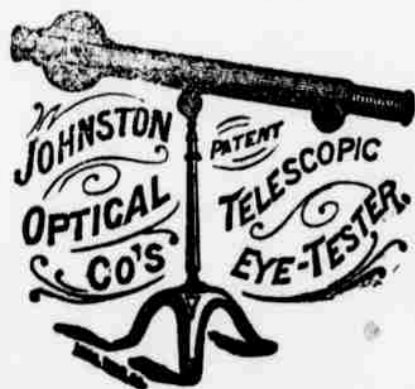

The Floods in Illinois.

Chicago, April 20.—Despatches from along the Rock river, in Illinois, states that the water is higher than ever known before and is doing great damage. At Sterling, Ill., it is twelve feet above low water mark and still rising. The manufacturing interests of Rock Falls, opposite Sterling, is threatened with complete destruction and night and day hundreds of men have worked for dear life to protect their bulkheads and raceway. If the water should raise another foot the loss would be enormous. Several people have been forced to leave their homes. The register office is a foot deep in water and others nearly as bad. The water is 22 inches higher than the high water mark of 1877. The river is two miles wide at several places north and south of here, and many farmers have large fields of wheat under water and whole meadows are equally flooded. Above Elgin the Fox river broke its ice gorge and dam and the ice and water tore down the dams at Carpentersville and Dundee, and at Elgin the river rose two feet above high water mark, breaking the dam and sweeping away the fine iron bridge of the C. M. & St. P. R. R., just south of town, taking barns and out-houses with it, and flooding stores and first floors in the chief streets. The damage so far is \$75,000 to \$100,000. Another ice gorge threatens to do further havoc. All the mills, manufacturers and water powers have suspended operations. The lower part of Sterling is flooded, the fair grounds are submerged and the distillers with hundreds of cattle are on an island with the water crowding dangerously on all sides. The Chicago & Northwestern R. R. track for five miles is completely covered with water and much of it is washed away. Communication with the outside world, except by telegraph, is completely cut off. The river between Sterling and Erie has overflowed and is covering the country for many miles, and if it continues rising the destruction will be fearful. Thousands of people line the river banks watching the fearful flood, which at times swells in waves three or four feet high. At Ft. Atkinson, Wisconsin, all the low lands near the river are flooded and the ice comes down in huge chunks, crushing bridges, dams and everything in its path. Chicago, April 20.—The water in the southwestern part of the city is still rising and is now above high water mark of 1847, the highest point ever reached. The only additional damage done is the flooding of Griffin & Connelly's ice house on the Canal bank at Willow Spring. A despatch from Elgin says that the railroad track is four feet under water and trains cannot pass over it inside of ten days. The bridges are badly demoralized here and at Dundee a great deal of damage has been done. It is thought that the river cannot rise any higher and that the worst of the flood is over. The damage in Elgin yesterday afternoon aggregated \$200,000.

The Booming Missouri.

Omaha, April 20.—The Missouri river to-night is twenty feet and eight inches above low water mark and is within sixteen inches of being as high as the first flood on April 9th. It is still rising rapidly and it is now believed that the river will go higher than ever within the next forty-eight hours as all the tributary streams are swelling out of their banks from the melting snow. A despatch from Sioux City says the river has raised there nine inches since yesterday and is within one foot of the extreme high water and still rising. The Big Sioux, Little Sioux and other tributaries are all beyond their banks and rising still more. The situation at Omaha has again become serious and it is feared that more damage will be done than before as the frost is nearly all out of the ground and it washes easily. The river broke through the levee this afternoon and flooded the lumber yards and filled the base spots to a level with the river. The Union Pacific shops are again flooded and shut down entirely this afternoon together with the Willow Springs Distillery, smelting works and other establishments. The bottom lands on the other side of the river are again inundated and all the dwellings in the low lands on both sides are again being vacated. No interruption has yet occurred to trains reaching the east side of the river to transfer although some of the low roads are obliged to take a roundabout course to get into Council Bluffs. The Elkhorn river rose five feet at Norfolk last night and is still coming up.

John Kelly Wins.

Philadelphia, April 20.—A New York special says that the combination against Kelly was apparently as perfect as anything could be and it was supported by the leading journals as well as by the most influential men in the Democratic party who had begun to tire of wearing the Kelly collar. That such a combination should have been so decidedly beaten is now a most impressive proof of the strength of the machine politics in this city. As for Kelly personally he is delighted beyond measure, as well he may be. He is reported to have expressed himself something after this fashion this morning: "This is the proudest day of my life; my opponents appealed to the rank and file of Tammany Hall to put me out. The appeal has been responded to by putting them out. I don't think they will ever try that game again; it was a Republican and scallawag movement disguised as Reform, but they, as could be seen were under a lion's skin all the while. Still I have no ill feeling towards any one of them; their worse punishment must be their own disappointment and their own disgust over last night's work." It need hardly be added that Bosses triumph is fresh humiliation for his left hand friend Tilden who certainly looked for his overthrow.

Cholera.

New York, April 20.—The Tribune's reporter interviewed Dr. F. N. Oats of 24th street yesterday who said that three cases of cholera have recently come under his knowledge there. It is very unusual to find cases of this nature at this time of the year. He said that he had treated several cases of this kind during the winter. These are the signs which have preceded all the epidemics in New York. Nobody wants to be trotted out as an alarmist of course, but it looks to me as if we should have trouble when the hot weather comes. The Herald says: We have it on authority of the most eminent physicians of the city and their opinion is sustained by the whole profession that New York is now on the verge of a pestilence and that in fact symptoms of the plague have already appeared. The Times says: On the failure of the citizens yesterday the actions on the street clearing bill, especially the Republican members from this city is simply shameful and should not be allowed to fade from public memory. In all probability the Senate will not agree to the Carpenter bill and it is certain that the city doesn't want it. The best thing that can now be done is the enactment of a law placing the power and responsibility in the hands of a single head of street clearing department to be appointed and to be removed by the Mayor. If this or something approaching this in simplicity and effectiveness cannot be obtained from the State Legislature the sooner a vigorous agitation for the self government of this city is begun the better.

Meek Gorham.

New York, April 20.—A Washington dispatch says Jorgensen last night having prepared a card addressed to Gorham he called at the Republican office. Gorham refused to publish it or furnish any other retraction in his paper of what Jorgensen termed misstatements. Then Jorgensen opened on Gorham. Those who were there say he showed himself to be a master of vituperation. The vernacular was exhausted to express his contempt for Gorham. The Senate scenes were not a circumstance to the scene in the Republican office, but Gorham was as impervious as a knot in a log. He could not be insulted. His friends say he possesses amiability to a fair degree, but they had never credited him with power or disposition to sit dumb for an hour under as severe a verbal castigation as ever man received. Yet that is what he did. It was not until Jorgensen had actually talked himself tired that he gave up and left Gorham to his reflections.

The Baltimore Postmaster.

Washington, April 20.—Four Baltimore delegations visited the President to-day in regard to the city Postmastership. The President said that he would try and appoint a man acceptable to the great business interests of the city, and not to suit any faction, unless such a man was proposed with greater unanimity than now was apparent. He said that he might go outside of the city, or even appoint a Democrat.

Frye's Speech.

Washington, April 20.—Senator Frye made an ultra speech to-day, presenting numerous election outrages in the south, having them enrolled on manuscript. It was very severe and may react against Robertson. The Democrats regard Frye as a representing the administration and this afternoon there was considerable talk among them of defeating Robertson as a measure of revenge.

Fighting Editors.

Cleveland, April 20.—Editor Cowles of the Leader and Iceripps and Sweeney of the Pennsylvania press are engaged in a war to the knife. The controversy has already originated several libel suits, all because of Cowles' kicking a press reporter out of his office because he believed he was a blackmailer. War is especially prolific of denunciatory editorials.

Reid Didn't Resign.

Cleveland, April 20.—Col. John Hay who is now here at home denies that Whitelaw Reid has resigned the editorship of the New York Tribune to be succeeded by him. Col. Hay says that Reid has no thought of resigning the editorship, and the story probably originated from the fact that Col. Hay will take Reid's place during his temporary absence.

A New Fester.

New York, April 20.—John Giscoom of this city will begin in Chicago under the immediate supervision and sole control of Prof. Haines of the Rush medical college a fast of fifteen days on or about the first of May. Giscoom left for Chicago a few days ago and has no doubt ere this placed himself at the disposal of Dr. Haines who is described by prominent medical men here as fully competent to carry out the task he has undertaken. It is expected that the forthcoming experiment will furnish what the Tanner and Duell affairs did not, namely, many valuable data as to the chemistry, physiology and general appearance of protracted starvation. Giscoom is rather under middle age, of tolerably compact physique and the wildest of enthusiasts.

Kansas Crops.

Chicago, April 20.—Reports collected within ten days from every county in Kansas regarding the crops show that on the whole the winter wheat crop is in excellent condition, better than usual at this season. Everything now depends upon rain. The past few days have been exceedingly hot and windy and in some places the dirt has been blown so as to expose the roots of the wheat to the sun, but little damage has been done as yet. A good warm rain would have been of benefit. The farmers say that with favorable weather the crop will be the largest ever harvested in Kansas. Spring wheat is in an unfavorable condition.

A Wrecked Schooner.

San Francisco, April 20.—The American whaling bark which went on the rocks at the Awanui Reads is a total wreck. She was twelve months out from New Bedford with 200 barrels of oil. The schooner Lizzie from the South Seas reports that Capt Schwartz landed on Solomon Group to trade and the trader at the village was surrounded by the natives and tomahawked. The savages then rushed for the boat but the crew regained it first and pushed off. A report has also been received that the Captain of the Black Hawk has also been murdered by the natives but the report is unconfirmed.

Ancient Feud Culminates.

Uvalde, Texas, April 20.—A long standing feud between the families of Gen. John R. Gaylor and Mr. Gilchrist culminated yesterday by a fight between Gen. Gaylor and one son on one side and Gilchrist and two sons on the other, in which the elder Gilchrist was killed outright and one of his sons mortally and the other seriously wounded; young Gaylor was slightly hurt. Both families are prominent and well known. Gen. Gaylor was governor of New Mexico some years ago.

Pacific Slope Senators.

Chicago, April 20.—A despatch from Washington says that the Senators from the Pacific Slope are beginning to express apprehensions lest the dead lock should continue and prevent the ratification of the Chinese treaties. According to the terms these documents and ratifications must be exchanged within one year after the execution of the documents, and the time will expire about the middle of November.

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Circuit Court to-day, before Judge Lowells hearing was had on bill in Equity for the removal of the Cuffee trust of A. and W. Sprague. Gen. Butler and Gen. Pryor appeared for the complainants. On hearing of the question of jurisdiction the case was continued for a week for the consideration of that point.

Guilty.

Colorado Springs, April 20.—The trial of Conty, the murderer of Tom Perkins at Buena Vista, was concluded here to-day. The jury remained out two hours and then returned a verdict of murder in the first degree. A motion for a new trial will be made. Judge Helm who goes to Denver tomorrow will hear the arguments next Saturday.

Whitelaw Reid.

New York, April 20.—Whitelaw Reid this morning denied that he was about to retire from the Editorship of the Tribune and also denied that he was going to take the Berlin Mission. Col. Hay has kindly consented to edit the Tribune for him during his absence in Europe, but Hay has stipulated that he will not remain over six months.

Mormon Missionaries.

Cheyenne, April 20.—Forty-four Mormon missionaries passed over the Union Pacific road to-day on their way to Wales on a proselyting expedition. They are all inferior and coarse looking. The men, most of them, have from two to five wives at home. They will work in the mining and iron districts in Wales.

Nominations.

Washington, April 20.—The President nominated R. A. Elmore of New York for Second Assistant Postmaster General and W. A. M. Gaier of Pennsylvania Third Assistant. A. D. Hazen was appointed Assistant Attorney General of the Postoffice Department.

Fire.

New York, April 20.—The saw mill of Buck & Aisch, on West 11th St. together with a small house adjoining the building, burned this forenoon. Loss, \$50,000, which was insured.

Beaconsfield.

London, April 20.—It is understood that the friends and relatives of the late Beaconsfield are willing to assent to a public funeral and burial of the remains at West Minister Abbey.

Will Confirm Longstreet.

Washington, April 20.—It is generally believed that Longstreet will be confirmed U. S. Marshal by practically a unanimous vote.

Guadalquivir.

Madrid, April 20.—The Guadalquivir is again raising. It has rose 16 feet in two days and several places are inundated.

The "Constitution" Safe.

Washington, April 20.—The frigate Constitution arrived at Piney Point to-day.

Dave Rudabaugh Convicted.

The case of Dave Rudabaugh accused of murdering Lopez, one of the jailors in this city, was tried before the district court in Santa Fe on Tuesday. Maj. M. A. Breeden and G. Gordon Posey appeared for Rudabaugh and Col. Wm. Breeden for the prosecution. The case consumed the whole day and was given to the jury at 8:30 p. m. After being out an hour and a half the jury returned a verdict of murder in the first degree. It is said that Rudabaugh was perfectly calm throughout the progress of the trial. We clip the following from the New Mexican giving a resume of his testimony: "He said that they went to the jail together to see Webb and were admitted by the jailor. He was standing with his hands resting upon the timber above the cell door when he heard a shot and turned around to find that Allen had killed the man that had let them in. He turned to run and saw a man running out of the kitchen with a revolver in his hand. The prisoner stepped out of range by going into a doorway and from there made his way into the street. He ran and overtook a hack and he and Allen who had preceded him, got in and drove off. The story was very consistent with the facts as they appeared in evidence, excepting that it threw the blame upon Allen. All the statements made by witnesses except to the actual killing and who fired the fatal shot were dove tailed in very cleverly and if the account had come from a man of better character than Rudabaugh's and under different circumstances it would possibly have carried conviction with it."

Rudabaugh's counsel gave notice that they would appeal the case to the higher court, and he was remanded back to jail. The case will come up before the Supreme Court next December.

Lincoln for President in 1854.

The Washington correspondent of the New York Sun writing of what he regards as Garfield's weakness to become president for yet a second term quotes the following comments:

"Were I compelled to select from this administration the man most likely to succeed Garfield, I would take the youngest of them all. I mean Secretary Lincoln." This was said by one old in the service and independent in his position among leading republicans. "The name is a preliminary battle won; and the man so far as I can hear, suits the name. He promises at his age a great deal more than his father did. He is ambitious only to do his work well. I consider he has the best introduction to the country of any man of his time; perhaps of any time; and though it may sound strange in our ears, I tell you there are to-day more presidential possibilities in the modest, hard-working, and thoroughly intelligent secretary of war than in any other man in the nation. This sounds strangely only because it is new. But it will bear thinking of. Lincoln's selection by Garfield was purely a sentimental idea. Other men have made similar mistakes. Don't think too lightly of this, gentlemen."

More than twenty years of active participation in public affairs and the management of the republican party gave weight to the words of the veteran politician. Similar expressions are not infrequently heard among republicans.

GAZETTE CLEANINGS.

The track of the street railway is laid to the Sumner House.

An assayer and mining surveyor has opened an office in Deming.

A. B. Sager Esq. advertises a large amount of town property in his hands for sale.

With a few more spring rains hay will be down to eight dollars a ton next fall.

It is reported that a San Francisco newspaper man will start a paper at Deming.

A beautiful settled rain set in yesterday afternoon and continued during the night.

The planing mill of Rupe & Castle is constantly running at full speed with a full complement of hands.

Both trains were on time yesterday each being a double header, the trains being long, though not very heavily loaded.

The railway route agent who went down yesterday was obliged to work the mail in a baggage car. The paper mail was not worked but the letter mail came through all right.

Track laying on the A. T. & S. F.'s El Paso branch is progressing well. An average of a mile and a half daily is laid. Tuesday night the track was 27.32 miles out from Rincon junction.

The grass is starting up finely this spring and the numerous spring rains will insure a luxurious growth. Extremes often follow each other and New Mexico will undoubtedly yield a crop of grain this year, as much above the average as the crop last year was below.

George M. Pullman's private car went east yesterday. It contained Mr. Pullman's family and several friends, in all, ten in the party. They were just returning from California having gone out by the upper route. The car is one of the finest in the country, and attracted a deal of attention at the station.

An Indian Scare.

A report of another Indian outbreak in the southern country is going the rounds of the press. This time it is in the Florida Mts., twelve miles south of Deming Junction, where it is reported that the reds undertook to "jump" one of the numerous little camps that have sprung up in that rich district. On the 12th, as two men were returning to their camp on the east side, which is known as Capitol Dome camp, they heard bullets whistling about their heads and saw several fall very near them. They were but a short distance from camp, but in order to reach it would have been obliged to go through a cañon before they could join their fellow miners. Two of their number had ridden over to Deming that morning and they accordingly thought it best to go to the junction for reinforcements before attempting to make camp. After finding the two other miners in Deming the quartette set out for Capitol Dome; reconnoitering they finally made camp finding that no Indians had been seen and no bullets had passed near the camp. It is thought the bullets must have been glanced shots from a party availing themselves of the excellent hunting in the mountains. Some enterprising newspaper correspondent telegraphed to the Tucson Star the account of an Indian excitement on the small basis of the report of the two miners, which has been magnified every time it was copied.

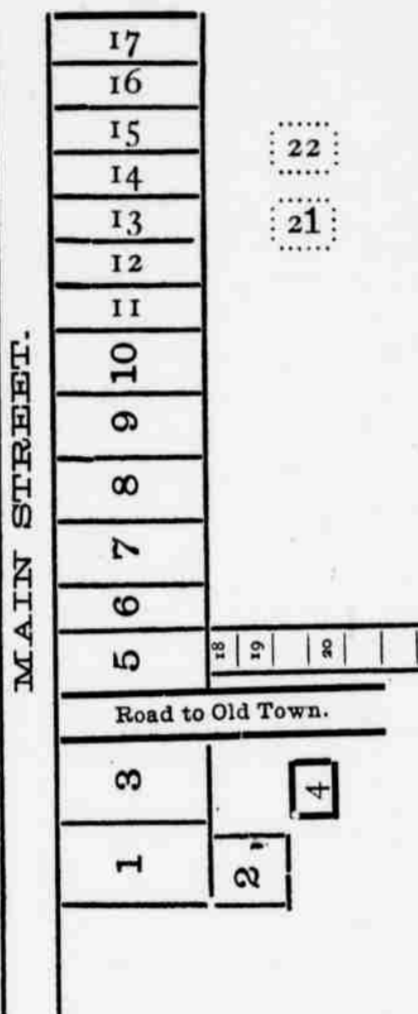

Sensible.

C. E. Patterson, Esq., of White Oaks, has obtained an interest in the "South Homestake" mine. He writes to his brother in this city that they are taking out immense amounts of ore and sacking it for shipment to St. Louis. They have thousands of dollars worth of ore already sacked for shipment. This is the way to do business for when ore is reduced in a distant metropolis and turns out well, it will induce large amounts of capital to flow in that direction. The sooner the rich ores are sent abroad for treatment the sooner capital will bring reduction works into the country so that it can be worked at home. The question is frequently asked, why, if the ore is so rich in New Mexico, it is not shipped abroad to be treated as was the first ore taken from the famous Leadville mines? It is stated on good authority that within thirty hours after the rich silver strike was made in Leadville thousands of pounds of ore were on the road to the reduction works at Denver. The quantity continued to increase until capital which is always on the alert for a paying investment carried machinery into the mines and there worked the rich ores. The individual miner may know the wealth of his mine but capital, which is proverbially panicky and nervous concerning new investments, will never move to his assistance in any considerable amounts until it is demonstrated beyond the shadow of a doubt that there is something to be made. Miners, it will pay to associate yourselves together and ship some of the richest ores abroad!
