DEMONSTRATION TRAIN ATTRACTS BIG CROWD

Santa Fe Railway and N. M. A. C. Make Big Hit in New State

LUNA COUNTY THERE

Farmers' Institute Organized With Dr. Conway as President.

Prof. Tinsley and Dr. Garrison must have an idea that Deming is on the map good and hard. The Mimbre Valley must look mighty big to them after the visit of that demonstration train, last Friday, and the vast crowd of intelligent people who came to see them. They will not be greeted by a better crowd in New Mexico.

The big train, all bedecked with appropriate streamers advertising the New Mexico Agricultural College, arrived on schedule time with Prof. J. D. Tinsley, agricultural demonstrator in charge, and accompanied by Dr. W. E. Garrison, head of the college and one of the five educators of the new state. Prof. W. E. Conway, superintendent of the extension department of the college, and another good New Mexico booster, Prof. Simpson, who is an encyclopedist on the raising of stock; Prof. Fiddian Green, who can tell all there is to know about raising trees; Prof. Frederick L. Bisby, government irrigation engineer, who for a long time has been a Mimbre Valley booster and who will make stereotypical slides of some of the editor's kodak films of our pumping plants and irrigation development for use by the Department of Agriculture, Supt. Summers of the Santa Fe and other good helpers, numbering in all about 20.

Of course a demonstration train or any other old train boosting New Mexico wouldn't be complete without Secretary Hening, moving spirit of the Bureau of Immigration and the chief publicity agent west of the Mississippi. For that reason Hening was along.

The train had all kinds of "good news" for the farmers from a fat little 16-month-old Aberdeen Angus weighing half a ton to the big leaded Texaco oil and sleek Dorset Jersey hegs. Finest chickens you ever saw, and apples and other fruits that would make the world sit up and take notice.

With the exception of bright, snappy lectures by Prof. Conway and the temporary organization of a Luna County Farmers' Institute, the whole three hours were spent in rapid-fire questions and answers and examination of the exhibits, including the proper pruning and culture of trees, scientific culture of soil, silos, pumping plants, and everything that goes to make up modern farming.

Supt. Taylor, with his corps of handsome assistants, had the pupils of the public schools to view the exhibits and listen to nice talks by Prof. Conway. The schools marched under military orders and presented a fine appearance.

There was such a mammoth crowd that formal lectures were out of the question, but every representative of the College was working overtime answering questions and giving demonstrations. Many of the school children had pencils and tablets making notes of what they saw and we expect to see some of them getting that ten-dollar prize.

In the lecture car temporary officers for a Luna County Farmers' Institute were elected, Dr. Hoffman being elected president and Willard E. Holt, secretary. S. J. Smith, Dr. Conway and Prof. Holiday being a committee on constitution.

Prof. Conway left a good taste in everybody's mouth by giving the following original New Mexico haunt:

"New Mexico! New Mexico!
I love thy highlands capped with snow;
I love thy valleys far below,
Filled full with forest fruit and flower;
Of tangled vine and leafy bower,
I love thy deserts, once repose,
That blossom now in new-blown rose,

Pierre, was appointed to ascertain the best varieties of commercial fruit trees to plant in the Mimbre Valley and to make report at the next meeting to be held Saturday afternoon, January 20th, at 3:00 p. m. at the Crystal theatre.

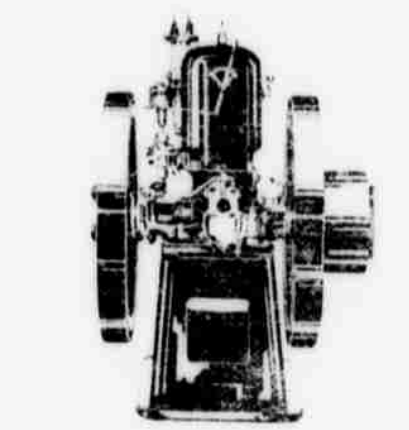
