I found after unlocking

fastened in side I went
around the Room took
down some Boards that
had been nailed ~~of~~ over
a broken window and
went in I took them in
the old Cow linter I found
the door fastened that went
to the horse stable also
the door that went into
the drive place and
I could not get in

I stuck my head up
 through a hole in the
 Boards after my head
 and could look around
 pretty well I saw no
 hay possibly 5 or 6 hundred
 in one of the bays
 I have not been in the
 low barn so dont know what
 is there

I understand from your
 letter that you will have
 only one horse if so you
 will not need a great lot
 of hay Possibly I may
 spare what you need
 if Mr + Mrs Dill are coming
 the first of may they
 will be here in good time

to look after all these
things

I have been quit well all
winter how be able to
work in the woods every
day Mrs Leighton is
as well as usual she
had a poor week last week
but is much better again
I am in hopes she will feel
better when the warm
weather comes and she
can get out more I am
sure she will be glad
when you can come
and sit with her
