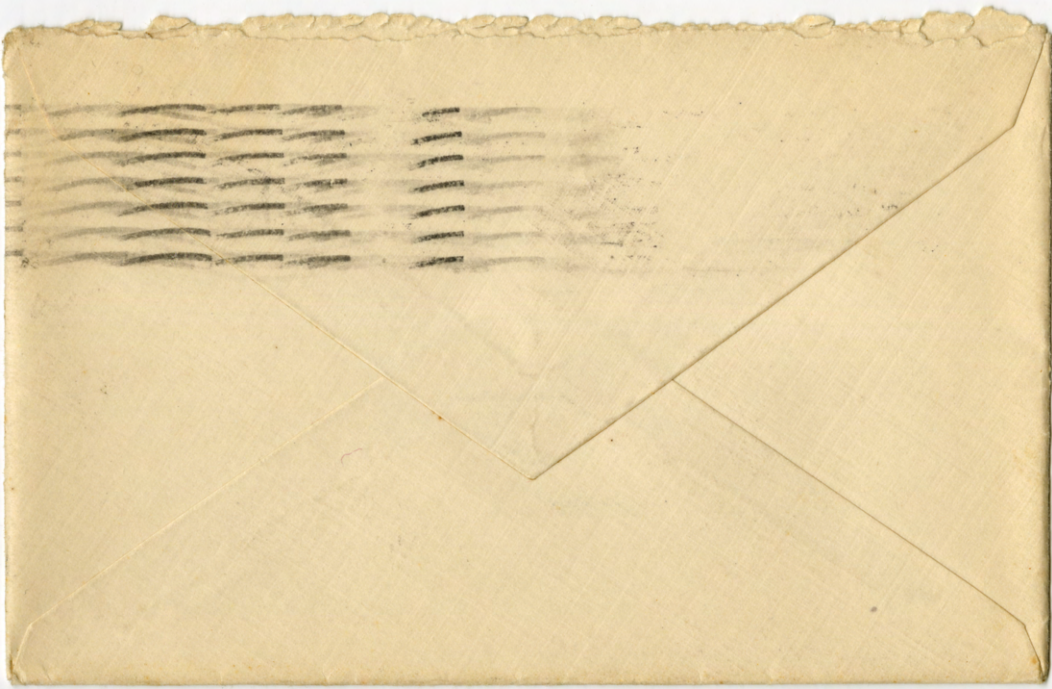

My Dear Mrs. Davison:-

year and the discipline is much more strict than it has been.

Jack is in our room most of the time and really I have seen quite a change in him since I first met him. To tell the truth I really think Jack is discontented. I believe he would be better satisfied at home,

as he always saying "I wish I
